Cuba's newly appointed Ambassador, Ernesto Meléndez Bachs, was born in 1939. He is an economist and was appointed Ambassador in Bulgaria in 1965 and Ambassador in Czechoslovakia in 1966. In recent years he has been Minister at the Ministry for Foreign Investment and Economic Cooperation and has served as Ambassador in Tokyo. His most recent appointment was at the Higher Institute of International Relations in Havana.

Germany's newly appointed ambassador, Dr Wolfgang Trautwein, was born in 1946 and holds law

degrees from the universities of Saarbrücken and London. He is a career diplomat and in recent years has worked at the German Embassy in London and has led the UN Division and the North African, Near and Middle Eastern Affairs Division at the German Federal Foreign Office. His most recent appointment was as Deputy Permanent Representative of Germany to the United Nations in New York.

Brazil's newly appointed Ambassador, Antonino Lisboa Mena Gonçalves, was born in 1947. He entered Brazil's foreign ministry in 1970 and in recent years has worked as Minister at his country's embassy in Washington D.C. and as General Director of the America Department at the foreign ministry in Brasilia. His most recent appointment was as Brazil's Ambassador in La Paz, Bolivia.

Yemen's newly appointed Ambassador, Abdulmalik A. El-Eryani, was born in 1963. He is an economist and has mainly served in the country's administration, specialising in economic and industrial issues. During the period 2001-2003, he was a member of the Yemen government, serving as Minister for Tourism and Environment. Ambassador El-Eryani is concurrently accredited to The Hague, the Netherlands.

Government Bill on Swedish participation in UN mission in Lebanon

The Government has presented a Bill to the Riksdag proposing Swedish participation in the United Nations Interim Force in Lebanon (UNIFIL) for six months. Sweden intends to send one corvette to the UNIFIL naval component.

The mission is being carried out within the framework of Security Council resolution 1701, which emphasises the importance of the Lebanese government restoring sovereignty over the whole of its territory. The Resolution establishes that a reinforced UNIFIL is to support Lebanon's government in securing the country's borders and preventing the import of weapons or the like that have not been approved by the government.

"By contributing to UNIFIL, Sweden sends a clear message about its strong support of the UN and multilateral solutions. It demonstrates strong Swedish commitment to Lebanon's unity and sovereignty," says Minister for Foreign Affairs Jan Eliasson.

Sweden has contributed SEK 84.2 million to humanitarian measures in Lebanon and is one of the largest donors in the EU as regards both the UN appeal and the total amount of humanitarian aid. Swedish initiatives are now being implemented and planned for the early reconstruction of Lebanon.

Sweden has also helped to increase the total amount of international support to the reconstruction of Lebanon by means of the conference that was held in Stockholm on 31 August.

The Government has decided to send two long-term and three short-term observers to Nicaragua ahead of the parliamentary and presidential elections that are to take place on 5 November. The election observers are part of a joint EU mission that is expected to comprise a total of 94 people.

"By sending election observers, Sweden and the EU can help to ensure that correctly-conducted democratic elections are held in the country. This is an important condition for continued development in the country," says Minister for International Development Cooperation Carin Jämtin.

Nicaragua is one of Sweden's primary partner countries in Latin America. Development cooperation aims to support Nicaragua's efforts to reduce poverty and contribute to democratic development.

Swedish support to weapons destruction in Tajikistan

The Government Offices decided today to give EUR 100 000 to the final phase of the Organisation for Security and Cooperation in Europe (OSCE) project regarding small arms and light weapons and conventional ammunition in

Tajikistan.

The project aims at destroying small arms and light weapons and conventional ammunition, increasing security in the handling, storing and documentation of the material, and building a national capability for dealing with these activities in the future.

The project is led and administered by the OSCE Mission in Dushanbe in cooperation with Tajik authorities. The Mission reports to the OSCE Forum for Security Cooperation in Vienna, where all participating OSCE states are represented. Sweden's representative at the Forum for Security Cooperation, Colonel Claes Nilsson, is coordinator for the OSCE light weapons project in 2005 and 2006.

Sweden has already provided a total of SEK 1.6 million to the project.

Since the programme began in the summer of 2005, some 12 tonnes of conventional ammunition has been destroyed. The destruction of a total of 26 000 small arms and light weapons began in June 2006, when the destruction facility in the country became operational. Security improvements as well as renovation and construction of secure weapon and ammunition depots are underway and will be completed before the end of the year.

Report on global challenges launched

A report on global public goods has been launched in conjunction with the IMF and World Bank Annual Meetings in Singapore on Monday 18 September. The report addresses threats facing humanity, including the spread of communicable diseases, climate change as a result of the greenhouse effect, financial instability, international terrorism as well as the proliferation and use of nuclear weapons.

The report states that these transboundary problems demand renewed commitment to international cooperation. The report proposes reforms of central international institutions and points out the importance of all states contributing politically and economically. In addition, a number of concrete proposals are presented on how to deal with pressing challenges.

Sweden and France together appointed the international task force that has produced the report.

Leif Pagrotsky signs education agreement with China

Today Sweden's Minister for Education, Research and Culture Leif Pagrotsky and Chinese Ambassador Lu Fengding signed an agreement to facilitate student exchanges between China and Sweden.

"China is a major actor in the global arena and it is important that we create opportunities for increased exchanges between our countries," says Mr Pagrotsky in a comment on the agreement.

The agreement aims to facilitate cooperation between Swedish and Chinese universities and colleges. On the Swedish side, responsibility for international cooperation is delegated to the individual higher education institutions, but the agreement will considerably simplify contacts with Chinese counterparts.

"Last year I signed a research agreement with China and now we also have an agreement on higher education in place. At present close to 200 Swedish students are studying in China and just over 900 Chinese in Sweden. I would like many more Swedish students to go to China and more Chinese students to come to us. Increased exchanges lead to increased knowledge and lifelong links and are of great benefit to Sweden," says Mr Pagrotsky.

Barbro Holmberg to take part in UN meeting on migration

The UN high level dialogue on migration and development begins in New York on 14 September. This is the first time that ministers from UN member states are to meet and discuss how migration can promote development and what needs to be done to counter its negative aspects. The Swedish delegation will be led by Minister for Migration and Asylum Policy Barbro Holmberg.

"Migration is one of the most important global issues of the future and it brings with it incredible development capacity. When people move, knowledge and experience are spread. The amount of money migrants send home is already more than twice as much as all development assistance. In countries with an ageing population, immigration can be an important supplement to the labour force. But there are also drawbacks. People are taken advantage of and treated badly. This is something we must deal with," says Ms Holmberg.

"Migration is a transboundary issue and has to be managed in cooperation with other countries. The fact that the UN is now highlighting the issue of migration and development for the first time is an initial step towards being able to make better use of the potential presented by migration and counter its drawbacks."

Sweden has been proactive in highlighting the migration issue internationally, including by initiating the Global Commission on International Migration (GCIM), whose report is part of the material on which the high level dialogue is based.

Increased Swedish support to research on HIV and AIDS

Sweden has decided to contribute SEK 15 million to each of three research organisations for their work with vaccines and microbicides against HIV and AIDS. The organisations are the International AIDS Vaccine Initiative (IAVI), the International Partnership for Microbicides (IPM) and the Population Council.

"Research is long-term and costly and, for HIV and AIDS, unusually complicated. Since Sweden actively pursues issues on preventive measures it is natural for us to give support to research on vaccines and microbicides. Our increased contribution gives us the opportunity to put economic weight behind our policy in the area of HIV/AIDS. Research, preventive measures, care and treatment as well as opinion forming with regard to the causes and consequences of the pandemic are all important parts of our cohesive strategy against HIV/AIDS," says Minister for International Development Cooperation Carin Jämtin.

Sweden has also given economic support to the three organisations in the past, in part through Sida/SAREC and in part through the Ministry for Foreign Affairs. The evenly distributed contributions amounted to a total of SEK 12 million in 2004 and a total of SEK 30 million in 2005. This year, the support is increased by a total of SEK 15 million, amounting to SEK 45 million.

Increased Swedish support to Global Environmental Facility

An agreement to top up the Global Environmental Facility (GEF) with more than SEK 22 billion for the period 2006-2010 was reached at a meeting in Cape Town, South Africa, at the end of August.

A total of 32 donors including China, India and South Africa will contribute to the topping up of the Global Environmental Facility. Sweden is one of the few countries to increase its contribution to the Facility with a pledge of SEK 850 million.

"Global environmental issues require more cooperation to achieve internationally set goals. Sweden's strong commitment to the climate, biological diversity and the handling of chemicals is demonstrated by our support to the Facility," says Minister for the Environment Lena Sommestad.

"More resources are needed if we are to be able to deal with global environmental threats. Rich countries must take greater responsibility to ensure that resources are available for these efforts. Swedish support reflects our conviction that the Facility is an extremely important multilateral actor," says Minister for International Development Cooperation Carin Jämtin.

The Global Environmental Facility was established in 1991 to finance investments in developing and former eastern bloc countries. The Facility, which currently has 176 member states, cooperates closely with organisations including the World Bank, UNDP and UNEP. Since it was set up, the Facility has distributed more than SEK 44 billion in grants and has acquired approximately SEK 145 billion more from other sources. At present the Facility supports 1 800 environmental projects in 140 countries.

Sweden grants debt relief to Congo

The Government decided today to grant debt relief to the Democratic Republic of Congo in the framework of the HIPC-initiative, an international agreement to assist the poorest and most heavily indebted countries to achieve a sustainable debt.

The decision is based on a multilateral agreement in the Paris Club and consists in the cancellation of about 70 per cent of Congo's payments to Sweden between June 30, 2005 and Mars 31, 2006. Payments during this period amount to about 38 million kronor in Swedish kronor, of which about 26 million kronor are cancelled. Congo shall make the remaining payments between 2010 and 2027.

The Paris Club is a group of official creditors from 19 industrialized countries.

Harvard professorship in memory of Anna Lindh

The Kennedy School of Government at Harvard University today announced the appointment of Samantha Power to be the first holder of the chair named in memory of Sweden's late Minister for Foreign Affairs, the "Anna Lindh Professor of Practice of Global Leadership and Public Policy".

David T. Ellwood, Dean of the Kennedy School of Government, announced the appointment today at a ceremony at Harvard attended by Minister for Foreign Affairs Jan Eliasson.

"With her commitment to human rights and her epoch-making work on genocide, Samantha Power will be a strong and worthy first holder of the Anna Lindh Professorship at Harvard University. By this appointment, Harvard is securing Anna Lindh's memory and position in international politics," says Mr Eliasson.

Samantha Power came to the Kennedy School in July 2000 after a number of years of work as a journalist. She has written several books on foreign policy and human rights and has received several awards for her writings. In 2003 she won the prestigious Pulitzer Prize for her book "A Problem from Hell: America and the Age of Genocide".

The establishment of the professorship has been actively supported by Prime Minister Göran Persson, the Ministry for Foreign Affairs, Anna Lindh's family, the Anna Lindh Memorial Fund and

the Confederation of Swedish Enterprise. The professorship is largely financed by funds from the business sector and private foundations. Most of the funding comes from the telecommunications company Ericsson, which has contributed USD 1 million. Other contributors include the Barbro Osher Pro Suecia Foundation, the Bank of Sweden Tercentenary Foundation, the Swedish Foundation for International Cooperation in Research and Higher Education, Ambassador Lyndon Olson Jr. and Dr S. Alan Counter.

He resumed his duties in 1992 and since then he has served as Consul-General in New York, Ambassador in Lebanon, Director of Special Policy for Science and Technology at the Ministry of Foreign Affairs in Santiago and most recently Ambassador in Jordan.

Mexico's newly appointed ambassador is Norma Bertha Pensado Moreno, born in 1958. She has served in her country's Ministry for Foreign Affairs since 1981 and in recent years served as Counsellor in Vienna, at the Mexican Delegation to the OECD in Paris and from 2001 to 2004 at the Embassy of Mexico in Stockholm. Most recently she has served as Director General for Europe at her country's Ministry for Foreign Affairs.

Slovenia's newly appointed Ambassador, Vojislav Suc, was born in 1954. He entered his country's foreign service in 1991 and has served as Consul-General in New York as well as serving two separate spells as Head of Department at the Ministry of Foreign Affairs in Ljubljana, first heading the Department for Multilateral Political Relations and most recently as Head of the Division for North and Latin America and the Caribbean.

Namibia's newly appointed Ambassador Theresia Samaria was born in 1947. She started as an accountant at the Municipality of Kuisebmond, Walvis Bay and subsequently became Chairperson of the Management Committee of the Walvis Bay Town Council before being elected Mayor. Ambassodor Theresia Samaria served most recently in Botswana where she was High Commissioner.

Denmark's newly appointed ambassador, Tom Risdahl Jensen, was born in 1947 and has served in the Danish Foreign Service since 1977. His former posts include Counsellor in Bonn and Director, Ambassador, North Group, in Copenhagen. His most recent post was in London, where he was

Ambassador since 2001.

Jan Eliasson welcomes Security Council Resolution on Darfur

On 31 August, the UN Security Council adopted Resolution 1706 on the Darfur region in Sudan. The Resolution announces that UMIS, the UN peace-keeping mission in Sudan, will be expanded to include some 20 000 people. The primary task of UNMIS is to support implementation of the peace agreement entered into on 5 May between the government of Sudan and parts of the rebel movement in Darfur.

"I welcome this Resolution. It will lay the basis for a vigorous international commitment to bring an end to the conflict in Darfur. The government in Khartoum has not been able to shoulder its responsibility to protect its people. I would therefore urge the government in Sudan to accept the UN initiative," says Minister for Foreign Affairs Jan Eliasson.

"We cannot tacitly accept a situation in which Darfur collapses into an even deeper spiral of violence and suffering. It is important that the Resolution can be fully implemented," says Mr Eliasson.

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Sweden is heavily committed to efforts to bring the conflict in Darfur to an end and has taken part in the peace negotiations in Abuja. Sweden is also contributing military experts, police officers, medical experts and financial support to AMIS, the African Union's peace mission in Darfur, and, in addition, is reviewing the possibilities of contributing to a future UN mission.

Sweden is also participating in UNMIS, the UN mission in the southern region of Sudan, whose task is to monitor the peace agreement between the Sudanese government and the rebel movement (SPLM/A). Swedish humanitarian support to Sudan amounts to some SEK 210 million per year.

Priority given to work on remediation of barrels containing toxic waste

In an open letter to the Minister of the Environment, the World Wide Fund for Nature (WWF) urges the Government to draw up an action plan for safe waste management of the barrels of toxic waste outside Sundsvall. Thanks to the fact that the Government has given priority to remediation appropriations in this year's budget, resources for this work are already available at the Swedish Environmental Protection Agency.

"I share the concern of the WWF and ever since the discovery of these barrels have been following this work carefully. For its part, the Government has been able to increase the budget appropriation earmarked for the remediation of contaminated areas in recent years. At present there are abundant resources for needs of this kind," says Minister of the Environment Lena Sommestad.

The Swedish Environmental Protection Agency receives just over SEK 500 million a year from the state, and it should be possible to earmark this money for the investigation and remediation of contaminated areas. The Västernorrland county administrative board and the Swedish Environmental Protection Agency are currently discussing the need for further investigations to ascertain the extent of the dumping and the effects on the environment of a possible leakage.

At the same time, a dialogue is underway with the countries around the Baltic Sea on dumping problems in these waters. The Swedish Environmental Protection Agency will keep the countries involved continuously informed on the measures being taken.

"Since the Baltic Sea is so sensitive to environmental disturbances, it is important that the countries around the Baltic Sea are informed and that we work together on this type of problem.

Unfortunately, there are probably other places where similar dumping has taken place," says Ms Sommestad.

The conference, which is being organised together with Norway and Spain, will also deal with the issues of access for relief organisations and the need to quickly repair the damage in war-torn Gaza.

Minister for International Development Cooperation Carin Jämtin warmly welcomes accredited media representatives to a meeting in the Conference Media Centre, Grand Hôtel, at 13.00.

In May, the UN made a revised emergency appeal for the Palestinian territories in which it requested USD 384 million. To date, only USD 162 million has been paid out. Sweden has contributed SEK 80 million to the appeal. In addition, Sweden is providing humanitarian aid via other organisations and actors in the region. Humanitarian aid from Sweden during 2006 will amount to SEK 360 million, which makes Sweden the fourth largest humanitarian donor to the Palestinians.

Ban stops use of brominated flame retardant in Sweden

The Government decided today to ban the use of the brominated flame retardant decaBDE. The ban applies to decaBDE in new products such as textiles, upholstery and cables.

"Today, decaBDE is found in both humans and birds of prey. Some studies indicate that this substance can disturb brain development and that it can be broken down into other, more dangerous substances. This is why we have chosen to go ahead of the EU and propose a national ban", says Minister for the Environment Lena Sommestad.

This substance is the subject of a risk assessment at EU level and the conclusion there is that further studies must be conducted to reduce the considerable uncertainties found in the assessment. A study on mice conducted in Sweden, in which disturbances in the development of the brain have been found, is one of the studies that many people believe should be repeated. The Union's own scientific committee, however, is of the opinion that we should not wait for further studies to be conducted before taking risk reduction measures against decaBDE.

"It is very positive that Sweden is taking the lead and introducing a national ban. There is already sufficient evidence to indicate that decaBDE is harmful to health and the environment, so it's high time that we take action", says Kjell-Erik Karlsson of the Left Party.

Certain groups of goods will be exempted from the ban, such as vehicles and electrical and electronic equipment, since these are already regulated in the EU. Today, certain other brominated flame retardants are already banned in the EU.

In October 2005, the Commission decided on an exemption for, in principle, all use of decaBDE in what is termed the RoHS Directive (restricting the use of certain hazardous substances in electrical and electronic equipment), motivating this decision by stating that it has not been shown to entail any risk to the consumer. The RoHS Directive bans the use of such substances as mercury and certain brominated flame retardants in new electrical and electronic equipment. Several member states entered reservations against the decision and stated that the Commission was not qualified to take such a decision. The European Parliament and Denmark have also decided to sue the Commission at the European Court of Justice so as to get the decision annulled. Sweden will intervene in this case on the side of the Parliament and Denmark.

"In our opinion, the Commission's decision totally lacks legal basis. It was on my initiative that the Parliament went to the Court," says Carl Schlyter, the Green MEP. "If scientific evidence and common sense are allowed to prevail, the European Parliament and Denmark, with Swedish assistance, will win in the Court, and the decision on these exemptions will be revoked. This will provide even stronger protection for people and the environment."

The proposed national ban will enter into force on 1 January 2007. It is based on an agreement between the Government, the Green Party and the Left Party.

Ahmed Yusuf may be deleted from UN sanctions list

On Wednesday evening, the Government requested the United Nations to remove Ahmed Yusuf from the sanctions list of individuals who have had their assets frozen because of alleged association with Al-Qaida, the Taliban and Usama bin Laden.

The Government has learned that the United States, which originally requested that Ahmed Yusuf be put on the list, now supports delisting.

"It is extremely pleasing that this message has finally come. It is most important for Mr Yusuf himself, who will be removed from the UN sanctions list after nearly five years. But it is also important for all those who have persevered in their efforts to enable Mr Yusuf to be removed from the list," says State Secretary for Foreign Affairs Hans Dahlgren.

The UN Sanctions Committee will now make a decision on the Swedish Government's request for delisting, which may take several days. The Government has no reason to believe that the Committee will deny this request. After that, it will remain for the European Commission also to decide to delete Mr Yusuf from the EU list. This will cancel the freezing of Mr Yusuf's assets and the travel restrictions applying to him.

"What has happened illustrates that the UN sanctions need reform, that better legal security is needed in the system and that it must become easier to remove individuals from the sanctions list who obviously do not belong there," says Mr Dahlgren.

Background

In November 2001 Ahmed Yusuf and two other Swedes, along with the Swedish organisation Al Barakaat, were listed by the UN Sanctions Committee because they were alleged to have been associated with Al-Qaida, the Taliban and Usama bin Laden. The UN decision was then implemented by an EU decision and the Swedes' financial assets were frozen. Later, travel restrictions were also imposed.

On many occasions since the decision, the Government has requested that the Swedes be deleted from the list as no investigation proved any association with Al-Qaida and the others. Two of the Swedes were delisted in consultation with the United States in autumn 2002. Regarding Ahmed Yusuf, however, the US authorities considered there were still unresolved questions that made them unwilling to agree to his delisting. Since decisions by the Sanctions Committee, whose members are the same as the countries represented in the Security Council, require unanimity it was impossible to obtain approval for delisting against the will of the United States.

Since then the Government has worked intensively, in tandem with Ahmed Yusuf's lawyer, to convince the US authorities that there is no reason to keep Mr Yusuf on the list. The US authorities have now arrived at the same conclusion as the Swedish Government, namely, that Mr Yusuf should be taken off the sanctions list.

Sweden recalls observers from Sri Lanka

Sweden will be successively recalling the Swedish members of the Nordic observer mission SLMM (Sri Lanka Monitoring Mission) from Sri Lanka.

All the observers will have been recalled before 1 September, due to the fact that one of the parties involved in the conflict, the Tamil Tigers LTTE (Liberation Tigers of Tamil Eelam), has declared that it no longer accept the inclusion of citizens of EU states in the Nordic observer mission in Sri Lanka. The presence of the observers is based on the agreement of the parties on SLMM's composition and their undertaking to guarantee its security.

"In the situation that has arisen we have no choice other than to recall the Swedish observers. I regret the attitude of the Tamil Tigers. This implies a reinterpretation of the ceasefire agreement and is in contravention of the international agreements stating that personnel in international monitoring missions do not represent their governments but only themselves and their missions", says Minister for Foreign Affairs Jan Eliasson.

"The forced withdrawal of personnel from Denmark, Finland and Sweden - constituting more than half of the SLMM contingent - may weaken the ceasefire agreement. So I want to again urge the Tamil Tigers to reconsider their decision. Sweden is prepared to send back Swedish observers if it is possible to find a solution to the issue of SKMM's composition and the safety of its personnel. We are therefore awaiting Norway's continued contacts with the parties concerning the future of SLMM".

Since 1998 Norway has been acting as mediator in the peace process between LTTE and the government of Sri Lanka. Talks between the parties led to the signing of a ceasefire agreement in February 2002. As part of the agreement SLMM was established in March 2002 to monitor compliance with the ceasefire agreement.

The Mission consists of 60 unarmed Nordic observers - 16 Norwegian, 15 Swedish, 13 Danish, 12 Finnish and 4 Icelandic - and has been led since 1 April 2006 by the Swedish Brigadier General Ulf Henricsson.

A large part of SLMM's activities consist of investigating accusations of violations of the ceasefire agreement, marking international presence and facilitating mediation in conflicts at the local level.

After EU's listing of LTTE as a terrorist organisation on 29 May, LTTE declared that Denmark, Finland and Sweden were no longer regarded as being neutral in their work for SLMM and must therefore withdraw from the assignment by 1 September. In July Sweden sent an emissary, Ambassador Anders Oljelund, to discuss directly with the LTTE the issue of continued Swedish participation in SLMM with reference to the crucial role of SLMM in the monitoring of the ceasefire agreement.

The government of Sri Lanka has opposed LTTE's unilateral decision to exclude observers from EU member states from SLMM. Both Finland and Denmark have reported that they are planning to recall their observers before 1 September.

Largest evacuation ever

To date, 8 027 Swedish citizens and other people resident in our country have received help in evacuating from Lebanon to Sweden since the unrest in Lebanon began.

Of these, 7 573 have travelled on aircraft chartered by Sweden's Ministry for Foreign Affairs. Most recently, about a hundred arrived last night at Stockholm-Arlanda Airport on one of these aircraft.

"This means that Sweden has undertaken the largest evacuation of Swedes ever", says State Secretary for Foreign Affairs Hans Dahlgren.

By comparison, between 800 and 900 Swedes were evacuated in connection with the Cyprus crisis in 1974.

So far, the Ministry for Foreign Affairs has chartered 51 aircraft, three ships for shuttle services between Beirut and Cyprus, as well as some 15 buses for transport to Syria.

The Swedes who were in southern Lebanon south of the Litani River, and with whom the Ministry has had contact, have all now been able to leave the area.

"During this crisis, as long there are Swedes remaining in Lebanon who want to be evacuated, Swedish efforts to help them will continue," says the State Secretary for Foreign Affairs.

During the evacuation work, Sweden has cooperated closely with the other Nordic countries, EU countries and with the UN and other organisations.

Revised guidelines for democracy support through organisations linked to political parties

On 27 July the Government adopted revised guidelines for democracy support to developing countries, Western Balkan countries and Eastern European countries provided through organisations linked to political parties.

Increased support for vaccination in poor countries

The Government has decided that Sweden will contribute more than SEK 270 million over a period of 15 years to the International Finance Facility for Immunisation (IFFIm). The intention is to help the international community to rapidly obtain more resources for increased vaccination in the poor countries of the world.

"This financing will enable us to help save millions of lives in poor countries in the years ahead," says Minister for International Development Cooperation Carin Jämtin.

"This supplements our continued strong support and direct payments to the Global Alliance for Vaccines and Immunisation (GAVI) and other support for the fight against communicable diseases," says Ms Jämtin.

The fight against communicable diseases is one of four priority areas in Swedish development cooperation. The idea behind Sweden's long-term but financially limited support to IFFIm is to show donor countries that are not able at present to immediately allocate extra funds from national budgets that it is still possible to quickly increase aid in an area given priority.

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The International Finance Facility for Immunisation (IFFIm)

borrows money in international capital markets by issuing bonds guaranteed by donor countries' legally binding future aid increases. The donor countries also undertake to pay a certain amount of interest to bondholders.

These bonds are an attractive investment for institutional investors and others seeking secure future returns. The money that IFFIm borrows is then transferred to the GAVI Alliance (Global Alliance for Vaccines and Immunisation), which provides financial support to vaccination programmes in poor countries. IFFIm's target is to collect USD 4 billion, which, if achieved, will make it possible to save an estimated 10 million lives, according to GAVI's calculations.

Clarification concerning European stem cell research

Yesterday, after a long and animated meeting, EU research ministers were finally able to agree on EU research policy for the period 2007 - 2013, the Seventh Framework Programme.

Since reports have circulated in some of the media about new restrictions in stem cell research, the Ministry of Education, Research and Culture would like in this press release to clarify yesterday's decision in Brussels.

The countries that wanted to stop EU funding for stem cell research were sufficiently numerous at yesterday's meeting to achieve a blocking minority, thus preventing a decision.

However, after strong pressure from Swedish research minister Leif Pagrotsky and others, those who are in favour of stem cell research nonetheless managed to obtain the support of enough countries to reach a decision.

The decision means that the proposed text for the Seventh Framework Programme was adopted as it stood. In addition, the Commission made a statement worded as follows:

"The European Commission will continue with the current practice and will not submit to the Regulatory Committee proposals for projects which include research activities which destroy human embryos, including for the procurement of stem cells. The exclusion of funding of this step of research will not prevent Community funding of subsequent steps involving human embryonic stem cells."

The effect of the research ministers' decision and the Commission statement is that stem cell research is eligible for funding out of resources from the EU's Seventh Framework Programme, which has a budget of some SEK 470 billion, in accordance with current practice under the present Sixth Framework Programme.

Research minister Leif Pagrotsky comments:

"Because our line has prevailed, more money than ever will be available to European research. The outcome of yesterday's meeting is a great success for research and for everyone who hopes that stem cell research can yield results in the fight against currently incurable diseases such as Parkinson's, Alzheimer's and leukaemia."

New Ambassador for international cooperation against trafficking in human beings

The Government has appointed Anders Oljelund as Ambassador for international cooperation in the fight against human trafficking.

"Our intention is to put increasing pressure on the people organising this shameful trade. The goal is to stop it completely. More intensive cooperation at international and regional levels is needed to deal with this type of crime. Anders Oljelund's task will be to strengthen and coordinate these efforts", says Minister for Foreign Affairs Jan Eliasson, commenting on the decision.

Human trafficking is a complex problem rooted in poverty, marginalisation and ideas about the subordination of women and children as well as in inadequate protection of human rights. Trafficking in human beings is closely linked to international organised crime and to inadequate protection of human rights. It is therefore one of the greatest security threats today.

Anders Oljelund will coordinate the Ministry for Foreign Affairs' work on fighting human trafficking and will promote Sweden's international cooperation in fighting all forms of trade in human beings, including trafficking for sexual purposes, forced labour, the trade in organs and in mercenaries. These efforts also involve fighting the causes of human trafficking, promoting preventive measures and strengthening the protection of victims.

Anders Oljelund, who takes up his new post in August 2006, is currently Director at the Ministry for Foreign Affairs. He was appointed in January 2006 as a mediator in the Darfur conflict in Sudan, as a member of the EU Special Representative's staff in Sudan. His previous appointments have included posts as Ambassador and Head of the Swedish NATO delegation in Brussels, followed by Head of the Department for Global Development at the Ministry for Foreign Affairs. Anders Oljelund has also served in Kinshasa and Rome.

Björn Carlson to receive the 2006 Swedish Baltic Sea Water Award

The Swedish financier Björn Carlsson has been named as the winner of the 2006 Swedish Baltic Sea Water Award.

The Swedish Baltic Sea Water Award is a regional award established by the Swedish Government to draw attention to direct, practical initiatives that help improve the quality of water in the Baltic Sea. Mr Carlsson is the first Swede to receive this mark of distinction in the eight years that the prize has been awarded.

In 2005, Björn Carlsson personally donated SEK 500 million (USD 62.6 million) to the recently established Baltic Sea Foundation. The donation will be used for interdisciplinary projects and creative initiatives that support and help improve the quality of water in the Baltic Sea. The Foundation, which began its work on 1 January 2006, is administered jointly by the Royal Swedish Academy of Sciences and Åbo Akademi University.

According to the award committee chair, Ulla-Britt Fallenius of the Swedish Environmental Protection Agency, Mr Carlsson's individual initiative for improving the marine environment of the Baltic Sea is unique. It is the largest donation ever in the forty years that various institutions and organisations have been working on the Baltic Sea.

The prize money of SEK 100 000 will be presented on 25 August 2006 during World Water Week in Stockholm.

The prize, which has been awarded annually since 1999, is administered by the Stockholm International Water Institute (SIWI). Previous award winners include Vodokanal, St Petersburg's municipal water utility and its General Director Felix Karmazinov, the Nature Management and Water Environment Division of Fyn County, Denmark and Frantschach Swiecie SA, Poland.

Increased Swedish support to peace mission in Darfur

On 18 July 2006 Sweden is participating in a donor conference for AMIS, the African Union (AU) peace-keeping mission in Darfur in Sudan. The conference is being held in Brussels. Leading the Swedish delegation is Ambassador Marika Fahlén. At the conference, Sweden will announce a further contribution of SEK 10 million in support of the AU and AMIS. The money will make possible the continued and strengthened participation of Swedish civilian personnel and help in the form of expertise and experience through such means as training programmes.

"The situation in Darfur remains serious. By strengthening the African Union's capacity, Sweden will provide additional support to efforts to create peace in the region," says Minister for International Development Cooperation Carin Jämtin.

"We already contribute to the AU in the form of both civilian and military personnel. Our increased support should be seen as a contribution to strengthen the AU mission in Darfur pending a UN takeover."

A peace agreement between the Sudanese government and some of the rebel groups has been in effect since May 2006, but despite this the disturbances continue. Since summer 2004 AMIS has been in place as a peace-keeping force under a UN mandate and now monitors the peace agreement. Sweden currently provides 3 military experts and 6 civil police officers to AMIS. The Swedish Rescue Services Agency, within the framework of the EU support mission, runs a medical services operation with the aim of strengthening AMIS's capacity in the medical field.

Efforts continue with undiminished intensity to help the remaining Swedes out of the area as quickly and as safely as possible.

"I would also like to express my appreciation for all those here at home and on site in the region who are working extremely hard and often under difficult conditions to assist in this relief effort," says Mr Persson.

Sweden joins air transport programme

The Government has decided that Sweden will join the multinational Strategic Airlift Interim Solution (SALIS) programme in order to increase its capability to participate in peace-support operations.

"Membership of SALIS means that Sweden will increase its opportunities to participate in peace-support operations over long distances. It is an important step in being able to address the current lack of strategic air transport capability. This is a shortcoming we share with other European countries and it is positive that we can cooperate in finding solutions," says Minister for Defence Leni Björklund.

SALIS is a multinational arrangement between sixteen countries. The arrangement aims at providing the member states with access to strategic air transport capability in connection with peace-support and humanitarian operations. The term strategic transport refers to transport of heavy loads over long distances. The aircraft that SALIS member countries will have access to are An-124-100s, which can carry loads of up to 120 tonnes. In all, the programme deals with possible access to six aircraft. Two of these will be chartered by SALIS on a full-time basis, which provides rapid access to considerable transport capacity. An additional four aircraft will be available upon request. The current arrangement will be in effect for a three-year period.

Membership of SALIS means that Sweden will be able to pre-book flying time at a predetermined cost. Under the agreement, Sweden has reserved some 40 flying hours per year, but more time can be booked upon request.

The Government took a decision to sign the SALIS Partnership Cooperation Agreement at a cabinet meeting on 29 June.

Swedish military units listed with UN and Partnership for Peace

The Government has decided to update the listing of units for peace support operations in the UN Force Catalogue and to adopt partnership objectives within the framework of the Partnership for Peace.

The UN maintains a force catalogue called the UN Stand-by Arrangement System (UNSAS). It contains military, police and civilian components, primarily from UN Member States. Swedish resources are already listed in this catalogue, and the Government's decision means that previous listings will be updated.

Since 1995, Sweden has also been participating in the Peace Planning and Review Process (PARP), which is carried out within the Partnership for Peace (PfP). Participation in the PARP aims at developing Swedish military units and capabilities that, together with troops from other countries, can be called on in international peace support and humanitarian operations.

Simply put, the Government's decision concerns which units and what military capabilities Sweden lists with the UN and the PfP force catalogues. The decision of whether Sweden will ultimately make military units available for an operation is always taken by the Swedish Government or the Riksdag.

All listed units and capabilities are included in existing budgets and correspond to the units the Government listed in the EU Force Catalogue on 23 March 2006.

The Government took a decision on the listings at the Cabinet meeting on 29 June.

Statement by Minister for Foreign Affairs Jan Eliasson and Minister for International Development Cooperation Carin Jämtin: Sweden calls for humanitarian access to Gaza

"The living conditions of the civilian population in the Gaza Strip are close to untenable. A humanitarian disaster is near at hand. The effect on the civilian population is very severe.

"Violence and destruction must cease and international humanitarian law must be respected. Humanitarian access must be guaranteed so that measures to protect the civilian population can be initiated.

"Eliminating electric power in Gaza is having devastating consequences. Large sections of the civilian population - women, children, old people and the ill do not have electricity. The supply of fresh water has been cut off. Waste management plants and sewage pumps are immobilised, with grave consequences for the health of the civilian population. There is no electric power for technical equipment essential to hospitals. The fuel tanks of back-up generators will soon be empty.

"The deliberate bombing of civilian targets - of central importance to the survival of the civilian population - such as electric power, the supply of fresh water and sewage management violates international humanitarian law and can be considered a form of collective punishment of the civilian population.

"We are very concerned about the intensification of violence in Gaza. The disproportionate use of violence must cease. Innocent civilians find themselves in a hostage-like situation in a very complicated drama.

"We urge the Palestinian side to immediately release captured Israelis and to immediately cease firing rockets into Israeli territory.

"We urge Israel to immediately cease firing on and bombing civilian targets in Gaza and to immediately undertake measures to help and facilitate the re-establishment of vital functions in the Gaza Strip such as electric power, the supply of fresh water and sewage management.

"We further urge Israel to immediately provide humanitarian access and to facilitate the import of foods, fuel, medicine and spare parts to Gaza to stop an impending humanitarian disaster.

"Israel must immediately release the detained Palestinian politicians or bring charges against them in a court of law."

Swedish support to improve international humanitarian operations

The Government Offices have decided to contribute SEK 30 million to a new system for improving the international community's operations in humanitarian crises.

The system will also make it easier to initiate reconstruction efforts at an earlier stage. The leading humanitarian organisations have agreed to divide the responsibility for different types of operations among themselves. The money will primarily go to the UN bodies UNICEF, UNHCR, UNDP, WFP and WHO so that they can build up capacity in the form of personnel, equipment and material so as to be able to take immediate responsibility for relief requirements within the framework of their new areas of responsibility.

"The new system will contribute to faster and more effective humanitarian operations. Examples of such operations could be the efforts immediately following the earthquake in Pakistan or in the ongoing humanitarian crisis in northern Uganda, where some two million people are living as refugees," says Minister for International Development Cooperation Carin Jämtin.

According to an independent evaluation of the international community's operational capacity in humanitarian crises, relief organisations have become increasingly more effective at saving lives and alleviating the suffering of people in situations of conflict and disaster, but there are still substantial gaps and delays in the relief efforts. As a result of the evaluation commissioned by the UN, a number of reforms of the humanitarian system have been initiated with the aim of improving financing for humanitarian assistance and strengthening the capacity, efficiency and coordination of operations in the field. Sweden has supported these reforms and was proactive in the work with establishing the UN's new Central Emergency Response Fund for humanitarian crises.

Commission on Oil Independence presents its report

The Commission on Oil Independence was appointed by the Government in December 2005. Its remit was to present a concrete strategy to break Sweden's

dependence on oil by 2020 - so there will be alternatives should prices rise - and tangibly reduce our actual use of oil. In this way, Sweden will be in a better position to secure its long-term energy supply, reduce climate impact, develop new technology, improve competitiveness and make better use of energy resources from forestry and agriculture.

The Commission presented its report today. Commenting on the report, Prime Minister Göran Persson says:

"The report is an important first step towards Sweden becoming independent of oil. My assessment is that this can be difficult to achieve by 2020. Moreover, the rate of progress is affected by a number of factors that are outside the scope of national policy. The clear direction of the report is a good basis for positive development.

"The Commission's work has been characterised by its members' expertise in industry, agriculture and forestry, science and energy efficiency. All of them have been prepared to compromise. No one has reached their own optimal position on every issue. The result has been a consensus report. There is one single issue on which we have not agreed: whether Sweden should press to abolish Europe's protective tariffs on its own ethanol production. In every other respect, the Commission is in total agreement."

"I am now hoping for a broad discussion on the Commission's proposals so that the report can contribute to increased knowledge and offensive action from industry and consumers as well as from the agricultural and forestry sectors. The report will form the basis of the further work - analyses, inquiries, and proposals - that is necessary to develop a policy that can consolidate and develop Sweden as a pioneer in the transition to sustainable development."

Commission Secretary-General Stefan Edman says:

"The Commission's report opens up many exciting opportunities for Sweden. We show that by taking measures at this stage, it is possible to counter a future oil shortage and rising oil prices in a way that also promotes development, growth and employment. The report also indicates a number of conflicting objectives. I am convinced, for example, that it is possible to find a balance between increased forestry production and ambitious goals for biological diversity and nature conservation."

Conclusions of the report

Overall objectives and measures

The Commission has worked to ensure that Sweden will be able achieve the following objectives by 2020:

- · energy efficiency improvement in society as a whole by at least 20 per cent,
- · 40-50 per cent less petrol and diesel in road transport,
- · 25-40 per cent less oil in industry,
- · no oil for the heating of residential and commercial buildings.

A special centre for energy efficiency is proposed. Its task will be to move issues forward, evaluate and submit annual reports to the Government and Riksdag on energy efficiency in homes, vehicles and industry.

Alternative fuels

The greatest consumption of oil products takes place on the roads. To break this dependence, a rapid increase in the use of alternative fuels is necessary. Production of fuel from the Swedish forestry and agriculture sectors must increase. The Commission proposes the following measures.

- · New plants. The Government should contribute to the initiation of a number of pilot and demoplants to start production of "second generation biofuels" such as synthetic gas fuels, forest-based ethanol and biogas from the bio-based raw materials that are most efficient from the point of view of acreage and energy.
- · Increased forest take-off. Forest growth needs to be increased in the long term by 15-20 per cent through more efficient management in the form of clearing, thinning out, refined plant material, ditch clearing and fertilisation as well as through intensive cultivation of spruce and broad-leaf trees on a few per cent of the acreage.
- · Energy crops. Arable land and disused, non-afforested farmland can be cultivated with energy crops and energy broad-leaf trees on a scale of 300 000-500 000 hectares.
- · Demand for biovehicles. Promotion of vehicles running on alternative fuels should continue through measures at national as well as local level. Public procurement can contribute to technological development. Government agencies should procure vehicles with new technology, thus accelerating the phasing out of fossil fuels and putting a premium on efficient vehicles.

More efficient transport

Potential fuel production is limited by the acreage of forest and arable land, as well as by the energy used in the production process. If availability of alternative fuels in the future is to meet the demand, fuel consumption of cars and lorries must be reduced.

- · More efficient vehicles. By such means as hybrid cars, an increased proportion of diesel-run vehicles, renewal of the vehicle fleet and better materials, Swedish cars could become on average 25–50 per cent more efficient by 2020. The Commission would like to see greater incentives for fuel-efficient vehicles and reduced carbon dioxide emissions.
- · Environmental classification. Fuel efficiency should be included as a factor in environmental classification of cars. The Commission recommends that consideration be given to the different size groups for cars. In this way, the necessary technological development can be pursued on a broad front in all the various car classes.
- · Energy labelling. To make consumer choice easier, consideration should be given to introducing an energy-labelling system. Such systems currently exist in

the United Kingdom and the Netherlands.

· Planning. Traffic planning can be improved by the use of systems including ITS (intelligent transport systems) and GPS. Car-pooling should be encouraged.

The Commission also proposes a series of measures to improve efficiency and reduce goods transport on the roads, to strengthen the public transport system and railways and encourage the use of IT, for instance, to increase distance work.

Residential and commercial buildings

The use of oil for heating has decreased rapidly in recent decades. To do away in practice with all the oil used for heating, an increase in biofuels and greater energy efficiency are essential.

- · New construction. Incentives for new production of low-energy buildings should be created. The Commission recommends the introduction of stricter building regulations and new incentives to encourage building in an energy-efficient way.
- · Rebuilding and modernisation. Energy efficiency programmes are proposed to provide increased knowledge and greater motivation to modernise existing residential and commercial buildings not least in the "million homes programme" for improved energy efficiency. A reduction in direct electric heating should be speeded up. The Government should lead the way in efforts to improve efficiency.
- · Thermal power technology. District heating has a central role in the phasing out of oil. Existing and future power stations should be supplemented by thermal power technology so they are able to produce electricity as well as heat.

Industry

The Commission has set the ambition that half the heating oil used in industry must be replaced by biofuels by 2020 and that oil for industrial processes must be replaced whenever possible by biofuels or energy gases.

- · Policy instruments. Incentives may be needed if the oil used for heating or steam is to be replaced by biofuels or district heating.
- · Efficiency improvement. Greater cooperation between institutes of technology and primary industries could promote improvements in energy efficiency. Major benefits could also be gained by mapping energy use and efficiency improvement programmes drawn up jointly by company management and employees.
- · Knowledge. Small and medium-sized enterprises should be provided with supplementary support through energy offices and energy consultants.

Research

The Commission also indicates a series of research and development projects that could be decisive in the long term for further reducing our oil use. This includes projects on solar cells, fuel cells, hybrid vehicles, wave energy and improvements in energy systems in residential buildings and industry.

Swedish contribution to reconstruction in Georgia

Sweden plans to contribute SEK 10 million for projects in the agricultural sector in South Ossetia. This promise of a contribution was given in connection with a donor conference on South Ossetia in Brussels on 14 June, convened by Chairman-in-Office of the Organisation for Security and Cooperation in Europe (OSCE), Belgian foreign minister Karel de Gucht.

The aim of the conference was to obtain financing for projects in agriculture, energy and infrastructure and for the development of small enterprises in South Ossetia. It is hoped that support

to economic reconstruction in the conflict zone and its surrounding areas will result in confidence-building measures and inject new energy into the peace process in South Ossetia.

"I welcome this initiative by the OSCE and am particularly pleased that the parties to the conflict were able to agree on the confidence-building measures that were proposed. I hope that the Swedish contribution will help these development initiatives in South Ossetia to contribute to greater security for the population in the region and to reduce the tensions," says Minister for International Development Cooperation Carin Jämtin.

A factor of particular importance is that through this conference, the OSCE is drawing a link between the mutual relationship between security and development.

A conflict broke out when the Georgian province of South Ossetia declared its independence in connection with the collapse of the Soviet Union. An agreement on a ceasefire was negotiated in 1992, but it has not yet been possible to conclude a peace agreement.

Swedish development assistance to Georgia has doubled in recent years and for the period 2006-2009 is expected to amount to SEK 100 million per year.

National action plan on women, peace and security - UN Security Council Resolution 1325

The Government today adopted a national action plan for the implementation of UN Security Council Resolution 1325 on Women, Peace and Security.

"Women are often particularly vulnerable during conflicts. At the same time, women in conflict areas are often excluded from measures aimed at preventing armed conflicts, managing crises and building peace. The national action plan is both a map and a compass for the Government's intensified efforts to strengthen protection for women in conflicts," says Minister for Foreign Affairs Jan Eliasson.

The Swedish action plan contains measures at national, regional and global levels. These include enhancing the training of personnel in international operations to increase security for women and girls. In addition, more women will be included in Sweden's contributions to peace-support operations. A special "1325 delegation" will also be set up for consultation with researchers, civil society and others. Moreover, Sweden will work to ensure that a gender perspective is included in peace and security-building operations within the framework of the UN, the EU and the OSCE.

UN Resolution 1325 on Women, Peace and Security was adopted unanimously by the Security Council in October 2000. It is intended to increase women's equal participation in conflict prevention, peace support and peace-building, and to strengthen the protection of women and girls in conflicts.

Carin Jämtin in talks on new United Nations Human Rights Council

On 12 June, Minister for International Development Cooperation Carin Jämtin met Swedish non-governmental organisations for consultation prior to the first meeting of the new United Nations Human Rights Council. Some twenty representatives of organisations including Amnesty, Save the Children Sweden, the Church of Sweden, and the Swedish Federation for Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual and Transgender Rights, RFSL, took part.

The United Nations Human Rights Council will open its first session in Geneva on 19 June. Ms Jämtin stated that the Government hoped the new Council would mean greater effectiveness in the work to promote human rights.

Ms Jämtin's main point was that the Council should primarily aim to follow up the implementation of commitments that have already been made.

The new Council replaces the former Commission on Human Rights.

"I want the Council to be more operational and goal-oriented. Council discussions must produce concrete results on the ground," said Ms Jämtin.

She also said that Sweden is advocating that the same generous conditions should apply for non-governmental organisations to participate in the new Council as in the Commission. Another Swedish demand is that the status and mandate of the UN Special Rapporteurs should be retained.

The new United Nations Council for Human Rights will convene three times a year. It may also convene in emergencies. The first session will be held on 19-30 June. The following sessions will take place in September and December.

Sweden is not a member of the Council during the current period. Under an agreement on Nordic rotation, Finland has sought and won election to the Council. As an observer, however, Sweden will both take part in the meetings and express its opinions.

"It is important to cooperate with the regional level in the United States in the fight against climate change. California has ambitious targets for climate policy and lies well to the fore in work on sustainable transport solutions. It shares Sweden's goal to break dependence on oil and is focusing particularly on alternative motor fuels," says Lena Sommestad.

Sweden currently has the largest fleet of biogas-fuelled vehicles in the world. Sweden has unique knowledge and technology for using biogas as a fuel for vehicles. California knows a great deal about research and development in the field of hydrogen and other alternative energy sources.

"This cooperation is tremendously exciting and has the potential to both help reduce emissions from cars and boost environmental technology exports. This is of interest to both Sweden and California," says Lena Sommestad.

The Californian delegation will have an opportunity to study the world's largest plant for upgrading biogas to vehicle quality, which is now being completed by Göteborg Energi at Ryaverket sewage treatment plant in Göteborg. The delegation will also make a visit to Linköping, where Svensk Biogas AB is engaged in successful commercial production and sales of biogas, using manure, biocrops, sewage sludge and industrial waste as raw materials.

disarmament and non-proliferation. Consequently, renewed efforts are needed at international level to get disarmament and non-proliferation work moving. The Swedish Government is actively pushing this issue. The Blix report is a very important part of our continued efforts."

WMDC report: New proposals to reduce threats by weapons of mass destruction

After two years work, the independent international Weapons of Mass Destruction Commission, WMDC, chaired by Hans Blix has put forward a number of concrete proposals on how the world could be freed of nuclear, biological and chemical weapons.

The report entitled "Weapons of Terror" analyses the threats under which the world is living today - above all, 27 000 nuclear weapons and efforts by individual states and perhaps terrorist groups to develop or obtain different kinds of weapons of terror. The report discusses how these threats and risks can be addressed, including current issues such as Iran and the Middle East, North Korea, India and Pakistan.

The Commission's 14 members from all continents state that common global efforts to achieve arms limitation and disarmament have stagnated. After 50 years of cold war, we even see the risk of arms races involving new types of nuclear weapons, space weapons and missiles.

It is high time to revitalise global cooperation on disarmament and the Commission presents a list of 60 recommendations. At the top are the recommendations that all governments must accept the Comprehensive Nuclear Test Ban Treaty that was agreed ten years ago, that states currently possessing nuclear weapons must reduce their arsenals and that they must stop producing plutonium and highly enriched uranium for more nuclear weapons.

The world must aim at achieving a ban on both possession and use of nuclear weapons, in the same way as bans that apply to biological and chemical weapons. All states - even the great powers - must prepare to live without nuclear weapons and other weapons of terror.

As part of a new, concerted effort, the Commission proposes that a world summit be called at the United Nations in New York on disarmament, non-proliferation and terrorist use of weapons of mass destruction. The summit should also discuss and decide on reforms to make the UN disarmament apparatus more effective.

To break the deadlocks at the Conference on Disarmament in Geneva, the Commission proposes that unanimity should no longer be required for issues to be put on the agenda, but that a two-thirds majority should suffice.

"Existing international treaties have shown weaknesses. At the same time, a policy based on unilateralism and military actions has failed and has been costly in terms of lives and resources. Efforts to jointly create global security must now be intensified. All states - especially those with nuclear weapons - have a responsibility and must take part in the process," says Hans Blix.

The Commission's 14 members have unanimously endorsed the report which, after having been presented to the UN Secretary-General in New York on 1 June, will be presented to governments, non-governmental organisations and the general public around the world.

Carin Jämtin to UN high-level meeting on HIV/AIDS

Minister for International Development Cooperation Carin Jämtin will lead the Swedish delegation taking part in the UN high-level meeting on HIV/AIDS in New York on 31 May-2 June.

During the course of the meeting, the General Assembly will follow up the implementation of the commitments made in the Declaration of Commitment on HIV/AIDS, agreed on by the world's countries at the special session of the Assembly in June 2001. Ms Jämtin will participate in a panel discussion on the prevention of HIV and AIDS. Ms Jämtin will also take part in one of the five round-table meetings that will discuss how the commitments made by the world's countries in 2001 have been realised and the new measures and decisions that will be required. The Swedish address to the General Assembly on 2 June will be delivered by State Secretary Annika Nilsson from the Ministry of Health and Social Affairs.

The number of NGOs to take part in this UN meeting - almost 800 - is larger than ever. A special hearing with representatives of civil society will also take place.

The Swedish delegation will include Members of the Riksdag Ms Ewa Björling (Moderate Party) and Ms Marina Pettersson (Green Party), and six representatives of Swedish NGOs.

Sweden continues to support peace in Aceh

The Government has decided to extend the assignment for six Swedish Sida observers who are part of the civilian EU Aceh Monitoring Mission, which monitors the peace agreement in Aceh Province in Indonesia. The Government also decided to extend the assignment of ten or so logistics personnel from the Swedish Rescue Services Agency responsible for logistics and communications support for the mission.

On 15 August 2005, a peace agreement was signed between the government of Indonesia and leaders of the Movement for a Free Aceh (GAM). At the request of the Indonesian Government and GAM, the EU, together with five ASEAN countries, undertook to monitor the agreement. The original mandate for the mission has previously been extended to 15 June, but since it is not expected that local elections in Aceh can be held until August, the mission has been extended until 15 September.

Sweden's contribution to the mission, which is channelled via Sida and the Swedish Rescue Services Agency, has a total value of SEK 57 million. Sweden has also recently provided a judge within the framework of the mission who is to determine whether a number of imprisoned GAM members are to be granted amnesty.

The Government has presented a Bill to the Riksdag requesting the Riksdag's consent to take part in an EU-led military force in support of UN peace-keeping operations in the Democratic Republic of the Congo. The EU-led mission will take place within the framework of the European Security and Defence Policy.

"After many years of war, the Congolese people are finally getting the chance to vote in democratic elections. It is absolutely essential the elections are conducted in a proper manner. For this reason, the Government proposes that Sweden contribute to the EU force that will support UN peace-keeping operations in Congo during this important election period," says Minister for Foreign Affairs Jan Eliasson.

"Our participation in the EU peace force is part of Sweden's increased ambitions for peace-support operations. The mission shows that the EU has the ability to function as a global actor for peace and security under a UN mandate. It is important that the EU is prepared to contribute when the UN asks for help," says Minister for Defence Leni Björklund.

Sweden's contribution is expected to amount to some 70 people and will comprise a special forces unit including staff officers and air transport resources.

The EU force will include soldiers from Germany, France, Belgium, Poland, Spain, Portugal, Italy, the Netherlands, Sweden and Greece. A total of 1 500 soldiers will take part. The mission will take place under a mandate from the UN Security Council and will be for a limited period of time in conjunction with the Congolese elections, which are scheduled to be held on 30 June 2006.

Under a UN mandate in the summer of 2003, a special forces unit from Sweden took part in the EU's Operation Artemis in the north-east of the Democratic Republic of the Congo. During 2003 and 2004, an airfield unit from Sweden took part in the UN MONUC mission in the town of Kindu. Sweden is currently supporting the EU Police Mission in the Democratic Republic of the Congo with a communications expert from the Swedish Rescue Services Agency.

Towards a better North Sea environment

Today the ministerial meeting of the North Sea conference ended in Göteborg. Ministers from eight North Sea countries and the European Commission have met for two days to discuss measures to reduce the impact of fishery and shipping in the North Sea.

- The negotiations have been tough, but important steps have been taken. We will reduce the nitrogen oxides with 40 percent and strengthen the requirements of the sulphide emission down to 1 %. These reductions are crucial if we are to improve the air quality and reduce the acidification, says the Minister for the Environment, Lena Sommestad, who chaired the negotiations.

Other important decisions in the shipping area in the Minister Declaration:

- Clean ship. The concept Clean Ship is launched which means that criteria for evaluating environmental performance of ships are developed and used as an incentive to encourage sustainable shipping.
- Improved air in port cities. This will be possible by increased use of shore side electricity for ships in ports. Sweden took as the first country an initiative to tax relief for shore side electricity which will contribute to improve the air quality in Swedish ports.

Other important decisions in the fishing area in the Minister Declaration:

- We agreed to develop and introduce environmental impact assessments of new fishing methods and gear. This is something new and very important for the North Sea environment, says Lena Sommestad.

Other important decisions taken by the ministers are:

- Reduce by-catch. The objective is to reduce the by-catch of marine mammals to less than one percent of the best population estimate.
- Support of pilot project of fishing days. The ministers agreed to support the pilot project of fishing days in Kattegat that starts next year and if the experiences are positive it can be extended to all fishing in the North Sea.
- Ban on discard. Measures to minimize discards will be taken, including a ban on high grading. The effects of these measurements will be evaluated by 2008.
- Strengthening the control of fishing. To reduce the illegal fishing an improved control- and sanction system is proposed and a North Sea Network of Cooperation on fisheries offences between national investigation and prosecution agencies will be established.

Two-day ministerial meeting for a better environment in the North Sea

Tomorrow, Thursday, the Ministerial Meeting within the North Sea Conference will begin at the Swedish Exhibition and Congress Centre in Göteborg. For two days, ministers will discuss the environmental impact of shipping and fisheries on the North Sea and will negotiate a declaration containing measures to be taken.

Sweden initiated the meeting and Minister for the Environment Lena Sommestad, the meeting chair, will lead the negotiations. The most difficult negotiations will address fishing by-catches and the large quantities of fish that, today, have to be thrown back into the sea for various reasons. Shipping discussions will be dominated by the rising level of sulphur emissions in the shipping industry and how the trend can be slowed down.

"I hope we can reach agreement on permitting large-scale trials with fishing days and demanding more environmentally friendly fishing equipment. We must identify measures to be taken and encourage shipping to assume greater responsibility for its emissions, not least when ships are in port," says Ms Sommestad.

The North Sea Conference is a political cooperation project aimed at protecting and improving the marine environment of the North Sea. Representatives of governments will take part, as well as representatives of municipalities, regions, the business sector and the environmental movement around the North Sea.

"If we are to succeed in improving the environment in the North Sea, all countries and sectors must contribute. Solutions do exist but vigorous political measures are essential and all parties must be willing to act if we are to bring about real change," says Ms Sommestad.

Number of asylum-seeking children with severe withdrawal behaviour falling

The national coordinator for children in the asylum process with severe withdrawal behaviour is today presenting her third report. It shows that the number of asylum-seeking children with severe withdrawal behaviour is falling.

At the beginning of March 2006 there were 65 asylum-seeking children with severe withdrawal behaviour under treatment by Sweden's child and adolescent psychiatric services. At the same time a further 82 children, former asylum seekers who had been granted residence permits, were being considered for treatment.

A follow-up in the middle of April 2006 showed that this figure had fallen in less than a month from 82 to 59, which shows that the statistics can change very fast. Only five asylum-seeking children have been reported as falling ill since November 2005.

The report also shows that neither trauma, culture nor the asylum process can provide general explanations for asylum-seeking children exhibiting severe withdrawal behaviour in Sweden.

The research has been carried out by Docent Nader Ahmadi. The research team for the study included psychologists Dr Kjerstin Almqvist and Andreas Tunström, political scientist Merrick Tabor and sociologist Dr Maria Appelqvist.

Sweden's Economy

Sweden's gross domestic product (GDP) is forecast to grow by 3.6 per cent in 2006 and 3.0 per cent in 2007. Open unemployment, measured as an annual average, is expected to fall to 4.9 per cent this year and 4.5 per cent next year. General government net lending is estimated to amount to 2.0 per cent of GDP in 2006 and 2.2 per cent in 2007.

Continued strong growth in the global economy

GDP growth in the global economy is expected to remain strong both this year and next. Growth is being fuelled to a great extent by low interest rates and strong productivity growth. Despite strong growth, rising energy prices and higher resource utilisation, inflation has been low. The high rate of growth in the United States is expected to slow somewhat during the year but remain favourable throughout the forecast period. The euro area and Japanese economies are expected to strengthen in 2006.

Strong Swedish GDP growth and labour market

The Swedish economy is expected to grow rapidly in 2006 and 2007. Rising international demand and Swedish firms' good competitiveness mean that exports of both goods and services will grow strongly, especially this year. Low interest rates, good corporate earnings, high capacity utilisation and strong demand for housing spell continued favourable investment growth. Household consumption will perform well thanks to rising employment and real incomes coupled with a favourable wealth situation and low interest rates. Robust local government finances and enlarged labour market policy programmes in the general government sector mean that general government consumption will also grow strongly this year.

The number of vacancies is rising, and firms' recruitment plans are increasingly positive. Employment began to recover in 2005 and is expected to continue to rise thanks to strong domestic demand and enlarged labour market policy programmes. Many of those previously outside the labour force are now looking to enter the labour market. This increased supply of labour will favour a lasting increase in regular employment and counter labour shortages, but does mean that unemployment will fall less far than employment rises during the forecast period. The regular employment rate is expected to grow throughout the period.

Resource utilisation in the labour market is currently low but is set to rise gradually. Wage growth is expected to accelerate but remain moderate. Slowly mounting domestic inflationary pressure, coupled with a stronger krona and falling oil prices, is expected to mean that inflation will rise only slowly both this year and next. Only a moderate increase in interest rates is therefore anticipated.

For 2008, an estimate based on assessments of the resource situation and the economy's potential growth rate is presented. The estimate assumes that the economy will reach full resource utilisation in 2008. It is expected that there will still be available resources in the labour market at the end of 2007, which means that employment and GDP can continue to grow at a good rate in 2008 without the risk of excessively high inflation. GDP is estimated to grow by 2.8 per cent in 2008 and open unemployment to edge down further to 4.4 per cent.

Public finances

General government net lending amounted to SEK 71 billion or 2.7 per cent of GDP in 2005. Financial assets exceeded liabilities by SEK 331 billion or 12.4 per cent of GDP at the end of the

year. Consolidated gross debt was 50.3 per cent of GDP, which is well below the EU's reference value of 60 per cent.

In 2006 general government net lending is forecast to be 2.0 per cent of GDP, which is more than twice the level anticipated in the Budget Bill for 2006. The improvement is due primarily to tax revenues - particularly capital taxes - being expected to be higher than previously assumed. In 2007-08 expenditure will fall as a proportion of GDP, and net lending will rise.

Local government finances strengthened considerably in 2005, and both financial result and net lending are expected to continue to show relatively large surpluses during the forecast period.

The positive net lending in the general government sector means that its financial position will continue to improve during the forecast period. The budget balance will show a surplus throughout the period; thus, both central government debt and consolidated gross debt will fall. The 2006 Spring Budget: Focusing on the elderly, young people, new jobs and integration

Today the Government presents the 2006 Spring Fiscal Policy Bill. The Bill contains proposed economic and budget policy guidelines, along with a supplementary budget for 2006. It is based on an agreement between the Social Democratic Government, the Left Party and the Green Party.

The Swedish economy is developing strongly, with an expected growth rate of 3.6 per cent in 2006 and 3.0 per cent in 2007. This is a revision upwards compared with the assessment in the Budget Bill for 2006. Inflation is expected gradually to rise from the present low levels, approaching the

Riksbank's 2 per cent target in 2007. However, low rent increases, a stronger krona and declining oil prices are expected to restrain the rise in inflation.

Employment took an upward turn in the autumn of 2005 in response to a strong domestic economy and active labour market measures. In all, employment is expected to increase by about 80 000 in 2006 and approximately 40 000 in 2007, with the private sector accounting for around 65 per cent of the new jobs. With the initiatives proposed in the Spring Fiscal Policy Bill, open unemployment is expected to fall to approximately 4.5 per cent at the end of 2006. This means that the unemployment target according to Statistics Sweden's previous estimation methods will be reached by the end of 2006.

Central government debt is expected to decline in 2006, both as a share of GDP and in kronor. In the period since the surplus target was introduced in 2000 up to and including 2008, average public sector net lending is estimated at 2.0 per cent of GDP. This means the surplus target is being met.

In 2006 and 2007, the expenditure ceiling will amount to SEK 907 billion and SEK 949 billion respectively. With the proposals in the Spring Fiscal Policy Bill, the margin to the expenditure ceiling will be SEK 2.7 billion in 2006 and SEK 9.7 billion in 2007, which is well in line with the budgeting margins presented in the Budget Bill for 2006.

More new jobs and lower unemployment

The Government proposes measures to supplement the autumn's employment package. Although employment is expected to grow this year, the Government believes that continued measures are required to reduce unemployment, particularly among the long-term unemployed, young people, immigrants and people with disabilities. This is because the supply of labour is also on the rise, along with employment. As a result, it can still be difficult for unemployed people to get a job even though there are more jobs to apply for.

250 positions for generational change in the central government sector

Central government agencies will be given the opportunity to recruit an additional 250 people to cope with generational change between 1 July 2006 and 31 December 2007.

150 new jobs in the cultural sector

State-owned cultural institutions will be given the opportunity to recruit an additional 150 unemployed graduates from 1 July 2006, to look after museum collections.

Bonus jobs up to retirement for 60-year-olds

Everyone who is at least 60 years old and obtains a bonus job can keep the job until they are 65, unlike other bonus jobs that last for a maximum of two years.

2 000 more wage subsidies

In order to increase employment among people with disabilities, the Government proposes 2 000 new wage subsidy places in the second half of 2006 and all of 2007.

Co-financing requirements for work experience places will be abolished

As a trial, the co-financing requirement for employers offering work experience places will be abolished until the end of 2007.

1 000 more places in advanced vocational training

The drive to provide more places in advanced vocational training will be extended to add a further 1 000 places from autumn 2007 until spring 2009.

Employment training targeting shortage occupations

Labour market measures will add another 11 000 places in 2007 and 2008, which will provide an

opportunity for more places in employment training. Existing resources will be redistributed and employment training will be given precedence over preparatory training. The employment training will be adapted to meet national and regional needs and will be provided in areas where there is an existing or impending shortage of labour.

Compensation for jobseekers' travel expenses

Young people aged 20 to 24 will be eligible for compensation for travel expenses associated with employment interviews.

Businesses and growth

The Government wants to strengthen the climate for business, particularly for small enterprises, and proposes the following measures:

The basic financing of Almi Företagspartner AB (Almi Business Partner) will be secured SEK 70 million will be put into Almi from 2007.

Reinforced investment in innovation

Almi will be given SEK 10 million per year in 2007 and 2008 to strengthen its work on providing funding and advice for all forms of innovation.

Research and development at small and medium-sized enterprises

The Swedish Agency for Innovation Systems will receive an additional SEK 100 million from 2007 onwards to put into the programme "Forska & Väx" ("Research & Grow"), which targets small enterprises.

Investment in Industrial Development Centres

The Swedish Agency for Economic and Regional Growth (Nutek) will be allocated SEK 10 million more per year in 2007 and 2008 to support Industrial Development Centres (IDCs).

Promoting rural development

The next Environmental and Rural Development Programme for 2007-2013 will have broader coverage than the present programme. The Government intends to allocate additional national resources to increase the scope of the programme. It will include energy and environmental measures as well as initiatives targeting small enterprises. The contents of the programme will be prepared at the Government Offices during the spring of 2006.

Strategic development programmes for Swedish industry

Together with the business sector and trade unions, the Government has drawn up strategies for a number of key industries in Sweden: forestry and wood products, metals, vehicles, pharmaceuticals, biotechnology and IT/telecommunications. The Government is considering extending this initiative to more industries. If it does, the first in line will be the tourism industry and other parts of the services sector. The Government will revert to this issue in the Budget Bill for 2007.

Wealth tax in unlisted companies ("Lex Uggla")

The Lex Uggla issue should be included in the major review of taxation that has previously been announced. However, the Government considers that there may be reason even now to take account of the latent tax liability when valuing owners shares in unlisted companies for the purpose of assessing wealth. There will be an inquiry on this issue. In addition, the Government will instruct the Swedish Tax Agency to further clarify its information on excess liquidity in unlisted limited liability companies so as to simplify application of the legislation.

The elderly

Sweden must become the best place in the world to grow old. This will require numerous measures

over the coming decade. The Spring Fiscal Policy Bill presents measures for better health care and social care, secure housing arrangements and enhanced financial security.

Billion kronor investment in better health care and social services for the most infirm SEK 600 million will be invested in 2006 and SEK 1 billion per year in 2007 and 2008 to improve the health care provided to the most infirm members of the elderly population. SEK 200 million will be provided to care of dementia patients in 2007 and 2008. In addition, SEK 50 million will be specially committed in 2007 and 2008 to develop elderly care adapted to a multicultural society.

Investment grants for special service homes

At present there is a shortage of special service homes in many parts of the country. The Government wants to encourage municipalities to build new special service homes and make alterations to existing homes. A new investment grant facility will be set up for special service homes, making SEK 250 million per year available from 2007.

Higher housing supplement for pensioners

The compensation will be raised from 91 to 93 per cent of the cost of housing up to the ceiling, which is SEK 4 850 a month. The higher rate will be effective retroactively from 1 April 2006.

Preventive work

In 2007 and 2008, SEK 150 million will reinforce preventive work by the municipalities, for instance measures to prevent falling accidents in the home.

Research in the elderly field

With a view to supporting research and development in the elderly area, SEK 30 million will be allocated each year in 2007 and 2008 to the Swedish Council for Working Life and Social Research. SEK 5 million per year will be allocated in 2006, 2007 and 2008 to the development of a national skills centre for health care and social services for the elderly, including family and dementia issues.

Technological development in the elderly field

The Government considers that resources are needed to support technological development of strategic importance and everyday relevance in the elderly area and is committing SEK 25 million per year to this purpose in 2007 and 2008.

Young people

The spring budget includes a major focus on young people. It addresses work, education, housing, recreation, security and health.

Bonus jobs for young people

To make it easier for young people to get a foot in the labour market, from 1 July 2006 the number of bonus jobs will increase by 1 000 places specially intended for young people aged between 20 and 24. The qualifying rules will be the same as for other bonus jobs.

More jobs for unemployed young people

Unemployed young people qualify for general recruitment incentives after six months of unemployment. In 2006 general recruitment incentives will be granted for approximately 1 500 young people aged 20 to 24. The lower six-month registration requirement for young people will be extended until 2007.

More summer jobs

In 2006 SEK 100 million will be put into support for municipalities offering young people summer jobs.

Support for apprenticeship training

In order to establish apprenticeship training schemes, between 2007 and 2009 SEK 20 million per year will be put into development support for 20 municipalities with a high proportion of upper secondary students who lack final grades from the vocationally oriented programmes.

Higher study grant

The study grant for upper secondary students will be raised by SEK 100 to SEK 1050 per month. This increase will be effective retroactively from 1 April 2006.

Higher study support

Study support will be raised on 1 July 2006 by SEK 300 a month, of which SEK 100 will be a grant and SEK 200 a loan.

Rent guarantees

A central government grant will be introduced for municipalities that want to use rent guarantees to make it easier for young people and others to obtain housing. SEK 100 million per year will be set aside for this purpose. It is estimated that this will be enough for approximately 20 000 guarantees each year.

Extended investment-support schemes

The temporary investment support for building small housing units will be extended until 30 June 2008.

More housing for students

SEK 100 million will be allocated in 2007 and SEK 50 million in 2008 to pay for investment grants for student housing, which it is estimated will lead to 1 300 more units.

Drive for psychiatric services for children and young people

There will be a drive to improve the availability of psychiatric services for children and young people. In addition, a national centre will be established for support, knowledge and methods development. This drive will have a budget of SEK 250 million per year in 2007 and 2008.

More recreation centres

The Government is committing SEK 80 million per year between 2007 and 2009 to develop recreation activities and meeting places for young people.

Integration

The Government is presenting several measures to improve educational and working opportunities for women and men of foreign origin.

100 schools - 100 special resource staff

To improve students' results in school, 1 000 special resource staff will be employed at schools in segregated areas. They are intended to provide teaching support and help enable more young people to leave school with a complete set of grades.

Meeting places for young people

SEK 3.5 million per year will be allocated in 2007 and 2008 to give young people in the metropolitan regions in particular better access to places where they can meet.

Speedy establishment of new immigrants

The Public Employment Services will be given overall responsibility for helping newly arrived immigrants to quickly enter employment. Trial activities will start on 1 July 2006 as a

geographically limited trial over a two-year period.

Workplace induction for immigrants

The workplace induction trials conducted in 20 municipalities will be incorporated into ordinary activities.

More new entrepreneurs

In order to improve business opportunities for immigrants to Sweden, an extra SEK 20 million per year will be put into the Swedish Association of Ethnic Entrepreneurs (IFS) and Almi.

Supplementary education and validation

Many university graduates with foreign degrees lack employment commensurate with their education. A drive to provide teacher education for 300 students per year for two years will therefore be launched, along with a pilot project providing supplementary education for 30 lawyers with foreign degrees. The advanced education programme in administrative practice at Stockholm University, Göteborg University and Malmö University will be extended. The National Agency for Services to Universities and University Colleges will be given extra resources to improve the validation of foreign upper secondary school grades.

Increased grants to anti-discrimination offices

The central government grant will increase by SEK 1 million in 2006 and SEK 4 million per year from 2007.

Increased support to municipalities

Municipalities receiving people who have now obtained permanent residence permits under the new Asylum Act will receive increased support to enable them to offer a good induction and employment or education. The municipalities will be given a one-off payment of SEK 20 000 per refugee that they receive in 2006. In addition, the standard compensation will be raised by approximately 6 per cent from 2007, which is equivalent to SEK 10 000 for adults.

Dental care

In the Spring Fiscal Policy Bill resources will be allocated to pay for the first stage of a dental care reform. Basic support will be introduced at a level of SEK 500 so that everyone can go to the dentist once every eighteen months at the same price as a visit to the doctor. When the reform has been implemented, a check-up will cost a maximum of SEK 200. SEK 500 million will be allocated to this first stage in 2007 and SEK 1.7 billion from 2008. The reform will enter into force in 2007. In the Budget Bill for 2007, the Government intends to present a proposal on a high-cost protection scheme for everyone in the dental care system.

Limitation of real estate tax

The limitation rule for real estate tax is to apply to holiday and weekend homes as well. This entails that a household that only owns one property - a holiday or weekend home - will be able to apply the limitation rule. The limitation rule will also be amended so that households that now benefit from the limitation rule but have properties assessed at more than SEK 3 million can pay a reduced real estate tax on assessed values between SEK 3 million and SEK 5 million. These proposals will be effective retroactively from 1 January 2006.

Fighting homelessness

Society must improve its efforts to fight homelessness. The Government proposes, among other measures, an increase of SEK 20 million per year in 2007 and 2008 in the personal representative initiative, as well as increases of SEK 23 million in 2007 and SEK 33 million in 2008 in the resources available to the National Board of Health and Welfare to contribute to projects to combat homelessness.

Liberal adult education

The central government appropriation for liberal adult education will be augmented by SEK 400 million per year from 2007 onwards.

Better preparedness for contagious diseases

The country's preparedness for a possible influenza pandemic will be strengthened. SEK 200 million will be allocated in 2006 to efforts to ensure a satisfactory supply of vaccine in the event of a pandemic.

Environmental initiatives

SEK 30 million per year will be allocated to expanding wind power in 2007 and 2008. In 2007 and 2008, SEK 500 million per year will be allocated to energy-saving measures and conversion to renewable energy in premises used for public activities, with SEK 50 million of this sum going to support solar cell installation. The state investment programmes in support of climate investments (KLIMP) will be augmented by SEK 75 million per year in 2007 and 2008. In addition, SEK 50 million in 2006 and SEK 100 million in 2007 will be dedicated to renewable fuels, by stepping up the appropriation for climate investments.

Green tax shift

The Budget Bill for 2006 announced a tax shift of SEK 3.6 billion. Because some proposals could not enter into force as quickly as was anticipated at that time, it is proposed that the abolition of carbon dioxide tax for the trading sector should be postponed until 1 January 2007.

Sweden retains the absolute right for taking a decision in each individual case where consideration is given to participation by any of the units.

In order to increase the Union's capacity to carry out more demanding crisis management operations, the European Council adopted new goals in June 2004. The Government has now taken a decision to list Swedish military units in the EU Force Catalogue under Headline Goal 2010 and the Requirements Catalogue 05, which were adopted by the Council in November 2005.

Sweden sets climate target of - 25% by 2020

The Swedish Government made a joint decision with the Left Party last week to set a medium-term climate target of -25 per cent by 2020, compared with emissions in 1990.

At the same time, the short-term target remains set at -4 per cent by 2010, to be achieved without compensation for removal by carbon sinks or recourse to flexible mechanisms. This target is considerably more ambitious than the target of +4 per cent that Sweden has been allocated within the EU.

"I am proud that Sweden is now raising its ambitions and retaining its leading role in climate work. We are reducing our national emissions while laying the foundation for a sustainable transformation of the energy system," says Minister for the Environment Lena Sommestad.

In the Bill, the Government and the Left Party write that there is no justification in energy policy or scope in climate policy for large-scale extension of the natural gas network. As society focuses on facilitating and promoting the establishment and expansion of renewable energy, the interest in an energy supply based on fossil fuels is declining.

One new feature of the Bill is the effort to develop separate indicative targets for 2015 for different sectors. The indicative targets are important to point out a way to achieve the complete target for

2020, the date when dependence on fossil fuels is to have been broken.

"Our target is that by 2010 the emissions of carbon dioxide from the transport sector will have stabilised at the 1990 level. This is an ambitious goal and to succeed we are now investing in special initiatives such as transport-saving solutions, increased energy efficiency and renewable fuels," concludes Ms Sommestad.

One of the principles of the Swedish climate strategy is that Sweden must set an example internationally. Sweden's emissions of greenhouse gases are low at present, compared with other developed countries, whether calculated per person or per unit of GDP. Since the 1970s Sweden has worked successfully to reduce its dependence on fossil fuels and by doing so has limited its emissions of greenhouse gases.

Swedish support to African Union mission in Darfur

The Government today instructed the Swedish Rescue Services Agency to strengthen its health and medical care efforts in Darfur, Sudan. The Swedish Rescue Services Agency's task is part of EU support measures to the African Union (AU) and, through such means as training and advisory services, will enhance the AU's capacity to provide medical care for its staff.

Go-ahead for further action to implement production of influenza vaccine in Sweden

Minister for Public Health and Social Services Morgan Johansson has today received Lars Rekke's report on the conditions necessary for producing influenza vaccine in Sweden.

On 12 January this year, the Government appointed Lars Rekke as negotiator to investigate, in contact with the pharmaceutical industries, various public-private solutions for setting up production of influenza vaccine in Sweden.

The reason behind the assignment is that global capacity for producing influenza vaccine is expected to be insufficient in the event of a pandemic. The Government has therefore noted that Sweden cannot be sure it would have access to the amounts of vaccine that would be required. Domestic production of influenza vaccine would increase the chances of being able to vaccinate Sweden's population at an early stage.

The conclusions in Mr Rekke's report indicate that the conditions allow the Government to proceed with negotiations on public-private cooperation to set up vaccine production in Sweden. Mr Rekke also recommends that the Government continue negotiations.

The report also concludes that continued negotiations should primarily focus on production in very close cooperation with an established vaccine company. Production should preferably be part of a structure that is designed over time to safeguard development resources, the transfer of know-how, and marketing channels. Furthermore, the aim should be to base such production on the new technology that is on the threshold of a probable breakthrough.

Minister for Public Health and Social Services Morgan Johansson says:

-We now have a solid report setting out the conditions for negotiations and a recommendation that the Government should continue its efforts to set up vaccine production in Sweden. In the Spring Budget Bill, the Government will provide the means necessary to proceed quickly. It is the Government's ambition that we in Sweden will have supplies of vaccine that will cover the needs of the whole population in the event of a pandemic.

Smaller defence administration - more operational activities

On Wednesday the 22nd of March the Government submitted to the Riksdag the Communication 2005/06:131 "Appropriate governance and administration of the Swedish defence".

The aim of the Communication is to inform the Riksdag of the Government's intentions regarding further changes to the governance and administration of the Swedish defence.

"As the transformation from defence against invasion to operational defence progresses, the defence administration must also be reduced. So far, the functions for support and administration have been relatively unaffected, while at the same time the operational organisation has been significantly reduced. Therefore there must be a redistribution of resources - from support and administration to operational activities. To put it simply, more bang for the buck," says Minister for Defence Leni Björklund.

"I have respect for those who work in the Swedish Armed Forces, the Defence Materiel Administration, the Swedish National Defence College, the National Service Administration and the Defence Research Agency and I understand that they may be worried that their jobs will be affected. It is, however, a necessary change that is being made. It means that a decision taken by the Riksdag is being implemented. The agencies will now be assigned the task of examining how the changes are to be carried out and what consequences this entails. The Government will present effective measures in connection with the Budget Bill," Ms Björklund concludes.

Main points of the Communication

The central command of the Swedish Armed Forces is to be cut back by some SEK 250m. The aim is for the reduction to be fully implemented by 2008.

Research activities are to be reduced by some SEK 500m from 2008. A special advisory body is to be attached to the Swedish Armed Forces with a view to improving their ability to steer research.

A review is to be conducted of the structure and organisation of the combined intelligence activities and security services and of the prospects of developing the aim and direction, governance and financing of the intelligence and security services, in terms of both organisation and content. The aim of the review is to produce proposals for reducing costs within the intelligence and security services.

The administration of land, buildings and premises is to be rationalised and refined so as to promote more efficient joint processes and create conditions for savings of some SEK 100m with full effect from 2008.

A step-by-step procedure for recruitment is to be introduced within the framework of the present system of national total defence service. The procedure is to be designed so as to actively encourage more women to take an admission examination. As a first step, a selection is to be made from the

male part of the age group. As a second step, those who are considered likely to meet the requirements for a long course of basic training are to be called for recruitment inspection, which may in turn consist of several steps. The introduction of a step-by-step procedure for recruitment and more rational methods will make it possible to transfer approximately SEK 100m in appropriations from the National Service Administration to the Swedish Armed Forces from 2008.

The future volumes for training senior officers should be set at a lower level than previously and costs to the Swedish Armed Forces should be reduced by some SEK 70m from 2008.

Changes are to be made in the equipment and technical supply process. There is to be further development of the defence equipment process so as to bring it into line with the operational defence and its needs. A change in the division of responsibilities between the state and industry is to be implemented. The tasks, roles and responsibility of the government agencies in the defence equipment process are to be clarified and integrated leadership is to apply for the defence equipment process. The Defence Materiel Administration's costs should fall by some SEK 900m. Some SEK 700m of these expenditure cuts should be implemented by 2008.

The Government intends to clarify the purposes of defence appropriations so as to make it easier for the Riksdag to exercise its financial authority. In order to present a better overall picture of the expenditure area, the Government intends to provide the Riksdag with a consolidated presentation of the results of operations of expenditure area 6 Defence and contingency measures in connection with the security policy reviews. The Government considers that the model for commissioned services financed by charges should be retained, but measures are needed to further improve the way the model functions. The Council for Transparency of the Swedish Armed Forces, which has not filled the intended role as an instrument for transparency, citizen influence and democratic control, is to be abolished.

Government Bill on renovation and modification of artillery system

Today the Government submitted to the Riksdag Government Bill 2005/06:132, "Renovation and modification of the Haubits 77B artillery system".

To enable the Swedish Armed Forces to retain a future artillery capability that has good potential for both national and international use, the Government proposes that the Haubits (Howitzer) 77B artillery system should undergo renovation and modification. The Government's proposal starts out from the recognition that the present artillery system has shortcomings in several respects, including protection of personnel. According to estimates, delivery of the artillery system will begin in 2009 and will allow an initial capability to be available in 2011.

The Riksdag has prescribed an operational organisation with two artillery battalions. The Swedish Armed Forces have made the assessment that this corresponds to 24 gun units. The cost estimates that the project is based on assume that Sweden will cooperate with a partner to share the costs with. If no partner joins in, the Government may reconsider implementation of the project.

"It is with concern that we are hearing reports from Belarus that security forces this morning have arrested further demonstrators in Minsk. All those arrested while trying to exercise their political rights must be released immediately," says Acting Minister for Foreign Affairs Bosse Ringholm.

Contributing to the growth of a modernised, democratic and pluralist Belarussian society is the long-term perspective of development cooperation. Sweden intends to continue its support to democratic development and civil society in Belarus.

Cooperation in crisis - for a more secure society

Today the Government submitted to the Riksdag a Bill (2005/06:133) entitled "Cooperation in crisis - for a more secure society".

"Improving Sweden's crisis management capability is a long process. We are learning all the time. Local and regional crisis management capability in Sweden is good, which was shown by the handling of the Gudrun storm. But it is possible to improve crisis management capability at all levels. All agencies must be prepared and able to manage a crisis occurring within their area of responsibility," says Minister for Defence Leni Björklund.

"It is particularly important to improve the ability of society to manage crises that simultaneously affect a number of different areas. One of the measures the Government is proposing is therefore to set up a crisis leadership agency," comments Leni Björklund.

"The creation of an agency to lead crisis management is an important step but is not a solution to all crisis management issues. Sweden's ability to handle crises depends on many steps in a process and on a holistic view, from preventive measures to the crisis management itself. All areas of society are affected, which is why everyone must contribute and work jointly so that together we can increase security in society."

"As citizens we have a duty to learn more. We must be better at providing and passing on information about how individuals can play a part in crisis management, both as victims of a crisis and as voluntary participants in the work of crisis management," says Leni Björklund.

The Government proposes that a crisis leadership agency be appointed for national cross-sectoral crises, i.e. which affect large areas of society simultaneously. Relevant parts of the Rescue Services Agency and the Swedish Emergency Management Agency will be merged.

After the Government decision the crisis leadership agency will be able to set priorities for and coordinate the work of other agencies. Other agencies will retain responsibility for their activities during crises.

The crisis leadership agency must have its own early warning system, a department that can provide situation reports and give warning of impending crises. Designated agencies and county administrative boards must increase their preparedness, and always have staff available. The Government Offices has its own early warning system - the preparedness and analysis department - which is to cooperate with the crisis leadership agency and support the Government.

The Government proposes that a requirement be introduced to the effect that important basic functions in society must function even in a crisis. The regulations must focus more on the fact that services must function and less on how they are to function. The Government proposes special improvements in preparedness for the supply of drinking water and for information assurance.

The Government is to review how national resources that are important for crisis management can be better coordinated. This concerns national maritime resources, publicly financed helicopter resources, intelligence activities and resources for dealing with chemical, biological, radiological and nuclear substances (CBRN). The new radio communication system Rakel used by the "Blue light agencies" is to be extended to more users, with more actors working for order, safety and health. More organisations apart from voluntary organisations must be given support as national crisis preparedness resources.

In order to improve the national knowledge base as regards preventing and managing crises a national programme for security research will be set up. The Government Offices will continue exercises in accordance with the new exercise pattern, with at least one major exercise per year. Courses on national security and the possibilities of individuals to act in crises are to be tested in upper secondary schools. A new law on municipal and county council crisis preparedness is proposed. It includes stipulations on municipal risk and vulnerability analyses and on training and exercise of employees and elected representatives. Municipalities and county councils must report to the national crisis leadership agency during and after a crisis.

"The main features of the Government Bill are in line with the proposals made by the cross-party parliamentary Defence Commission in January. It is a great asset that the Riksdag parties are by and large agreed on the path Sweden should take to strengthen our capabilities of cooperation in crises for a more secure society," concludes Leni Björklund.

Bill on EC Directives submitted to the Riksdag

The Government has submitted to the Riksdag the Bill "Implementation of the EC directives on transfer of passenger data and residence permits for studies".

The Bill proposes that airlines carrying passengers to Sweden from a state that neither belongs to the EU nor has entered into an agreement on cooperation under the Schengen Convention shall, at the request of the police, transfer information about the passengers as soon as check-in has been completed. Carriers who neglect to transfer data or who have transferred incomplete or incorrect data will be liable to pay a special charge.

Under the proposal, the amendment on transfer of passenger data will enter into force on 1 September 2006.

The Bill also proposes that a temporary residence permit for studies shall be subject to withdrawal if the holder, for example, never appears for registration at the school, if the studies are not begun or are interrupted prematurely or if the holder has inadequate means of support.

Inquiry on the right of asylum-seeking children to go to school

The Government has approved a decision to appoint an inquiry to review the conditions for regulating the right to education, pre-school activities and school-age childcare for children and young people who are avoiding enforcement of a refusal-of-entry or expulsion order.

Under the current regulatory framework, asylum-seeking children and young people are entitled to schooling on more or less the same terms as children who are resident in Sweden. However, municipalities are under no obligation to offer schooling to children and young people who are avoiding the enforcement of a refusal-of-entry or expulsion order. Nevertheless, today's provisions allow municipalities to offer them places at school voluntarily.

The remit of the inquiry includes examining the possible design of regulations and whether changes in school and aliens legislation may be necessary. The inquiry is to take a position on whether such a regulatory system is compatible with provisions on secrecy and provisions on the notification requirement, the need to submit information and the obligation to report, both to the police and social services. The inquiry includes a review of police procedures in enforcing refusal-of-entry and expulsion orders. The situation of personnel in schools and other facilities will also be reviewed. The inquiry is to report its findings no later than 15 February 2007.

Pending the results of the inquiry, municipalities have been allocated extra funds to be able to receive these children in schools.

Host Country Inquiry presented

The report on Sweden as host country for international organisations was presented to the Government yesterday.

The Host Country Inquiry was appointed to find solutions to a number of practical problems that

had arisen for intergovernmental organisations in Sweden, and also to outline plans for a more active Swedish host country policy. The objective is for Sweden to become better at attracting international activities.

"International cooperation is a rapidly expanding field. Sweden should be in a good position to attract more international organisations", writes Professor Daniel Tarschys.

The Inquiry proposals include making it easier for existing organisations and their staff to work and serve in Sweden. This could be achieved by the granting of Swedish personal identity numbers, access to Swedish schooling and the introduction of freedom of choice as regards affiliation to the Swedish social insurance system, for example.

The Inquiry chair, Daniel Tarschys, considers that host country policy needs to be coordinated. A special coordinator should therefore be appointed at the Ministry for Foreign Affairs to deal with international organisation issues that recur frequently. Another task should be to promote the establishment of more organisations on Swedish soil.

The number of international organisations worldwide is estimated at more than 6 000. The decision to send election observers to Belarus follows a request from the OSCE.

Sweden increases environmental aid

The Government has previously decided to use part - SEK 1 billion over a three-year period (SEK 330 million in 2006) - of the increase in development assistance funding for action in the environmental field. As a result of this special initiative for environment in development assistance and the great interest in developing countries for Swedish environmental technology the Government has taken the following decisions:

- Sida is to receive SEK 235 million for action in the environmental field. The funds are mainly to be used in the areas of water and sanitation, chemical safety, renewable energy and climate issues, sustainable urban development, sustainable use of natural resources and education, capacity support and environmental management.
- SEK 35 million of these funds are to be allocated to action in environmental technology, especially renewable energy and sustainable urban development.
- The Government instructs Sida to set up a council to support its Director-General in matters concerning the orientation and distribution of funds in the special initiative. Council members will be appointed by the Government. The council will include representatives of business and environmental organisations.
- A further SEK 15 million will be distributed by the Government for international environmental programmes.
- The Government also intends to report to the Riksdag that an increase of SEK 80 million is being made in Swedfund's appropriation in order to finance environmental investments in developing countries.

The Government's decision is based on an agreement between the Social Democratic Party, the Left

Party and the Green Party.

Mr Wolfensohn is the Special Envoy for Gaza Disengagement appointed by the Quartet, which is made up of the European Union, the United Nations, the United States and Russia.

In addition to ongoing development assistance to the West Bank and Gaza, the Swedish Government contributes SEK 40 million to the Quick Impact Programme launched by Mr Wolfensohn to promote positive economic development in Gaza. The funds are channelled through the UN refugee organisation UNRWA, which has a central role in improving the situation of Palestinian refugees. The Quick Impact Programme is intended to generate quick and positive development in Gaza after Israel's withdrawal. It includes measures to create jobs, build up infrastructure and improve the environment.

Of particular note among the initiatives undertaken by Mr Wolfensohn as Special Envoy is his work with the Israeli-Palestinian Agreement on Movement and Access signed in November 2005. A central part of this agreement was to open the Rafah Crossing Point to allow people to transit

between Gaza and Egypt under third-party surveillance. This later resulted in the EU mission to monitor the operation of the crossing point, the EU Border Assistance Mission in Rafah (EU BAM Rafah). Sweden's contribution to the mission is extensive and currently includes six Swedes.

The backing of Peter Semneby as the EU representative for southern Caucasus reflects a greater Swedish commitment to the region. A Swedish ambassador will be appointed for southern Caucasus and in the strategy for development cooperation with southern Caucasus adopted by the Government for the period 2006-2009, the Swedish contribution is expected to increase to SEK 120 million per year. In recent weeks, the Prime Minister has visited Georgia and the President of Armenia has been received in Stockholm.

At present, the EU has nine Special Representatives for different conflicts and regions requiring particular attention, including the Balkans, the Middle East, Afghanistan and Africa.

Legislation proposed on right of residence for Union citizens

Today the Government submitted to the Riksdag a Bill entitled "Implementation of the EC Directives on the free movement of Union citizens in the EU and on the status of third-country nationals who are long-term residents".

The Bill includes a proposal to abolish the system with residence permits for EU citizens and their family members. Instead, the concept 'right of residence' will be introduced, a natural right that Union citizens have to reside in Sweden. Residence permits will be replaced by registration for Union citizens and residence cards for their family members. The Swedish Migration Board will be responsible for issuing the documents.

The proposal also introduces a new legal concept, that of third-country nationals who are long-term residents, into Swedish law. Under the general rule, a third-country national may be granted this status after residing in Sweden for five years.

Legislation proposed on residence permits for family

reunification

Today the Government submitted to the Riksdag a Bill entitled "Implementation of the EC Directive on the right to family reunification and certain issues relating to case processing and DNA analysis in connection with family reunification".

Under the proposed legislation members of the nuclear family will be entitled to a residence permit for the purpose of family reunification. In order to shorten processing times in family reunification cases, the present requirement for an oral process will be simplified, without neglecting the requirements of legal certainty.

Another consequence of the proposed legislation is that in certain circumstances, primarily when dealing with parent-child relationships, a person applying for a residence permit on family reunification grounds will be offered a DNA analysis to prove the relationship that is pleaded. Under the proposal, the legislative amendments concerning the possibility of DNA analysis will enter into force on 1 July 2006 and the other amendments on 1 May 2006.

This year's reports on the situation for human rights in the countries of the world are part of this important work," says Ms Freivalds.

Another two steps on the path to a non-toxic environment

Sweden is notifying bans on mercury and the pesticide paraquat.

Sweden has made great progress in its endeavours to phase out toxic chemicals. Today yet another step is being taken in this work through a proposal for a general ban on mercury. Under the proposal the present ban on certain goods will be extended and will also include amalgam and analytical chemicals, for example.

On Tuesday the Ministry of Sustainable Development will deliver supporting material to the National Board of Trade, which will notify the new rules to the European Commission and the World Trade Organisation (WTO). The ban is to come into force on 1 January 2007.

In addition, today Sweden is notifying mercury and the dangerous pesticide paraquat to the global environmental convention on prior consent for certain particularly hazardous chemicals in international trade, known as the Rotterdam Convention.

Mercury is already listed under the Rotterdam Convention, but only for use in agriculture. The new notification also covers mercury in areas like the chlor-alkali industry, small-scale gold extraction and batteries.

Paraquat has been banned in Sweden since 1983. The EU approved the substance in December 2003 after very tough opposition from Sweden. In February 2004 the Government decided to take legal action against the European Commission for its decision to allow paraquat in the EU. As a result of this legal action, the Court of Justice will examine the Government's request for the annulment the Commission's decision.

"The notifications we are now making of the bans on mercury and paraquat are part of our long-term work for a non-toxic environment," says Minister for the Environment Lena Sommestad. "Paraquat is a severely hazardous chemical that is extremely hazardous to health. Major risks are associated with its use, especially in poor countries where protection for workers is poor. The approval of paraquat by the EU was a defeat. I am now eagerly waiting the ruling of the EU Court on our request for the annulment of the Commission's decision."

Laila Freivalds presents report to Kofi Annan

On Thursday 19 January, Minister for Foreign Affairs Laila Freivalds will present the concluding report from the Challenges Project on peace support operations to UN Secretary-General Kofi Annan.

The report, "Meeting the Challenges of Peace Operations: Cooperation and Coordination", contains numerous proposals on how to strengthen the international community's peace support efforts.

Some points mentioned in the report are that measures to support justice in countries affected by conflict must be an integrated element early on in the planning stage of UN peace operations. Practical tools are needed for cooperation between the UN and various regional organisations, such as in Africa. This in turn places demands on education, which to an even greater degree must include both military and civilian experts.

"Through this report and its concrete recommendations, Sweden is providing an important contribution to UN peace support efforts. Sweden is taking part in 10 of the 18 current UN peace support operations. This is one more way for us to help strengthen this crucial work," states Ms Freivalds.

"The report and its recommendations have been developed in cooperation with authorities, organisations and governments in 14 countries throughout the world. The work on the report has contributed to greater consensus on how UN peace operations should be developed and how Member States can support these efforts."

The presentation marks the opening of a seminar at UN headquarters on peace support operations. The project's partner organisations, many Member States, representations from the UN Secretariat and other international organisations will take part in the seminar.

The purpose of the Challenges Project is to help enhance and improve the efficiency of international peace operations. Since its launch in 1997 the project has grown and now includes partner organisations and departments from 14 countries: Argentina, Australia, Canada, China, India, Japan, Jordan, Nigeria, Russia, the UK, South Africa, Turkey, the USA and Sweden. The project is coordinated by Sweden through the Folke Bernadotte Academy (chair), the Swedish Armed Forces, the National Police Board and the Swedish National Defence College.

New Swedish strategic plan for sexual and reproductive health and rights

The Government has adopted a policy document for Sweden's international policy for sexual and reproductive health and rights, (SRHR).

The document, which is the first of its kind, will form the basis of the bilateral, multilateral, operational and normative work that Sweden conducts internationally.

"It is important to clearly highlight Sweden's positions when it comes to sexual and reproductive health and rights. International opposition exists, and we are unfortunately often forced to focus on defending declarations already agreed on," states Carin Jämtin, Minister for International Development Cooperation.

"The policy document emphasises the importance that Sweden attaches to these issues - partly to realise the UN Millennium Development Goals, but primarily because they deal with every person's individual rights," Ms Jämtin concludes.

Sexual and reproductive health and rights apply to everyone's partnerships, relations and sexual lives. They involve the entire life cycle. They include knowledge about sexuality and reproduction, protection against HIV/AIDS and other sexually transmitted diseases, access to contraceptives and abortions. They also include adequate health care during pregnancy and childbirth, and care of the newly born.

Action plan against communicable diseases

The fight against communicable diseases is so important that it is being made a priority area for Swedish development assistance. The Government has decided on an action plan for Sweden's contribution to the global fight against communicable diseases.

The action plan is based on the proposal that was presented to Minister for International Development Cooperation Carin Jämtin in October last year (Swedish Government Official Reports 2005:107).

"The fight against communicable diseases will be one of four priorities for Swedish development assistance," says Ms Jämtin.

"By adopting a special action plan, we are bringing greater coherence to Sweden's contribution to the global fight against communicable diseases. This enables us to set clearer priorities and coordinate our inputs so as to maximise their usefulness," concludes Ms Jämtin.

The action plan applies to all Swedish global development policy and will be characterised by long-term commitment and clear and measurable targets. The development of new knowledge and harnessing of research results have a key role.

The action plan singles out certain areas as particularly crucial in the fight against communicable diseases:

- better education and increased gender equality, access to clean water and sanitation, decent housing, good food and vaccines, development and correct use of new medicines;
- reinforcement of health systems in poor countries;
- studies of the spread of communicable diseases among both people and animals and application of the International Health Regulations (IHR).

The Government instructs agencies to facilitate the expansion of wind power

In October this year the Government decided to appoint a national wind power council. As the first result of the work of the council, several changes are now being made to improve the work of sectoral agencies on wind power. The changes concern both appropriation directions and agency instructions.

- · The Swedish Energy Agency is identified as the agency that will, in its role of expert agency, lead the other agencies in work to increase the use of wind power.
- · The Swedish Environmental Protection Agency is given the task of securing the dissemination of knowledge, through its expert role, about the environmental impact of wind power developments in order to facilitate and accelerate increased use of wind power.
- · The county administrative boards are being instructed to work actively at regional level to accelerate the positive development of wind power. For example, the county administrative boards are to facilitate work by the municipalities on plans for greater production of wind power. If wind power is to increase, it must achieve a wider regional spread than it now has. This increases the importance of the county administrative boards as public authorities at regional level. The appropriation directions for the county administrative boards identify the transition to alternative energy sources as a priority area, making it a separate programme area for the first time.
- · The National Board of Housing, Building and Planning is given clearer responsibility for creating the conditions to achieve the planning objective of 10 TWh by 2015 and for reporting on the provision of information to enhance expertise among country administrative boards and municipalities, in particular, in planning for the development of wind power.
- · Svenska Kraftnät is given the task of reporting what actions have been taken to facilitate the connection of wind power to the national electrical grid.
- · The Swedish Armed Forces are given new tasks such as contributing to the appropriate localisation of wind power.
- The Swedish Board of Fisheries is also to contribute actively to the achievement of the planning objective of 10 TWh by 2015.

"Step by step we are now purposefully creating the conditions to accelerate the large-scale development of wind power, which is necessary in view of coming generations," says Minister for Sustainable Development Mona Sahlin. "In the long term the vision for energy policy is to only use renewable energy, everything else is incompatible with long-term sustainable development."

The Government updates its Asia policy

The Government today presented the communication "A Swedish Policy for Asia" to the Riksdag.

In the communication, the Government describes its Asia policy in a number of important areas: democracy and human rights; trade and investment; development cooperation; the environment; research; education; non-governmental organisations; cross-border networks; and culture, information and measures to promote Sweden. The perspective focuses on Sweden's interests in international issues, the desire to promote our welfare through employment and growth, and the goals and needs of the Asian countries themselves.

The impact of the changes taking place in many countries in the region is clearly global in nature. Asia's importance in the world economy continues to grow, which emphasises how important it is that Sweden works to develop its economic ties with the region as a whole. Even though poverty in Asia is decreasing, the majority of the world's poor still live in Asia, gaps within countries are increasing and many countries are having problems living up to several of the other Millennium Development Goals. There is a need to continue to support reform efforts in developing Asian countries and to continue their integration in the global economy. The environment is highlighted as a crucial issue for Asia that will require continued attention for a long time to come. In its cooperation with countries in Asia, the Government will continue to give high priority to human rights and democracy issues.

Developments in the world will be closely linked to developments in Asia during the coming century. For a small, open economy like the Swedish economy, this involves great opportunities and challenges. The pace of development in Asia is very rapid, and it is therefore warranted to analyse Asia's growing role in the world and to update the Government's Asia policy.

The Swedish Government gives the "go ahead" on the Neuron project

Today the Government has decided to go ahead with the UCAV project,

commonly known as the Neuron. The decision firstly enables the Swedish Armed Forces to place an order with the Defence Materiel Administration concerning the development of a technology demonstrator for an UCAV. Secondly it enables the Defence Materiel Administration to sign an agreement with France on the co-operation concerning the UCAV. The aim of the agreement and the co-operation as such is twofold - firstly to enhance and deepen the knowledge of UCAVs - especially its value for the development of both military and civilian aeronautical competencies - secondly to strengthen the Swedish ability for sustaining and developing the JAS 39 Gripen.

Today's decision does not imply any commitment what so ever regarding a continuation of the UCAV project, and in accordance with the overall aim, there are no plans for any serial production either. The Neuron is a distinct technology demonstrator and the project definition does not include any activities related to preparations for or production as such.

- Both the Swedish Parliament and the Swedish Defence Commission have for a long time declared that Sweden should pursue its international co-operation concerning development projects in the area of defence matériel. According to the Minister of Defence, Leni Björklund, the Government is now able to give the "go ahead" for the Swedish participation in the Neuron project. A project involving, apart from Sweden, five more countries.

According to Leni Björklund, today's decision is part of a long-term and responsible policy for defence - a policy that is made possible due to the co-operation with other political parties willing to compromise in order to create broad solutions.

- The decision enables Sweden to keep and develop the much needed aeronautical competencies crucial to the sustaining of the operational capabilities of the Swedish Air Force. The decision naturally have positive effects on the Swedish Space and Aeronautics Research and Industry. The Minister of Defence concludes that the Neuron project will benefit both civilian and military development projects.

The cost for the Swedish part of the Neuron project over a ten year period will be MEUR 75 or approximately MSEK 680. The Saab group will finance the major part of the project with MSEK 600 while the remaining MSEK 80 is financed by the Swedish Government. As a consequence the cost for the sustaining of the JAS 39 Gripen will be reduced with MSEK 30 per year.

The fact that the Saab group is financing a major part of the project renders approximately MSEK 600 within the budgetary framework for the JAS 39 Gripen available for the long-term development of the JAS 39 Gripen between 2005 - 2012. The details of which will be further developed by the Defence Materiel Administration and the Saab group during the first half of the year 2006.

Education leads to increased productivity and higher lifetime incomes

People with an education become more productive in their work and thus earn higher lifetime incomes. It is difficult to demonstrate on the basis of the research findings whether education contributes to increased economic growth, in addition to that resulting from the increase in lifetime incomes. Professor Anders Björklund and Mikael Lindahl Ph.D., both at the Swedish Institute for Social Research at Stockholm University, show this to be the case in a review of the research literature. Their findings are presented in the first of a series of reports, which the Expert group on Economic Studies (ESS) will publish.

Björklund and Lindahl discuss and analyse in their report "Education and Economic Development - What does empirical research show about causal inter-relationships" (ESS 2005:4) the latest findings in economic research on the relationship between education and economic development, and give as their overall conclusion that "the best studies indicate that the overall economic production effects correspond fairly closely to the aggregate individual income effects".

Apart from higher lifetime incomes, there are other empirically documented effects of the impact of education on individuals, such as better health, longer life expectancy and greater political involvement. In addition, education tends to be "inherited" in the sense that the children of parents with a higher education also get a higher education themselves.

The report identifies a number of gaps in our current knowledge. For instance, how growth in Sweden is affected by the major initiatives and investments that have been taken in education. In addition, relatively little research has been carried out into how the effects of education differ in relation to educational orientation. Neither have the positive effects that education is assumed to have on linkages to the labour market and transition to work been sufficiently well covered in the research.

In order to provide a broader social science perspective of our knowledge in macroeconomics, Albert Tuijnman, Professor in International Pedagogy has been invited to comment on and supplement this review of the findings.

The Expert Group on Economic Studies (ESS) is a working group in the Swedish Ministry of Finance co-operating with other parts of the Government Offices. This report has been initiated in conjunction with the Ministry of Education, Research and Culture. The main task of ESS is similar to the former Expert Group on Public Finance (ESO) to broaden and deepen the knowledge needed for policy initiatives in different socio-economic areas.

Sweden to withhold budget support to Uganda

The Government has decided to withhold SEK 65 million in budget support to Uganda in light of the negative democratic development in the country.

Sweden contributes to increased security in the Palestinian areas

The Government has decided to provide substantial support to improve security and living conditions in the Palestinian areas.

The Government is contributing SEK 20 million to support EU action to transform and modernise the Palestinian Civil Police. In addition, the Government has decided to provide SEK 40 million in assistance to the Quick Impact Program for positive economic development in Gaza. The funds will be channelled through the UN refugee organisation UNRWA, which has a central role in improving the situation of Palestinian refugees.

"For Sweden, it is important to contribute to international efforts to increase security in the Palestinian areas. Palestinians will be better able to combat terrorism. The support improves the prospects for a resumption of the peace process," says Minster for Foreign Affairs Laila Freivalds.

"By providing aid to the Quick Impact Program and the EU Police Mission we are helping to establish better and more secure living conditions in the Palestinian areas," says Minister for International Development Cooperation Carin Jämtin.

At the turn of the year, the EU Police Mission for the Palestinian Territories (EUPOL COPPS), which is supporting the transformation of the Palestinian Civil Police, will be expanded. The purpose of the Mission is to assist in building up a modern police force that establishes law and order and promotes human rights. A more effective police force will be more able to combat terrorism. The Deputy Head of the Mission is a Swede and additional Swedish advisers are likely to join the Mission when it is expanded at the turn of the year. These contributions will make Sweden one of the largest donors to the Police Mission.

The Quick Impact Program is intended to generate quick and positive development in Gaza after Israel's withdrawal. It includes measures to create jobs, build up infrastructure and improve the environment. The Program is headed by James Wolfensohn, who has been appointed by the Quartet (EU, UN, USA and Russia).

Support for EUPOL COPPS and the Quick Impact Program is being provided alongside Sweden's substantial contribution to the EU mission to monitor the operation of the border crossing point at Rafah between Gaza and Egypt.

Sweden supports UN Fund for the Tsunami Warning System

In the same meeting, the Ministers also discussed bilateral questions, including the Joint Plan of Action that was initiated by Prime Minister Thaksin and Prime Minister Persson of Sweden last year. The agreement has since been negotiated between the two kingdoms and is scheduled to be signed shortly.

The Joint Plan of Action covers a broad range of issues such as enhancing bilateral economic relations, areas of mutual interest such as agriculture and forestry, defense and military cooperation, education and research, energy and the environment, ICT, tourism and health care, post Tsunami recovery, cooperation in regional development projects and regular exchanges on global issues.

When the border station at Rafah between Gaza and Egypt opens tomorrow on 25 November, it will be done with the EU as a monitoring party. Sweden is one of the largest donors to the mission, providing five police officers, one logistical expert and 26 furnished containers intended for housing and offices for EU personnel.

"This is the first time that the EU is assuming a leading role in the Middle East conflict. I am very pleased that Sweden is playing an important role in this context," says Minister for Foreign Affairs Laila Freivalds.

"I am delighted that, starting tomorrow, the Palestinians in Gaza will once again be able to travel abroad. For Sweden, the EU mission represents an important contribution to create positive development in Gaza and better conditions for the resumption of the peace process," says Minister for International Development Corporation Carin Jämtin.

The EU High Representative Javier Solana has especially commented on the importance of Sweden's contribution to the mission.

On 15 November representatives of the Palestinian National Authority and Israel's government concluded an agreement on mobility and border crossings that included the border station at Rafah between Gaza and Egypt. This border station has largely been closed since Israel's withdrawal from Gaza in September 2005. The agreement of 15 November means that the parties have agreed on the forms for opening the border and that the EU, as a neutral third party, will be tasked with monitoring the operations of the border station.

Sweden's Convergence Programme Update Presented

Sweden has today submitted an update of the convergence programme to the European Commission and to the Council.

The convergence programme shows that Sweden's economy is on a positive track. GDP is expected to increase by 2.4 per cent in 2005 and 3.1 per cent in 2006. Net lending in the public sector is estimated at 1.4 per cent of GDP in 2005 and 0.7 per cent in 2006. Consolidated gross debt in the public sector, the so-called Maastricht debt, is expected to reach 50.9 per cent of GDP this year and to decline to 46.0 per cent of GDP in 2008.

Under the Stability and Growth Pact, Member States participating in the monetary union will prepare stability programmes. Member States that are not participating will prepare convergence programmes. The aim of the programmes is to strengthen surveillance of public finances. Members have undertaken to attain budget objectives in balance or surplus. Each country may define its precise national objectives. However, the objective may not be below -1 per cent of GDP.

The update of Sweden's convergence programme is based on the forecasts, estimates and proposals in the Budget Bill for 2006. Economic objectives remain unchanged. This means that public finances shall achive a surplus of 2 per cent of GDP on average over the business cycle.

The Government also reports on its measures to improve efficiency in the economy. Measures in labour market policy, education and medical care and ill health are emphasized. The long-term impact of demographic changes on the public finances is also highlighted. These issues are of high importance for economic policy in the European Union.

Agreement to sharply accelerate efforts to improve the Baltic Sea environment

At a meeting at Haga Palace in Stockholm today, environment ministers from the Baltic Sea countries were in favour of the idea of moving ahead of the rest of the EU and making the Baltic Sea a pilot area for the EU Marine Strategy.

"We have had a successful meeting, with environment ministers from the countries around the Baltic Sea giving powerful political backing to measures to tackle the environmental situation in the Baltic Sea," says Minister for the Environment Lena Sommestad, who took the initiative for the meeting with her Baltic Sea colleagues.

The Helsinki Commission (HELCOM) action plan for the Baltic Sea, which is scheduled to be ready in 2007, can provide a basis for work on the Baltic Sea as a pilot area.

"We have discussed how to step up the pace of HELCOM's work on a joint action plan for the Baltic Sea in the best way. One idea could be to create a task force", says Lena Sommestad.

Some of the countries will also provide extra resources for the work on the joint action plan. Work on the HELCOM action plan is focusing on measures relating to four major environmental problems: eutrophication, hazardous substances, maritime traffic and safety and species loss/biodiversity.

With regard to maritime safety and emergency and combating capacity, ministers from the Baltic Sea countries have agreed to further develop this work within HELCOM.

The ministers have also agreed that measures are needed to reduce overfishing, particularly of cod, and to improve reproductive environments for cod.

Contribution towards return of totem pole

The Government today approved a grant of SEK 200 000 to the National Museums of World Culture for the Haisla Totem Pole Repatriation Project. The grant is to be used to cover part of the costs associated with returning the totem pole to Canada.

The totem pole in the National Museum of Ethnography is a memorial that tells the story of the difficult time in the 1870s when the Kitlope people were ravaged by severe smallpox epidemics and a large part of the population died.

Swedish election observers to Democratic Republic of the Congo

Mona Sahlin comments on the Barsebäck 2 agreement

On 16 December 2004, the Government decided that the second Barsebäck reactor would be shut down at the end of May 2005. The intention to close the reactor was already publicised on 4 October 2004, when the Social Democratic Party, the Centre Party and the Left Party presented a strategy for the continued phase-out of nuclear power.

The Government's negotiator, Ms Yvonne Gustafsson, Director-General for the National Financial Management Authority, has today informed the Government and the parties cooperating with it on energy policy, the Centre Party and the Left Party, that a solution has been reached in the negotiations with regard to Barsebäck 2.

"Negotiations have been conducted on a business-like basis and I am very satisfied that the negotiator has found a solution that is acceptable to all parties," comments Minister for Sustainable Development Ms Mona Sahlin.

The Barsebäck agreement from 1999 between the Government, Sydkraft and Vattenfall regulates state compensation in the event of a future decision on a shutdown of Barsebäck 2, supported by the Nuclear Power Phase-Out Act.

Compensation for Barsebäck 2 has been decided on the basis of the same basic valuation principles that were applied in connection with the shutdown of Barsebäck 1.

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Agreement on Barsebäck finalised

Government, Vattenfall and E.ON negotiators have agreed on the compensation to be paid by the state as a result of the December 2004 decision to withdraw the operating licence for reactor 2 at the Barsebäck nuclear power plant as of 1 June 2005. This compensation is based on the provisions of the framework agreement concluded between the parties in connection with the closure of reactor 1 on 30 November 1999. Among other things, it allowed for E.ON Sweden to increase its share of ownership in the Ringhals nuclear power plant by 3.76 percentage points when B2 was shut down.

The main features of today's agreement are that Vattenfall will be granted compensation for its share of ownership in reactor 2 at the Barsebäck nuclear power plant (74.2%) and for E.ON's increased share of ownership in the Ringhals plant. In this way, the original agreement granting E.ON Sweden the same amount of power at the same cost as it would have been supplied by the Barsebäck nuclear power plant has been met. The agreement also means that the state will pay compensation for additional costs in connection with the shutdown and service operations of reactor 2. The previously agreed state compensation for single operation of reactor 2 ceased when the reactor was shut down.

The state will pay SEK 4.1 billion in cash as compensation to Vattenfall, over a four-year period. This compensation is adjusted to conditions on the market and is based on the parties' assessment of the main criteria defined by the framework agreement as the necessary basis of the valuation.

State compensation for additional costs of shutdown and service operations amount to a total of approximately SEK 1.533 billion for the period from 2005 until the end of June 2017, when the reactor's lifespan would have reached 40 years.

Thus, the costs to the state will amount to a total of SEK 5.6 billion. Since compensation has been reduced by around SEK 2.4 billion for the single operation of B2, the net costs for the state amount to SEK 3.2 billion.

"I am very pleased that we have managed to reach an agreement that all the parties can accept," says the Government's negotiator Ms Yvonne Gustafsson. "This agreement means that the state has met its commitments under the framework agreement."

The agreement will enter into force when it has been approved by parties including the Government and the boards of E.ON Sweden and Vattenfall. In anticipation of this approval, E.ON Sweden will obtain power from the Ringhals nuclear power plant as though the agreement had entered into force, under an interim agreement between E.ON Sweden and Vattenfall.

Turkey and Croatia closer to EU membership

The EU Commission has presented monitoring reports on Turkey and Croatia. The reports are a first review of the countries' reform processes since accession negotiations began on 3 October.

The Commission considers that Turkey continues to sufficiently fulfil the political requirements of the Copenhagen Criteria, which is a fundamental condition for accession negotiations. Croatia is expected to fulfil this part of the criteria without any great difficulty. Both countries appear to be efficient market economies. At the same time, the Commission emphasises in the reports that the countries need to continue reform of their respective judicial systems.

"Sweden welcomes the fact that accession negotiations have now begun with Turkey and Croatia and that the Commission monitoring reports indicate continued progress in the countries' reform efforts," says Minister for Foreign Affairs Laila Freivalds.

In the reports, the Commission also indicates the areas of reform that Turkey and Croatia should prioritise in the short and medium term.

Macedonia's application for EU membership

The EU Commission has presented its response to Macedonia's application for EU membership which was submitted in April 2004.

Guidelines for Central Government Debt Management in 2006

The Government has decided on the guidelines for the management of the central government debt. This year's decision on the guidelines covers the years 2006 to 2008. It continues to aim at greater risk diversification in Sweden's central government debt in the long term. Thus the percentage of foreign currency debt will decrease and the percentage of inflation-linked debt will increase. The goal for the percentage of inflation-linked debt has been fixed at 20 per cent of the central government debt with the aim of reducing the uncertainty in the allocation of the debt between nominal and inflation-linked borrowing.

- The central government debt at its peak in 1998 came to approximately 75 per cent of GDP. Through good economic policy, we have succeeded in slashing the debt and in October 2005, the central government debt came to SEK 1,278 billion, less than 50 per cent of GDP, says Sven-Erik Österberg, Minister for Local Government and Financial Markets.
- The general goal of central government debt policy is to minimise the long-term cost of the debt while giving due consideration to the inherent risk. This goal remains unchanged. Therefore the maturity in the central government debt will stay the same as it was in the guidelines for 2005, Sven-Erik Österberg concludes.

The main points in the decision on the guidelines are:

- The measure for the maturity of the nominal krona and foreign currency debts is changing from the duration to the average interest rate refixing period;
- The foreign currency debt is to decrease in the long term to 15 per cent of the central government debt. The foreign currency debt is to be amortised by SEK 25 billion in 2006 and the aim for 2007 and 2008 is an amortisation of the same amount. The Debt Office may deviate from this benchmark by \pm SEK 15 billion;
- The percentage of inflation-linked debt is to increase in the long term to 20 per cent of the central government debt. The Government is also of the opinion that the goal for the rate of growth in the stock of inflation-linked loans could be lowered somewhat;
- The benchmark for the average interest rate refixing period is to be 3.1 years for 2006, with the same benchmark being the aim for 2007 and 2008. The Debt Office may take interest rate positions not exceeding 0.5 years duration. The risk mandate covers both the strategic and operational levels;
- The goal for debt and market maintenance is being introduced and clarified in the guidelines for 2006. The Debt Office is to use debt and market maintenance measures to help make the markets work better. Such measures must not entail setting aside the goal of long-term cost minimisation.

The Government has signed an agreement with the Latvian government to make it possible for the Latvian state to assume responsibility for the Riga Graduate School of Law (RGSL) which Sweden has been supporting.

The institution will retain its academic profile and will now be able to continue its activities in collaboration with the University of Latvia and with support from the Latvian government.

The RGSL was originally founded as part of the process to develop and strengthen judicial systems in Latvia and the other Baltic countries. This has also meant that RGSL activities have helped prepare the countries for EU membership.

Under an original agreement between Sweden and Latvia in 1997, the RGSL was to be transferred to Latvian ownership at a later stage. Swedish support to the RGSL has amounted to a total of more than SEK 40 million.

The institution has a high academic profile and has awarded Masters degrees to some 200 students. It has also provided a large number of legal education and professional development opportunities for practising lawyers in public administration, the judiciary and the legal profession.

Sweden takes international initiative against child abduction

Minister for Foreign Affairs Laila Freivalds hosted an informal ministerial meeting on unlawfully abducted children at Haga Palace on Friday, 4 November. Ministers and senior political representatives from Algeria, Latvia, Malta, Morocco, Tunisia and Turkey took part in the meeting.

The purpose of the meeting - the first of its kind - was to discuss measures that can be taken to prevent the unlawful abduction of children, i.e., when one of the child's parents unlawfully abducts or retains a child in a country other than that in which the child lives on a permanent basis.

International cooperation, in which Sweden takes an active part, has so far concerned cross-border cooperation between officials and judges. Ms Freivalds now wishes to go one step further and involve political decision-makers in a number of countries.

"We want to initiate cooperation with these countries to strengthen the international regulatory framework and make processing cases that arise quicker and more fruitful. Foreign policy is just as much about the security of individuals as it is about the security of nations," states Ms Freivalds.

"It is vital to do everything possible to prevent children being unlawfully abducted by influencing or deterring a potential perpetrator, by increased vigilance at border crossings and by quick and efficient restoration of custody once an abduction has taken place."

At the meeting, the so-called Haga Declaration against child abduction was adopted, which established the following:

- The countries agreed about the importance of setting up Central Authorities*. These are considered to be of crucial importance in tracing abducted children and facilitating decisions on returning them to their custodian.
- By means of extensive training initiatives for judges, prosecutors, lawyers, social workers and administrative personnel, the "Haga countries" wish to improve the quality of and increase the speed in processing child abduction cases.
- The countries also established that it was important, particularly to avoid abductions, that use can be made of rights of access determined by a competent court, and that the countries should be able to improve their cooperation in areas such as visas.
- *The responsibility of the Central Authorities is to process individual cases as well as to provide specialist skills and to facilitate the exchange of information between states.

Increased Swedish support to operations in Sudan

The Government has decided to increase support to the African Union (AU) peace-support operations in Darfur by a total of SEK 15 million.

The support will go to AU operations in Darfur - the AU Mission in Sudan (AMIS) - and to the political peace negotiations that are being held in Abuja.

"Sweden is now making a further concrete contribution to the AU's efforts to promote security in Darfur. For sustainable peace to be achieved, attention must be focused on the particularly vulnerable position of women. Targeted measures are being undertaken to increase women's participation in the political negotiations and to strengthen protection for women and girls," says Minister for Foreign Affairs Laila Freivalds.

The support will be distributed evenly over three areas of priority. The AU operations in Darfur will receive increased Swedish support to measures including security building. Some of the support will go to the AMIS office for human rights and gender issues in Sudan. The remainder will go to the peace negotiations in Abuja, where some of the money is earmarked for active promotion of women's participation in the peace negotiations.

In addition to previous financial support of SEK 7 million to AMIS and the Abuja negotiations, Sweden is contributing military experts and police through EU support measures to AMIS, and also advisers for the political negotiations.

Increased Swedish presence in Afghanistan

In a proposal to the Riksdag, the Government suggests that Sweden increase its contribution to the International Security Assistance Force in Afghanistan (ISAF).

The Government's intention is for Sweden to take over command of the Provincial Reconstruction Team (PRT) in Mazar-e-Sharif, located in northern Afghanistan, in March 2006.

"The Government views the Swedish contribution to ISAF as a long-term commitment of high priority. It is therefore natural that we wish to assume greater responsibility in this important mission," says Minister for Foreign Affairs Laila Freivalds.

"A long-term international military and civilian presence is necessary in Afghanistan to support the developing democracy and to create the conditions for security and reconstruction. ISAF plays a very important role in this."

ISAF's main task in Afghanistan is to contribute to security. Improved security is essential for the reconstruction efforts of the Afghan government, the UN and other relief organisations to succeed.

Swedish units have taken part in ISAF since the mission was set up at the end of 2001 following a UN Security Council decision. In October 2003 the geographical mandate of the NATO-led force was expanded from Kabul so that it also covered other areas of the country.

Today some one hundred Swedish soldiers take part in ISAF. With the proposed increase, the Swedish presence in ISAF would double. Three civilian advisers would also be attached to the Swedish-led regional unit in Mazar-e-Sharif: one for political issues, one for development issues and one for police matters.

Simpler and cheaper premium pension

Inquiry chair Karl-Olof Hammarkvist today presented the report Svårnavigerat? Premiepensionssparande på rätt kurs (Difficult waters? Premium pension savings on course) to the Minister for Local Government and Financial Markets Sven-Erik Österberg.

The construction phase of the premium pension system has been completed. The Premium Pension Inquiry notes that the premium pension system is working well and is reasonably cost-effective, but that it should be even simpler and cheaper for pension savers to manage their premium pension.

Simpler premium pension

Despite extensive information many pension savers feel unable to handle their premium pension. Pension savers need different information and guidance from that given at present by the Premium Pension Authority (PPM). The Inquiry proposes that all pension savers be given in-depth decision-making support that simplifies management of their premium pension.

Pension savers must continue to be able to choose freely among the funds in the system, but should be helped to compose a well-diversified fund portfolio with low administrative charges. The PPM's

investment model soon to be introduced is a good first step in this work. The premium pension is not only about putting together a fund portfolio. The greatest difficulties with pension saving consist of the day-to-day management, evaluation and review of choices made. The PPM should therefore develop services that make it simpler for pension savers to manage and follow up their premium pension.

Cheaper premium pension

In an international perspective the charges paid by pension savers for their premium pension are low. This is also the case in comparison with Swedish insurance companies and other authorities. The PPM's administrative costs per pension saver are, for example, only about one third of the Swedish Social Insurance Agency's average administrative costs for income pensions.

A large proportion of the charges paid by pension savers go to the fund management companies. In its capacity as a major investor the PPM requires a rebate on the fund fees paid by pension savers. The premium pension can therefore be made even cheaper if the PPM reviews the model for requiring a rebate from fund management companies and introduces fees to be paid by the fund management companies to pension savers.

The selection of funds in the premium pension system

The selection of funds in the premium pension system has increased considerably since the start. At the time when the first fund choices were made, in 2000, there were just over 450 funds in the system. At the end of September 2005 there were 705 funds registered in the system. The basic view of the Inquiry is that no fund per se can be regarded as unnecessary or impossible in a fund portfolio for pension savings. The fundamental problem is not the selection of funds but rather the lack of sophisticated guidance.

However, it is not an end in itself to have so many funds in the system. There are funds in the system that do not fill any function since there is no demand for them from pension savers. The selection of funds can therefore be reduced to about 100 to 200 funds, without any deterioration in pension savers' possibilities of managing their premium pensions. This is not a goal in itself but relates to how pension savers are utilising the fund selection and so may change over time.

Premiesparfonden to be developed and Premievalsfonden phased out

It is proposed to make the default alternative, Premiesparfonden, a generation fund so that the risk level is reduced as the pension saver gets older. Premiesparfonden will be opened up for active selection and Premievalsfonden of the Seventh National Swedish Pension Fund (Sjunde AP-fonden) that can be actively selected should thereby be discontinued. The low-risk requirement in Premiesparfonden should be replaced by the prudent person principle. It is proposed that the Seventh National Swedish Pension Fund be allowed to exercise voting rights and the restrictions on influence that apply generally to fund management companies be applied to the Seventh National Swedish Pension Fund.

An independent and separate pension authority

The present system, with two authorities for old age pensions, means that pension savers do not receive the service they are paying for. Without going into details, the Inquiry proposes that an independent and separate pension authority be established, with responsibility for pension administration.

With the contributions Sida has made so far to the Swedish Rescue Services Agency for help with UN measures in the area, and to the International Federation of Red Cross and Red Crescent Societies, Sweden's support amounts at present to approximately SEK 105 million.

The UN estimates that four million people may be in need of humanitarian assistance following the earthquake in South Asia on 8 October. On 11 October, the UN made a joint appeal for humanitarian assistance for the area to a value of USD 271 million, or roughly SEK 2.1 billion. More than 30 states have initiated or offered help in the affected area.

This decision means that Sweden is contributing a total of six of the fifty police officers that have been pledged in support of AMIS.

In addition to police advisers, civilian support to the African Union includes measures to train police officers and development assistance in areas such as human rights, the situation of women and children and other humanitarian support.

Sweden has previously contributed a number of military experts to the EU mission.

Under UN mandate, the African Union has been monitoring the ceasefire between the Sudanese government and rebel groups in Darfur since May 2004.

New cooperation between Sweden and California to reduce emissions from cars

Lena Sommestad, Minister for the Environment, and Terry Tamminen, Cabinet Secretary to Governor Arnold Schwarzenegger of California, agreed at a meeting on Thursday to start a cooperative task force to look at the possibility of developing a transport system based on biogas in California.

The task force will be made up of government and industry representatives from Sweden and California.

"California has ambitious targets for climate policy and lies well to the fore in work on sustainable transport solutions. It is important to cooperate at regional level in the United States to reduce emissions from cars," says Ms Sommestad.

"Sweden can contribute unique knowledge and technology for using biogas as a fuel for vehicles. Terry Tamminen is very interested in what we are doing and I have therefore invited him to Sweden to give him a chance to study on the spot how we are working to develop renewable vehicle fuels," says Ms Sommestad.

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Sweden has the largest fleet of biogas-fuelled vehicles in the world. Over the past few years, the market has grown at a rate of 15-20 per cent per year. We now have approximately 7000 biogas cars in Sweden. The industry (manufacturers of biogas vehicles, gas and energy companies, and municipalities) believes there is great potential to increase the share of the market held by biogas. In 2010 Sweden could be producing and distributing enough biogas for approximately 80 000

vehicles.

California has set the target of reducing emissions of carbon dioxide by 80 per cent by 2050. The focus is on measures in the transport sector.

The Government decided today to provide debt relief to Indonesia. Resources freed by this decision are to be used for humanitarian and reconstruction needs following the tsunami.

The decision is based on a multilateral agreement in the Paris Club and means that SEK 33.6 million (USD 4.3 million) will be scheduled for repayment between 1 December 2006 and 1 December 2009. Tax Convention between Sweden and USA amended

Sweden and the United States have signed a protocol amending the tax convention between the two countries. One effect of the amendments will be to eliminate withholding taxes in cases where dividends are paid from a subsidiary in one of the states to a parent company in the other state.

The protocol makes certain amendments to the 1994 Tax Convention between Sweden and the United States. One result of the amendments will be to completely eliminate withholding taxes in most situations when a dividend is paid from a subsidiary in one of the states to a parent company in the other state. At present dividends paid from the United States are taxed at a rate of 5 per cent. The amendment will enable Swedish companies operating in the American market to act on the same terms as companies from major competing countries.

Pension funds will also be exempted from withholding taxes on dividends from the other country.

The protocol will enter into force during the spring of 2006 at the earliest.

Background facts on Sweden's work on green cars

The Swedish Government's strategy for more environmentally-friendly cars and fuels is based on four components:

- · Tax relief for environmentally-friendly fuels and green cars. Carbon dioxide neutral fuels, including biogas, are exempt from both carbon dioxide tax and energy tax for a five-year period.
- · Access to environmentally-friendly fuels throughout the country. The Government has drawn up draft legislation requiring large petrol stations in Sweden to offer renewable motor fuels.
- · Public procurement. The Government is encouraging purchases of green cars by preferential taxation and public procurement. In 2006 the target is that 35 per cent of all cars bought by the central government sector will be green cars.
- · Investment grants. For several years, the state has granted support to municipalities and companies to reduce green house gas and other emissions. A long list of projects has begun to promote the introduction of renewable fuels, for example, projects to produce biogas or extend networks for distribution. These investment grants have been very successful and have helped to reduce emissions dramatically. The market of biogas for vehicles is growing with 15-20 % each year the last five years and Sweden has now the largest fleet of biogas vehicles in the world.

Carin Jämtin to participate in World Bank Annual Meeting

Minister for International Development Cooperation Carin Jämtin will participate in the World Bank Annual Meeting in Washington DC on 24-25 September.

One of the main issues at the meeting will be the G8 countries' proposal on debt cancellation for the poorest and most heavily indebted countries. The aim is to cancel all these countries' currently outstanding debts to the World Bank (IDA), the International Monetary Fund and the African Development Fund.

"Sweden welcomes the G8 proposal on debt cancellation as an important step in solving the debt problems of the poorest countries. The details of the proposal are however still unclear and need to be specified," says Minister for International Development Cooperation Carin Jämtin.

"Promises of debt cancellation must be followed by more money for financing. Otherwise there is a risk that the poor people who have set their hopes on the G8 countries' promises will be greatly

disappointed."

"The rich countries must contribute more resources to the World Bank and the African Development Fund if this debt cancellation really is to be implemented. It is also important to guarantee that the poorest countries will also be able to take advantage of loans and donations for poverty reduction from these institutions in the future," concludes Ms Jämtin.

The Minister for International Development Cooperation will also chair a separate meeting between a number of countries and the World Bank's new president, Paul Wolfowitz, to discuss the issues to be addressed at the Annual Meeting.

Ms Jämtin will also have a series of meetings with the World Bank vice presidents to discuss how developing countries should be able to take advantage of increased trade and to discuss the new World Bank strategy for Africa.

Laila Freivalds and women foreign ministers demand gender equality when UN peace-building commission is set up

At the recently concluded UN Summit in New York, the decision was taken to create a peace-building commission to assist countries in dealing with the transition from conflict to sustainable peace.

In a letter to UN Secretary-General Kofi Annan and President of the General Assembly Jan Eliasson, Minister for Foreign Affairs Laila Freivalds and 13 women foreign ministers write that gender equality must prevail when the commission is set up.

"Experience shows that women's involvement in peace-building efforts is extremely important. It must be an integral part of UN efforts. Women and representatives of women's organisations from countries that are expected to be part of the peace-building commission must be allowed to actively participate in its conception. The goal must be a peace-building commission that has an equal representation of women and men at all levels," states Ms Freivalds.

The initiative to the letter was taken at a dinner attended by women foreign ministers in connection with the 60th session of the UN General Assembly, hosted by Ms Freivalds. The letter is also signed by Benita Ferrero-Waldner, EU Commissioner for External Relations.

The budget for 2006: Investing in new jobs, growth and welfare

The Swedish economy is doing well. Over the past ten years Sweden has had a growth rate higher than the EU and OECD average. Sweden also has lower inflation, a higher employment rate, less unemployment and lower interest rates than in the EU as a whole. However, unemployment is still too high.

A shift is now expected from last year's strong export-led growth to domestically driven growth. Low interest rates and good profit rates in industry are encouraging continued strong investment growth. Household consumption is expected to continue to increase as a result of low interest rates, a good asset position, healthy income growth and a stronger labour market. Growth in the local government sector, which has been weak, is expected to pick up strongly in 2006, partly in response to considerable central government commitments to the local government sector.

Growth is estimated to reach 2.4 per cent in 2005 and 3.1 per cent in 2006. The growth forecast is being revised downwards for 2005 and upwards for 2006, relative to the assessment in the 2005 Spring Fiscal Policy Bill. Inflation is expected to remain low during 2005 before gradually rising in 2006.

Increasing domestic demand in 2005 and 2006 is expected to lead to higher demand for labour in the private sector. Overall, employment is expected to rise by 0.1 per cent in 2005 and 1.3 per cent in 2006, with open unemployment falling to 4.8 per cent in 2006. During 2005 the labour force survey conducted by Statistics Sweden has undergone a major reorganisation and the concept of unemployment has been redefined. As a result, unemployment figures have gone up without any effect on actual unemployment. An unemployment level of 4.5 per cent is equivalent to approximately 4.0 per cent according to the previous definition.

The surplus target set for 2005 is at least 0.5 per cent of gross domestic product (GDP). Although growth is expected to be lower than when the target was proposed, a considerably higher surplus is anticipated: 1.4 per cent. This is due partly to lower interest on the national debt, higher corporate taxes and a better financial performance in the local government sector. The Government proposes that the surplus target set for 2006 should be at least 0.5 per cent of GDP. The general target of a surplus of 2 per cent on average over the course of a business cycle remains in place.

The expenditure ceilings have been met every year since their introduction in 1997. The Government's proposal in the Budget Bill is that the expenditure ceiling for 2007 should be set at SEK 949 billion. A proposed level for the 2008 expenditure ceiling will not be presented until the Budget Bill for 2007.

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Promoting new jobs

In the present Budget Bill, the Government is launching a broad two-year employment package, to start on 1 January 2006. This will give 55 000 people a job, a trainee position or a place in education or training. The employment package targets both the private and the public sector. It will cost a total of SEK 10 billion in 2006 and SEK 10 billion in 2007.

More jobs in industry

Sweden is in a good position to compete. The European Commission puts Sweden in first place in its comparisons of the climate for innovation in the EU. However, competition from other countries is growing tougher. The Government proposes several measures to strengthen Sweden's competitiveness and encourage more and expanding businesses.

·Strategic development programmes for Swedish industry

The Government, the business sector and the trade unions have begun to draw up strategies for six key industries: forestry, metals, vehicles, pharmaceuticals, IT/telecommunications and biotechnology. In addition, there will be special initiatives for aeronautics and space technology. The investment in industry-specific programmes will have a total scope of SEK 1 billion between 2006 and 2010.

·Research at small enterprises

The Government proposes new support of SEK 100 million in 2006 for research and development at small enterprises. From 2007 onwards this support will be provided in the form of reduced taxes for SMEs that invest in research and development. A sum of SEK 200 million has been budgeted for this purpose from 2007. In all, commitments to research and development at small enterprises will amount to SEK 900 million between 2006 and 2010.

·Investment in Industrial Development Centres

The Government proposes that the Swedish Agency for Economic and Regional Growth (Nutek) should be allocated SEK 20 million in 2006–2008 to support and develop Industrial Development Centres (IDCs).

·Encouraging women entrepreneurs

A special drive to encourage entrepreneurship by women will be undertaken within the framework of regional resource centres (RRCs). SEK 15 million will be allocated in 2006.

·Lower employer's contributions for solo entrepreneurs who take on staff

The employer's contribution will be reduced to 10.21 per cent for solo entrepreneurs who take on an employee. The reduced employer's contribution can be claimed by the company for a period of about one year in 2006 and 2007.

·Simpler tax rules for close companies

On 1 January the reform of tax rules for active owners of close companies (the "3:12 rules") will be completed. Full implementation of the reform will have cut these taxes by a total of SEK 1 billion.

·New bridges to working life

Labour market programmes will be expanded by 13 000 places to make it easier for people to enter the labour market.

·More secure conditions for entrepreneurs

The Government will look over the terms for social security affecting entrepreneurs.

·Increased commitment to environmental technology

Research appropriations targeting sustainable development will increase by SEK 210 million in the coming years.

·Lower carbon dioxide tax for companies trading in emissions rights

Carbon dioxide tax will be completely eliminated for industrial plants covered by the trade in emissions rights. This tax will also be abolished for high-efficiency cogeneration and will be reduced for other plants in the energy sector included in the trading system by SEK 0.13 per kilogram of carbon dioxide.

Improved quality in the public sector

The Government proposes measures to raise quality in the public sector and give people outside the labour market a chance of a job in, for example, health care or social services.

·Bonus jobs for increased quality

20 000 "bonus jobs" will be created to raise quality in the public sector. These positions will be used to perform quality-enhancing tasks that are not now carried out. To get a bonus job, a person will have to have been unemployed for more than two years. People in bonus jobs must be offered pay at the collective agreement rate. The employers will receive a subsidy of 100 per cent of the cost of wages up to SEK 1 000 per day.

·Enhanced skills in health and social services

Many people who work in the health service and the elderly care sector lack proper education and training. They will now be given an opportunity for further education and training. The employment package contains 10 000 educational-leave replacement positions per year.

·Higher central government grants to local government

In order to put municipalities and county councils in a position to plan for the long term and to raise the quality of welfare provision, the Government proposes a rise in the general government grants of SEK 1 billion in 2007 and SEK 6 billion in 2008.

Jobs for higher education graduates

In the wake of the latest recession, the number of unemployed higher education graduates has increased. The Government proposes several measures to reduce unemployment in this group.

·Trainee positions in small businesses

A joint project between public employment offices and staffing companies will provide 4 000 trainee positions for unemployed graduates, mainly in small businesses.

·Easing the generation shift

In order to ease the generation shift at central government agencies and secure the transfer of know-how, SEK 360 million will be committed in 2006 and 2007 to enable the agencies to bring forward the recruitment of up to 1 000 people. Over a two-year period, 100 new positions for law clerks will be created at the courts. Supervisory operations at the county administrative boards will be able to recruit an extra 100 people. There will be opportunities for 210 people to do a traineeship.

·Better controls of tax evasion and benefit fraud

The Swedish Tax Agency will be able to employ 420 people in 2006 and 2007 so as to undertake a forceful drive against tax evasion. Over the same period, the Swedish Social Insurance Agency and the National Labour Market Board will receive resources to employ 300 and 500 people respectively to raise standards and tighten up checks on benefit payments.

·More resources for border control

The Swedish Customs Service will receive resources to employ a further 50 people to fight the illegal import of drugs, alcohol and tobacco.

·Taking care of Sweden's cultural heritage

600 positions will be established for unemployed higher education graduates during 2006 and 2007 so as to restore and conserve museum collections. Over the same period, the National Property Board will receive resources to recruit a further 50 graduates.

·Increased diversity in the central government sector

The advanced education programme in administrative practice for immigrants with higher education will be expanded by 120 positions in 2006.

Jobs for young people

Many young people are out of work. The Government will make vigorous efforts to combat youth unemployment.

·Apprenticeships for young people

3 000 apprenticeships will be established for unemployed people aged 20 to 24 who lack a complete upper secondary education.

·Continued employment support for the young long-term unemployed

During 2006, the employment offices will continue to be able to use general employment support for young unemployed people aged 20 to 24, starting as soon as they have been unemployed for 6 months.

·Enhanced support for holiday work

In 2006 the Government will increase the grant enabling local governments to provide holiday jobs for upper secondary school students who have difficulty obtaining such work on their own.

Increased knowledge, skills and creativity

Sweden must assert itself in the face of growing international competition by means of increased

knowledge, skills and creativity. Since 1994 the proportion of pupils taking three-year upper secondary programmes has doubled from 40 to 84 per cent and the number of students in higher education has increased by more than 140 000. The Government wants to continue to invest in knowledge.

·More places in higher education

Higher education will expand by a total of 17 500 places by 2007. 3 500 places will be added in autumn 2005, 12 500 in 2006 and 1 500 in 2007. At the same time, there will be a major investment in raising the quality of higher education. Appropriations to higher education will increase by more than SEK 130 million in 2006 and a further SEK 135 million from 2007 onwards.

·Advanced vocational training

Advanced vocational training programmes will expand by 1 000 places in 2006 and 2007.

·More teachers in school

An additional 300 places will be available at teacher education institutions, starting in the spring of 2006, to enable higher education graduates to qualify as teachers.

·Education in shortage occupations

In 2006 a special employment training programme will be established offering 500 places primarily to prepare people to work as treatment providers in penal care, treatment centres and schools. Three higher education institutions will be instructed to develop shortened further education programmes by spring 2006 for people wishing to qualify as pre-school teachers and nurses.

Increased fairness and welfare

The economic standard enjoyed by households rose by 23 per cent between 1994 and 2003. The trend towards widening income gaps has been broken and the income spread is now declining, for the third year in a row. Yet much unfairness still remains. To make Sweden a fairer country, welfare needs further development. The efforts made in this term of office will continue.

·Rise in child allowance brought forward

The child allowance and supplementary allowance for additional children will rise by SEK 100 per child per month from 1 October. The first payment will be made retroactively in December. Moreover, a new supplementary allowance of SEK 100 will be introduced for families with a second child. This measure will mean an extra SEK 300 a month for a family with two children and an extra SEK 500 a month for a family with three children.

·Higher ceiling for housing supplement for pensioners

To improve conditions for the worst-off pensioners, the rent ceiling in the housing supplement scheme will be raised from SEK 4 670 per month to SEK 4 850 per month, as from 1 January 2006. A pensioner paying a rent above the new ceiling will receive nearly SEK 2 000 more in housing supplement per year.

·Support for family members

From 2006 an additional SEK 100 million will be allocated to support for family members. SEK 75 million will go to continued development of support provided by local government, SEK 20 million to cooperation with voluntary organisations and SEK 5 million to organisations of pensioners and family members.

·Better preparedness for contagious diseases

SEK 10 million per year will be set aside from 2006 to 2008 to provide for better national preparedness for outbreaks of serious communicable diseases.

·More resources to penal care

The Swedish Prison and Probation Service will receive SEK 400 million to continue its expansion to accommodate more inmates and to improve operations in terms of security, treatment and occupation.

·More resources for care of substance misusers

The Government will continue its commitment to care for substance misusers and its measures to combat homelessness. In 2006 SEK 210 million will be allocated and in 2007 SEK 360 million.

·Commitments to culture

The Government proposes a range of measures to strengthen the cultural sector. There will be increased support for free dramatic art and for dance. In addition, the Government will up its commitment to the Theatre Alliance. Action will be taken for Swedish film by increasing government support for the film agreement. The cultural sector will also receive SEK 55 million from 2006 onwards for increased pension premium costs at state-supported theatre, dance and music institutions.

·Asylum seekers

Health care for asylum seekers will be enhanced by SEK 75 million from 2006. The municipalities will receive SEK 50 million from 2006 to take social action for child refugees. The appropriation to the Swedish Migration Board will increase by SEK 43 million in 2006, SEK 52 million in 2007 and SEK 60 million in 2008 in order to improve the quality of reception of asylum seekers.

Taxes

·Lower taxes for low and medium income earners

The last step will be taken in compensation for personal social insurance contributions. On average, this will lower taxes by approximately SEK 110 per earner per month. Since it began in 2000, the entire reform has lowered the average tax charged by over SEK 900 a month. In addition, the basic income tax allowance will be raised as part of the green tax shift.

·Limitation of real estate tax

The limitation rule will be changed so that the real estate tax cannot amount to more than 4 per cent of household income, as opposed to 5 per cent previously. A person who earns SEK 300 000 per year and who lives in a house with an assessed value of SEK 2 million currently enjoys a tax reduction from SEK 20 000 to SEK 15 000. Under the new regulation, the tax in this case will be lowered by an additional SEK 3 000 to SEK 12 000.

·Higher mileage deduction

In order to alleviate the effects of the high price of petrol, the mileage deduction will be raised from SEK 17 to SEK 18 per ten kilometres.

·A step towards abolition of advertising tax

The tax on advertisements in general newspapers will be lowered from 4 to 3 per cent and the tax on other advertising from 11 to 8 per cent. In addition, the threshold beyond which tax must be paid will be raised from SEK 12 million to SEK 50 million for daily newspapers and from SEK 6 million to SEK 10 million for popular and specialist periodicals. This means that fewer daily newspapers will have to pay advertising tax and that the tax will be lowered for those that do pay advertising tax.

·Tax on alcopops and tobacco

A surtax on alcopops will be introduced in spring 2006. The minimum excise duty on cigarettes will be raised from 90 to 100 per cent and the tax on smoking tobacco will increase from SEK 630 to SEK 770 per kilogram as from 1 January 2006. Appropriations for alcohol and drug prevention efforts will increase by a total of SEK 185 million in 2006 and 2007.

Proactive environmental policy

In order to continue the transformation of Sweden into a sustainable society, the Government's budget contains commitments totalling more than SEK 1 billion to the environment and a continuation of the green tax shift.

·Green tax shift

The vehicle tax on light buses and light lorries will be increased by 60 per cent. The output tax on

nuclear energy will be raised by 85 per cent. A tax on air tickets will be introduced from 1 May 2006, at a rate of between SEK 50 and SEK 100 per ticket. In addition, the tax on gravel will be increased by 30 per cent and the landfill tax by SEK 65 per tonne. A tax on waste incineration will be introduced. The tax on electricity used by households and the service sector will be raised by SEK 0.006/kWh. As part of adaptation to the EU, the reduced tax rates for electricity, gas, heating and water will be eliminated. The tax increases amount to a total of SEK 3.6 billion. At the same time, tax reductions will be implemented for an equivalent amount. Income tax will be lowered by SEK 2.5 billion, primarily benefiting low and medium income earners by raising the basic income tax allowance. Solo entrepreneurs who take on staff will pay lower employer's contributions.

·Commitment to energy research

Appropriations for energy research will increase by SEK 270 million in 2006 and 2007 and a further SEK 100 million in 2008.

·Economic incentives to switch to environmentally friendly energy sources

New economic incentives will be established for switching from direct electricity heating or oil heating to more environmentally friendly energy sources, by means of new investment support schemes. This will involve tax relief totalling SEK 400 million per year over a five-year period.

·Support for replanting after Gudrun

The Government proposes that appropriations for replanting of storm-felled forest should amount to SEK 150 million per year from 2006 to 2008.

·Climate investment programmes

The central government climate investment programmes will receive an extra SEK 200 million in 2006 and SEK 320 million in 2007 and 2008.

·Biological diversity

The funds committed to biological diversity will be augmented by SEK 120 million in 2006, SEK 100 million in 2007 and SEK 100 million in 2008.

·Wind power

Support for wind power pilot projects will be extended for five years beginning in 2008. The support will be worth SEK 70 million per year.

Sweden's Economy

Sweden's gross domestic product (GDP) is forecast to grow by 2.4 per cent in 2005 and 3.1 per cent in 2006. Open unemployment is expected to hold at 5.9 per cent this year before falling to 4.8 per cent next year. General government net lending is estimated to amount to 1.4 per cent of GDP in 2005 and 0.7 per cent in 2006.

Global economy continues to grow at a good rate

The very strong growth in the global economy slowed during the second half of 2004. Nevertheless growth is expected to remain favourable and amount to just over 4.0 per cent in both 2005 and 2006. Low interest rates, high corporate earnings and rising employment are leading to growing investment and consumption in the United States and Japan. Industrial activity in the euro area is slowly picking up, due to stable demand from the rest of the world, low interest rates and high earnings. Continued robust growth is expected in the Nordic region, thanks primarily to strong domestic demand. Developments in oil prices add a substantial element of uncertainty.

Higher Swedish growth after temporary dip

Swedish exports and industrial output grew very strongly last year. After a sharp slowdown around the turn of the year, exports are now recovering, but domestic demand is expected to be the main driver behind Sweden's continued favourable GDP growth in 2005 and 2006. Investment picked up last year. High capacity utilisation in industry, firms' solid profits and low interest rates will help investment in machinery and residential construction to continue to grow strongly. Household consumption is picking up thanks to a brightening labour market outlook and robust real income growth.

The growing number of hours worked and several labour market indicators suggest the start of an upswing in employment during the second half of 2005. However, measured as an annual average, employment growth will be very weak this year. Next year employment is expected to rise by 1.3 per cent, thanks partly to strong domestic demand fuelling recruitment needs in the service and construction sectors. Rising employment in the local government sector and an increased number of places in labour market policy programmes will also contribute. However, the regular employment rate will fall slightly this year to 76.6 per cent and then hold at this level next year.

Productivity growth in the business sector will slow next year as the main source of growth shifts from the export industry to the more labour-intensive service sector. Resource utilisation in the labour market will climb gradually in 2006. Domestic inflationary pressure will therefore build up slowly, but wage settlements to date suggest continued moderate wage growth. Inflation will remain low this year and rise only slowly in 2006. The Riksbank is not expected to start raising its reportate until the second half of 2006.

Medium-term estimates

Besides the economic forecast for 2005 and 2006, medium-term estimates are being presented for 2007 and 2008. It is expected that there will still be available resources in the labour market at the end of 2006. Employment and GDP can therefore continue to grow at a good rate in 2007 without the risk of excessively high inflation. GDP will grow by 2.8 per cent in 2007. GDP will then grow by 2.3 per cent in 2008, which is in line with what is considered to be the potential rate. Open unemployment will fall to 4.4 per cent in 2007 – equivalent to around 4.0 per cent using Statistics Sweden's previous definition – and stay at this level in 2008.

Public finances

After two years of net lending deficits, the general government sector generated a net lending surplus of SEK 26 billion or 1.0 per cent of GDP in 2004. At the end of 2004 financial assets

exceeded liabilities by SEK 131 billion or 5.2 per cent of GDP. Consolidated gross debt was 51.1 per cent of GDP, which is well below the EU's reference value of 60 per cent.

In 2005 general government net lending is estimated to be 1.4 per cent of GDP, which is twice the level forecast in the 2005 Spring Fiscal Policy Bill. The unemployment measures, tax changes and other reforms proposed in the Budget Bill will contribute to net lending falling to 0.7 per cent of GDP in 2006. In 2007-08 expenditure will fall as a proportion of GDP and net lending will rise.

The central government sector will continue to report net lending deficits and budget deficits throughout the forecast period, while the old-age pension system will generate stable net lending surpluses of around 2 per cent of GDP. The local government sector recorded a net lending surplus in 2004 and is expected to continue to do so during the forecast period.

This positive net lending means that the general government sector's financial position will improve substantially during the forecast period, and in 2008 financial assets are expected to exceed liabilities by SEK 270 billion. Central government debt and consolidated gross debt will fall as a proportion of GDP.

Swedish security marketed in the USA

Marketing of Swedish security-related products and systems in the USA will be improved. At Thursday's cabinet meeting a decision was made to allocate SEK 400 000 to special promotion efforts.

"There is great potential to increase Swedish exports in this area," says Thomas Östros, Minister for Industry and Trade.

"Last year, the American government purchased security-related products and systems from private companies to a value of USD 8 billion. This can be compared to the USD 12 billion spent by the World Bank and the USD 4.5 billion spent by the UN on purchases."

According to the Swedish Trade Council, Sweden has cutting-edge skills in areas such as ID systems and biometrics, sensors and communications, personal protective equipment, public security networks and security connected with transport and logistics.

"There is every indication that the US will invest more on defences against bioterrorism, on border security and on secure IT networks in the future. Swedish companies have excellent prospects to succeed in this market," states Mr Östros.

The marketing project is being carried out in cooperation between the Embassy in Washington, the Swedish Trade Council and the Swedish-American Chamber of Commerce. Swedish companies, government agencies and organisations are also taking part, as are local cooperation partners.

New trade offices in Italy and Canada

Sweden among the first to support convention against

nuclear terrorism

In connection with the ongoing UN Summit in New York, the Prime Minister yesterday signed the UN Convention against Nuclear Terrorism and the UN Convention on Jurisdictional Immunities of States.

The former is one of a number of global terrorist conventions aimed at terrorist crimes including threats or the use of nuclear material or fuel. Sweden has made an active contribution in this area and is one of the first countries to sign the agreement. The latter, the convention on state immunity, regulates the extent to which a charge may be brought against a State in the courts of other States. It advocates limited immunity for States. By signing the conventions, Sweden has come one step closer to adopting both conventions.

The Prime Minister also presented Sweden's ratification of the Protocol to the UN Convention against Torture. The aim of the Protocol is to establish, under the UN Committee against Torture, a Visiting Committee comprising independent experts with the purpose of enabling the experts to access all the places where detained persons are being held.

Sweden is now bound by the Protocol, which however has yet to enter into force. Before the Protocol can enter into force it must be adopted by a total of twenty States.

More Swedish police to Kosovo

The Government has decided today that Sweden will contribute a further five police officers to the UN police operation in Kosovo for a six-month period. This means that the Swedish contribution to the operation now amounts to 41 Swedish police officers.

"Law and order is a precondition if reconstruction efforts in Kosovo are to gain momentum," says Minister for International Development Cooperation Carin Jämtin. "By strengthening the Swedish police operation, we can contribute to democratic development."

The Swedish police officers are to assist the United Nations Mission in Kosovo (UNMIK, the United Nations Interim Administration Mission in Kosovo) in its long-term police operations. The UN Mission's main aim is to support reconstruction efforts in Kosovo, to uphold law and order and to establish and train a local police force.

Background

Police operations in Kosovo are carried out by international UNMIK police officers, at present

some 2 600 officers from 44 countries, and by the local Kosovo Police Service (KPS), which was established in 1999. KPS is a multiethnic force consisting of some 7 200 officers at present. Sweden has been contributing police officers to the UN in Kosovo since the end of 1999. Swedish bilateral development assistance to Kosovo amounts to approximately SEK 100 million per year. Since 1999 we have also been contributing to KFOR, the NATO-led crisis management force, at present with approximately 330 troops.

Carin Jämtin to visit Zambia for Hammarskjöld ceremony

Carin Jämtin, the Swedish Minister for International Development Cooperation, will be taking part in a memorial ceremony in honour of Dag Hammarskjöld in Zambia on 18 September. It was in the night between 17 and 18 September 1961 that the plane carrying the former Secretary-General of the United Nations crashed in what is now Zambia. As this year is the centenary of Dag Hammarskjöld's birth, a special ceremony is to be held in Ndola, where the plane crashed.

"Zambia makes an admirable contribution to keeping the memory of Hammarskjöld alive," says Minister for International Development Cooperation Carin Jämtin.

"It does so not just by holding annual memorial ceremonies, but also by organising courses in Hammarskjöld's spirit, in human rights and conflict management."

The visit to Zambia will also provide an opportunity to conduct a discussion with the Zambian Government on Swedish development cooperation and its guidelines and ambitions. Sweden has long had an active role as a driving force in coordinating development assistance in Zambia. This work, which has now entered an intensive phase, means that donors are moving towards a common strategy and more effective cooperation.

On her trip, the Minister for International Development Cooperation will also be visiting Mozambique. Here, too, resolute efforts are being made to make development assistance more effective. Sweden has an active role as this year's chair of the group of donors cooperating on budget support for Mozambique.

"Sweden has an important role to play as a driving force for more effective development assistance in cooperation with the national governments," says Minister for International Development Cooperation Carin Jämtin.

Jonas Weiss Memorial Fund gives awards to Swedish diplomats

The Jonas Weiss Memorial Fund's honorary distinction for 2005 goes to Jonas Hafström, Swedish Ambassador in Bangkok. The Memorial Fund's annual grant is awarded to First Secretary Diana Janse at the section office in Kabul.

Jonas Hafström receives the award for "resolute action and steadfast behaviour in connection with the devastating tsunami disaster in Thailand in December 2004". Mr Hafström, who took up his post as Ambassador in Bangkok in June 2004 and has previously been Head of the Department for Consular Affairs and Civil Law at the Ministry for Foreign Affairs, was one of the first observers to visit the area after the disaster struck. He saw the destruction and the human suffering in Phuket, the Khao Lak region and Takua Pa, and reported his observations back home to the Ministry. In a statement giving the reason for its decision, the board of the Memorial Fund, which is comprised of representatives of the Weiss family and the Ministry for Foreign Affairs, says that the honorary distinction was conferred because "his determination to personally see and report the consequences of this disaster was that of a field worker, a reminder that diplomacy is also the ability to face a cruel reality undauntedly".

The Jonas Weiss Memorial Fund's annual grant of SEK 30 000 goes to Diana Janse, stationed at the Swedish section office in Kabul, for "her courageous field work in the Balkans, in Russia and now most recently in Afghanistan". Ms Janse, who has worked at the Ministry for Foreign Affairs since

1999, took up a temporary post in Kabul last year. The statement explaining the reasons for the decision also says that Diana Janse, "by combining curiosity and an interest in people with an interest in the complexity of the societies she has chosen to examine in greater depth, has also helped increase the Swedish Foreign Service's understanding of these areas".

The memorial grant and the honorary distinction will be presented at a ceremony at the Ministry for Foreign Affairs on Jonas Weiss's birthday, 10 November.

The Jonas Weiss Memorial Fund was established in 2002 after 33-year old Counsellor Jonas Weiss was killed in a car accident while travelling on official business between Baghdad and Amman. Mr Weiss, who had previously served at the embassies in Belgrade and Moscow, was stationed in Amman at the time, but his main task involved working in Iraq. His time at the Ministry for Foreign Affairs was characterised by commitment to diplomatic fieldwork. The grant and the honorary distinction are awarded to individuals who act in his spirit.

Sweden offers support for hurricane victims

"Together with the other EU Foreign Ministers, and on Sweden's behalf, I have today expressed our deep concern and sympathy for all those affected by the hurricane in the United States. Both the EU and Sweden have offered to assist the United States in rescue efforts, if the United States requests this," says Minister for Foreign Affairs Laila Freivalds after the informal meeting of EU Foreign Ministers in Newport, Wales.

"This is a tragedy for everyone in the area affected, particularly the people who have lost family members and homes. Disasters often hit people with limited resources hardest. Today's government decision to offer Swedish support is a way for us to show our solidarity with the Americans who have suffered. The important thing right now is to get a clear idea of the concrete needs at the present time. To this end, the Ministry for Foreign Affairs is in close dialogue with the United States," says Ms Freivalds.

"The Ministry for Foreign Affairs is still trying to contact a few Swedish citizens who we believe were in the area. Intensive efforts are being made to get in touch with them, above all by the Swedish Consulate-General in New York in cooperation with the US authorities," says Ms Freivalds. "The Ministry for Foreign Affairs has also set up a special coordinating group for Hurricane Katrina, headed by the Director-General for Administrative Affairs, and we will be

maintaining continuous contacts with the US authorities in Washington and Stockholm."

Swedish help to prison and probation services in Côte d'Ivoire

The Government Offices have decided to contribute two Swedish prison and probation experts to the UN peace support operations (UNOCI) in Côte d'Ivoire for a period of 12 months. The experts are leaving for Côte d'Ivoire on 1 September.

"It is positive that Swedish prison and probation staff are taking part more often in international peace support operations. Different forms of civilian help are an increasingly important part of UN peace support operations - a development that Sweden has contributed to and supports," says Minister for Foreign Affairs Laila Freivalds.

The experts will help to build up the prison and probation system in Côte d'Ivoire as part of the reform of the country's judicial system.

Since April this year, UNOCI has been headed by Pierre Schori, former Ambassador to the Permanent Mission of Sweden to the Office of the United Nations in New York. The Operation has been in place since April 2004 and currently has a military strength of over 6 000 men. The primary task of the UN force is to monitor the ceasefire and support the implementation of the peace agreement concluded in January 2003.

International Forum on equal access to health care

Health Ministers of Belgium, Germany, Portugal, Spain, Sweden and United Kingdom met in Stockholm on 28-29 August 2005 to continue discussions initiated in Aachen in August 2004 and Toledo in March 2005. Their discussion focused on how to improve health care for the benefit of patients and particularly what role European cooperation shall play in improving quality, accessibility, safety, innovation, efficiency et cetera. Ministers also discussed how to ensure that future developments are driven by the fundamental values of equity, universality and solidarity. In essence, that everyone should be guaranteed all the health care they need, regardless of ability to pay.

- European health systems, even though they have organisational differences, share some basic common values, namely equity, universality and solidarity. We need to find out concrete ways to put these principles into practice in the context of an enlarged European Union, reinforcing quality and sustainability, and setting the patients in the core of our political discussions and initiatives, said Elena Salgado.
- Health care is no ordinary commodity and should not be governed by free market principles. I therefore assume that health care will be excluded from the draft Services Directive. I however, wish to continue to discuss if there is a need some kind of patient mobility directive to ensure the safety for patients who receives care abroad, continued Ylva Johansson.
- We welcome the freedom of movement in Europe and want to increase patient mobility. This

requires a clear framework, which we provide sovereignly at the national level. The services directive is not the appropriate place for this, elaborated Ulla Schmidt.

- When thinking about health, market is not an end in itself. Some market mechanisms can however be used in the health care sector under strong regulation, as instruments to improve effectiveness, efficiency as well as equity in health and to ensure the political and social objectives that inspire a renovated European Social Model, continued António Correia de Campos.
- Health care is an integral part of the greater discussion on the European Social Model. Further investment in our systems is needed to promote medical science and to face the challenges of an aging population. If properly oriented, health expenditure is not expenditure but an investment in human capital, said Stefaan Thijs.
- These have been useful and interesting discussions relevant to our shared objectives of reconnecting Europe with the citizen, in the context of Europe's shared values and principles, concluded Rosie Winterton.

The five invited Member States were represented by Ms.Ulla Schmidt, Minister for Health and Social Security (Germany); Mr. António Correia de Campos, Minister of Health (Portugal); Ms. Elena Salgado, Minister for Health and Consumer Affairs (Spain); Ms. Rosie Winterton, Minister of State (UK) and Mr. Stefaan Thijs, Political Advisor to Mr. Rudy DeMotte (Belgium).

Nordic foreign ministers strengthen emergency preparedness

At a meeting on Bornholm today, the Nordic ministers for foreign affairs agreed on a series of measures aimed at increasing the help available to Nordic citizens in the event of an emergency abroad.

"This summer's terrorist attacks in London and Sharm el-Sheik show that it is not only natural disasters such as the tsunami in Thailand that make great demands on our emergency preparedness. It is therefore important that we now expand Nordic cooperation in future emergency situations," says Minister for Foreign Affairs Laila Freivalds.

The Nordic foreign ministers also discussed consumer protection in the event of major disasters. They agreed that this protection also needs evaluation.

"It is of the greatest importance to consumers to have clear information about their rights and about the ability of the travel industry to assist them and meet its obligations if a major disaster occurs," says Ms Freivalds. "It is good if we Nordic countries share the same high level of ambition

regarding the responsibilities of travel companies and the insurance industry."

The package of measures agreed on by the foreign ministers includes:

- More intense consultation and exchange of information between the Nordic capitals. Preparation for transportation home from emergency areas.
- Instructions to Nordic embassies and consulates to make joint plans and above all have joint local training exercises in emergency leadership and management.
- In places where a Nordic country has no mission, another country's embassy/consulate will be nominated to take care of citizens of the country without representation.
- The rescue services will take steps to make transportation of personnel and equipment in emergency situations more effective.

Sweden and the other Nordic countries are also working in the EU context for closer cooperation on effective emergency preparedness within the European Union and elsewhere.

Krister Thelin re-elected to Yugoslavia Tribunal

Krister Thelin of Sweden, Chief Justice of Appeal (on leave) at the Scania Court of Appeals, was re-elected at the UN yesterday as ad litem judge with the Yugoslavia Tribunal. Mr Thelin will serve an additional four years in the pool of ad litem judges he has been part of since 2001.

On 25 May 1993 the United Nations Security Council decided to establish the ad hoc International Criminal Tribunal for the Former Yugoslavia in order to prosecute persons responsible for serious violations of international humanitarian law committed in former Yugoslavia up until 1 January 1991. The Tribunal, located in The Hague, has jurisdiction over four types of crimes: grave breaches of the 1949 Geneva Conventions, violations of the laws or customs of war, genocide and crimes against humanity. In order for the Tribunal to conclude its mandate as quickly as possible the Security Council decided in 2001 to establish a group of 27 ad litem judges.

Swedes to monitor peace agreement in Aceh

The Government decided today to send 15 Swedish observers to Aceh in Indonesia to monitor the peace agreement between the Indonesian Government and the Free Aceh Movement (GAM).

On 15 August, the Government of Indonesia and the leadership of the Free Aceh Movement (GAM) signed a peace agreement in Helsinki. The peace agreement creates a basis for a solution to the conflict that for many years has raged in Aceh Province. Under the agreement the Indonesian military will withdraw from Aceh Province in parallel with the handover of weapons by GAM.

At the request of the Indonesian Government and GAM, the EU together with five countries from ASEAN has undertaken to monitor the agreement. This is a civilian operation comprising 250 observers. The observers will also be monitoring the protection of human rights.

"The role of the EU is very important for ensuring that the agreement is implemented so a lasting peace can be built in the region. The cooperation with the ASEAN countries gives the mission greater weight and credibility. For this reason, Sweden has chosen to give strong support to this mission," says Minister for International Development Cooperation Carin Jämtin.

In addition to the 15 observers, the Government decided on 8 August to contribute full logistical support to the mission. Sida has allocated up to SEK 40 million for this purpose. The Swedish Rescue Services Agency will be responsible for the operation.

Women are often at risk during periods of conflict and war. This concerns not least the risk of sexual abuse, but also issues such as marginalisation from decision-making processes. The concept of gender justice covers, for example, violence against women and the deficiencies in or absence of civil law that takes women's rights into account.

The Ministry for Foreign Affairs, the United Nations Development Fund for Women (UNIFEM) and the International Legal Assistance Consortium (ILAC) are co-organising an international meeting on the theme "Building Partnerships for Promoting Gender Justice in Post-Conflict Societies".

The meeting will be held at the Hilton Hotel Slussen in Stockholm on Thursday 25 and Friday 26 August. State Secretary Annika Söder will be the moderator.

Minister for Gender Equality Jens Orback will be holding the opening address on the importance of highlighting gender justice in post-conflict situations. The closing address will be given by Baroness Amos, Leader of the British House of Lords.

On Friday 26 August at 10.20 am, the South African Justice Minister and equality and women's affairs ministers from Liberia, Haiti and Afghanistan will be holding a press conference at the Hilton Hotel Slussen.

The meeting will be attended by representatives from different parts of the world, donor countries, UN representatives and experts in the area. The purpose of the meeting is to follow up and

implement the recommendations adopted at the Gender Justice Conference in September 2004. The meeting will focus on, for example, how the UN and other relevant actors could best support the reconstruction and reform of the rule of law in post-conflict countries and how gender aspects should subsequently be safeguarded.

The Organisation for Security and Cooperation in Europe is an instrument for establishing long-term security in Europe. All European countries participate in the OSCE, as do Canada, the United States and the Central Asian States - at present 55 countries in all. "I am very concerned about Iran's message to the IAEA that the country has decided to resume uranium conversion," says Minister for Foreign Affairs Laila Freivalds.

"If Iran does take this step it will be contravening the Paris Agreement and the International Atomic Energy Agency (IAEA) Board Resolution, both from November 2004.

"France, Germany and the UK put forward a new proposal for solving the issue on 5 August. I hope the negotiations will be able to continue. This is conditional on the Paris Agreement being respected," Ms Freivalds says.

This message was delivered to the Iranian Chargé d'Affaires today by Acting Director-General for Political Affairs Peter Tejler.

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Background

There is widespread concern in the international community that Iran's nuclear programme may give the country the capacity to produce nuclear weapons. Sweden shares this concern. Three European countries and the EU High Representative for the Common Foreign and Security Policy, Javier Solana, backed by the entire EU, have been negotiating with Iran for a considerable time in an attempt to reach an agreement that would include guarantees that the nuclear programme has exclusively peaceful purposes. The negotiations are based on an undertaking by Iran to suspend all uranium enrichment and related activities as long as talks continue. It is this undertaking that Iran has recently said it intends to abandon.

Sweden to contribute to EU mission in Aceh

The Government decided today to contribute support to the EU mission in Aceh Province in Indonesia. Sweden will be the only country providing logistical assistance to EU personnel in the area.

On 15 August, the Government of Indonesia and the leadership of the Free Aceh Movement (GAM) are expected to sign a peace agreement in Helsinki. The peace treaty is a historic agreement and a solution to many years of conflict in Aceh Province. The Indonesian Government and GAM have asked the EU to monitor the agreement. The EU observer mission will be a civilian operation whose assignment will be to monitor implementation of the peace agreement.

The Government decided today to contribute logistical support to the EU mission and to allocate up to SEK 40 million for the purpose via Sida's budget. The operation will be carried out by the Swedish Rescue Services Agency, which will initially provide about eight staff members. Their task will include ensuring that the EU observers have access to office facilities, transport, telecommunications and IT. The Swedish Rescue Services Agency is prepared to travel to Aceh on Wednesday this week. The Swedish support will enable EU personnel to take up their positions swiftly so as to be able to monitor the agreement, which is to enter into force on 15 August.

"The peace agreement is a unique opportunity for lasting peace in Aceh Province and the EU observers will fulfil an important function in monitoring it," says Minister for International Development Cooperation Carin Jämtin.

"Earlier this summer the Government allocated SEK 150 million to reconstruction after the tsunami disaster in Indonesia. Sweden's contribution to the EU mission is an additional part of the long-term support for peace and development that we are giving to the region," Ms Jämtin continues.

"The Swedish Rescue Services Agency has a very good international reputation for its international disaster and aid operations and is in demand as a partner in cooperative activities. In response to the tsunami disaster, for example, the Swedish Rescue Services Agency is on the ground in Indonesia and Sri Lanka to support UN aid efforts," says Minister for Defence Leni Björklund.

"The Swedish Rescue Services Agency will now have the task of supporting EU efforts to monitor the peace agreement in Indonesia. The fact that this task has been assigned to the Swedish Rescue Services Agency is further evidence of Sweden's expertise in the field of logistics," adds Ms Björklund.

Many international and African leaders will attend the ceremony on Saturday, along with representatives of major aid organisations.

"I want to use the opportunity to speak with leading members of the Sudanese government about the urgent need to find a solution to the Darfur conflict and about the importance of a continued peace process," says Ms Jämtin.

The Minister for International Development Cooperation will also talk with representatives of other African governments about African development issues and about the conflicts raging on the continent.

WTO eliminates trade barriers to Swedish vehicle exports to Taiwan and India

Sweden and the Swedish vehicle industry have enjoyed success in two cases concerning technical barriers to trade brought before the World Trade Organisation (WTO).

Taiwan recently declared that, contrary to previous announcements, it would not be introducing special national regulations on the height of buses. The changes would have caused substantial problems for exports of buses by Swedish companies such as Volvo and Scania and were therefore brought before the WTO as technical barriers to trade.

A lack of capacity at the Indian authority responsible for testing lorry engines and parts has also been raised as a barrier to trade. This lack of capacity has previously forced Volvo to have its tests done by competing companies in India, which has been unjustifiably costly and time-consuming. However, after two years of discussions and pressure in the WTO, India has now chosen to expand capacity at its domestic testing authority.

"These are two good examples of how problems involving technical barriers to trade can be resolved in the WTO", says Minister for Industry and Trade Thomas Östros. "They also illustrate how Sweden's membership of the EU lends force to our actions in the WTO."

"It has been important to find an acceptable solution to these problems in which Sweden has clear interests," he adds.

However, certain regulations in India still constitute technical barriers to trade for the Swedish vehicle industry. These problems could be resolved if India acceded to the United Nations Economic Commission for Europe (UNECE) international agreement concerning motor vehicles.

Personal export advisers for every county

The Government decided today to increase the number of personal export advisers available through the Swedish Trade Council so that in future there will be export advisers for every county.

The extended remit of the Swedish Trade Council, which involves an investment of SEK 4.5 million, means it will be possible to increase the number of export advisers from 15 to 21.

In 2004 there were six export advisers. There was an increase to nine at the beginning of 2005, and on 22 June 2005 the Government instructed the Swedish Trade Council to increase the number by a further six, to 15 export advisers.

By now increasing the number of regional advisers to 21, it is estimated that approximately 1 500 companies annually will be able to obtain advice and help in preparing to enter new markets and expand internationally.

"Many small Swedish companies have export potential. It is important that the Swedish Trade Council is able to assist with special advisory services to make it easier for them to get out into the international market. It must be possible to obtain this support everywhere in the country," says Minister for Industry and Trade Thomas Östros.

"With the right support, more companies can gain access to the international market more rapidly. In this way we help Swedish companies to expand internationally, while also promoting growth and employment in Sweden."

The Swedish Trade Council has offered personal export advisory services to companies with fewer than 50 employees since 2002. These advisers work in close cooperation with regional and local business organisations throughout the country.

EU to establish rapid reaction units

EU foreign ministers decided today to establish civilian rapid reaction units. It will be possible to despatch the units at short notice to crises and conflicts around the world. The aim is to enhance EU capability to contribute to peace and security.

In November 2004, Minister for Foreign Affairs Laila Freivalds submitted a proposal to improve EU capacity to rapidly deploy civilian crisis management resources in conflicts. Despite the need to act quickly, it has previously often taken weeks or months for support to be in place.

"The decision we have taken today means that by the end of next year, the EU will be able to deploy civilian rapid reaction units with only five days notice. The units will include experts in areas such as conflict resolution, human rights and conflict mediation," says Minister for Foreign Affairs Laila Freivalds.

Experience from the Balkans and Africa, for instance, shows that the quicker the international community is in place in an escalating trouble spot, the greater the chances of preventing violent developments.

In crisis situations, civilian experts can play an important role by building up trust between different groups in a community, enhancing local capability to solve conflicts and monitoring the implementation of a peace agreement. Also in cases where a military force has been deployed, civilian supplements are usually needed to help solve the political, economic and legal aspects of the conflict.

EU civilian rapid reaction units will supplement the military rapid reaction capacity that the Union previously decided to establish. Together with Estonia, Finland and Norway, Sweden will contribute to a joint military rapid reaction force.

EU civilian crisis management is part of the Union's Common European Security and Defence Policy (ESDP). The EU is already working with training and advisory programmes for local police services in Bosnia and Herzegovina, Macedonia and the Democratic Republic of the Congo. In the past year, the Union has also supported the reform of the legal sector in Georgia and has begun training officials in the Iraqi police force and legal system. Further, the EU provides both civilian and military support to the African Union operation in Darfur. Two additional operations are being planned at present: a police operation for the Palestinian National Authority and an operation for observing the potential peace agreement in Aceh province in Indonesia.

Swedish contribution to the UN debate: Reform of the Security Council is needed now

At yesterday's debate in the UN General Assembly on reforming the Security Council, Sweden spoke along with 20 other Member States.

In the Swedish address, which is enclosed in English, Sweden's Ambassador to the UN, Anders Lidén, emphasised the need for a decision on the issue now.

Reforming the Security Council, which has been discussed for quite some time, is one of the most complex reform issues facing the world community, and perhaps the most important. The composition of the Security Council must better reflect the considerably enlarged membership of the UN in order to win relevance and legitimacy. Since the UN Charter was adopted 60 years ago, a number of countries, mainly in Africa, Asia and Latin America, have developed into major political and economic actors. These countries must be given a role in the Security Council that reflects their importance.

Prior to the UN Summit in September, the Government is working towards coordinated, concrete decisions on reform issues that aim at strengthening the UN and multilateralism. The Government supports Secretary-General Annan in his desire that the issue of reforming the Security Council be resolved prior to the Summit.

The Government also supports Secretary-General Annan in his view that the right of veto should not be extended to potential new members of the Security Council. Instead, the Government wishes

to work for a "veto-free" culture in the Council. Furthermore, the Government feels that a periodically recurring review mechanism should be introduced that regularly examines the potential new permanent members of the Security Council.

The debate continues today and on Wednesday.

New strategy for cooperation with Russia

The Government has decided on a new country strategy for Sweden's development cooperation with Russia. The strategy applies to the period 2005-2008.

Two major changes in the new strategy are a reduction of Swedish support to Russia and altered prioritisation of areas for cooperation.

The reduction of financial support will take place in stages to SEK 160 million per year towards the end of the period covered by the strategy. This is a consequence of good economic growth in Russia in recent years. The reduced support is part of a transition to normal neighbouring-country cooperation between Sweden and Russia.

Support for economic transition, i.e. stimulation of business and the economy, will decrease sharply. At the same time areas like the deepening of democracy and social security will continue to have priority. Several cooperation projects undertaken in the environmental field in recent years are nearing completion and therefore support will also decrease in this area.

"Recent good growth in Russia justifies a reduction of Sweden's financial support for the reform process in Russia," says Carin Jämtin, Minister for International Development Cooperation. Priority in future cooperation will be given to democracy issues, administrative reform, child welfare and the fight against HIV/AIDS.

The other cooperation areas will be democracy and human rights, environmental protection, social security, economic transition, common security, and research and education.

Sweden doubles its cooperation with Ukraine

The Government has decided on a new country strategy for Sweden's development cooperation with Ukraine for the period 2005-2008.

The most important change in the new strategy is a much clearer commitment to supporting Ukraine's efforts to form closer ties with the EU. Decision in indicative matter involving a child

The Government has today taken a decision in the indicative matter of asylum-seeking children with symptoms of devitalisation.

The Government has made an overall assessment of the family's situation. The child's very serious condition, combined with the situation in Uzbekistan and the risk that returning there would cause the child further harm formed the basis of the decision.

At the same time the Government has given the National Board of Health and Welfare the task of drawing up recommendations to prevent children from developing symptoms of evitalisation and to create early support measures.

Summary of decision on practices

- The Government grants the child and the other members of the family a permanent residence permit on humanitarian grounds.

The decision is based on an overall assessment of the child's state of health, the climate of uncertainty in the country of origin and that returning there would seriously affect the child's condition.

- The Government affirms that all asylum cases will be assessed on an individual basis. This is a fundamental principle of asylum.
- A child's own grounds for seeking asylum are to be examined and assessed independently. Children may experience persecution and fear differently from adults and this shall be taken into consideration when assessing a child's grounds for asylum.
- Greater consideration shall be given to how children are affected by a refusal of entry. The Government emphasises that the risk of a child's psychosocial development being permanently harmed if he or she returns to the country of origin shall carry greater weight.
- Considering the situation in Uzbekistan, people from Uzbekistan should currently be granted a temporary residence permit.

Task for the National Board of Health and Welfare

The National Board of Health and Welfare has been tasked to draw up recommendations to prevent children from developing symptoms of devitalisation and to create early support measures.

The task also includes drawing up recommendations for the care and treatment of these children.

The role of social services is given special attention. The recommendations are to be presented by 1 November 2005 at the latest.

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As a result of floods and political disturbances Haiti is currently undergoing a difficult economic and social development. In the past year Sweden has taken decisions to contribute more than SEK 20 million to humanitarian assistance via the UN, the Red Cross and other organisations to meet the immediate needs that have arisen as a result of these difficulties.

Sweden increases support to world's poorest countries

The Government decided today to contribute a total of SEK 6.15 billion to the International Development Association (IDA).

Within the World Bank, IDA is the institution that focuses on the poorest countries by providing both interest-free loans with favourable repayment periods and aid in the form of pure grants. This makes Sweden the sixth largest donor to IDA's lending to poor countries.

This decision is the 14th replenishment of IDA and applies to the period 2006-2008. The Government's decision increases Sweden's contribution by 67 per cent compared with the previous level of support, which applied to the period 2003-2005.

"The World Bank is one of the most important institutions in the fight against poverty. By being able to offer aid and loans of favourable terms we give poor countries the opportunity to borrow for investments in infrastructure and to carry out social reforms," says Carin Jämtin, Minister for International Development Cooperation. This lending is based on countries' own priorities of what measures are most appropriate in their particular national context.

"Because our aid is increasing, Sweden can play a more and more important international role in the fight against poverty and in efforts to achieve the UN Millennium Development Goal of halving

poverty by 2015," concludes Carin Jämtin.

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The World Bank has undergone major change in recent years, and today poverty reduction is its overall objective. Sweden is continuing to working actively for World Bank reform as the Bank is without comparison the largest single financier of development cooperation today. Total lending by the World Bank in the previous fiscal year amounted to some USD 20 billion.

The operations of IDA (International Development Association) focus strongly on low-income countries and on Africa, in particular. IDA gives the world's poorest countries the opportunity to take interest-free loans with very long repayment periods but it also works with pure grant aid.

Sweden enters reservation against new tariff rules for developing countries

On 27 June the EU Council of Ministers adopted new rules for tariff preferences for developing countries in relation to the EU. Sweden entered a reservation against the decision.

"The idea of these new rules is to make things easier for developing countries. We do not think that they go far enough," says Minister for Industry and Trade Thomas Östros.

Sweden considers that the system is still too restrictive and limits export opportunities for developing countries, partly through the introduction of safeguard clauses. This makes access to the EU market more difficult rather than enhancing it.

One new feature is the system of duty free access for certain goods from countries that fulfil international conventions in areas like human rights, environment and labour law. However, here too, there are complicated requirements that limit the use of these exemptions.

"This is a step in the right direction, but we would have liked to go further and open up the system even more," says Thomas Östros.

The new regulation enters into force on 1 January 2006. The system of duty free access based on international conventions has itself been in force since 1 July 2005.

Government to fund export advisers

The Government took a decision on 22 June to increase the number of personal

export advisers available through the Swedish Trade Council.

The extra SEK 5 million provided means there will be new export advisers in Kalmar, Linköping, Örebro, Borlänge and elsewhere.

Sweden supports post-tsunami reconstruction

The Government decided today to allocate up to SEK 440 million over a five-year period for reconstruction after the tsunami disaster in Asia. The support will go mainly to Indonesia and Sri Lanka and to regional initiatives.

SEK 220 million has been paid out previously in humanitarian support, out of the SEK 500 million that was made available immediately after the disaster. Total Swedish support for post-tsunami humanitarian assistance and reconstruction thus amounts to SEK 660 million.

The earthquake in the Bay of Bengal on 26 December 2004 and the flood waves that followed caused one of the world's very worst natural disasters. As many as 300 000 people lost their lives and over a million were left homeless. Indonesia and Sri Lanka suffered most and large segments of the coastal population of these two countries are now without any means of support. India, the Maldives and Thailand were also affected by the tsunami.

Some of the support for Indonesia is being channelled via a reconstruction fund (Multidonor Trust Fund) established by the World Bank. Sweden is represented on the Steering Committee, as are the

European Commission, the Netherlands, Norway, Denmark, Canada, Germany and the UK, among others.

"As a member of the Steering Committee, Sweden will do what it can to ensure that reconstruction in Aceh focuses on the needs of those who have been hardest hit," says Minister for International Development Cooperation Carin Jämtin.

"The reconstruction process must be careful not to recreate poverty; it must lead to socially and environmentally sustainable development. The issues we will emphasise are coordination, a focus on poor people in conflict-sensitive areas and ensuring that measures are guided by the countries' own priorities. Special attention must be paid to gender equality issues and the situation of children, and a close eye must also be kept on the risk of corruption," she continues.

No definite decision has yet been taken on the forms of support for Sri Lanka, but one possibility is to amplify the parts of bilateral cooperation that are relevant to the work of reconstruction over a certain period.

Regional initiatives will also receive Swedish support. An agreement has been entered into with the United Nations Environment Programme (UNEP) on support for an inventory of environmental damage following the disaster. Ongoing regional projects and programmes, primarily related to the marine environment of the Bay of Bengal, including fisheries, will also receive support. Extra funds may also be made available to the ILO and the UN Development Programme (UNDP), for use in job creation programmes.

Of the SEK 440 million allocated, SEK 150 million is intended for Indonesia, SEK 120 million for Sri Lanka and SEK 120 million for regional initiatives. In view of the great uncertainty at present about needs for funds during reconstruction, an unspecified reserve of SEK 50 million has been set aside.

Liability rules for environmental emergencies in Antarctica adopted in Stockholm

After almost thirteen years of negotiations, the Antarctic Treaty parties have agreed on liability rules in the event of an environmental emergency in Antarctica.

"The parties' agreement on liability rules in the event of an environmental emergency in Antarctica is a major success for Antarctic cooperation. Sweden has been a strong driving force in obtaining legally binding liability rules. It is particularly gratifying, therefore, that the parties have been able to reach agreement at the Stockholm Antarctic Treaty Consultative Meeting (ATCM) under Sweden's leadership," says Minister for Foreign Affairs Laila Freivalds.

The aim of the new Stockholm Annex is to prevent environmental emergencies in Antarctica. Everyone who operates in Antarctica must work to avoid emergencies. Should an environmental emergency take place nevertheless, whoever causes the damage must take measures to minimise

and contain the impact.

The negotiations have been legally complicated. They have involved the rules of international law as well as national and international tort law, procedural law and insurance law. Since there is disagreement on sovereignty in Antarctica, the states have had to negotiate without touching on this sensitive issue. The Stockholm Annex is based instead on each state taking responsibility for its operators and all states cooperating.

"The Stockholm Annex is a unique and welcome document and now it is important that the states ratify the convention so it can enter into force," says Ms Freivalds.

Important reforms for higher education

The Government's goal is for Sweden to be a leading knowledge nation characterised by high quality education and lifelong learning for growth and justice. In its bill New world - new university, the Government presents proposals aimed at making higher education in Sweden more international and more attractive.

A new degree structure that facilitates international comparison is proposed to make it easier for students to obtain employment both in Sweden and abroad. Fairer, clearer and simpler admission rules will send a signal to aspiring students that learning pays and will open up education to more people.

The Government has drafted the bill in cooperation with the Left Party.

"The proposals give our education system a higher quality profile from an international perspective," says Minister for Education, Research and Culture Leif Pagrotsky. "Sweden must be an attractive country for foreign students to study in. Our Swedish higher education graduates must be attractive in the labour market in Sweden and internationally."

"Our higher education will now be more comparable. This will lead to greater international and

national mobility," comments Britt-Marie Danestig of the Left Party. "Furthermore, the Government Bill contains a number of measures to reduce the social bias in recruitment, such as simpler and clearer admission rules."

Some of the proposals in brief

- · A strategy and a range of measures are presented to promote internationalisation of higher education.
- The structure of educational programmes and degrees will change, partly due to a division of higher education into three cycles and the introduction of a new two-year Master's Degree (masterexamen). The present Degree of Master (magisterexamen) will be retained. Higher education credits, but not grades, should be brought into line with the European model (ECTS).
- The Government considers that the Swedish Net University Agency should be given SEK 30 million, with instructions to support work by higher education institutions to broaden their recruitment base. Dedicated resources can bolster efforts by higher education institutions to recruit more broadly.
- · The rules for admission to higher education are to be simplified and made fairer and more consistent. The regulations on basic eligibility will be changed so as to make the requirements for applicants from upper secondary school and applicants from upper secondary adult education more consistent. Higher education institutions can decide special eligibility requirements for programmes intended for beginning students that do not lead to a professional degree. Specific work experience can serve as an additional qualification within the framework of a local selection process covering no more than 20 per cent of the available places. Upper secondary courses in mathematics and in modern languages other than English will be given more credit in admissions to higher education.

Strategy for internationalisation

The Government presents an overall strategy for the internationalisation of higher education, so as to bring about continuous and systematic efforts in this area. The objectives set out in the strategy are broad and long-term and express the fundamental positions taken by the Government.

The strategy makes it clear that higher education institutions must conduct active internationalisation efforts so as to enhance the quality of their education and promote understanding of other countries and of international relations. Obstacles to internationalisation must be eliminated, in Sweden and internationally. Follow-up of international activities in the higher education system must be developed and improved. The Government also presents a range of other measures to promote increased internationalisation.

New structure for educational programmes and degrees

In order to make Swedish higher education more comparable, more attractive and more marketable internationally, the Government proposes changes in the structure of programmes and degrees in Swedish higher education. This is being done, above all, in view of Sweden's participation in the Bologna process, which now encompasses 45 European countries.

The Government proposes a division of higher education into three cycles: undergraduate level, graduate level and postgraduate level. At each level, the education provided will presuppose and build on education at previous levels. It is proposed that the Higher Education Act should contain descriptions of each of these levels. All degrees should be awarded at one or other of these levels. The level of each course offered in educational programmes at undergraduate and graduate levels should be determined so as to assign the course to either undergraduate or graduate level. New descriptions of the anticipated learning outcomes should be prepared for all degrees. A special category of degrees should be introduced for artistic fields.

A new higher education credit system should be introduced that is compatible with ECTS (the European Credit Transfer System). This would mean that one academic year would be equivalent to 60 higher education credits. The Government does not propose any changes in the rules for higher education grades. Higher education institutions should continue to be able to decide on which

grading systems to apply.

The present Degree of Master (magisterexamen) will be retained. It should be a one-year degree at graduate level. In addition, however, a new general degree, the Master's Degree (masterexamen), should be introduced at graduate level. This degree should comprise the equivalent of two years of full-time study, building on previous studies equivalent to at least three years of full-time education leading to a degree at the undergraduate level. The option of obtaining such a degree will be an advantage to Swedish students intending to study or work abroad and will attract more students to Swedish higher education. A Master's Degree should be closely linked to education at postgraduate level.

Authorisation to award Master's Degrees should be given to universities and other higher education institutions that are approved for research in one or more disciplinary domains. Other higher education institutions and private education providers should be authorised to award Master's Degrees following application, assessment of scientific standard and approval.

The doctorate should continue to comprise four years of full-time study, although students pursuing education at research level should be allowed credit for studies in Master's Degree programmes.

Broader recruitment

One high-priority objective of the Government's education policy is to achieve greater equality in recruitment to higher education. The Government therefore presents a number of measures for further work towards broader recruitment.

The Government considers that recruitment action by higher education institutions needs a new national support scheme. The Swedish Net University Agency should be given SEK 30 million per year, with instructions to support work by higher education institutions to broaden their recruitment base. The Agency should also support teaching methods development and development work by higher education institutions in preparation for implementing reforms relating to the structure of educational programmes and degrees.

The Government will give special directions to higher education institutions to encourage an increased percentage of beginning students from working class families in longer higher education programmes where recruitment is most skewed. Universities and other higher education institutions should cooperate more widely with upper secondary schools from which a small proportion of pupils go on to studies in higher education, so as to stimulate interest in further study. Cooperation with compulsory (age 6-16) schools should also be encouraged. The Government will also direct the National Agency for Higher Education to follow up and evaluate the work of higher education institutions on broader recruitment.

Changes in rules for admission to higher education

As regards admission to higher education, the bill proposes changes in eligibility and selection regulations aimed at making the rules simple, fair and consistent. Basic eligibility is made equivalent to the upper secondary school certificate, i.e. at least 2 250 upper secondary credits, including a passing grade in the upper secondary certificate project. It is proposed that the same credit requirements should also apply for applicants coming from local authority adult education. The "25:4 rule" (25 years old with 4 years of work experience) will be kept.

Requirements for special eligibility for programmes leading to a professional degree will be set by the National Agency for Higher Education, as at present. For other programmes intended for beginners, each higher education institution will decide on the requirements that are to apply, within certain limits. Standard eligibility requirements will be phased out.

Universities and other higher education institutions will be allowed to decide the selection criteria to apply for a maximum of 20 per cent of the places in programmes intended for beginning students. The purpose of this is to draw on qualifications and experience that are particularly relevant to the programme other than grades and the national university aptitude test. The Government also takes a positive position on developing variants of the national university aptitude

test for different educational areas. Credits for work experience will be eliminated in the category of applicants selected via the aptitude test. No quotas - in the sense of certain places being reserved for applicants from a certain group or a certain social or ethnic background - will be permitted.

In admissions to medical programmes and some other programmes, the choice between applicants with top grades in all subjects is currently made by drawing lots. Now higher education institutions will instead be able to use the national university aptitude test, their own tests or interviews to decide between applicants with equally good grades.

Upper secondary school advanced courses in mathematics and in modern languages other than English should be given more credit in admissions to higher education.

Strategy for future environmental challenges in Antarctica

Simplified rules for providing temporary services in the EU

This week, the EU Competitiveness Council adopted a Directive on the mutual recognition of professional qualifications, such as degree certificates or professional licences.

The new Directive replaces 15 different directives and makes it easier for both employed and self-employed persons to practise their professions in another member country.

"This is another step towards achieving a functioning internal market in which the free movement of workers plays an integral part," says Thomas Östros, Minister for Industry and Trade.

A new feature is that simplified rules have been introduced with regard to providing services on a temporary basis in another member country. It will be sufficient for a professional to be established in one member country to be approved in another.

Some member countries have very specific requirements for particular professions, such as membership in special professional associations. With regard to providers of temporary services, such rules will only be in effect if the profession has an impact on health or security. However, the same disciplinary measures that apply to the professional group in the recipient country will also apply to providers of temporary services.

A special government agency in each member country will be responsible for ensuring that the new rules are followed and that citizens receive necessary information.

The decision to send election observers has been taken after a request from the European Commission to all EU Member States.

Sweden's development cooperation with Burundi amounts to about SEK 15 million a year. In addition, Sweden contributes some SEK 23 million in humanitarian aid via the UN system and NGOs that are active in Burundi.

Smoking ban in restaurants on 1 June

On Wednesday 1 June, smoking is banned in pubs and restaurants. Sweden is thus one of the first countries to introduce smoke-free cafés and restaurants. Ireland and several states in the US have previously taken the lead.

The reason for the decision on smoke-free cafés and restaurants is that some 6 500 people die each year due to smoking, while an additional 500 people die from passive smoking. The Government Bill on banning smoking in restaurants was adopted by the Riksdag a year ago, with a large majority. Only the Moderate Party was opposed.

It is primarily restaurant employees who are exposed to second hand smoke in

Sweden.

- Smoking has been a major problem in the working environment. The risk of developing cancer is two to three times greater among people working in pubs and restaurants than among the rest of the population, states Morgan Johansson, Minister for Public Health and Social Services.

A study recently showed that over 80 per cent of the Swedish people support the decision. Two out of three smokers support the introduction of smoke-free cafés and restaurants.

- I am very pleased that popular support is so extensive. It shows that the prospects for implementation are quite promising, Mr Johansson adds.

The Government's proposal is based on the health of employees, increased access to public entertainment for people suffering from allergies and asthma, and on young people having access to smoke-free premises, such as cafés. Restaurateurs who wish to set up a smoking room may do so. However, out of consideration to the staff, no service, eating or drinking is allowed in the smoking room.

Result document on global development presented to the Riksdag

The Government has presented to the Riksdag its second result document on the policy for global development.

Presentation of the document follows the decision taken in December 2003 on a new Swedish policy in which the goal of contributing to equitable and sustainable development is to apply to all policy areas.

"Sweden is the only country that has adopted such an ambitious policy for global development that includes all policy areas. Sweden to implement the prudent person rule for occupational pensions

The Swedish Government is to present today a bill to the Riksdag on new regulations for occupational pensions institutions. The bill covers friendly societies that provide occupational pensions (occupational pension funds), pension foundations and the occupational pension business of life assurance companies. The new regulations, which implement the European Directive on the activities and supervision of institutions for occupational retirement provision, represent the first step towards more modern and risk-based insurance regulation.

The underlying principle of the Directive and of the bill to the Riksdag is the prudent person rule, which targets the decision-making process of the individual institution.

The proposals referred to the Riksdag are an important step towards more modern regulation and proactive supervision in the insurance field. We are laying a firm foundation for stronger occupational pensions, while ensuring consumer protection for pensioners. A further step towards modern and risk-based regulation of insurance activities and stronger, more preventive supervision will be taken by the coming introduction of a modernised solvency system for insurance companies that are now being prepared at the Ministry of Finance. These solvency rules are well in line with the Solvency II work at Community-level, says Minister for Local Government and Financial Markets Sven-Erik Österberg.

In the bill to the Riksdag, the Government proposes that the institutions should invest their assets in a prudent manner. Technical provisions corresponding to pension commitments should be based on a market valuation of these commitments. In addition, new operating terms are proposed as well as special provisions on information to beneficiaries. Under another proposal, Finansinspektionen (the Financial Supervisory Authority), which already supervises life assurance companies and occupational pension funds, will be made responsible for supervising the financial operations of pension foundations.

It is proposed that the new regulations come into force on 1 January 2006.

On Tuesday 17 May, Carin Jämtin, in her capacity as Sweden's Minister for International Development Cooperation, accepted the "Polio Eradication Champion" award presented by Rotary International.

The prize has been awarded to Sweden for a special grant of SEK 210 million given to the Global Polio Eradication Initiative in December 2004. The prize was presented at the Grand Hotel in Stockholm.

Rotary International's global campaign has contributed in limiting the geographical spread of polio and the total number of outbreaks of the disease. When the campaign against polio began just under 20 years ago, a total of over 1 000 children in 125 countries were afflicted every day. Last year, the corresponding figure came to 3 children in 20 countries. The containment of polio means that greater resources can be directed to other health-related areas in countries in need.

"Progress in the fight against polio is extremely important in promoting new successes, such as in our efforts on poverty-related communicable diseases, where we now raise the level of ambition and investment together with increasing development assistance and new achievements in the area," says Ms Jämtin.

Previous "Champions" selected by Rotary International include UN Secretary-General Kofi Annan.

Carin Jämtin to visit the Palestinian areas and Israel

Minister for International Development Cooperation Carin Jämtin is to visit the Palestinian areas and Israel on 18-23 May.

Carin Jämtin will meet government representatives, representatives of civil society and international organisations on the Palestinian side. Her programme also includes a field visit to the West Bank, including a visit to the Temporary International Presence in Hebron (TIPH) international observer force.

Twelve Swedes are currently participating in the TIPH international observer force.

Protection of witnesses before international courts and tribunals

The Government decided today to refer a proposal to the Council on Legislation concerning residence permits for witnesses before international courts and tribunals.

"In order to bring individuals suspected of genocide, crimes against humanity and war crimes to trial, it's important to be able to offer threatened witnesses protection," says Minister for Migration and Asylum Policy Barbro Holmberg.

Sweden has agreements with international courts and tribunals to allow witnesses, and if necessary their families, to come to Sweden if an international court or tribunal so requests. This applies in cases where such individuals need protection against harassment or threats because of bearing witness.

In the proposal referred to the Council on Legislation, the Government proposes that the individuals the agreements refer to should have a statutory right to a temporary residence permit in Sweden lasting at least one year. Sweden already receives witnesses and their families, but this occurs within the framework of the refugee quota.

The aim of both projects is to market Swedens cutting-edge expertise in these fields and so increase foreign investment in Sweden. The projects will also help promote Swedish exports.

The Swedish Forest Administration to merge into one government agency and marking of standing timber to be discontinued

The Swedish Forest Administration (SVO) will merge into a single government agency, regional forestry boards will be abolished and SVO contract services will be separated from official responsibilities. At the same time, the SVO will discontinue marking standing timber on behalf of forest owners. These proposals were made by the chair of the Government's inquiry, County Governor Maggi Mikaelsson, in an interim report that was presented to Minister for Communications and Regional Policy Ulrica Messing at 15.00 today.

At present, the SVO consists of the head agency, the National Board of Forestry, and 10 regional forestry boards, each one an independent agency in a legal sense. Inquiry chair Ms Mikaelsson now proposes that the National Board of Forestry and the regional forestry boards merge into a single government agency. The board of directors of the regional forestry boards will be replaced by broad-based regional councils and increased cooperation with county administrative boards will be an important task.

"It is important to safeguard the confidence and the regional support that the Swedish Forest Administration has. But greater uniformity is needed and my proposal makes possible a more cost-effective organisation," comments Ms Mikaelsson.

Ms Mikaelsson also proposes that SVO contract services that are financed by fees be organisationally separated from publicly financed official responsibilities and that the much discussed marking of standing timber be discontinued.

A proposal from the Forestry Inquiry is that forestry measures be given a more prominent position in the coming national programme for rural development to enable funding from the EU for activities of this kind.

"I think that Sweden should make use of the opportunity to receive support for certain forestry measures", states Ms Mikaelsson. "These include training, small-scale additional processing and certain staff-intensive management practices. Measures of this kind must naturally have an environmental focus."

Experts like these are in demand and they complement the extensive financial support we are providing to enable the implementation of the peace agreement between the government of Sudan and the rebel movement in southern Sudan," says Minister for Foreign Affairs Laila Freivalds.

At the International Donor Conference for Sudan held on 11-12 April, Sweden pledged support amounting to a total of SEK 700 million up until 2007.

The UN Mission in Sudan (UNMIS) is responsible for monitoring and contributing to the implementation of the peace agreement signed on 9 January this year. The UN mission must also

provide logistics, operative and other support to the African Unions efforts in Darfur.

Sweden had earlier decided to send three police officers, two of whom are already in the area. Sweden is also contributing staff officers and one police officer within the framework of the Multinational Stand-by High Readiness Brigade for UN Operations, which among other things will be responsible for part of the UN missions headquarters for a period of six months.

Minister for Foreign Affairs Laila Freivalds is to travel to Alexandria today to take part in the official inauguration of the Anna Lindh Foundation for Dialogue between Cultures. The inauguration ceremony is to take place tomorrow, Wednesday.

Other participants include the EU Presidency, represented by Luxembourg's Minister of Culture, François Biltgen, the EU Commissioner for External Relations, Benita Ferrero-Waldner and Egypt's Minister of Culture, Farouk Hosni.

"This Foundation has an extremely important task, which is to help bridge the gap and strengthen the dialogue between different cultures," says Minister for Foreign Affairs Laila Freivalds.

The Foundation's assignment is to promote greater understanding between the EU Member States and ten countries round the Mediterranean and in the Middle East within the framework of what is known as the Barcelona Process. The dialogue aims at building partnerships for social, cultural and other human issues, with the emphasis on greater contact between cultures.

The Foundation, which is based at the Swedish Institute and the Egyptian Library of Alexandria, will serve as a central forum for the national networks that each country has built up. An important aspect of the activities of these networks will be to promote contact between representatives of civil society in the different countries and cooperation on issues related to education, culture, science and communication. Particular emphasis will be given to human rights, democracy, sustainable development, gender equality and youth affairs. The National Museums of World Culture will serve as the contact point for the Swedish network.

During the first three-year period, the Foundation's board will consist of the Barcelona Process steering committee, in which the governments of all 35 countries are represented. In addition to the board, the Foundation will also have an advisory committee with 12 members, six of whom are from EU countries and six from partner countries. Its Director will be Dr. Traugott Schöfthaler from Germany.

The Foundation will be co-financed by the 35 members of the Barcelona Process. Total financial support amounts to more than EUR 12 million (approximately SEK 110 million).

Ambassadors from around the world to visit Kiruna and Narvik

On 20-22 April the heads of more than 70 foreign missions in Stockholm will visit the Kiruna region.

Government to take part in UN meeting on sustainable development

The thirteenth meeting of the UN Commission for Sustainable Development will take place on 11-22 April. The meeting is a follow-up to the World Summit in Johannesburg in 2002, which adopted a political declaration and implementation plan for sustainable development.

At this years meeting there is a special focus on the implementation of the UN Millennium Development Goals with regard to water, sanitation, housing and sustainable building.

Mona Sahlin will head the Swedish delegation and take part on 18-21 April. She will meet the US energy minister, open the Nordic Council of Ministers seminar on sustainable consumption and production, and deliver Sweden's main speech. Mona Sahlin will also meet Executive Director of the United Nations Human Settlements Programme (UN-HABITAT) Anna Tibajuka as well as environmental and energy NGOs.

Minister for International Development Cooperation Carin Jämtin will be taking part in the meeting on 20-21 April. She will be participating in discussions with finance and development cooperation ministers on the economic gains to be achieved by investing in water, sanitation and good housing. Carin Jämtin will also have talks with UN Deputy Secretary-General Louise Fréchette, Kofi Annans Chef de Cabinet, Mark Malloch Brown, and Executive Director of the UN Population Fund Thoraya Obaid.

Minister for the Environment Lena Sommestad will attend the meeting in New York on 20-22 April. Among other things, she will take part in a minister-level discussion on the tsunami disaster and in the closing ministerial session on how political measures can be turned into action.

Producer responsibility for electronics expected to result in better management and recycling of e-waste

The Government decided today on a regulation which means that manufacturers or importers of electrical and electronic products will be responsible for the collection and recycling of the products when they have reached the end of their useful life.

The new regulation means that e-waste will be taken care of and recycled more efficiently. We also hope that more products will be reused, says Minister for the Environment Lena Sommestad. Today many of us frequently change to new models of mobile phones and computers. If producers are responsible for their own products, they are better motivated to design products that are easier to recycle.

The new regulation on producer responsibility for electrical and electronic products will come into effect on 13 August 2005. The regulation is based on an EU directive that Sweden has been pressing for.

The new regulation will also make it easier to ensure that companies take their responsibilities seriously. The Swedish Environmental Protection Agency has been asked to draw up a register in which all producers are required to list themselves. The register will contain information on the types and quantities of products sold in Sweden and how much of it that is collected, reused or recycled.

The Swedish Environmental Protection Agencys register will improve the prospects of checking that producers take care of their old products, says Ms Sommestad.

Everyone who has electrical or electronic products that have reached the end of their useful life must sort them from other waste so they can be collected and reused or recycled. Producers will ensure that there are efficient collection systems.

Municipalities will continue to be responsible for all household waste which, for one reason or another, does not reach the producers collection systems. Municipalities can deliver such e-waste to the producers.

The new rules provide incentive for producers and municipalities to cooperate in organising waste management in the best possible way. Service to consumers will improve and consumers will not need to think about who the responsible producer might be, says Ms Sommestad.

Other new features of the regulation

- · Producers must label their products with information which makes it possible to link the responsible producer with the product. The labelling will also make it clear that the product must be dealt with separately from other waste.
- · Producers will provide a financial guarantee for new household products. This guarantee will ensure that collection of the products is financed even if the producer is no longer in business.
- · Producers will also share responsibility for taking care of historical domestic waste.

· Responsibility for refrigerators and freezers will be transferred from municipalities to producers.

In Sweden we already have producer responsibility for electrical and electronic products. This responsibility has led to producers in Sweden being at the forefront in the EU as regards collecting and recycling e-products, but the ambition is to be even better. The EU goal is to collect 4 kg of e-waste per person per year. In Sweden, we collected approximately 11 kg of e-waste per person in 2003.

Spring Fiscal Policy Bill 2005: A stable economic basis for the biggest reform ever in the area of migration

Cases previously dealt with by the Aliens Appeals Board will instead be heard by the courts as from 1 January 2006.

In the spring the Government will present a bill on the new system in which the costs will be specified.

SEK 200 million has been allocated to transitional costs this year. This includes, for example, costs for premises, staff recruitment, continuing professional development and the phasing out of the Aliens Appeals Board.

Resources have been allocated to the Swedish Migration Board, which is now making decisions in a large number of cases. This is resulting in shorter processing times. The Aliens Appeals Board has been given a further SEK 25 million in 2005 to process and make decisions in as many cases as possible before 2006.

Costs for health and medical care for asylum seekers have increased and compensation to county councils has therefore been increased by SEK 15 million.

Spring Fiscal Policy Bill 2005: Sweden to increase development assistance

"The disparities existing in the world are enormous. Development assistance is one of many ways for Sweden to help achieve greater fairness. Next year, we will achieve the goal of one per cent of GNI in development assistance. We can be proud of the fact that Sweden is one of the world's largest development assistance donors," says Minister for International Development Cooperation Carin Jämtin.

In 2005, development assistance will increase by SEK 2 billion compared with 2004. Between 2000 and 2005, Swedish development assistance has increased from 0.72 per cent of GNI, corresponding to SEK 14 billion, to 0.8824 per cent of GNI, which is SEK 23.7 billion. In 2006, the goal of one per cent in development assistance will be achieved. Sweden is one of five countries to exceed the UN goal of 0.7 per cent of GNI in development assistance. The others are the Netherlands, Luxembourg, Norway and Denmark.

The priorities for development assistance in 2005 are the fight against HIV/AIDS, conflict management, labour market initiatives and gender equality, including sexual and reproductive health and rights. Initiatives in the environmental area and to intensify the fight against communicable diseases are being prepared for 2006.

Spring Fiscal Policy Bill: Focus on jobs and welfare

Today the Government presents the 2005 Spring Fiscal Policy Bill. The bill contains proposed economic and budget policy guidelines, along with a supplementary budget for 2005. It is based on an agreement between the Social

Democratic Government, the Left Party and the Green Party.

Strong economy, continued labour market uncertainty

The Swedish economy is strong, growing at 3.2 per cent in 2005 and 2.7 per cent in 2006. Inflation remains low and public finances are healthy. Households are expected to continue to increase their consumption, thanks to good real wage growth and low interest rates. Public sector consumption is expected to rise in both 2005 and 2006. As in previous economic upturns, however, developments in the labour market lag behind. Unemployment is still much too high. This is the context for the priorities that the Government is setting in the Spring Fiscal Policy Bill.

Expenditure ceilings are being met, surplus target remains firm

The Spring Fiscal Policy Bill means that the expenditure ceiling for 2005 will be met, as will the precise surplus target for 2005 a public finances surplus of 0.5 per cent of GDP. The budget margin for 2005 is larger in the 2005 Spring Fiscal Policy Bill than it was in the Budget Bill for 2005. The margin predicted then was SEK 0.2 billion. The assessment now is that it will be around SEK 1 billion. General government net lending is estimated at 0.7 per cent of GDP in 2005 and 0.6 per cent of GDP in 2006.

Reforms set out in the Budget Bill for 2005 remain firm

The Spring Fiscal Policy Bill confirms the reforms that the Government and the parties cooperating with it agreed on in the Budget Bill for 2005.

Employment package

In addition, the 2005 Spring Fiscal Policy Bill contains a number of new proposals. One of these is an employment package that will provide financial scope to put over 22 600 people into work or training in autumn 2005. The Government estimates, moreover, that compared with the present forecast, close to an extra 5 000 places will be available at higher education institutions this autumn.

This employment package, together with the measures that the Government and Riksdag already decided on in the autumn, are expected to reduce unemployment to 5 per cent in 2005 and 4 per cent in the second half of 2006. It is estimated that open unemployment will average 5.0 per cent in 2005 and 4.4 per cent in 2006.

The employment package contains the following measures:

SEK 1 billion for jobs for the long-term unemployed

Employers who give jobs to people who are long-term unemployed will receive tax rebates. The subsidy will be equivalent to up to 85 per cent of the wage cost. This measure will provide scope for a further 10 000 full-year equivalent positions in 2005, which will allow 20 000 positions as early as the second half of 2005. Within the framework of this measure, 1 500 new green jobs will be created, i.e. project appointments for environmentally oriented work. These recruitment incentives will reduce central government tax revenue by approximately SEK 1 billion in 2005. The initiative will continue at a level equivalent to 10 000 full-year positions in 2006.

Higher ceiling for wage subsidies

The ceiling for wage subsidies for recruitment of occupationally disabled people and people in sheltered employment with public sector employers will be raised from SEK 13 700 to SEK 15 200 per month from 1 July 2005. This reform will cost an estimated SEK 70 million in 2005. The Government will present a comprehensive review of the measures for people with occupational disabilities in connection with the Budget Bill for 2006.

Better employment services

A number of measures will be implemented to step up and improve employment services. A reallocation of 2 000 sabbatical year places from 2005 to 2006 will enable the Swedish National

Labour Market Administration to increase the quality of both job placement services and the sabbatical year initiative. Job placement services must be enterprise-oriented. The regulatory framework for these programmes will be clarified to increase legal certainty and to ensure that support is available to those whose needs are greatest.

More places in advanced vocational training

From autumn 2005, an extra 1 000 places will be made available in advanced vocational training schemes. This measure will have a budget of SEK 45 million in 2005, SEK 90 million in 2006 and SEK 45 million in 2007.

Increased training in shortage occupations

An additional 2 000 places will be created in labour market training schemes in 2005, focusing particularly on occupations where there is a shortage of labour.

500 new educational places will be established at folk high schools for young people who are long-term unemployed, a measure that will cost SEK 30 million.

Supplementary courses for immigrants

Immigrants with qualifications from foreign universities will be offered a one-year supplementary course at Linköping University and Malmö University. SEK 10 million per year will be allocated to this purpose in 2005 and 2006.

Special programme for teachers

A special project for further education of schoolteachers who lack full teaching qualifications will be carried out in cooperation with the local government sector. The project primarily targets teachers in vocational subjects, will be offered on a half-time basis and will begin in autumn term 2005, when 500 places will be available. An additional 500 places will be offered in the spring term of 2006.

Adult secondary education

The targeted government support for adult education will be retained for a further three years in order to ensure the number of places in municipal adult secondary education.

The Government will monitor developments in the labour market closely and make further proposals if needed.

Other highlights in the Spring Fiscal Policy Bill:

Support to people who have suffered as a result of the tsunami disaster and the storm

The bill also contains measures in response to the tsunami disaster in Asia and the storm in southern Sweden.

SEK 150 million is allocated for costs associated with the tsunami disaster. Over and above this, the National Board of Psychological Defence will receive additional funds of SEK 21.2 million, chiefly because the national council for coordination and support for people affected by the tsunami disaster will be transferred to the National Board of Psychological Defence on 1 July 2005. In response to the storm in southern Sweden, SEK 500 million is being allocated to provide special support to enable forest owners to store storm-felled timber. In addition, SEK 100 million is being committed to provide financial support at a fixed rate to forest owners for use in restoring forest roads and land after increased volumes of transport. The Government also proposes to reduce diesel tax for forest machinery, which will cost SEK 200 million.

Moreover, the National Board of Forestry will receive SEK 15 million for an aerial inventory of storm-felled forest and survey of insect damage.

In addition, forest owners affected will receive special support of SEK 50 per cubic metre of timber

(solid volume under bark) removed from the forest. This support will take the form of a tax reduction. The support will total SEK 2 billion in 2005 and 2006.

Other proposals in the Spring Fiscal Policy Bill

The 2005 Spring Fiscal Policy Bill also contains the following proposals:

Other proposals in the Spring Fiscal Policy Bill

Energy research

will receive a boost of SEK 100 million in 2006 and an equal amount in 2007. This higher level means that present programmes in energy research, including renewable energy sources such as solar energy, bioenergy and wind power, will be carried through.

More resources for the National Public Transport Agency

The National Public Transport Agency will be put in a better position to purchase interregional public transport. The appropriation will increase by SEK 100 million in 2005, SEK 100 million in 2006 and SEK 100 million in 2007.

Car allowances for people with disabilities will be raised by SEK 65 million to shorten waiting periods for allowances in 2005.

Increased appropriation for the new system for appeals and procedures

To cover the costs associated with the new system for appeals and procedures in aliens and citizenship cases, which will be introduced on 1 January 2006, the appropriations to the courts system, the Swedish Migration Board and other relevant authorities will rise by SEK 200 million in 2005 and SEK 414 million in 2006. In addition, the Aliens Appeals Board will receive extra resources of SEK 25 million this year.

Commitment to womens shelters, the National Center for Battered and Raped Women and womens organisations

SEK 135 million will be allocated from 2006.

Local government sector

The Government, the Left Party and the Green Party share the assessment that additional resources will need to be allocated to the local government sector in the next few years. The Government will return to this issue in connection with the Budget Bill for 2006.

Fight against tax fraud and benefit fraud

In the 2005 Spring Fiscal Policy Bill, the Government presents a coordinated package of measures to combat tax fraud and benefit fraud.

- . Tax control will be improved.
- . The tax offences departments will be made more effective.
- . The obligation to provide statements of income from savings abroad will be strengthened.
- . To restrain unregistered labour in the building industry, a proposal on deductions for contractors and reverse charge liability for VAT is being prepared.
- . The 2004 Tax Control Inquiry is studying the issue of type-approved cash registers in cash-based businesses.
- . The rules for information exchange between the tax authoritys fiscal branch and the tax offences departments will be reviewed.

Work on restraining fraud relating to benefits and allowances will also be stepped up.

- . The exchange of information between government agencies will be expanded.
- . The Swedish Agency for Public Management will be instructed to assess the exchange of information between the Swedish Social Insurance Agency, the unemployment insurance funds and

the National Board of Student Aid and to propose improvements.

- . There will be an inquiry into the criminal law provisions concerning benefit fraud.
- . The regulations for demanding repayment of benefits and allowances will be reviewed.
- . A special delegation against benefit fraud will be established.
- . Increased supervision will be a priority.

Sweden's Economy

Sweden's gross domestic product (GDP) is forecast to increase by 3.2 per cent in 2005 and 2.7 per cent in 2006. Open unemployment is expected to fall to 5.0 per cent this year and 4.4 per cent next year. General government net lending is estimated to amount to 0.7 per cent of GDP in 2005 and 0.6 per cent in 2006.

Global economy continues to grow fast

The very strong growth in the global economy in 2004 slowed in most regions towards the end of the year. However, global growth is set to remain strong. In the United States, rising employment is leading to higher household consumption, and business sector investment is continuing to grow. In the euro area, investment is expected to recover this year, and household consumption is projected to pick up, supported by an improvement in the labour market. Oil prices and global financial imbalances are sources of uncertainty.

Continued good growth in the Swedish economy in 2005-2006

Last year's high Swedish GDP growth was above all due to very strong export growth. Export growth is falling back now that the global economy has slowed, the need for replacement investment outside Sweden is decreasing and the Swedish krona is strengthening further. Domestic demand will play an increasingly important role. The upswing in investment that began last year is continuing. Investment in industry and the energy sector is expected to grow strongly, and residential construction is expected to continue to increase. Household consumption is rising more quickly thanks to rising real incomes, low interest rates, a good wealth position and a brighter labour market outlook.

Last year's strong output growth, above all in industry, was the result of higher average hours worked and high productivity growth, which meant that employment fell. In 2005 employment will begin to rise, largely thanks to the local government sector. Next year employment will grow more quickly, and above all in the private service sectors. The regular employment rate will fall to 76.8 per cent this year before rising to 77.1 per cent next year. Rising employment and the expansion of labour market policy programmes will cause open unemployment to fall to 5.0 per cent this year and 4.4 per cent in 2006.

As growth slows in the export industry and picks up in the service sectors, the business sector's aggregate productivity growth will drop to a more long-term sustainable level. Resource utilisation will climb gradually in 2005 and 2006. Domestic inflationary pressure will build up slowly, but wage settlements to date suggest continued moderate wage growth. Inflation will remain low in 2005 and rise slowly next year. The Riksbank is not expected to start raising its repo rate before 2006.

Medium-term estimates and alternative scenarios

Besides the economic forecast for 2005 and 2006, medium-term estimates are being presented for 2007. As there will be some available resources in the economy at the end of 2006, it is predicted that employment and GDP could grow at a good rate in 2007 without causing inflation problems. GDP is projected to grow by 2.4 per cent in 2007, and open unemployment to fall further to 4.2 per cent.

Public finances

After two years of net borrowing, the general government sector generated a surplus of SEK 28 billion, or 1.1 per cent of GDP in 2004. The improvement was due to expenditure falling while revenue was largely unchanged as a proportion of GDP. The central government sector improved its net lending by SEK 22 billion relative to 2003, and the local government sector by SEK 8 billion. Financial assets are estimated to have exceeded liabilities by SEK 147 billion or almost 6 per cent of GDP. Consolidated gross debt was 51.2 per cent of GDP at the end of 2004, which is well below the EU's reference value of 60 per cent.

Both revenue and expenditure will fall as a proportion of GDP during the forecast period. In 2005 and 2006 general government net lending will drop to 0.7 and 0.6 per cent of GDP respectively despite an increase in resource utilisation in the economy and a decrease in unemployment. The drop in net lending will partly be the result of expansionary fiscal policy.

The central government sector will continue to report net lending deficits and budget deficits throughout the forecast period, while the old-age pension system will generate stable surpluses of around 2 per cent of GDP. The local government sector recorded a net lending surplus in 2004 and is expected to continue to do so during the forecast period.

This positive net lending means that the general government sector's financial position will improve during the forecast period, and in 2007 financial assets are expected to exceed liabilities by SEK 200 billion. At the same time, the central government sector's deficits mean that the liabilities column of the general government balance sheet will grow. However, both central government debt and consolidated gross debt will fall as a proportion of GDP.

Swedish delegation to visit Ghana

A Swedish delegation comprising officials from the Ministry for Foreign Affairs, the Swedish Export Credits Guarantee Board, the Swedish Trade Council, Sida (the Swedish International Development Cooperation Agency) and Swedfund (the Swedish Fund for Industrial Cooperation with Developing Countries) is to visit Ghana on 18-20 April.

The purpose of the visit is to broaden and deepen trade cooperation between Sweden and Ghana and to begin negotiations on a bilateral agreement on the mutual promotion and protection of investment. "I welcome this opportunity to discuss and elaborate the Swedish proposal to establish a rapid reaction capability in the EU for civilian crisis management. I am convinced that a capability to deploy civilian rapid reaction teams would be a good way to strengthen the EU's ability to manage crises and solve conflicts," says Ms Freivalds.

The purpose of the seminar, which is being arranged by the Folke Bernadotte Academy in

The conference is being arranged in light of the peace agreement between the government of Sudan and the Sudan People's Liberation Movement/Army (SPLM/A) signed in January this year following more than twenty years of civil war.

"Sweden will be contributing over SEK 700 million to Sudan in 2005-2007 to support the peace agreement for southern Sudan and in response to the enormous humanitarian needs throughout the country," says Minister for Foreign Affairs Laila Freivalds.

"The government of Sudan must now take responsibility for peace, human rights and development throughout the entire country. It is therefore absolutely crucial that progress is now also made in conflict-affected Darfur in western Sudan. In Oslo I will make clear that Sweden's continued and increased support to Sudan is dependent on positive developments in Darfur."

The civil war between the government of Sudan and the Sudan People's Liberation Movement/Army (SPLM/A) in southern Sudan has lasted over two decades and has led to 4.5 million internally displaced persons and more than 2 million deaths. On 9 January 2005 the government of Sudan and the SPLM/A signed a comprehensive peace agreement.

Sweden to implement the prudent person rule for occupational pensions

The Swedish Government is today referring a set of proposals on new regulations for occupational pensions institutions to the Council on Legislation. The proposals cover friendly societies that provide occupational pensions (occupational pension funds), pension foundations and the occupational pension business of life assurance companies. The new regulations, which implement the European Directive on the activities and supervision of institutions for occupational retirement provision, represent the first step towards more modern and risk-based insurance regulation.

The underlying principle of the Directive and of the Governments proposals to the Council on Legislation is the prudent person rule, which targets the decision-making process of the individual institution.

The proposals referred to the Council on Legislation are an important step towards more modern regulation and proactive supervision in the insurance field. We are laying a firm foundation for stronger occupational pensions, while ensuring consumer protection for pensioners. A further step towards modern and risk-based regulation of insurance activities and stronger, more preventive supervision will be taken by the coming introduction of a modernised solvency system for insurance companies that are now being prepared at the Ministry of Finance. These solvency rules are well in line with the Solvency II work at Community-level, says Minister for Local Government and Financial Markets Sven-Erik Österberg.

In the proposal referred to the Council on Legislation for consideration, the Government proposes that the institutions should invest their assets in a prudent manner. Technical provisions corresponding to pension commitments should be based on a market valuation of these commitments. In addition, new operating terms are proposed as well as special provisions on information to beneficiaries. Under another proposal, Finansinspektionen (the Financial Supervisory Authority), which already supervises life assurance companies and occupational pension funds, will be made responsible for supervising the financial operations of pension foundations.

It is proposed that the new regulations come into force on 1 January 2006.

"It is with great satisfaction that I note that the UN Security Council has now decided to refer the matter of legal proceedings for violations of international humanitarian law and human rights in Darfur to the International Criminal Court (ICC)," says Minister for Foreign Affairs Laila Freivalds. "Sweden has worked very actively to achieve this decision in the Security Council."

"The Security Council decision is of the utmost importance to both victims and the rest of the population of Sudan. It also sends a clear message to perpetrators of similar international crimes around the world that these crimes cannot be committed with impunity. It is our hope that the decision will contribute to a peaceful resolution of the conflict in Darfur."

The Security Council decided last night (1 April Swedish time) by a vote of 11 in favour, none against to adopt a resolution (resolution 1593) referring violations of international humanitarian law in Darfur, Sudan to the International Criminal Court (ICC). This is the first time that the UN Security Council has used its authority under the statute of the court to refer a situation to the ICC. The United States, China, Algeria and Brazil abstained in the vote.

A new country strategy for development cooperation with India was approved by the Government today. The country strategy applies to the period 2005-2009.

According to the strategy, development cooperation with India is to create conditions that will enable poor people to improve their lives. It focuses on respect for democracy and human rights, environmental protection that will benefit the poor and innovative research and development in areas that will benefit the poor.

The new country strategy does not involve traditional state-to-state cooperation. Proposal referred to Council on Legislation on new system for appeals and procedures in aliens and citizenship cases

The Government yesterday referred the proposal New system for appeals and procedures in aliens and citizenship cases to the Council on Legislation.

"This is the biggest reform in the area of migration ever undertaken. The Aliens Appeals Board will be replaced by court proceedings as of 1 January 2006. This will lead to a more transparent and open process in which people seeking asylum will have greater opportunities to present their cases orally. It will add to greater confidence in the way decisions are made," says Barbro Holmberg, Minister for Migration and Asylum Policy.

"At the same time, we are submitting a draft for a new Aliens Act in which grounds for seeking protection are expanded. Refugee policy is to focus on the need for protection. We want to make it clear that asylum is a question of the risk of persecution in ones country of origin, not illness or other problems that might arise in Sweden."

The proposal referred to the Council on Legislation contains a new appeals system. The Aliens Appeals Board will be closed and replaced by a procedure in the courts. In the future, decisions by the Swedish Migration Board can be appealed to migration appeals tribunals and, after being granted leave to appeal, to a precedent-setting migration higher appeals tribunal as the court of last resort. It is the Governments intention that the three county administrative courts (in Stockholm, Göteborg and Malmö) are to serve as migration appeals tribunals, and the Administrative Court of

Appeal in Stockholm as the migration higher appeals tribunal. The Government is no longer to be able to have individual cases referred to it for decisions that would set guidelines.

A new procedural system is an important element of the reform. When an appeal is lodged, a legal process between two parties will be conducted in the courts, with the Swedish Migration Board as one party and the asylum applicant as the other. There will be an opportunity for the asylum seeker to be granted an oral hearing in the migration appeals tribunals corresponding to the general procedure at administrative courts. The procedural system is designed to achieve an expedited process. The main focus of hearings in aliens cases is to be placed on the court of first instance, i.e. the Swedish Migration Board.

The 1989 Aliens Act will be replaced by a new Aliens Act. The different grounds for residence permits will be more clearly defined and grounds for protection given more prominence. Provisions with regard to protection will be extended in the new Aliens Act, to include the proposal "persons who on grounds of serious conflict in their country of origin feel a well-founded fear of serious abuse shall also be deemed to be in need of protection".

The concept of humanitarian reasons as grounds for a residence permit will not be included in the new Aliens Act. Under exceptional circumstances, if none of the main grounds for a residence permit are applicable, the concept of particularly distressing circumstances may instead motivate granting a residence permit. In such cases, an overall assessment must be made, particularly of the applicants state of health, adjustment to Sweden and the situation in his/her country of origin. Regarding children, the Act makes it clear that these circumstances need not be of the same gravity or weight for a residence permit to be granted.

At present, people whose asylum applications have been rejected and, in this connection, have received a legally binding removal order are able to submit a new residence permit application to the Aliens Appeals Board. This system will cease. Instead, the Swedish Migration Board will, on its own initiative, examine new circumstances that come to light during the enforcement stage. The alien him/herself may also refer to any new circumstances related to the need for protection. In certain circumstances, a new examination regarding a residence permit may be conducted by the Swedish Migration Board.

In cases where security is at issue, decisions taken by the Swedish Migration Board will be able to appealed to the Government. The migration higher appeals tribunal must then hold oral hearings and submit a statement to the Government. If the migration higher appeals tribunal finds that there are obstacles to enforcement, this position is binding for the Government.

The proposal referred to the Council on Legislation also contains draft amendments to the Citizenship Act and the Act concerning Special Controls in respect of Aliens.

After the Council on Legislation has dealt with the proposal, the Government intends to present a bill to the Riksdag in the spring. These amendments will enter into force on 1 January 2006.

The proposal referred to the Council on Legislation was initiated through an agreement between the Government, the Green Party and the Left Party, based on the budget agreement for 2005. This agreement also encompasses a joint commitment to finance the new system, which is expected to be considerably more expensive than the current system. The preparatory process regarding financing the reform is continuing.

Government makes contribution to Multilateral Investment Fund

The Government decided today to sign the second Multilateral Agreement on Investments and to contribute USD 5 million (approximately SEK 36 million) to the Multilateral Investment Fund (MIF) for a period of up to five years.

The Multilateral Agreement on Investments will be signed in Okinawa, Japan, on 9 April. The Fund will make its first payments in 2007.

MIF is one of the Inter-American Development Bank (IDB) bodies specialising in the private sector. The Fund was established in 1993 with the aim of promoting private sector development in Latin America and the Caribbean. The focus today is on the development of small and microenterprises in the region's poorest countries and on a review of and work on money remittances. Three quarters of the projects are implemented in cooperation with NGOs and business organisations in the least-developed countries in the region. Activities to date have included more than 650 projects worth a total of approximately USD 1 billion (roughly SEK 7.2 billion). Sweden's involvement in the Fund is expected to lead to increased influence and an exchange of knowledge in an area where Sweden currently has relatively limited experience.

The Government submits a written communication to the Riksdag on military equipment exports for 2004

The Government submitted to the Riksdag today a written communication on Swedish export control policy and the export of military equipment for 2004.

The value of actual Swedish military equipment exports rose from SEK 6.5 billion to SEK 7.2 billion during 2004.

"For the past 20 years, the Government has been able to give open, correct information on Swedish export control policy. This provides a good basis for the public debate. I take a very positive view of being able to give this information to the Riksdag so early in the year," says Minister for Communications and Regional Policy Ulrica Messing, who is responsible for export control issues.

"The increase in military equipment exports in 2004 shows that the Swedish defence industry is holding its own in the context of a restrictive export control policy. Most of this increase is due to exports to our traditional cooperation partners in this field. This is also important from the point of view of Swedish security policy."

In terms of export licences that were granted, however, there was a reduction of 28 per cent compared with the previous year. The total value of export licences granted amounted to SEK 6.5 billion in 2004.

Military equipment exports accounted for 0.8 per cent of Sweden's total exports of goods in 2004.

Strong commitment to Swedish research

In its bill Research for a Better Life (2004/05:80) the Swedish government presents its appraisal of how SEK 2.34 billion in new funding for research and development should be used with an eye to bolstering the position of Sweden as a research nation. The measures target both pure and needs-specific research and are geared to stimulate new Swedish innovations for growth and sustainable development.

The governments auxiliary parties, the Left Party and the Green Party, also support the bill.

This bill contains a great deal of new funding for Swedish research, says Minister of Education and Research Leif Pagrotsky. The government has chosen to highlight a few of the fields where Sweden is an international leader and where the stakes are high for both the public and private sectors. Sweden invests more than any other country in research and development, and in this bill my ambition is to further strengthen our international competitiveness.

The bill targets growth and employment in the form of a 50-percent increase in allocations to Vinnova (the Swedish Agency for Innovation Systems), says Britt-Marie Danestig of the Left Party. Gender research will receive more than twice as much funding. We are also earmarking funds to

make it possible for working teachers to pursue research.

The bill proposes a commitment to research for sustainable development amounting to SEK 210 million as one of the priority areas, says Mikaela Valtersson, member of parliament for the Green Party. This places the focus on crucial issues for the future like climatic change and sustainable development in the green sector where new knowledge is needed.

The government is focusing on three areas that are critically important to the future development of the country: medical research, SEK 400 million; technological research, SEK 350 million; and research in support of sustainable development, SEK 210 million. This funding should be allocated by the governmental research financiers: the Swedish Research Council (VR); the Swedish Council for Working Life and Social Research (FAS); the Swedish Research Council for Environment, Agricultural Sciences, and Spatial Planning (Formas); the Swedish Agency for Innovation Systems (Vinnova); and the Swedish National Space Board.

Another SEK 300 million is being invested in research centers of excellence that are highly competitive in the international arena. Funding for a center of excellence should be available for a period of up to ten years and comprise up to SEK 10 million per year. This support should be allocated by VR, FAS, Formas, and Vinnova. Universities, university colleges, research institutes, companies, and other interested parties are expected to commit considerable resources of their own to these strong research environments.

Direct governmental allocations to universities and university colleges should be increased by SEK 521 million. This expansion is designed to strengthen research and graduate education, to help provide employment opportunities for newly graduated Ph.D.s to enhance their resumes, and to bolster efforts at universities and colleges to take their research findings to market.

The government also wants to further intensify the opportunities for the researchers of the future. Therefore the research councils and Vinnova are also being provided with resources to create employment for new Ph.D.s and to stimulate the development of graduate education by funding national schools of research--joint centers for graduate education at key departments.

The government wishes to continue to develop R&D in collaboration with the business community. Vinnova should receive SEK 120 million for R&D programs in the vehicular sector and other fields essential to Sweden. Vinnova should also be given SEK 10 million for efforts that enable small and medium-size companies to access research.

Industrial research institutes and holding companies at universities and colleges play a vital role in the transfer of knowledge between academia and business. These holding companies should be allocated SEK 60 million to boost their capital. A mediator will be appointed to advise them on more efficient holding-company structures. Resources for institutes of industrial research should be augmented by SEK 110 million.

Moreover, the government wishes to provide the Swedish Research Council with a further SEK 42 million for research infrastructure. Allocations to the Swedish National Archive of Recorded Sound and Moving Images should be supplemented by SEK 5 million. Another SEK 20 million should be allocated for the conversion of collected material to new technological systems.

Furthermore, the government wants to see allocations for gender research increased by SEK 13 million and for education research by SEK 10 million. In addition, the Swedish Research Council should fund a national school of research in design in the amount of SEK 5 million.

New national organization for EU research collaboration

The Swedish organization for research collaboration in the EU should be updated to meet new conditions in order to provide those pursuing research in Sweden with early and pertinent information and support. The EU R&D Council will be dissolved and its activities transferred to Vinnova in the form of a secretariat charged with promoting Swedish participation in EU research collaboration by offering companies and academic researchers information, training, consultation,

and legal assistance. Special attention should be paid to opportunities for small businesses to take part in EU framework programs for research and development.

Research study on sequence of events leading to sinking of MV Estonia

The Government decided today that the Swedish Agency for Innovation Systems (VINNOVA) in its capacity as the authority responsible for the Sea Safety Programme should commission a research project to study the course of events leading to the sinking of MV Estonia.

The primary objective will be to develop knowledge to help improve maritime safety for ships in Swedish waters. The Government has today allocated SEK 8 million for this purpose.

International research institutes will also be permitted to apply to carry out the research project so that international knowledge and experience can be turned to account. The project should also include measures to guarantee that the knowledge acquired and the conclusions reached are made available to the Swedish shipping sector and other relevant actors.

A previous feasibility study of the course of events leading to the sinking of the ship based on the Joint Accident Investigation Commission (JAIC) report was carried out in 2003 by Vice-Admiral Frank Rosenius and civil engineer Staffan Sjöling of the Swedish Defence Matériel Administration, on behalf of the National Board of Psychological Defence. In the study, an analysis was made of the possible ways water could have flowed into the ship and the consequences this had for the course of events. The investigators were unable to explain in detail how the water had forced its way into some areas of the ship.

A main study of the sequence of events in the sinking of MV Estonia would provide experience that could be used to improve maritime safety for ships in Swedish waters now and in the future.

The Joint Accident Investigation Commission, representing Estonia, Finland and Sweden, produced a final report on the sinking of MV Estonia which was presented in December 1997. The Commission stated in the report that the ship had had a series of shortcomings in respect of maritime safety. These included the ships construction, evacuation routes and routines, rescue equipment and rescue systems. In the Commissions view, it was primarily these shortcomings that lay behind the accident and its serious consequences. In light of this, a number of improvements in maritime safety were recommended, many of which have since been implemented.

On 19 April 2001, the Government commissioned VINNOVA to allocate funds to support research into maritime safety. VINNOVA used these funds to begin a maritime safety programme. The programme represents a Government initiative to improve maritime safety, an initiative that has been co-financed by the business sector and various organisations. Research projects for more than SEK 100 million have been financed to date. In a decision on 10 February 2005, the Government allocated a further SEK 25 million for an extension of the programme until 2007.

The research programme has facilitated the identification of shortcomings in existing international regulations concerning fire fighting with water spray systems and problems with the launching of lifeboats from ships in heavy seas. The programme has also led to the production of a prototype of a simple, safe and inexpensive survival suit, as well as support systems for decisions in situations where hull damage has resulted in an inflow of water. Systematic analyses of human behaviour in disaster situations and procedures for effective risk communication have also been carried out.

VINNOVA will submit a report to the Government Offices (Ministry of Defence) by 1 February 2006 stating which research institute or consortium has been granted the assignment, how it intends

to carry out the assignment, and an estimate of the costs and completion date.

Sweden to increase its support to the peace process in Liberia

Sweden is to contribute a further SEK 25 million to the vocational training of former soldiers in Liberia. The aim is to help the tens of thousands of young people many of them teenagers who were previously forced to serve as soldiers and who are now returning to a normal life and need to support themselves

This grant is being given via the UN development programme UNDP and is part of Sweden's endeavours to support the peace process underway in Liberia since 2003.

Via Sida, Sweden also contributes support to refugees wishing to return to their native districts and to various programmes aimed at creating employment in rural areas. Total Swedish support to reconstruction and humanitarian needs in Liberia is expected to amount to some SEK 100 million in 2005.

Sweden to host international meeting on West Africa in

Stockholm

The International Contact Group for the Mano River region in West Africa will meet in Stockholm on Monday 21 March, hosted by Hans Dahlgren, State Secretary for Foreign Affairs. The Contact Group regularly convenes to discuss developments in the peace processes in Liberia and its neighbouring countries.

State Secretary for Foreign Affairs Hans Dahlgren is chair of the Contact Group, together with Niger Minister of Foreign Affairs Aïchatou Mindaoudou, who represents the Chairmanship of the West African cooperation organisation ECOWAS (Economic Community of West African States).

Some forty participants are expected to come to Stockholm, including Ghana's Foreign Minister Akufo-Addo, ECOWAS' Secretary-General Chambas, former Nigerian president General Abubakar, who led the peace negotiations on Liberia, and participants from the EU, the UN, the African Union, the United States, France, the UK, Morocco and Benin.

Mr Dahlgren has just returned from a trip to Liberia and Guinea, where he headed an EU delegation.

The International Contact Group for Liberia (ICGL) was formed in 2002 with the purpose of bringing an end to the prolonged civil war in Liberia. The Group's mandate has recently been extended to include the entire Mano River region: Liberia, Sierra Leone, Guinea, Côte d'Ivoire and Guinea-Bissau. Through his position as the EU Presidency's Special Representative for the Mano River countries, State Secretary for Foreign Affairs Hans Dahlgren has been chair of the Contact Group since its formation, together with the country holding the Chairmanship of ECOWAS.

New regulations on residence permits for third-country nationals

The inquiry on residence permits for family reunification and for long-term resident third country nationals yesterday submitted its interim report Family reunification and free movement for third-country nationals (SOU 2005:15) to Minister for Migration and Asylum Policy Barbro Holmberg.

The remit of the Inquiry is to implement two EC Directives in Swedish law: Council Directive

2003/86 EC of 22 September 2003 on the right to family reunification (the Family Reunification Directive) and Council Directive 2003/109/EC of 25 November 2003 concerning the status of third-country nationals who are long-term residents (the Long-term Residents Directive).

The Family Reunification Directive provides that a third country national (a person who is not a citizen of an EES or EU state or Switzerland) who has a more permanent residence in the EU is entitled to be reunited with members of his/her nuclear family, if they are also third country nationals. The Inquiry proposes that regulations be incorporated into the Aliens Act (1989:529) to the effect that relatives (spouse, registered partner, cohabitee and children under 18 years) who are third country nationals shall be entitled to be granted residence permits on grounds of personal ties with a third country national who is living in Sweden. In addition, the Inquiry proposes that refugee children or children otherwise in need of protection shall also be entitled to be granted residence permits for family reunion in this country, if the parents and children are third country nationals. A permit may, however, be refused if the third country national is considered to represent a threat to public order or security and on certain other grounds.

The Inquiry also proposes that new regulations be incorporated in the Aliens Act on a new category, long-term resident third country nationals. A third country national who has been permanently resident in Sweden for five years should be able to obtain special status as a long-term resident. This means that the third country national will be assured certain rights, including free movement in the EU. This status confers the entitlement to settle in another EU state in order to work. Third country nationals who have the status of long-term residents in another EU state and want to move to Sweden will be covered by the same conditions that apply to EU citizens in Sweden.

The Inquiry proposes that a new regulation be incorporated in the Aliens Act to the effect that a person with the status of long-term resident in another EU state may be expelled from the Unions territory if he or she is convicted of a crime by a Swedish court.

Yearbook on the EU 2004: Ten new Member States and a new Treaty

Today the Government submitted the annual communication on its work in the European Union to the Riksdag.

2004 was a very important year for the Union and was marked to a great degree by enlargement. On 1 May ten new Member States acceded to the EU: Cyprus, the Czech Republic, Estonia, Hungary, Latvia, Lithuania, Malta, Poland, Slovakia and Slovenia. Negotiations with Bulgaria and Romania were concluded in December ahead of the accession of the two countries in 2007, and the decision was made to begin accession negotiations with Turkey and Croatia.

Work continued on a new Treaty, whose aims include more efficient decision-making processes and making the Union more transparent for citizens, and an agreement was reached in June. The Treaty was signed in Rome on 29 October and the ratification process was initiated in the Member States.

During the year, preparations were begun ahead of the mid-term review of the Lisbon Strategy, the most important tool available to the EU for achieving sustainable growth and full employment. The importance of new environmentally-friendly technology as the driving force behind growth and a better environment was emphasised in accordance with Swedish priorities. Another important step was taken concerning cooperation in the area of justice and home affairs through a new five-year action programme called the Hague Programme. The terrorist attacks in Madrid on 11 March 2004 resulted in the adoption of a declaration on combating terrorism, which initiated intensified cooperation between Member States in efforts against terrorism.

The Government wants to improve product control

The Government has submitted a bill to the Riksdag on new and improved guidelines for market surveillance of products.

Market surveillance ensures that products meet the relevant requirements in areas including health, safety and environment. Today, however, market surveillance operates differently in different areas.

The Government therefore wants to improve coordination by strengthening the Market Surveillance Council at the Swedish Board for Accreditation and Conformity Assessment (SWEDAC). The Government is also proposing certain amendments to the Customs Act to facilitate cooperation between the customs and responsible authorities. The authorities will still be responsible for the control itself.

"As international trade increases, the need for effective market surveillance also increases," says Minister for Industry and Trade Thomas Östros.

"It is important that consumers can continue to buy products, secure in the knowledge that these products are safe. It is also vital for a continued high level of confidence in the EU internal market, where goods and services must be able to move freely," says Thomas Östros.

Report of the inquiry on permit applications based on personal ties submitted to Barbro Holmberg

The Inquiry on applications for residence permits on the basis of personal ties has submitted its report More effective processing of applications based on personal ties (SOU 2005:14) to Barbro Holmberg, Minister for Migration and Asylum Policy.

The inquiry chair, Per Lilja of the Swedish Migration Board, has had the remit of determining how the present system can be made more effective. The task of the Inquiry has been to present proposals for measures that can reduce processing times and save costs without disregarding the need to protect the legal security of the individual. In this context the inquiry chair has been instructed to give special attention to the aspect of protection when there is reason to suspect that one of the parties in the relationship will subjected to violence or other serious forms of abuse.

The present system is very resource-consuming and has resulted in long processing times at Swedish missions abroad and at the Swedish Migration Board. The Inquiry proposes a number of measures so that people who marry and want to be united with someone from another country will not have to wait for an unreasonably long time for a decision.

The number of applications on the basis of newly established relationships amounted to 15 360 in 2004, 80 per cent of which were granted. Sixty per cent of the applicants were women.

The Inquiry makes the following main proposals:

- The examination procedure should be made more flexible by changing the present verbal requirement in the examination so that the migration authorities are able to determine which examination method is most suitable and effective in each individual case.
- All sponsors should be checked against criminal records and records of suspected offenders. The authorities can then more easily discover and assess whether there is a palpable risk that the applicant and accompanying children may be exposed to violence or serious violation.
- It should be possible to revoke a temporary residence permit if the relationship ends during the two-year trial period.
- More uniform routines for receipt and registration of applications should be established at

Swedish missions abroad and the Swedish Migration Board. This is to achieve better control over the flow of cases and to be able to measure and compare processing times correctly.

- In order to ensure high and even quality in examinations and decisions the Ministry for Foreign Affairs and the Swedish Migration Board should further intensify the training of personnel and also give clear instructions concerning the requirements for these activities.
- Measures should be taken to simplify the processing of other cases within the area of permits in order to free resources, thereby giving the Swedish Migration Board more scope to allocate its resources according to needs in its operations.

Sweden to support environmental work in Russia

Sweden is to contribute EUR 6 million (SEK 55 million) to the Support Fund for the Northern Dimension Environmental Partnership (NDEP). This contribution will be for the period 2006-2008.

The aim of the NDEP Support Fund is to deal with environmental problems in north-western Russia. The Fund focuses on the environment and nuclear safety. Projects for extending water supplies, wastewater treatment, waste management and efficient energy use are financed in the environmental area. Initiatives for managing spent nuclear fuel and radioactive waste are planned in the area of nuclear safety.

The NDEP is a partnership between bilateral donors, the EU Commission, Russia and a number of international financial institutions - the European Bank for Reconstruction and Development (EBRD), the European Investment Bank (EIB), the Nordic Investment Bank (NIB) and the World Bank.

"The NDEP is an effective instrument for international environmental cooperation with Russia. Environmental issues also have high priority in bilateral Russian-Swedish development cooperation. The NDEP was organised during Sweden's Presidency of the EU in the spring of 2001 and is administered by the EBRD. In all, eight environmental projects have received financing from the NDEP Support Fund.

Sweden has previously contributed EUR 10 million (approximately SEK 91 million) to the Support Fund over the period 2002-2005.

KRUT delivered to Ulrica Messing

On Tuesday, February 15, Anders Svärd delivered a report from KRUT (the Military Equipment Inquiry) to Ulrica Messing, Minister for Communications and Regional Policy. The report is entitled KRUT - Reformerat regelverk för handel med försvarsmateriel (SOU 2005:9) (KRUT - A reformed regulatory framework for trade in defence equipment).

During the 1980s a new regulatory framework for military equipment was developed. Since the new regulations entered into force in 1993, significant changes have taken place both as regards the production and acquisition of military equipment and in terms of Sweden's foreign and security policy stance towards the world around us. In addition, foreign owners now have a substantial stake in the Swedish defence industry.

Several of the inquiry's proposals concern the guidelines covering the export of military equipment and other overseas cooperation, which are the Government's policy document for use in determining the suitability of recipient countries. The proposals in brief are the following:

- The EU's Common Criteria should be integrated into the guidelines. This would mean an increase in the number of factors to be taken into account when examining export applications and would also mean replacing the current distinction between military equipment for combat purposes and other military equipment with the EU approach. Under this approach, the areas of use for the equipment are analysed on a case-by-case basis, taking into account the intentions of the prospective recipient country.
- The regulation making export licences conditional on the Swedish Armed Forces needing the equipment the application refers to should be eliminated. This condition is considered to stand in the way of a necessary international restructuring of the Swedish defence industry and is incompatible with Sweden's EU commitment to develop a European defence capacity for crisis management. It is proposed that defence policy should instead be a reason for allowing exports.
- In addition to security and defence policy reasons, industrial policy considerations should also be permissible grounds for granting a licence. KRUT believes that international cooperation and exports of advanced equipment will enable new investments to be made so as to further develop the cutting-edge expertise that has been built up in the defence industry. The report emphasises that this is not about boosting employment or of regional policy.
- The positive presumption that applies to exports to the Nordic countries, neutral countries in Europe and the EU should be extended to the USA. The inquiry's arguments for this proposal are Sweden's dependence on US technology and our desire to strengthen cooperation on equipment with the United States. At the same time, the inquiry stresses that every single application involving these countries will still be subject to examination. There is no question of a carte blanche.

The inquiry has conducted a review of the Swedish supervisory system and has found that in all essential respects it works well and serves its purpose. The report proposes a number of measures to further develop the system. For example, KRUT would like the authority that examines applications for licences, the National Inspectorate of Strategic Products (ISP), to document the deliberations leading up to decisions in important cases (cases requiring consultation). KRUT would also like a strategy to be drawn up to strengthen the Export Control Council.

KRUT proposes that defence equipment imports and exports of services should be subject to regulation. The inquiry considers that requiring a licence for imports made by private individuals and arms dealers would be a means of increasing control over equipment in Sweden and reducing the risk of unlawful export or re-sale. Regulation of services, such as maintenance and testing of equipment, is needed so as to prevent such services being delivered to unacceptable countries. The report makes the assessment that companies that have received quality assurance certification from the ISP can be given a larger role in administering routine cases. They could, for example, be issued export licences that are valid for an extended period and allow repeated deliveries of a certain item, provided exports are subsequently declared to the ISP. KRUT emphasises that this can be done without lowering standards for supervision and examination. One positive effect of this change would be to give the ISP more time for complicated cases, cooperation with foreign authorities and follow-up of how previously exported equipment is being used.

With regard to the concept of military equipment (krigsmateriel), the inquiry proposes replacing this term with "defence equipment" (försvarsmateriel). One argument for doing so is that the determinant "krigs-" (meaning "war" or "military") has in general been replaced in Swedish public administration and in security and defence policy areas. In addition, the inquiry explains that several products now classified as military equipment are used by "blue light" agencies within the framework of civil defence and this is a trend that can be expected to grow stronger.

The inquiry takes the view that the regulation stating that military equipment may not be taken out of the country without a licence (Article 6 of the Military Equipment Act), which is usually equated in public debate with a general prohibition of exports, should continue to apply, with an amendment extending it to include services (technical assistance relating to military equipment).

Extra promotion money to embassies

The Government decided today to invest close to SEK 5.4 million on export promotion at Swedish embassies and consulates-general.

"We have to make the most of the potential offered by new and growing markets," says Thomas Östros, Minister for Industry and Trade.

"Swedish exports are thriving. We have increased exports from 30 to 45 per cent of GDP in ten years and have succeeded in turning a deficit of the current account balance to a surplus. SEK 4.5 million of the extra funds invested will go to 17 embassies and consulates-general in dynamic, rapidly growing markets that are of particular interest to Swedish companies.

Sweden contributes to newly-established IMF fund to subsidise loans to poor countries affected by natural disasters

The Government took the decision today to contribute SEK 70 million to support poor countries affected by natural disasters and needing assistance in reconstruction via loans from the International Monetary Fund (IMF). The Swedish contribution means that it will be possible for the IMF to offer loans at very low interest rates to the countries affected.

Swedish officers to Sudan

The Government decided Thursday to contribute six staff officers to the UN rapid deployment force SHIRBRIG in southern Sudan and one staff officer to the African Unions (AU) peace support initiative in Darfur.

The African Union

The AU has been monitoring the ceasefire between the Sudanese Government and the two rebel groups in Darfur since May 2004. On 20 October the Peace and Security Council of the African Union took a decision to expand the current observer mission. The mission will consist of 3 320 persons, including 450 observers and 815 civilian police officers. Sweden has already sent an observer to the AUs mission in Darfur and has given financial support of SEK 5.7 million to the AU and to the political peace negotiations.

The Government decided Thursday to contribute a Swedish staff officer to the African Unions initiative in Darfur. The decision was made after an enquiry from the AU and is part of a coordinated EU contribution to the AUs efforts to create peace and security in the region. Sweden is thereby making a further contribution to strengthening the international presence in Sudan.

UN Mission in Sudan

The civil war between the Sudanese Government and the rebel movement SPLM (the Sudanese

Peoples Liberation Movement) ended on 9 January 2005, when a peace agreement was signed. The fighting, which has been going on since 1983, has cost more than 2 million lives and more than 4 million refugees inside and outside the country.

The UN has long been preparing an operation after a peace agreement in southern Sudan. The UN Mission in Sudan (UNMISUD) will consist of military observers, protective and supporting forces as well as police and other civil personnel numbering almost 11 000 people. The UN Security Council will probably adopt a resolution on UNMISUD in February.

In 2004 many major steps were taken in the peace process for southern Sudan and SHIRBRIG, a rapid deployment force supporting the UN, was activated by the UN in order to plan its operation. The role of SHIRBRIG is to act as the command for military operations in the initial phase of the UN mission in southern Sudan. The Government decided Thursday that Sweden will contribute 6 staff officers to the mission over a six-month period.

Initiative for Swedish music export to the USA

Human rights in the world's countries in 2004

In January each year, the Ministry for Foreign Affairs publishes a report on human rights in the world's countries. For the third year in a row, the report is available on the Government's website for human rights: www.manskligarattigheter.gov.se.

These reports describe civil, political, economic, social and cultural rights in each country. They also give an account of the situation for various groups in society with regard to their specific abilities to enjoy their rights, such as the rights of children and women. Even though respect for human rights is growing internationally, serious crimes against human rights are committed in many places in the world, particularly in countries affected by conflict.

"Thousands of people every year are executed and threatened because of their opinions, national or ethnic origin, sexual orientation or religion without even a previous trial," says Minister for Foreign Affairs Laila Freivalds.

"The right to life is a fundamental human right. When a state chooses to ignore the right to life by failing to provide protection for certain groups or when a state tries to protect itself by violating certain individuals' right to life, the international community must shoulder the responsibility to protect. Sustainable peace and security can only be built on a foundation of states that respect the human rights of their inhabitants."

The promotion of human rights is one of the cornerstones of Swedish foreign policy. The annual publication of these reports has become a useful instrument and important source of information for the Government Offices and other Swedish government agencies and organisations. Response to publication of the reports has been predominantly positive and has encouraged greater exchange between a number of different actors in Sweden and abroad.

Up to now, Sweden and the USA are alone in publishing annual reports on the situation of human rights in the world's countries.

The official inquiry into the transportation of defence material on the M/S Estonia (Fö 2004:06) has presented its report to the government today.

The government gave a commission to the President of the Court of Appeal Mr. Johan Hirschfeldt by a decision on the 3rd of December 2004. The commission involved investigating whether the Swedish Armed Forces or the Defence Material Administration (FMV) had transported any defence materials onboard the M/S Estonia during the month of September 1994. If any information emerges that such transports have taken place, Mr. Hirschfeldt shall also give an account of whether these materials were of explosive character.

The Inquirys answer to these questions is that the Armed Forces on the 14th and the 20th of September 1994 transported defence materials on the M/S Estonia. The transported defence materials were not of an explosive character. The Inquiry has not found any information that indicates that the Armed Forces has transported defence materials on the M/S Estonia on any other occasion during the month of September 1994. No information has emerged that indicates that the Defence Material Administration has transported defence materials on the M/S Estonia during the month of September 1994.

A National Council for Co-ordination and Support for those affected by the natural disaster in South-East Asia

The Swedish Government has decided to establish a National Council with special responsibilities concerning the effects of the natural disaster in South-East Asia. The main task for the Council will be to co-ordinate the help and support from different government agencies available to those affected by the disaster in South-East Asia.

The Council will also facilitate the contacts between the affected and different authorities.

An additional task for the council will be to provide the affected with relevant information concerning different forms of assistance. More precisely the Council shall

- undertake an inventory of existing resources and identify the need for special efforts from the government or governmental agencies.

- further the co-ordination of public information on rules and regulations concerning social security, education, health care and welfare etc pertinent to the situation of the affected.
- establish a special function to facilitate the communication between the affected and the different authorities.
- propose legislative changes necessitated by unforeseen consequences of the disaster.

The former director-general of The National Board of Health and Welfare, Kerstin Wigzell, has been appointed chairman of the council. The National Police Commissioner and the director-generals of the following agencies have been appointed as members:

The National Board of Psychological Defence, The Swedish Emergency Management Agency, The National Board of Health and Welfare, The Swedish Tax Agency, Legal, Financial and Administrative Services Agency, The Insurance Office and The Swedish National Agency for Education. Representatives for municipalities and county councils will also be able to participate in the Council. A reference group will be formed consisting of professional expertise on the special

- I welcome the agreement among G 7 countries to extend debt payment relief to the countries in Asia struck by the Tsunami, said Finance Minister Pär Nuder today. Sweden supports this. Peace negotiations were intensified during 2002 and have continued since then. During this period, however, fighting flared up in the western region of Sudan, Darfur. At the moment, the situation in Darfur continues to be extremely serious and a number of breaches of the ceasefire have been reported. The United Nations estimates that some 2 million people in Darfur will be in need of humanitarian aid in the coming years.

Swedish measures for cholera vaccination in Sri Lanka and India

Sweden has received a request from the World Health Organisation (WHO) to undertake cholera vaccination measures in the areas affected by the natural disaster in Asia. Sweden will therefore assist by providing 400.000 doses of cholera vaccine which will be sufficient to vaccinate 200.000 people in the affected areas. Supplies held by the National Bacteriological Laboratory (SBL Vaccin) probably make Sweden the only country in the world to have such a large stock of vaccine readily available.

"If measures of this kind are not undertaken, there is the risk that cholera epidemics will break out in these areas that have already been so incredibly severely affected," says Minister for International Development Cooperation Carin Jämtin.

The disaster has destroyed water catchments, demolished drainage systems and polluted drinking water. The World Health Organisation considers there to be a great risk that different kinds of epidemics will break out. The WHO assesses the most acute risk to be that of a cholera outbreak. The WHO proposes that vaccination should take place in Sri Lanka and southern India.

The National Bacteriological Laboratory (SBL Vaccin AB) already cooperates with the WHO and has offered the available supplies of 400.000 doses of Dukoral cholera vaccine for WHO use.

Sweden will finance the whole initiative through the Swedish International Development Cooperation Agency (Sida). The initiative is expected to get under way in the affected areas within ten days. The Swedish Rescue Services Agency will be responsible for transport to Asia, where the WHO will take over the operation.

Swedish aid to Asia

Initially Sweden is setting aside some SEK 500 million for assistance to the disaster-hit areas in Asia. The terrible scale of the disaster is still not known and we must be prepared to contribute in every way we can, says Minister for International Development Cooperation Carin Jämtin.

Aid is being channelled via Sida and mainly consists of support to UN bodies, the International Red Cross, the Swedish Rescue Services Agency and Swedish NGOs.

So far Sida has taken decisions on contributions amounting to SEK 52.9 million. The aid measures implemented and planned so far include SEK 25 million to the International Red Cross and SEK 20 million via UNICEF to the worst-hit countries Indonesia, Sri Lanka and the Maldives. The Swedish Rescue Services Agency has, for example, sent personnel on behalf of the UN to Sri Lanka and has also sent a freight plane with tents and blankets. In addition, the Agency is planning a field

coordination office for the UN in Aceh province in Indonesia. The Swedish Red Cross is preparing relief work in these countries, including the provision of water for hospitals in Sri Lanka. Aid is also being channelled through organisations like the Church of Sweden/Church of Sweden Aid, Diakonia, the Swedish Section of the IOGT, PMU InterLife and the Swedish Mission Council.

Today it also became known that UN Secretary-General Kofi Annan has appointed Margareta Wahlström, a Swedish national, as the special coordinator for UN relief work in the crisis-hit area.

Additional air transport from Thailand

On Thursday the Swedish Civil Aviation Administration will be assisting the Ministry for Foreign Affairs in sending two medical transport aircraft to Thailand. SAS is providing the aircraft and Västerbotten County Council is responsible for the medical services. Each aircraft has 35 seats and space for 24 stretchers. Doctors and other medical staff will be on board the aircraft. The two aircraft are MD80s and will take off from Stockholm Arlanda for Phuket.

Germany has made an offer to Sweden to use any spare capacity to bring home Swedish citizens on board two medically-equipped German Airbus aircraft.

Today the Ministry for Foreign Affairs, together with representatives of the Danish and Norwegian foreign ministries, has reached agreement with SAS on the transport home from Thailand of the respective countries' citizens. These air transports will be able to accommodate a total of 2000-2300 people and will be undertaken during the period 30 December - 1 January. The first three aircraft are already on their way.

The agreement with SAS also includes further flights using the aircraft that have been reserved. Initially these are three Boeing 737s which will be making six flights from Bangkok to airports in Scandinavia. Each such flight can take 100 passengers. Thai shuttle flights will be used for transport from Phuket. Five Airbuses are being used in the current arrangement in addition to the 737s already mentioned. Four of these can accommodate 262 passengers. The fifth aircraft is equipped with 130 seats and space for 15-20 stretchers.

We can now begin work on future defence

Today the Riksdag has decided on the focus of defence policy for the coming years by approving the Government Bill Our future defence the direction of defence policy 2005 2007.

- I am pleased and relieved that the Riksdag was able today to take the decision on the future of our defence. It will now be possible to continue the important transition process from an invasion defence to an operational defence, an operational defence with a clear international profile, comments Minister for Defence, Leni Björklund.
- The defence that we are now building up is a high technology, mobile operational defence, able to respond to the current threat picture. This means that it can also be used in international crisis management and deployed wherever and whenever it is needed.

The point of departure for the defence reform is the positive security situation for Sweden. We do not, at present, see any potential military threat from other states, directed at Sweden. However, while potential military threats are declining, international terrorism and serious crime are on the increase. The money now released from defence will make it possible to strengthen the police and legal system so as to intensify the fight against terrorism and other crime.

The Government has appointed an inquiry to clarify how the defence forces can help deal with terrorist threats and large-scale terrorism. This inquiry will present its proposals on 31 August 2005.

The new main task of the Swedish Armed Forces is to create the capacity to engage in armed conflicts. This must be achieved from two time perspectives: present needs and those of the next ten years. The dimensions of our current preparedness are primarily international operations and the need to secure our territorial integrity. In the long-term perspective, it will be important to maintain and develop basic defence skills so as to be able to protect this country, should the security situation deteriorate.

In the current security situation there is no need to train as many soldiers and this is why we are now reducing the number of training platforms. Downscaling of units, equipment and personnel is necessary to make modernisation and development possible. Around ten towns will therefore be affected by closures and moves. An estimated 3 000 officers and 2 500 civilian employees will be made redundant.

Readjustment work will be started for the regions concerned. This process will be undertaken at national, regional and local levels to increase the competitiveness of these towns and regions. The Government will take a particular responsibility for the towns in which the labour market is most dependent on the Armed Forces and where the task of adjustment will therefore be especially important.

Sweden to give further support to peace efforts in Liberia

The Government Offices have decided to contribute a further SEK 10 million (1,1 million Euro) to a programme for the disarmament, demobilisation, rehabilitation and reintegration (DDRR) of ex-combatants in Liberia.

The contribution will be channelled via the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP), which is administering a donor fund for the programme. Sweden has previously contributed SEK 14 million (1,55 million Euro) to the Fund.

The DDRR programme is part of the peace agreement reached by the conflicting parties in Liberia in August 2003 after many years of civil war. The part of the programme connected with the disarmament of 100 000 soldiers is now complete. A large number of them are minors. The next stage in the process is the repatriation and education of these people.

"A well-implemented DDRR programme is of great importance for the peace process in Liberia and for the security of the whole region. It is essential that the people who have been disarmed now have the chance to readjust to civilian life. Particular attention should be paid to the returning child soldiers," says Minister for International Development Cooperation Carin Jämtin.

Sweden is participating with a mechanised rifle company of more than 230 troops in the UN peace support mission, UNMIL (the United Nations Mission in Liberia), and is supporting humanitarian measures and the reconstruction of the country by contributing some SEK 88 million (9,8 million Euro) during 2004. Sweden is also participating actively in the political and diplomatic peace efforts in Liberia and the countries in its vicinity. One of the ways it contributes is through State Secretary for Foreign Affairs Hans Dahlgren's role as the EU Presidency's Special Representative in the Mano River Union countries (Liberia, Sierra Leone and Guinea).

Minister for Industry and Trade and Minister for the Environment take initiative for simplified global vehicle rules

Today Minister for Industry and Trade Thomas Östros and Minister for the Environment Lena Sommestad are to send a letter to the EU Commissioner, Günter Verheugen, in which they urge him to take an initiative as soon as possible to introduce common rules for emissions from heavy vehicles in the EU and the USA. It is hoped that identical legislation can be achieved in these countries by 2012 at the latest.

At present, the USA and Europe employ different methods for testing heavy vehicle motors, which means that the technical requirements differ. The result is that vehicle manufacturers are obliged to conduct repeated tests and certifications so as to comply with the requirements of the importing country.

This often becomes a time-consuming aspect of companies development work, which could be avoided through common rules and testing methods.

In their letter to Verheugen, Thomas Östros and Lena Sommestad state that there are great advantages in enabling the European and US vehicle industries to compete on the same terms. The ministers point, for example, to the fact that harmonisation would free resources for vehicle manufacturers, which could then be used for more constructive and innovative ideas.

To realise these important aims, forceful political action is needed at a high level, write Östros and Sommestad in their letter, urging the Commission to take action to realise the full potential of the European and US vehicle industries.

The Swedish ministers also point to the advantage of the USA and Europe helping to develop global technical rules in the area, work that is being undertaken within the framework of the UN Economic Commission for Europe.

Minister for International Development Cooperation Carin Jämtin is scheduled to visit South Africa on 6-8 December for talks with South Africa's Minister of Finance, Trevor Manuel, and Deputy Minister of Foreign Affairs Azziz Pahad. Ms Jämtin will also be launching the new country strategy for cooperation between Sweden and South Africa. This strategy will mark a shift in cooperation between the two countries from traditional development assistance to a broader form of cooperation based on mutual interests and joint financing.

Ms Jämtin will then visit Ethiopia on 9-10 December where she will be meeting with Prime Minister Meles Zenawi and Foreign Minister Seyoum Mesfin to discuss, inter alia, the border dispute between Ethiopia and Eritrea. Ms Jämtin will also hold talks on Swedish development cooperation with Ethiopia and visit a project for street-children supported by Swedish Save the Children. In connection with this visit, Carin Jämtin will sign an investment protection agreement between Sweden and Ethiopia.

The visit to Addis Ababa also has a regional dimension in the form of meetings with the Chairman of the Commission of the African Union Alpha Oumar Konaré and Executive Secretary of the United Nations Economic Commission for Africa K.Y. Amoako.

Minister for Foreign Affairs Laila Freivalds comments on the report from the UN High-Level Panel

Yesterday the High-Level Panel on Threats, Challenges and Change formally presented its report to Secretary-General Kofi Annan. The report constitutes a basis for continued discussions, to be held until the summit next September, on how the UN can meet present and future threats and challenges.

"In all essentials, this report comes up to our expectations. The report provides a good basis for creating international consensus on collective security. Today's potential threats include poverty, HIV/AIDS and environmental threats as well as terrorism and weapons of mass destruction. These threats are interlinked and borderless. To meet them, we need a strong United Nations," was Minister for Foreign Affairs Laila Freivalds initial comment.

"The report contains forward-looking proposals in such areas as the collective security system, the use of violence, terrorism, the obligation to protect civilians, disarmament and non-proliferation of weapons of mass destruction. The proposals presented on the reasons for reforming the UN are also generally far-reaching and well-founded."

"Where Sweden is concerned, it will be one of our priorities to actively promote broad-based support for the Secretary-General in his reform efforts," says the Minister for Foreign Affairs.

"Kofi Annan has shown both clarity of vision and courage in his efforts to reform the organisation. The international community must take advantage of this opportunity to change, brought about on his initiative. Sweden will continue to be active in various forums, both in the EU and the UN and in other ways, to support these efforts and help move the process towards a decision during the Summit."

The High-Level Panel's report and the report on the Millennium Development Goals will constitute the basis of the Secretary-General's March report in the run-up to the Summit in September, which will be devoted to the five-year follow-up of the Millennium declaration and to discussions of the reform proposals.

Increased compensation for health care of asylum-seekers

The Government decided today to increase compensation to the county councils for health care of asylum-seekers. The increase will come into force on 1 January 2005.

"The costs of health care for asylum-seekers in certain age groups have increased. The decision taken today means that the state is compensating the county councils for this. Compensation to county councils is being increased by up to 36 per cent, depending on the age of the people seeking care," says Minister for Migration and Asylum Policy Barbro Holmberg.

Under the agreement child psychiatric treatment will now also include care for parents when this is necessary for the health of the children.

Another new point in the agreement is that all new arrivals must be offered medical examinations or health interviews as soon as they have obtained housing in the area of the county council and have been registered by the Swedish Migration Board.

Ambassador Bedjaoui entered his country's foreign service in 1978, and has specialised in marine law and territorial border issues. Recent posts have included that of Deputy Head of the Algerian Embassy in Moscow and Head of the Foreign Ministry's Department for Legal Affairs.

Turkey's newly appointed Ambassador Necip Egüz was born in 1951 and holds a degree from the Middle East Technical University. He is a career diplomat and in recent years has been Counsellor at Turkey's mission to the international organisations in Geneva and Head of the Foreign Ministry's Department for the Council of Europe and Human Rights. His most recent appointment was as Deputy Head of the Foreign Ministry's Department for Cyprus Issues.

Croatia's newly appointed Ambassador Svjetlan Berkovic was born in 1952. He holds a doctors degree in international law from the University of Zagreb. In connection with his service at the former Yugoslavia's consulate in Malmö in the mid-1980s, he studied law at licentiate level at Lund University. State Secretaries to Tanzania to discuss trade and development

The State Secretaries responsible for trade and international development cooperation respectively, Lars-Olof Lindgren and Annika Söder, will participate in a high-level meeting in Dar es Salaam, Tanzania, on 24-25 November.

The purpose of the meeting is to strengthen dialogue on trade and development between the Nordic countries and a number of African countries. The African countries covered by the Initiative are: Benin, Botswana, Burkina Faso, Egypt, Ethiopia, Ghana, Kenya, Malawi, Mali, Mauritius, Morocco, Mozambique, Namibia, Niger, Nigeria, Senegal, South Africa, Tanzania, Uganda and Zambia.

Sweden pushes for civilian rapid reaction units in EU

At todays meeting of the European Council, Minister for Foreign Affairs Laila Freivalds launched a proposal for the EU to establish civilian rapid reaction units in the context of the EUs Security and Defence Policy. The proposal was given a positive reception.

The idea of civilian rapid reaction units is that the EUs civilian crisis management capacity should have the same level of ambition as its military rapid reaction forces, i.e. it should be possible in certain situations to deploy units 5-10 days after a decision approving deployment.

Deploying civilian as well as military rapid reaction forces would strengthen the EUs capacity to act in crises. To give an example, let me mention our military operation in Congo last year. The operation was a success, but it could have made an even greater impact if it had also included a civilian crisis management component. We must learn from this example, says Minister for Foreign Affairs Laila Freivalds.

A capacity to deploy civilian rapid reaction forces would be a good supplement to the EUs ability to manage crises and solve conflicts, Ms Freivalds emphasises.

Civilian rapid reaction units have several potential uses. Apart from supplementing military rapid reaction forces with civilian instruments in a conflict zone, they could also be used as a preventive instrument in conflicts where the EU wants to establish a presence quickly so as to stabilise the situation. An additional area of use is to deploy civilian rapid reaction units in preparation for larger-scale civilian actions.

EU civilian crisis management is part of the common EU Security and Defence Policy (ESDP), which was established at the meeting of the European Council in Cologne in 1999. At present the EU has three ongoing civilian crisis management operations, two police operations in Bosnia and Macedonia and a mission in support of the justice system in Georgia. In addition, planning is under way for possible civilian missions in the Democratic Republic of the Congo and Iraq.

At the Civilian Capabilities Conference held by EU foreign ministers in connection with the Council meeting today, Sweden has announced its preparedness to contribute personnel to EU operations, which may also be offered to the United Nations for its missions. Sweden has announced the availability of 160 police officers, 48 specialists in the rule of law, 24 in civil administration and 202 in rescue services. Sweden has also volunteered 60 advisers to the field offices of EU special representatives and 45 civilian observers. The last two categories are new in EU civilian crisis management.

All set for Swedish led EU Battle Group

At the Council of Defence Ministers in Brussels today, Sweden and Finland declared the intention, together with Norway, to establish an EU Battle group. Sweden will assume responsibility as Framework Nation.

- The Nordic countries have a long-standing tradition of working together in crisis management operations, says Minister for Defence Leni Björklund. We are building on this established relationship, benefiting from existing consultation arrangements and our extensive military cooperation.
- In this context it is necessary to emphasize the importance of developing methods and procedures that can bring civilian and military processes closer together at all levels. By doing so I believe that the European Union will ensure coherent and effectively coordinated crisis management operations. In this work we should also draw on the experiences of the UN in this field.

Ministers of Defence declared at the Military Capability Commitment Conference their intention to commit up to thirteen Battle groups encompassing both the period of initial operational capability, 2005-06, and full operational capability from 2007 and onwards.

A decision on Swedish contributions will be taken by the Parliament in its Defence Resolution in December this year. The intention is to offer the Swedish Framework Nation-led Battle Group for a stand-by period during the first six months of 2008.

Carin Jämtin to participate in meeting of EU Ministers for International Development Cooperation

The EU Ministers for International Development Cooperation will meet in Brussels on 23 November to discuss EU measures to achieve the UN Millennium Development Goals of halving world poverty. The Council meeting will include discussions on the annual report of EU development assistance in 2003. The issue of how well the EU is living up to the commitments made at the International Conference on Population and Development in Cairo in 1994 will also be raised at the Council meeting.

"The EU is responsible for more than half of the world's development assistance and must therefore display strong leadership in the fight against poverty. Much more money is needed to combat poverty. At the same time, we must become more efficient in development assistance and not act in a contradictory manner towards the developing countries. It is neither effective nor consistent to provide development assistance with one hand whilst imposing tariffs and granting subsidies that obstruct developing countries' export opportunities with the other," says Minister for International Development Cooperation Carin Jämtin.

"In poor countries, the primary cause of death for girls between the ages of 15 and 19 is the complications they suffer during pregnancy. This is a cruel indication of how differently people's lives are valued. At the Council meeting, Sweden will actively pursue the issue of sexual and reproductive rights. Women's rights also play a key role in combating poverty and it is important, therefore, that the EU expresses support for the Cairo Agenda and includes these issues in its Millennium Development Goal Report," says Ms Jämtin.

"In order to reduce poverty effectively, a cohesive policy is needed in which trade, research, and development assistance policies, for example, mutually reinforce each other in the fight against the HIV/AIDS epidemic. We will therefore be asking the Commission to draw up a new action plan for the fight against HIV/AIDS, malaria and tuberculosis by April 2005," says Ms Jämtin.

Sweden to open a new Consulate-General in Houston

The Government has decided to establish a Consulate-General in Houston, Texas. This is part of the Government's export promotion campaign and the Consulate-General's main task will be to promote trade, investment and other exchanges between Sweden and the USA.

"The USA is already Sweden's largest export market and it is steadily growing. This is why we are investing in yet another presence in one of the main growth regions in the USA," says Minister for Industry and Trade Thomas Östros.

"The south of the USA is also a region with a strong university and research base, which opens the way for greater exchange in other areas as well. Particularly with regard to IT, telecom and biotechnology, we have much to gain from closer cooperation with the region."

The Consulate-General in Houston will be Sweden's third. Sweden already has Consulates-General in Los Angeles and New York. Sweden is also represented via its Embassy in Washington, the Permanent Mission of Sweden to the United Nations in New York and thirty honorary consulates in the country.

The honorary consulate in Detroit was recently upgraded to an honorary Consulate-General, a step that is occasionally taken in regions that are particularly significant for Swedish interests. This was

also part of the investment in the US market and particularly the vehicle industry that is so important to Sweden.

Last year, Swedish exports to the USA amounted to over USD 12 billion, which was an increase of 11 per cent from the previous year. At the same time, imports amounted to just over USD 3 billion. US companies are the largest international investors in Sweden, with some USD 30 billion in assets and 110.000 employees. Swedish companies have invested approximately the same amount in the USA and have more than 230.000 employees. Particularly important sectors are the car and manufacturing industries, telecommunications and pharmaceutical products.

Sweden's Convergence Programme Update Presented

Sweden has today submitted an update of the convergence programme to the European Commission and to the Council.

The convergence programme shows that Sweden's economy is on a positive track. GDP is expected to increase by 3.5 per cent in 2004 and 3.0 per cent in 2005. Net lending in the public sector is estimated at 0.7 per cent of GDP in 2004 and 0.6 per cent in 2005. Consolidated gross debt in the public sector, the so-called Maastricht debt, is expected to decline to 50.5 per cent of GDP in 2005.

Under the Stability and Growth Pact, Member States participating in the monetary union will prepare stability programmes. Member States that are not participating will prepare convergence programmes. The aim of the programmes is to strengthen surveillance of the public finances. Members have undertaken to attain budget objectives close to balance or in surplus in the consolidated public sector. Each country may define its precise national budget objectives.

The update of Sweden's convergence programme is based on the forecasts, estimates and proposals in the Budget Bill of 2005. Economic objectives remain unchanged. This means that public finances shall show a surplus of 2 per cent of GDP on average over the business cycle.

The Government also reports on its measures to improve efficiency in the economy. Measures in labour market policy, education and medical care and ill health are emphasised. The long-term impact of demographic changes on the public finances is also highlighted.

The Budget Bill that has been the basis for the update of Sweden's programme is based on an

agreement between the Social Democratic Government, the Left Party and the Green Party.

Liberia's Head of Government to visit Sweden

The Chairman of Liberia's national interim government, Gyude Bryant, is scheduled to visit Sweden on 19-22 November. During his visit, Bryant will be holding talks with representatives of the Swedish Government on such subjects as development in Liberia and Swedish support to the peace process in the country.

"I welcome Gyude Bryants visit to Sweden. Bryant has been given the important task of leading Liberia into free and fair elections in November 2005. With the peace agreement of 2003 and the broad UN mandate supporting its implementation, Liberia has been given a unique chance to break the vicious circle of violence and misrule that has long existed in the country", says Minister for Foreign Affairs Laila Freivalds.

"A peaceful development in Liberia is vital to the stability of the whole of West Africa. To achieve this, the active support and commitment of the international community is needed."

In 2003, the conflicting parties in Liberia signed a peace agreement that put an end to the civil war that had gone on in the country for many years and that resulted in enormous streams of refugees and extensive human suffering. A UN mission (UNMIL) of 15 000 forces was established to support the implementation of the agreement.

Sweden contributes with a mechanised infantry company of 235 persons to UNMIL and has allocated a total of SEK 65 million to support humanitarian initiatives and reconstruction of the country during 2004. Sweden also takes an active part in political and diplomatic efforts to support peace in Liberia and the countries in its vicinity. One of the ways it contributes is through State Secretary for Foreign Affairs Hans Dahlgren's role as the EU Presidency's Special Representative in the Mano River Union countries (Liberia, Sierra Leone and Guinea).

Swedish Embassy in Côte d'Ivoire evacuated

The remaining staff at the Swedish Embassy in Côte d'Ivoire left the country on Monday evening because of the danger of new disturbances. They travelled out on the Swedish Hercules aircraft that was sent to help with the evacuation of Swedish and foreign citizens following a Government decision. The Swedes were flown to Accra in Ghana. The Swedish Embassy in Abidjan will be closed until further notice.

The more than fifteen Swedes still in Côte d'Ivoire have previously been offered the possibility of evacuation. Most of them have expressed a wish to leave the country later in the week.

The use of the Hercules aircraft is being financed by the Ministry for Foreign Affairs. The aircraft, which comes from the F7 wing in Såtenäs, will make a number of flights in the region over the next few days and is expected to return to Sweden at the weekend. The aircraft is part of an operation being led by France.

In the past week some 6.000 foreign citizens have been evacuated as a result of the disturbances in the country and the sharp deterioration of the security situation. At the end of last week and during the weekend around ten Swedish citizens were evacuated using aircraft made available by other EU countries.

Samantha Power received the 2003 Pulitzer Prize for her book "A Problem from Hell", an examination of the history of genocide and a scathing description of the world's - and especially the USA's - inability or unwillingness to intervene in time. Power is currently a lecturer at the Kennedy School of Government at Harvard University, but has previously worked as a reporter for the Economist and the Boston Globe in the Balkans and in Africa.

Guidelines for Central Government Debt Management in 2005

The Government has decided on the guidelines for the management of the central government debt. The guidelines have as an aim to continue reducing the percentage of foreign currency in the central government debt. In the long term, the percentage of foreign currency debt will be lowered to about 15 per cent. Therefore, the amortisation of the foreign currency debt will continue to be SEK 25 billion a year. The percentage of inflation-linked bonds in the central government debt will increase in the long term and in time it will be 20 to 25 per cent. The benchmark for the average maturity in the total nominal krona debt and foreign currency debt is to be 2.5 years.

This years decision covers 2005 to 2007.

The Swedish National Debt Office may deviate from the stated amortisation rate for the foreign currency debt by SEK ± 15 billion.

Borrowing in inflation-linked bonds is to be weighed against the growth in demand for these bonds as well as the costs and risks of other borrowing.

In addition to krona borrowing in inflation-linked instruments and borrowing in foreign currencies, the central government borrowing requirement is to be met by nominal loans in kronor, which are traditionally the Governments most important source of financing.

The average maturity in the nominal krona debt and the foreign currency debt will be 2.5 years, which is a reduction of 0.2 years since last years guidelines. With the slightly lower average maturity, the expected cost is estimated to decrease without an undesirable increase in the aggregate risk level. The Debt Office may deviate from the benchmark by ± 0.3 years.

Ministry for Foreign Affairs inquiry proposes an increase in research and analysis

In a time of new opportunities, challenges and threats, Sweden needs to strengthen its research and analysis capacity in the field of foreign policy. The report "Thinking about the world" (Ds 2004:46), submitted to Minister for Foreign Affairs Laila Freivalds on Wednesday, presents proposals for how to achieve this. The report points to the need for new institutes and think-tank institutions and greater exchange between academia and the Government Offices.

The report, written by Ambassador Bengt Säve-Söderbergh and Senior Adviser Monica Andersson, presents a number of proposals for ways in which research and analysis capacity can be strengthened.

- Initiatives should be taken to set up policy-forming institutes and think-tank institutions in foreign and security policy. In the EU too, Sweden should advance the idea of establishing research institutes that develop common foreign policy.
- Contacts between the academic world and the Government Offices should be improved through exchange programmes and an annual Researchers Forum.
- Research and analysis capacity on the new Swedish policy for global development should be strengthened.
- Cooperation at the Government Offices should increase to improve its ability to formulate needs for research and analysis on todays security policy.

In its work, the inquiry has had the following points of departure:

- The global upheavals of recent decades have entailed changed conditions for Swedish foreign and security policy.

- We produce too few relevant, forward-looking policy intelligence and policy-oriented studies in Sweden. What we do produce is often obscure for decision-makers, opinion formers and other interested parties. It is far too narrow in content and often difficult to penetrate/unfamiliar or, for reasons of format, is inaccessible to decision-makers and a wider circle of stakeholders.
- The gap between the academic environment and the practical world is too great. On the one hand, there are often no systems in place for dialogue about or transmission of the material, and on the other, existing opportunities for exchange are not fully exploited.
- The culture among central government agencies is marked by too much compartmentalisation.
- There is far too limited circulation of people between the various working environments. This has a negative effect on creativity and hence on the ability to produce relevant and sufficient material.
- A change is needed and is possible. It will take time and will require patience.

Swedish support to African Union initiative in Darfur

Sweden makes a further contribution of SEK 5.7 million to African Union (AU) efforts for peace and security in the Darfur region of western Sudan.

Through this support, Sweden will contribute to the establishment of an integrated civil-military function, whose role will be to support and plan for the various efforts in the region. Support will also be given to the AU-led political negotiations in Abuja, Nigeria, where, on behalf of the EU, Swedish Ambassador Sten Rylander is assisting the African Union and participating in the mediation team.

"In view of the continuing critical situation in Darfur, Sweden welcomes the African Union's decision to expand the mission. The Swedish contribution is an important part of the international community's support to continued peace efforts and negotiations", comments Minister for Foreign Affairs Laila Freivalds.

Since May 2004, the African Union has been monitoring the ceasefire between the Sudanese government and the two rebel groups, the Sudan Liberation Movement/Army (SLM/A) and the Justice and Equality Movement (JEM) in Darfur. On 20 October the Peace and Security Council of

the African Union took a decision to expand the current observer mission, AMIS. The mission will consist of 3320 persons, including 450 observers and 815 civilian police officers.

Sweden already contributes with one observer to the AU mission in Darfur and two police officers and three military observers to the Joint Military Commission/Joint Monitoring Mission (JMC/JMM), which monitors the local ceasefire in the Nuba mountains of southern Sudan.

Government proposes abolishing housing allowances for asylum seekers making their own housing arrangements

The Government is to present today a bill to the Riksdag on housing allowances for asylum seekers. The bill proposes abolishing housing allowances for asylum seekers who choose to make their own housing arrangements rather than live in refugee residential centres provided by the Swedish Migration Board. Under the proposal, the change will enter into force on 1 March 2005.

"We have ten years experience of asylum seekers making their own housing arrangements. We have seen that this leads to overcrowding and social problems for many asylum seekers," says Minister for Migration and Asylum Policy Barbro Holmberg.

"It is not reasonable to actively encourage asylum seekers to choose their own housing solutions when we can see that this has serious consequences," says Ms Holmberg.

The monthly housing allowance today is SEK 350 for individuals and SEK 850 for families. Approximately half of all asylum seekers in Sweden are at present living in housing they themselves have chosen. Most of them are in major-city suburbs.

Consultations of the Member States of the Neutral Nations Supervisory Commission (NNSC) in Korea

Representatives of Poland, Sweden and Switzerland, the three Member States of the Neutral Nations Supervisory Commission (NNSC) in Korea, met in Warsaw on 25-26 October 2004 for their annual consultations.

The NNSC Member States reaffirmed their governments commitment to peace and stability on the Korean Peninsula and encouraged the continuation of the inter-Korean dialogue.

The NNSC was established 50 years ago through the Armistice Agreement of 27 July 1953. Stressing that the 1953 Armistice Agreement remains the only legal instrument for the avoidance of hostilities on the Korean Peninsula as long as it is not superseded by a comprehensive peace treaty, the Member States of the NNSC underlined the necessity that its implementing mechanisms continue to function and to provide channels of communication for the settlement of divergences through negotiations.

While reiterating their commitment to continuing their active participation in the NNSC at the service of the Armistice, Poland, Sweden and Switzerland affirmed their readiness to contribute to the efforts towards peace on the Korean Peninsula, getting the most out of the rich experience gathered in more than 50 years of uninterrupted presence in the NNSC, either by acting together or in association with other partners, or by operating individually depending on circumstances, in any framework that will be determined in the future.

The situation on the Korean Peninsula remains a matter of deep concern to the international community, as numerous problems causing regional tensions continue to obstruct efforts aimed at

the conclusion of a definitive peace arrangement. The representatives of the Member States of the NNSC expressed their strong support for all genuine efforts aimed at achieving a negotiated and sustainable solution that addresses the concerns of all parties involved. In this spirit, they welcomed the third round of the Six-Party Talks, which took place in Beijing on June 23-26 this year, as a significant contribution to easing tensions on the Peninsula. Poland, Sweden and Switzerland share the opinion that the continuation of the Six-Party process is necessary for improving the situation on the Peninsula.

The NNSC Member States noted that the situation on the Korean Peninsula continues to be characterised by the issue of denuclearization on the one hand, and the severe humanitarian situation in the DPRK, and the resulting need for aid, on the other. With reference to denuclearization, the DPRK is strongly encouraged by the participant States to revert to a total freeze of activities at its nuclear facilities, to return to full compliance with the NPT and to readmit IAEA inspectors. The Parties agreed on looking into the possibility of expanding assistance measures in favour of the DPRK, inter alia in the form of technical assistance. It was noted that progress in the process of denuclearization would enhance the possibilities of more substantial development co-operation with the DPRK.

Improved conditions for animal transports are necessary

- It is my strong belief that to improve conditions for the animals we need to have adequate rules with clear requirements regarding vehicles, journey times, space, fodder and water. Have sufficient rules on the training of those handling animals in transport and have rules that guarantee effective and efficient supervision of compliance.

Ann-Christin Nykvist Minister of Agriculture, Food and Consumer affairs said at a seminar on animal transports in Stockholm today.

- I can see no reason to transport animals long distances to slaughter. Animals should be slaughtered close to the farms and the meat transported in refrigerated vehicles.
- Last April the ministers of agriculture agreed on the need to enhance education and controls, but unfortunately could not agree on how to improve rules concerning maximum journey times, resting periods and allocated space for the animals being transported.
- But this cannot mean that we should wait before improving the rules on which there is agreement. We must as soon as possible agree on improved rules at EU level on mandatory controls of animal transport.
- We also have to agree on rules for compulsory training of drivers transporting the animals and of the accompanying animal keepers. We are also in need of clear and uniform systems in order to ensure compliance with the rules.

- This first step must then be followed by continued and intensified work to prevent unnecessary long transport distances and to enhance the rules on journey times, resting periods and rules governing the space allocated in vehicles.
- It is obvious that consumers are beginning to consider animal welfare as a part of what they consider to be good quality food. Therefore the consumers hold, to a great extent the key to the future.

Swedens National Report on Economic Reform Is Submitted to the EU

"The EU must give the work to promote growth and employment higher priority. Sweden is working towards this end with its ongoing effort to reform the product and capital markets and to improve competitiveness in the economy", says Minister for Finance Bosse Ringholm in connection with the presentation of the Swedish Report on Economic Reforms.

Sweden submitted today its National Report on Economic Reform of the Product and Capital Markets, which is part of the Cardiff Process, to the Economic Policy Committee in the EU.

Since work with the Cardiff Process began in 1997, economic development in Sweden has been very favourable, with growth averaging 2.8 per cent. Growth in the EU as a whole has averaged 1.8 per cent during the same period.

"The EU countries have to do their homework. In order to achieve the goals of the Lisbon Strategy and make the EU into the worlds most dynamic and competitive knowledge-based economy, EU Member States must set higher goals and the reform efforts must continue", says Bosse Ringholm.

"The Government is giving priority to work on economic reform of the product and capital markets in order to increase growth and employment. Unfortunately price levels in Sweden are still too high and there is insufficient competition. Therefore there needs to be more competition" Bosse Ringholm concludes.

The report includes measures to increase competition in Sweden, strengthen consumer protection, and improve efficiency in the public sector. It also includes an account of competitiveness and price developments in certain markets.

Swedish support to international operation in southern Sudan

Sweden will make an additional contribution of over SEK 1 million to the international monitoring operation in the Nuba Mountains, Joint Military Commission/Joint Monitoring Mission. Sweden is already taking part by providing five of a total of 43 international observers.

The operation plays an important role in improving the security situation for the inhabitants of the Nuba Mountains. Through this decision, Sweden now provides additional sought-after assistance to help keep the operation running, comments Laila Freivalds, Minister for Foreign Affairs.

The Joint Military Commission/Joint Monitoring Mission (JMC/JMM) monitors and helps with the implementation of the local ceasefire between the rebel movement SPLA and the Sudanese government in the Nuba Mountains in southern Sudan. The operation also provides support to the humanitarian and other international actors in place in the region, and also to the African Unions (AU) monitoring mission in Darfur. The AU has also modelled the planning and implementation of their operation in Darfur in part on the JMC/JMM.

The operation, which has been functioning since April 2002, currently consists of 43 international observers and slightly fewer participants from both parties. The personnel provided by Sweden consist of three military observers and two civilian police officers.

Swedish election observers to Mozambique

The Government decided today to send election observers to Mozambique ahead of the presidential and parliamentary elections that will take place on 1-2 December.

The Swedish International Development Cooperation Agency (Sida) has been instructed to recruit and train a maximum of two long-term and four short-term observers to monitor the elections. The Swedish observers will be members of the joint EU election observation team.

- It is of utmost importance that the elections in Mozambique are conducted democratically. I mentioned this in a meeting earlier this week with presidential candidate Guebuza of the government party Frelimo. By sending election observers, Sweden can contribute to the development of a functioning electoral system in the country and strengthen democracy in Mozambique, says Minister for International Development Cooperation Carin Jämtin.

On 1-2 December, Mozambique will be holding its third democratic elections since independence in 1975. One important purpose of international observers is to reduce the risk of irregularities and manipulation in connection with the elections.

Sweden has long-standing bilateral development cooperation with Mozambique, including dialogue on issues of human rights, democracy and good governance.

Minister for International Development Cooperation Carin Jämtin to attend World Bank and IMF Annual Meeting in Washington

Minister for International Development Cooperation Carin Jämtin is to attend the Annual Meeting of the World Bank and the International Monetary Fund (IMF) in Washington D.C., 1-3 October. One of the main issues at the meeting will be how poor and rich countries in cooperation with multilateral organisations can achieve the UN Millennium Development Goals.

The meeting will also include discussions on new sources of financing and the link between development assistance initiatives and the strategies of recipient countries. The poorest countries' influence on the institutions will also be discussed along with ways of making their debts more manageable.

Among Sweden's main messages at the meeting will be the effective use of development assistance and the need for coordinating initiatives between countries and institutions. Another Swedish priority is the debt issue, which should take into account the specific conditions of each individual country.

- To make cooperation more efficient, the World Bank and the IMF:s initiatives should be taken in consultation with the country in question. It is important that decision-makers and citizens in the countries concerned have the opportunity to participate and exert influence. The sustainability of reforms that are implemented without the support of the population can and should be questioned, says Carin Jämtin.

In connection with the Annual Meeting, Ms. Jämtin will also be meeting with representatives of the World Bank, the United States Agency for International Development (USAID) and from Brazil, Jordan, Canada, the Netherlands, Great Britain and the Nordic countries.

The World Bank, the largest single source of development assistance, has undergone major changes in recent years and today poverty reduction is the overarching objective of its activities. Sweden considers it vital that the World Bank's reform efforts continue and that their impact on its activities increases.

Sweden-Norway 1905-2005; one hundred years since the dissolution of the union

The year 2005 is the centenary of the dissolution of the union between Sweden and Norway. In Norway this will be highlighted with various events throughout the year. The Swedish Government has today allocated SEK 2.6 million for the preparation of a number of cultural and informative activities within the framework of the Norwegian programme. Several of these will be undertaken by the Swedish Institute in cooperation with the Swedish cultural centre Voksenåsen in Oslo.

The overall programme for the centenary anniversary includes the inauguration of the new Svinesund Bridge on 10 June 2005, which will take place in the presence of both royal couples. The ceremony is also the start of an official state visit by the Swedish royal couple in Norway. A return visit on the part of Norway will take place in September 2005.

Two large-scale, joint historical exhibitions will also be held; "Norrmän och svenskar, 1814-1905"

(Norwegians and Swedes) and "Brödrafolkens väl" (The Welfare of the Brother Peoples). The exhibitions will first be shown in Norway and subsequently at the Nordiska Museet and the Royal Armoury in late autumn 2005. During the year each country will also issue special postage stamps on the theme of "Neighbours in Development".

Two conferences will be organised in Sweden on the theme of peaceful conflict resolution and the growth of democracy in Sweden and Norway in the 20th century.

In 2005, the Swedish and Norwegian business promotion agencies, the Swedish Business Development Agency (NUTEK) and Innovasjon Norge, also plan to establish a joint five-year programme for Swedish-Norwegian business cooperation. The programme, comprising several projects, aims at increasing growth in both countries.

The Swedish Riksdag and Norwegian Storting will hold a joint seminar on "State and Secession" and open an exhibition on the dissolution of the union.

The Government proposes abolishing housing allowances for asylum seekers

The Government today submitted a proposal to the Council on Legislation regarding the abolition of the special housing allowances for asylum seekers who choose to make their own living arrangements.

This housing allowance was introduced as a special financial incentive to encourage more asylum seekers to make their own housing arrangements outside the Swedish Migration Board's centres. An incentive of this sort is no longer necessary.

In addition, there have proved to be a number of negative consequences for those who have made their own housing arrangements and for the municipalities receiving asylum seekers.

"We have seen that when people make their own housing arrangements, it leads to overcrowding and that several families live in the same apartment. This in turn has led to problems for the families in question and for the host family. The result is that many families are constantly moving and the children are forced to change schools, sometimes repeatedly," says Barbro Holmberg, Minister for Migration and Asylum Policy.

"It is difficult for municipalities to come to terms with the problems associated with people making their own housing arrangements. For example, it is unclear how many people to expect, which

makes planning their reception difficult, and at the same time it is difficult to inform asylum seekers about offers of medical examinations and schooling for the children," Barbro Holmberg continues.

"Abolishing the special financial incentives for people to make their own housing arrangements will not solve all the problems, but it can reduce the negative effects arising from it. We must continue our efforts to see what we can do to deal with the problems associated with people making their own housing arrangements," says Barbro Holmberg.

Under the proposal, the change will enter into force on 1 March 2005.

Foreign Minister Laila Freivalds to visit UN headquarters

On 21-24 September, Minister for Foreign Affairs Laila Freivalds will visit UN headquarters in New York for the opening of the general debate of the 59th Session of the General Assembly.

The Minister for Foreign Affairs will also have a number of bilateral talks and, along with other EU foreign ministers, will meet her Russian and US colleagues.

On the morning of Tuesday 21 September the Minister for Foreign Affairs will take part in a meeting of EU foreign ministers. In the afternoon there will be bilateral meetings and in the evening Prime Minister Göran Persson will deliver Swedens address in the general debate of the General Assembly.

On the morning of Wednesday 22 September there will be a meeting of Nordic foreign ministers. Later that morning, EU foreign ministers will meet US Secretary of State Colin Powell. After that Ms Freivalds will participate in a working lunch for women foreign ministers. During the rest of the day, there will be further bilateral meetings.

On the morning of Thursday 23 September EU foreign ministers will meet Russian Foreign Minister Sergey Lavrov. Afterwards the Minister for Foreign Affairs will attend a ceremony at which she will sign a ministerial declaration calling for the entry into force of the Comprehensive Nuclear-Test Ban Treaty.

The Minister for Foreign Affairs will also take part in a meeting on reform efforts in the UN, together with several of her colleagues.

The bilateral talks will include meetings with the foreign ministers of Jordan, Iran, Ukraine and the Democratic Republic of the Congo. The Minister for Foreign Affairs has also requested a meeting with her colleague from Eritrea to discuss the case of journalist Dawit Isaac.

Shorter waiting times and greater legal security

A very large number of asylum-seekers are waiting for a decision. To reduce waiting times, an additional SEK 20 million will therefore be provided to the Swedish Migration Board and an extra SEK 25 million to the Aliens Appeals Board. As more cases will be examined another SEK 60 million will be provided for public counsels and SEK 90 million for outward travel. Altogether the asylum process will receive an extra SEK 195 million.

Measures to shorten processing times and increase the clarity of asylum procedures are important. As a result of the long periods people stay in the country, many asylum seekers live under a great deal of pressure for an extended time, says Minister for Migration and Asylum Policy Barbro Holmberg.

The Aliens Appeals Board will be closed. A new system for appeals and procedures will take its place. An inquiry will be appointed to prepare and take measures towards the establishment of a new system for appeals and procedures. The necessary preparations at the Swedish Migration Board and the Aliens Appeals Board will be carried out in 2005. The aim is to implement the reform in 2006.

Reforming the asylum process is important. Many people whose asylum applications are rejected today feel that not all their reasons for seeking asylum have been taken into account and that they have not had a chance to present their case. The asylum process will therefore be changed to make it more open, Ms Holmberg emphasises.

The Aliens Appeals Board will receive an extra SEK 15 million for the current year. The number of asylum cases being decided is increasing, which requires both more public counsels and the execution of decisions. Appropriations in 2004 will therefore increase by SEK 75 million for public counsels and by SEK 40 million for outward travel.

The county councils and the state have signed a new agreement to cover the increasing costs that health and medical care for asylum seekers cause county councils. The agreement gives the county councils extra compensation of SEK 65 million in 2005 for health and medical care for asylum seekers. SEK 20 million will also be added to enable municipalities to conduct social assessments of unaccompanied minors.

Strong boost for export promotion

In the Budget Bill for 2005 the Government proposes an increase in resources for trade and investment promotion in 2005 and 2006. Export promotion will be augmented by SEK 75 million for 2005.

We want to consolidate and reinforce the position that Sweden, Swedish companies and Swedish expertise have established in markets and areas where Sweden is particularly able to compete, says Minister for Industry and Trade Leif Pagrotsky.

An increased presence and greater activity in dynamic and rapidly growing markets are an important element of Swedish growth policy. This applies both to the Baltic Sea area and new EU Member States and to more distant countries with great trade potential such as China, India and Brazil.

The new resources are for a number of areas including augmented export information, export development programmes, international marketing of selected industries and Swedish leading edge expertise in cooperation between public and private actors, as well as special trade promotion and trade policy initiatives.

Increased development assistance to fight poverty

Swedish development assistance will continue to grow. In 2005 development assistance will come to 0.882 per cent of GNI. The development assistance framework will grow by SEK 2.194 billion, which will bring it to a level of SEK 23.946 billion in 2005. Development assistance will be raised to one per cent of GNI in 2006.

"The needs are endless and the assistance we provide makes a real difference," says Minister for International Development Cooperation Carin Jämtin. "Things are moving in the right direction but it doesnt happen automatically. Political decisions, both in the rich world and in developing countries, are needed to make a fairer world possible."

"Next year's increase in development assistance means that we will be able to make concrete efforts in four major areas: HIV/AIDS, womens rights, conflict prevention and new action for human rights in working life in developing countries."

"From 2006 on, a billion kronor of the increased assistance will be used for a broad environmental programme in areas where Sweden can make valuable contributions. Socially, environmentally and economically sustainable global development will have positive effects both in developing countries and in Sweden."

The fight against communicable diseases

The Government will intensify its fight against HIV/AIDS. Support to UNAIDS will increase from SEK 100 million to SEK 150 million and support to the global fund against HIV/AIDS, malaria and TB and to other action against HIV/AIDS will also increase. A forceful new development assistance commitment will be made, focusing on research, treatment and prevention of diseases such as HIV/AIDS, measles, TB and malaria.

Gender equality and womens rights

Conservative forces are trying to undermine progress made in the gender equality area. Sweden will resist this tendency and will increase its support to the United Nations Population Fund (UNFPA) to enable it to continue its important work for womens reproductive and sexual health and rights. Support to UNFPA will increase from SEK 270 million to SEK 355 million. This will make Sweden the worlds second largest aid donor in this area.

Conflict prevention and common security

The link between development, peace and security is becoming increasingly obvious. Security from violence or threats of violence is a basic prerequisite for poverty reduction. Particular attention will be paid to underlying structures that give rise to armed conflicts. The resources allocated to civil missions, such as police and rescue personnel in connection with peacekeeping operations, will increase. Support for children affected by war and refugee situations will receive priority.

Human rights in working life

The right to work under reasonable conditions for reasonable pay is a basic premise of a successful fight against poverty. Yet a majority of the planets population are outside the formal labour market. For this reason, the Government is making a special commitment to formalisation of labour markets and human rights in working life.

To ensure that Swedish development cooperation is effective and efficient, a special agency will also be established to evaluate development assistance.

Sweden's Economy

Sweden's gross domestic product (GDP) is forecast to increase by 3.5 per cent in 2004 and 3.0 per cent in 2005. Of the 3.5 per cent GDP growth in 2004, 0.6 percentage points are a result of a higher number of working weekdays this year than last year. Open unemployment is expected to be 5.6 per cent this year before falling to 5.1 per cent next year. General government net lending is estimated to amount to 0.7 per cent of GDP this year and 0.6 per cent next year.

Developments in 20042005

The global economy has strengthened gradually in recent years. Investment has begun to recover after a number of very weak years thanks to low interest rates, much better corporate earnings and growing demand, not least from the rapidly growing Asian economies. Growth in the United States is forecast to slow somewhat next year, due in part to less expansionary monetary and fiscal policy. The economic upswing in the euro area has been weak, but growth will pick up this year and remain favourable next year. Oil prices are a source of uncertainty.

The composition of international demand favours Swedish exports, and competitiveness is good. Exports of telecommunication equipment and motor vehicles grew particularly strongly during the first half of 2004. Next year the world's need for replacement investments will fall slightly. At the same time, the Swedish krona will appreciate. Exports will continue to grow, but at a slightly slower rate. Domestic demand will strengthen. Investment has stopped falling and is now rising, especially in industry. Household consumption will also grow at a good rate during the rest of 2004 and in 2005, buoyed by a brighter labour market outlook, rising income and a good wealth position.

The rapid growth in output to date has been the result of higher average hours worked and high productivity growth rather than higher employment. The fall in employment has now flattened out, but there will be no clear increase until the beginning of 2005. The regular employment rate will fall from 77.6 per cent in 2003 to 77.0 per cent in 2004 and hold at this level in 2005. Absence due to sickness is expected to continue to drop. Open unemployment is believed to have peaked this year and will fall to 5.1 per cent in 2005.

Productivity growth is expected to remain high for the rest of the year before returning to a more long-term level. Coupled with moderate wage growth and falling import prices, the high productivity growth has meant that inflation is now low despite being pushed up by oil prices this year. Inflationary pressure is expected to grow gradually as the limiting effect of import prices subsides and domestic resource utilisation increases. The Riksbank is not expected to raise its repo

rate until next year.

Medium-term estimates for 20062007 and alternative scenarios

Besides the economic forecast for 2004 and 2005, medium-term estimates are being presented for 2006 and 2007. These estimates are based on the assumption that there will still be available resources in the labour market in late 2005. This means that employment and GDP can continue to grow at a good rate in 2006 and 2007 without causing inflation problems. In calendar-adjusted terms, GDP is forecast to grow by 2.5 per cent in 2006 and 2.3 per cent in 2007. Open unemployment will fall to 4.2 per cent in 2007.

Two alternative scenarios are also presented. The low-growth scenario assumes that for a number of years oil prices will be higher than in the base scenario. In this alternative scenario it takes longer for the Swedish economy to reach normal resource utilisation. The high-growth scenario assumes that wage formation and the labour market function better than in the base scenario. Unemployment can be permanently lower than in the base scenario without a risk of overheating, and the government's target of an 80 per cent regular employment rate will be achieved in 2007.

Public finances

In 2003 general government net lending amounted to 0.5 per cent of GDP. This year net lending is forecast to rise to 0.7 per cent of GDP. Net lending will then fall slightly as a proportion of GDP in 2005 and 2006 before climbing to 0.9 per cent of GDP in 2007 (cf. Table 4).

Net lending in 2004 will break down between the three components of the general government sector such that central government will generate a deficit of SEK 33 billion, the old-age pension system will generate a surplus of SEK 50 billion, and the local government sector will generate a small surplus. Next year an increased central government deficit will be offset by higher surpluses in the pension system and the local government sector. The increase in general government net lending in 2007 will be due to improved central government finances.

The general government sector's net debt turned into a positive financial position in 2003 due to increases in share values. The positive net lending means that its financial position will strengthen during the forecast period, such that financial assets are expected to exceed liabilities by SEK 106 billion in 2007.

Consolidated debt amounted to 52 per cent of GDP at the end of 2003, which is well below the EU's reference value of 60 per cent. The breakdown of net lending between central government and the old-age pension system means that the improvement in financial position during the forecast period will take the form of increased assets in the pension system, while the central government deficit will increase the liabilities side of the general government sector balance sheet. Central government debt will also grow temporarily as a proportion of GDP in 2004 before falling back again.

The budget for 2005: a commitment to more jobs and increased welfare

The Swedish economy is well prepared for the international economic upturn. The Sweden leaving an international recession behind it this time is stronger than the country that emerged from the recession ten years ago. Central government debt is lower, public finances stronger, employment higher and unemployment lower.

Sweden has outperformed the EU and the OECD between 1994 and 2004. During this period, Swedens GDP has increased by an average of 2.9 per cent per year. The corresponding figures for the OECD and the EU were 2.7 and 2.2 per cent respectively.

The Swedish economy experienced strong growth in early 2004. Provisional statistics show that GDP was 3.4 per cent higher in the first half of 2004 than in the first half of 2003. Industrial productivity was approximately 10 per cent higher than in the corresponding period in 2003.

GDP growth for the whole of 2004 is expected to be 2.9 per cent, mainly owing to a favourable trend for exports. Because of more working days in 2004, however, actual GDP growth will be as high as 3.5 per cent. Next year slightly weaker export growth is anticipated, but higher domestic demand will lead to an overall rise of 3.0 per cent in GDP.

Although the economy has turned the corner and growth figures are high, the labour market is still beset by recession. This year unemployment is expected to be 5.6 per cent. Among young adults, immigrants and older workers it is considerably higher.

General government consolidated gross debt has fallen sharply since its peak in 1994 when the burden of debt exceeded 75 per cent of GDP. This year the debt is down to 52 per cent of GDP and it is expected to continue to decline next year.

Our economic policy objectives remain firm. A high growth rate is only sustainable on the basis of sound public finances. The expenditure ceilings must be met. The target of an average 2 per cent surplus in public finances over an economic cycle remains in place. The precise target proposed for 2005 is a surplus of at least 0.5 per cent of GDP.

The expenditure ceiling has been met every year since its introduction in 1997. If the expenditure ceiling for 2004 comes under threat, the Government will take necessary measures.

The estimated budgeting margin is SEK 0.2 billion for 2005 and SEK 1.4 billion for 2006. The Budget Bill does not indicate an exact expenditure ceiling for 2007. The expenditure ceiling is set on the basis of an assessment of the potential and structural level of GDP. A number of changes over the past ten years have affected the productive capacity of the economy. The Government therefore wants first to analyse the effect of these changes on potential GDP before setting the expenditure ceiling for 2007.

Another reason to wait is that the Government is considering bringing in a system involving an employment margin in 2007.

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More jobs for a fairer Sweden

The Governments proposed budget measures aim above all to produce more jobs so as to deal with unemployment, stimulate demand, generate tax revenue for local government and so increase welfare.

The following is proposed:

Augmented employment support for local government totalling SEK 14.5 billion in 20042006.

- · Tax relief above all for low and medium income earners.
- · Improvements for small and medium-sized enterprises.

20 000 new places in labour market policy programmes in 2005. This will bring the estimated total capacity up to 111 000 places.

In the Spring Fiscal Policy Bill, which was adopted by the Riksdag in June, the following reforms were announced:

- \cdot 6 000 more staff in the pre-school sector in 20052007.
- · 6 000 places in further education/training for local government employees in 2004 and 2005.
- · 3 different types of RMI (building repairs, maintenance and improvement) deductions.

Measures for SMEs

To generate more jobs, both in the short and in the long term, small and medium-sized enterprises need to develop well. The Government is taking a number of measures to improve conditions for SMEs:

- · Inheritance and gift tax will be abolished, partly to facilitate the transition from one generation to the next in family businesses.
- The reform of the 3:12 rules will continue. This reform was initiated in 2004 by raising the interest rate used as divisor in calculating return on capital by two percentage points. A special working group will present proposals later this autumn on how to complete the reform. According to plan, the new regulations will enter into force on 1 January 2006.
- · Agriculture and forestry are exposed to tough competition from other EU countries. For the sake of jobs in these sectors, the tax on diesel used by agricultural and forestry machinery will be lowered by SEK 2 per litre.
- · SEK 15 million will be allocated to seed financing for newly started enterprises.

Tax reductions for low and middle income earners

The Government proposes a number of tax cuts that will make work more worthwhile, increase the purchasing power of low and middle income earners and help create more jobs. This will include further compensation for the personal contributions to the pension system that were introduced in connection with the restructuring of the budget.

- · Income taxes will be lowered by between SEK 900 and SEK 2 100 per person per year to compensate for the personal contributions (this corresponds to half the fourth stage of compensation, bringing the total degree of compensation to 87.5 per cent).
- · The basic deduction will be raised by SEK 2 400 per year for individuals earning between SEK 58 400 and SEK 271 100 per year. This translates into tax relief of between SEK 600 and SEK 800 per person per year.
- The deduction for work-related travel will be raised from SEK 1.60 to SEK 1.70 per kilometre.

More resources for local government

Health and medical care, schools and social services must maintain high standards and be available to all. To this end, municipalities and county councils will receive substantially higher grants in 2005 and 2006.

- · Employment support for local government will increase by SEK 1.5 billion in 2004, SEK 6 billion in 2005 and SEK 7 billion in 2006.
- · The general government grant will be raised by SEK 7 billion from 2007 on.
- · SEK 1.7 billion will be committed to introduce a health care guarantee and to provide increased resources for health services, psychiatry and care of drug misusers. SEK 200 million of this will be allocated to the alcohol and drugs plans.
- \cdot SEK 450 million will be allocated in 2005 to continuing professional development for staff in health services and elderly care.

Measures for children and families with children

The Government proposes a range of measures in 2005 and 2006 to strengthen the financial position of families with children.

- The monthly child allowance will be raised by SEK 100 per child in 2006.
- · The supplementary allowance for additional children will be raised by SEK 100 and will now be payable for second as well as subsequent children.
- · On 1 July 2006 the ceiling in the parental insurance system will be raised from 7.5 base amounts (SEK 24 000/month) to 10 price base amounts (just over SEK 32 000/month). This will mean that in 2006, the maximum parental benefit per day will go up from approximately SEK 660 to around SEK 880.
- · On 1 July 2006 the compensation provided for minimum level days in the parental insurance system will be increased from SEK 60 to SEK 180 per day.

The Spring Fiscal Policy Bill announced a commitment of SEK 1 billion from 2006 for children in families in a weak financial position. SEK 350 million will be used for maintenance support improvements, SEK 200 million for changes in the housing allowance and SEK 450 million for supplementary child allowances for students. The Government will announce the exact details at a later stage.

Measures for the elderly

 \cdot SEK 200 million will be allocated from 2005 onwards to improve housing supplement for pensioners.

Green tax shift and measures for a better environment

A continuation of the green tax shift is a key element in the Governments strategy for transforming Sweden into an ecologically sustainable society. Environmental taxes put a price on the environment and make it more expensive to pollute air or water.

The assessment made in the Spring Fiscal Policy Bill in 2000 was that there was an overall scope of SEK 30 billion for the tax shift in the period 2001-2010. Since then, a tax shift of just over SEK 7 billion has been implemented by the proposals in the 2001 and 2002 Budget Bills. During the 20022006 term of office, a tax shift of SEK 12 billion will be implemented.

Next year (2005), the green tax shift will involve approximately SEK 3.3 billion. It will include the following measures:

- · Higher vehicle tax for cars, up approximately SEK 340 for a petrol-driven car of normal weight. For diesel-driven cars, the tax will rise by SEK 100.
- · Higher petrol tax, up SEK 0.15/litre (SEK 0.19 after VAT).
- · Higher diesel tax, up SEK 0.30/litre (SEK 0.375 after VAT).
- · Higher vehicle tax for light lorries and light buses, up 40 per cent.
- · Higher electricity tax, up SEK 0.012/kWh (SEK 0.015 after VAT).

These tax increases, lessened by the lower diesel tax for agricultural and forestry use, will be offset by:

· Higher basic deduction, up SEK 2 400 for individuals earning between SEK 58 400 and SEK 271 100 per year. This translates into tax relief of between SEK 600 and SEK 800 per year.

Security and solidarity

Development assistance will be raised to one per cent of GNI in 2006. This means the total level will rise by SEK 3.3 billion.

· More money to make people more secure. The money freed up by the adjustment of the Swedish defence will be used for action to enhance peoples security. This will involve substantial reinforcements of the legal system, including the Swedish Police, the Swedish Security Service, the prosecution organisation, the judiciary, the Swedish Prison and Probation Service, the fight against organised crime and terrorism, care of drug misusers and measures for children and young people in risky environments. The adjustment of the Swedish defence will yield savings of SEK 600 million in 2005, SEK 1.5 billion in 2006 and SEK 3 billion in 2007.

Research

Higher research appropriations. The level of appropriations for research will be raised by SEK 2.3 billion over a four-year period (SEK 100 million in 2005, SEK 600 million in 2006, SEK 1.1 billion in 2007 and SEK 2.3 billion in 2008). This autumn the Government will present a research bill that will describe in greater detail how the money will be used.

Other measures:

- · Improved study support for older people. SEK 100 will be allocated from 2006 and SEK 250 million from 2007 to change the study support system so as to enable more older people to finance their education by study support.
- · More resources for the Swedish Customs Service. An extra SEK 25 million will be committed to the Swedish Customs Service from 2006 to enable more effective combating of large-scale smuggling and other cross-border organised crime.
- · Lower wealth tax. Wealth tax will be reduced in 2005 by raising the exemption for married couples and cohabiting couples with children to SEK 3 million.
- \cdot More people will have to pay state income tax. The upward adjustment of the thresholds will be limited to CPI + 1 per cent. This means the thresholds above which people begin to pay state income tax will be slightly lower than under the current rules.
- · Opportunities for obtaining a reduction of social security contributions will be limited. From 2005 the maximum base for a reduction of social security contributions will be lowered from a payroll of SEK 852 000 to a payroll of SEK 41 600. From 2005, interest will be charged on profits transferred to tax allocation reserves.

Major investments in the legal system

The external threats to Sweden have been replaced by internal threats directed towards peoples security and affecting their everyday lives in the form of crime, misuse and social exclusion. The Government is therefore moving its work for security and justice forward and continuing vigorous measures throughout the legal system. An extra budgetary allocation is proposed for the legal system of SEK 50 million this year, SEK 750 million in 2005, SEK 1.5 billion in 2006 and just over SEK 2.7 billion in 2007.

Major sums have been committed to the legal system in recent years. Since 2000 a total of nearly SEK 3 billion has been injected and the commitment will now be further stepped up.

The Government will strengthen the police, prosecutors, courts and penal care. Four thousand new police officers will be trained. The aim is to solve more crimes and further develop the cooperation between the police and prosecution services. The Swedish Security Service will also receive more resources to pay for enhanced bodyguard protection and the fight against terrorism. Additional resources will be allocated to the Swedish Prison and Probation Service to boost its ability to reduce cases of reoffending. The increased funds will be used to create more places in institutional care, tighten security at correctional facilities and remand prisons and continue the special anti-drug action.

These commitments to the police will make people more secure and enable the police to solve more crimes. We can see now that the objective of a police force of 17 000 officers will be reached within the next few months. This will be more police than we have had for 20 years, says Minister for Justice Thomas Bodström.

The Swedish Prison and Probation Service will be put in a better position to cope with the higher number of prisoners and the new demands on its activities. It will also be more individualised, says Mr Bodström.

Leif Pagrotsky concerned about rights of foreign inventors in the US

In two letters addressed directly to US Attorney General John Ashcroft and EU Commissioner for Trade Pascal Lamy respectively, Minister for Industry and Trade Leif Pagrotsky is seeking full transparency on the issue of the rights of foreign inventors in the United States. The background to Leif Pagrotskys concern is the problems being experienced by Swedish inventor Håkan Lans in the United States.

I would like to call the attention of the EU Commission and the United States Government to the asymmetry being experienced by European citizens in the US legal system, compared with the

treatment Americans receive in European courts, says Mr Pagrotsky, commenting on the letters. Intellectual property rights are regulated in an agreement the United States has fought for in the World Trade Organisation, WTO. It is, in other words, an area in which we have agreed to grant certain rights to each others citizens. It is important, therefore, that the United States lives up to this in practice, says Mr Pagrotsky.

In 1999, Håkan Lans lost a patent dispute against several American computer companies because his lawyers had sued the companies in Håkan Lans name, despite the patent rights having been transferred to a company wholly-owned by Mr Lans. The actual issue of patent violation was thus never subject to legal examination. Mr Lans subsequently initiated a number of legal processes against his former lawyers but, despite the fact that more than two and a half years have elapsed, the American court still has not taken up the case. The period of limitation expired in August for one of the processes in which Mr Lans is suing his former lawyers for perjury.

Without taking a position on the actual issue, Mr Pagrotsky expresses concern in his letter to the US Attorney General that the case remains undealt with, and states that it is highly unsatisfactory that the period of limitation for a case can expire without the court having taken any action. In his letter to the EU Commissioner for Trade Pascal Lamy, Mr Pagrotsky wonders if the US legal systems handling of patent disputes is compatible with the international commitments made by the United States. The agreement in question is the TRIPS Agreement (trade-related aspects of intellectual property rights) within the WTO, which includes rules on costs and delays in legal processes concerning intellectual property rights.

Government appoints Marie Hessle to coordinate initiative for apathy-stricken child asylum-seekers

In recent months the Government has received several reports warning about children in the process of asylum who cut themselves off from the outside world who stop speaking and moving and ultimately lie completely motionless and tube-fed. In response to these reports, the Government is launching a targeted effort to address the issue and today announced the appointment of Marie Hessle as coordinator.

Ms Hessles assignment is to gauge and analyse the scope of the problem and to both gather and spread information. As coordinator, she will also be required to present proposals on an ongoing basis for measures that can be taken in the asylum process.

It is tremendously important that we are able to identify the children and families at risk at an early stage, so they can receive appropriate help and support. Their cases must be given top priority to keep the time they have to wait for a decision as short as possible, says Minister for Migration and Asylum Policy Barbro Holmberg.

Today we know little about these acute stress reactions and general resignation syndromes. Only a handful of studies have been made involving relatively small samples of asylum-seeking children.

We need to know more to be able to give these children the help they need, says Ms Holmberg.

Marie Hessle is a psychologist and is head of Stockholm County Councils child psychiatry refugee unit. She has 15 years of experience of refugee issues, including refugee health at Carlslund Refugee Reception Centre. The task force was established at the initiative of former Swedish Minister for Foreign Affairs, Anna Lindh, and Sweden has taken on a secretarial function for the group. The purpose of the task force is to serve as an umbrella organisation for coordination and facilitation of efforts to combat human trafficking in the Nordic and Baltic countries.

Laila Freivalds presented the task forces common website, which is aimed to facilitate an exchange of information about initiatives to combat human trafficking for governments, organisations and the public. She also reported from a pilot project designed to aid the safe return of victims of human trafficking.

"Our countries must be at the forefront in the fight against human trafficking and make vigorous efforts to stop this form of slave trade. Together we will play a more active role in the EUs efforts to combat trafficking in human beings. The Nordic Baltic initiative sets a good example for other regions," says Laila Freivalds.

Today, thousands of women and children are victims of human trafficking from and through the Nordic and Baltic countries. It is estimated that between 400 and 600 women and children will fall prey to this modern form of slavery this year in Sweden alone.

The Swedish delegation to the task force is led by State Secretary Annika Söder.

The meeting of the Nordic-Baltic foreign ministers took place in Palanga, Lithuania.

Special investigator appointed to reduce the time married couples have to wait for residence permits

The Government decided today to appoint a special investigator to make residence permit investigations more efficient for couples who are married or cohabiting.

The present system demands considerable resources and results in long processing times at Swedens missions abroad and at the Swedish Migration Board.

The investigator will carry out a review of procedures and authority routines and will submit proposals for any statutory amendments considered necessary.

EU maintains offensive stance in WTO negotiations

EU trade ministers met today to review progress in the WTO negotiations in Geneva. By Friday 30 July the World Trade Organisation (WTO) aims to achieve an agreement that will compensate for the failure in Cancun in September 2003.

At the meeting it was agreed not to change the Commissions negotiating mandate. This was a rejection of demands that the EU should adopt a more defensive stance in WTO trade negotiations, not least in the field of agriculture.

From a Swedish point of view it is gratifying that we reached consensus on maintaining the offensive stance that the EU has adopted in the WTO in recent months, says Lotta Fogde, State Secretary responsible for trade issues.

If the EU had brought completely new guidelines to the continued negotiations in Geneva this would have caused confusion and sent unfortunate signals to the rest of the world. Todays meeting clearly shows that the EUs approach remains unchanged, says Lotta Fogde.

At todays Council meeting Sweden stressed how important it is that EU actions in the WTO negotiations give weight to initiatives for growth and a developing country perspective.

At the end of the week EU trade ministers will meet in Geneva to reach agreement on the final EU position on the closing week of WTO negotiations before the summer break. Minister for Industry and Trade Leif Pagrotsky is planning to take part in that meeting.

EU foreign ministers increase the pressure on Sudan

EU foreign ministers noted at their meeting in Brussels today that humanitarian access to Darfur has improved partially. At the same time there are no indications that the security situation for civilians has improved.

Obviously the humanitarian situation in Darfur is very grave, says Annika Söder, State Secretary at the Ministry for Foreign Affairs.

The EU has considerably increased its humanitarian relief efforts in Darfur as part of its overall financial contribution, which at present amounts to EUR 213 million.

I welcome the decision of the UN General Assembly, by an overwhelming majority, to adopt a resolution regarding the Israeli separation barrier.

The resolution requires Israel to fulfil its obligations as an occupying power, as set out in the advisory opinion issued by the International Court of Justice on 9 July. Dear Mr. Secretary-General,

In relation to your recent timely visit to Sudan, I would like to share with you my concern over the urgent crisis in Darfur.

I would like to express my deep appreciation to the United Nations, and to you personally, for the engagement you have shown in dealing with the serious situation in Darfur. In the spirit of our joint commitment at the Stockholm International Forum earlier this year, we must all shoulder our responsibility to protect groups identified as potential victims of genocide, mass murder or ethnic cleansing.

In this connection, I very much welcome your recent decision to appoint Mr. Juan Méndez as your Special Adviser on the Prevention of Genocide. We look forward to work closely with him in his important duty.

It is crucial that the Security Council takes its responsibility towards the situation in Darfur. The international community must continue to give high priority to influencing the Government of Sudan to take the necessary measures, as well as to provide assistance to those in need in Darfur. It is encouraging that the African Union is taking such great responsibility towards peace and security on the African continent by sending an observer mission to the area. As you know, Sweden, together with a number of other EU member states, is participating in that mission.

We have also traditionally been, and still are, a large financial contributor to the UN and other humanitarian organisations in Sudan. In addition Sweden is, through our active membership in SHIRBRIG, closely involved in the preparations for a UN observer mission to southern Sudan, following a comprehensive peace agreement. In order to be able to follow and assess more closely the developments in Sudan, we will shortly increase our diplomatic presence in the country.

My government has tried to be instrumental in making sure that the European Union demonstrates its full support to your efforts, as reflected in the encouraging communiqué signed between the United Nations and the Government of Sudan, during your visit to the country. In particular, one of the EU:s demands is that the Government of Sudan must co-operate with the United Nations on the protection of human rights. The normalisation of EU-relations with Sudan will depend on immediate and verifiable progress in Darfur, in particular through disarmament of the militia.

One issue that needs to be efficiently addressed is that of impunity. As suggested by Sweden, the European Union has called for measures to ensure that those responsible for breaches and violations of human rights and international humanitarian law in Darfur will be brought to justice. We stand ready to co-operate with all relevant parts of the United Nations to ensure that Darfur will not become a place where impunity prevails. I would suggest that our officials keep in touch on this matter.

There is still a need for urgent action in many fields to respond properly and efficiently to the crisis in Darfur. I am encouraged by the leadership that you have shown in managing the crisis. The Swedish government will continue to support and work with the United Nations in all of its continued efforts in Darfur and Sudan.

Sweden contributes a civilian police officer to a UN team in Sudan

The Government decided today to contribute a Swedish civilian police officer to an advance UN team in Sudan.

The United Nations is planning to send a peacekeeping mission to Sudan as a peace agreement has been concluded between the government in Khartoum and the SPLM/A rebel group. As part of the preparations for the upcoming mission the UN is now sending a team of about 150 people to Sudan to prepare the coming mission. The team will depart in groups during the summer and will stay for at least three months.

"By taking part in the UN team Sweden is making additional concrete contributions to the important peace efforts in the country. At the same time, we are strengthening the capacity of the UN to plan and carry out a future peacekeeping mission in Sudan. It is my hope that a final peace agreement can soon be concluded between the government in Khartoum and the SPLM/A," says Minister for International Development Cooperation Carin Jämtin.

The civil war in Sudan is one of the worlds longest lasting conflicts and has resulted in about two million deaths and more than four million internally displaced persons. At the same time as a peace process has been under way between the government in the north and the SPLM/A in the south, the conflict in Darfur has developed into one of the worlds greatest humanitarian disasters.

Sweden is one of the major donors of humanitarian assistance to Sudan and has contributed some SEK 150 million so far this year.

In addition, Sweden has assigned a military observer to the African Union (AU) monitoring mission in Darfur, western Sudan, and has contributed SEK 1 million to the AU for the same purpose.

Sweden is also contributing three military observers and two civilian police officers to a multinational monitoring mission, the International Joint Military Committee/Mission (JMC/JMM), in the Nuba Mountains in Sudan.

Sweden contributes observers to the parliamentary election in Kosovo

The Government decided today to contribute two long-term and four short-term observers to the Council of Europe Election Observation Mission in Kosovo. On 23 October a parliamentary election will be held in Kosovo, which has been administered by the United Nations Interim Administration Mission in Kosovo (UNMIK) for the past five years.

The decision to send election observers to Kosovo was taken after a request from the Council of Europe, which is responsible for observing election preparations and the conduct of the parliamentary election. The Organization for Security and Cooperation in Europe (OSCE) and a recently formed local election organisation are responsible for organising the election.

"It is important that the parliamentary election is conducted in good democratic order and that the Kosovo Serbs take part. For this reason, and to underline international interest in democratic development in Kosovo, we have decided that Sweden will contribute observers," comments Minister for International Development Cooperation Carin Jämtin.

The aim of the policy that the international community is pursuing under UN leadership is that Kosovo must first have functioning social structures before a discussion can begin on the question of the future status of the area. Next year there will be a review what progress Kosovo has made in

fulfilling the requirements that have been set up. Developments in the coming year will determine whether discussions on the status issue can begin then.

Up to now Sweden has invested substantial financial and human resources in Kosovo. Swedish development assistance amounts to approximately SEK 100 million a year, making Sweden one of the major donor countries in Kosovo. In addition to bilateral support, Sweden also gives considerable multilateral support to Kosovo via the EU.

The discussion was dominated by questions concerning the possibilities for the EU to influence the peace process and the importance of the Quartet as well as by the opinion of the International Court of Justice (ICJ) last Friday on the Israeli separation barrier. In a statement the Dutch Presidency repeated the EUs standpoint that the construction of the barrier on occupied land is contrary to international law, in accordance with the finding of the Court.

I welcome the Courts opinion on the Israeli separation barrier. It is in line with the view of the Swedish Government. The only reasonable consequence of the opinion is for Israel to demolish the

barrier on occupied land. Israel should respect the opinion of the Court, says Minister for Foreign Affairs Laila Freivalds.

Michael Sahlin appointed EU Special Representative in Macedonia

The Council of the European Union has today, Monday, decided to appoint Ambassador Michael Sahlin as EU Special Representative (EUSR) in Macedonia.

Ambassador Sahlin replaces the Dane Sören Jessen-Petersen, who has recently been appointed as the UN Secretary-Generals Special Representative in Kosovo.

Sahlin, who is currently Director-General of the Folke Bernadotte Academy, has extensive experience of the Balkans. His previous posts have included serving as Swedens Ambassador in Belgrade and Skopje and he was also State Secretary at the Ministry of Defence in 1992 when Sweden helped set up a preventive military force in Macedonia (UNPREDEP).

The EUSR plays a central role in Macedonian politics, not least by the influence on the implementation of the peace agreement from the conflict in 2001, the Ohrid Agreement and the EU Police Mission Proxima. Ambassador Sahlin will work in close cooperation with the Macedonian president and government, EU Member States and EU High Representative Javier Solana in order to secure the peaceful political process and promote the implementation of the Ohrid Agreement. Through these efforts, the EUSR is assisting Macedonia on the road towards future membership in the EU.

The EU has extensive commitments in Macedonia, including an advisory police mission and development support. Macedonia applied for membership of the EU on 22 March 2004 and the Commission is currently examining if and when the country is ready to begin accession negotiations.

Today, 9 July 2004, the International Court of Justice (ICJ) issued an advisory opinion on the question addressed to the Court by the General Assembly in December 2003 regarding the legal consequences of the construction of a barrier in Occupied Territory.

"I welcome the Courts opinion on the Israeli separation barrier. It is in line with what the Swedish Government conveyed earlier this year in its written statement to the Court as well as directly to Israel," states Laila Freivalds, Minister for Foreign Affairs.

"The International Court of Justice establishes that construction of the separation barrier on occupied Palestinian land is contrary to international law, particularly humanitarian law and human rights. This is a finding of fundamental importance, which Sweden supports."

"I encourage Israel to respect and give careful consideration to the recommendations of the Court."

The Courts advisory opinion is not legally binding.

Raoul Wallenberg to be honoured in Budapest

On 9 July 1944 Raoul Wallenberg arrived in Budapest and began his work to save the citys Jews from deportation to the German concentration camps. Today it is exactly 60 years since this event.

Earlier, Ivan Danielsson and Per Anger at the Swedish legation in Budapest, like representatives of the legations of other neutral countries in the Hungarian capital, had been working to save the Jews of Hungary. These endeavours were considerably reinforced by the arrival in Budapest of Raoul Wallenberg.

A memorial ceremony will be arranged in Budapest City Hall on 27 September 2004 to honour the

memory of Raoul Wallenbergs rescue mission. The Swedish Government will be represented by State Secretary for Foreign Affairs Hans Dahlgren.

In conjunction with this ceremony, the Swedish Institute of International Affairs, in cooperation with Hungarys Holocaust Documentation Center, will be arranging a scientific symposium on 27-28 September 2004, also in Budapest City Hall. A number of researchers from Sweden, Hungary and other countries will take part. The topic of discussion at the symposium will be the rescue missions carried out by the Swedish legation in Budapest, Raoul Wallenberg and the Swedish Red Cross.

In autumn 2003, the City of Budapest declared Raoul Wallenberg an honorary citizen.

Swedish citizen at Guantanamo base released

The Swedish citizen who has been held at Guantanamo base in Cuba for more than two years has been released. He will now be flown home to Sweden.

The release of the Swedish citizen has been preceded by a series of contacts between the United States and Sweden, both between government agencies and at diplomatic level. The Minister for Foreign Affairs, for example, raised the issue with her American counterpart on her visit to Washington earlier this year. The Minister for Defence also discussed the matter when she visited Washington in the winter. Later, in April, the Prime Minister brought up the issue with President Bush. There have been intensive contacts between Sweden and the United States during the spring and summer in an attempt to reach a solution.

Swedens basic position has been that the man must either be freed or be brought to court, in accordance with generally accepted legal principles.

In their contacts with representatives of the United States prior to the mans release, Swedish representatives have described the measures that Swedish law enforcement authorities may take when the man has returned to Sweden.

"It is highly gratifying that the Swedish citizen at Guantanamo has finally been released," says Minister for Foreign Affairs Laila Freivalds.

"Sweden is an active participant in the fight against international terrorism. To be conducted as effectively as possible, this fight is dependent on extensive international cooperation, not least in police matters. But it must not be conducted with means that lie outside the limits defined in the international legal system. That is why we in Sweden have been unable to accept individuals being held at Guantanamo with no legal basis. This has been the principle upon which we have acted," says Ms Freivalds.

Sweden to contribute SEK 10 million towards education of economists in Ukraine and Russia

Sweden is to make a contribution of SEK 10 million towards educating Russian, Ukrainian, Belarusian and Moldovan economists in the period 2004-2006.

Sweden will continue to support education provided within the framework of the Economics Education and Research Consortium (EERC), an international initiative aimed at ensuring high quality education for economists in Russia and Ukraine. Swedens contribution also includes two Swedish-financed doctoral positions for economists returning home after completing doctorates abroad. In addition, there is direct support for five Belarusian and three Moldovan students each year, including a study visit to Stockholm for these students. The host institution is the Stockholm Institute of Transition Economics and East European Economies at the Stockholm School of Economics.

"Our eastern neighbours are greatly in need of well-educated economists. We in Sweden want to help ensure that a new generation of economists is educated, who can contribute to the development of their countries," says Minister for International Development Cooperation Carin Jämtin.

The Economics Education and Research Consortium (EERC) was established in 1996 for the purpose of building up domestic competence in economics education and research in Russia and Ukraine. The EERCs core activities consist of a two-year masters programme in economics at Kyiv-Mohyla Academy, Ukraine, along with support to researchers in the field of economics in Russia, in the form of grant programmes and seminars. Sweden is one of the largest funders, having provided some SEK 25 million in support of these activities since 1998. The annual meeting of the United Nations Economic and Social Council

(ECOSOC) opens today in New York. Sweden will present a report there on how our national policies live up to the commitments set out in the UNs eighth Millennium Development Goal.

Goal 8 frames a partnership between rich countries and developing countries in which the responsibility of the rich countries deals with increasing development assistance, improving trade regulations, reducing the burden of debt in poor countries, etc.

Through this report, Sweden will be one of the first of the rich countries to present a report in accordance with Goal 8.

It is important that even those of us in rich countries live up to our promises, states Carin Jämtin, Minister for International Development Cooperation. We have expected developing countries to present reports on their commitments for quite some time now, but rich countries should also be subject to a review of their policy choices. By means of this report, we wish to encourage other countries to present reports on their commitments regarding the Millennium Development Goals.

Among the points emphasised in the report are Swedens efforts within the WTO and the EU for fairer trade, and our contribution to the HIPC Initiative, which deals with debt relief for the least-developed countries.

Swedens report on the Millennium Development Goals is part of the global reporting system established by the UN to follow up on the Goals. Next year, the UN Secretary-General will present a more extensive report on results from around the world which will incorporate the Swedish report. A major meeting will be held under UN auspices during the autumn of 2005 that will serve as an important review of how efforts for achieving the Millennium Development Goals by 2015 are proceeding.

The Millennium Development Goals are eight time-bound, measurable goals for worldwide development. The Goals include areas such as reducing by half the number of people living in extreme poverty, child mortality, maternal mortality, education, environmental damage, HIV/AIDS, malaria and other diseases as well as gender discrimination. If the goals are to be achieved by 2015, rich countries and poor countries alike must fulfil their commitments.

Today the Government has taken a decision on a new strategy for Swedish development cooperation with South Africa for the period 1 July 2004 31 December 2008.

During this period, development cooperation will be broadened and based on reciprocity and co-financing. The new cooperation will be based on a careful selection and elaboration of cooperation areas between various stakeholders in Sweden and South Africa, such as government agencies, local authorities and NGOs.

Today it is estimated that more than two million people are affected by the conflict in Darfur and they are in acute need of humanitarian assistance.

The initiative will play an important role in increasing security so that the relief organisations can carry out their important work," says Minister for Foreign Affairs Laila Freivalds.

"Sudans government has a great responsibility to ensure the ceasefire is respected, to protect the civilian population, to disarm the militia groups and to safeguard humanitarian access," says Ms Freivalds.

Sweden is also providing substantial financial and political support through the EU to the African Union observer mission to Darfur. The EU is contributing some EUR 12 million from a newly established Peace Facility that has been set up to finance crisis management operations in Africa.

The situation in Darfur is one of the worlds worst ongoing humanitarian crises, with widespread attacks on the civilian population. More than one million internally displaced persons, 130 000 refugees who have fled across the border to Chad, and almost one million people in the communities receiving the refugees, are in need of humanitarian aid. It is estimated that 30 000 people have been killed or have died in the disturbances over the past year or so.

Today Sweden and Laos signed an agreement on continued development cooperation.

The agreement, which covers the period July 2004 December 2006, was signed on behalf of Sweden by Ambassador Jan Axel Nordlander.

The agreement is based on a Government decision of 15 April 2004 on a new Swedish country strategy for development cooperation with Laos PDR.

The overall objectives of Swedish development cooperation with Laos during the coming period are:

Agreement between Sweden and Bosnia and Herzegovina on possibility of dual citizenship

Swedish citizenship legislation allows unrestricted dual citizenship, which means that a Swedish citizen can become a citizen of another country without losing Swedish citizenship.

Corresponding rules do not apply to citizens of Bosnia and Herzegovina who become Swedish citizens, unless the countries have an agreement permitting this.

Negotiations on an agreement to this effect were concluded today in Stockholm. This means,

among other things, that Bosnian citizens who acquire Swedish citizenship will not lose their old citizenship in the process. The agreement will come into force as soon as the Government of Sweden and the Bosnian Parliament have given their formal approval.

Minister for Democracy and Integration Issues Mona Sahlin and Minister for Migration and Asylum Policy Barbro Holmberg welcome the agreement and say in a joint comment:

"This is a positive step for Bosnians who become Swedish citizens, it makes it easier for them to travel and strengthens ties with their country of origin."

Laila Freivalds welcomes agreement on new Iraq resolution

On Tuesday evening the United Nations Security Council adopted a resolution on Iraqs immediate political future.

"It is gratifying that the resolution has been adopted unanimously and that there is international consensus on the future political process in Iraq," says Minister for Foreign Affairs Laila Freivalds.

"Thanks to intensive efforts by UN Special Envoy Lakhdar Brahimi, an interim government is ready to assume responsibility for Iraqs independence in a few weeks time. I welcome the fact that the UN will continue to play a central role in the democratic process.

At the same time, world commitment to a stable and independent Iraq must not be allowed to diminish. We have a common responsibility to support Iraq on the road towards democracy. We are still at the beginning of a process that is long and far from simple," says Ms Freivalds.

As from 30 June, a sovereign Iraqi interim government under the leadership of Prime Minister Iyad Allawi will take over, and occupational government of the country will end. The UN resolution establishes the timetable for democratic development as drawn up by the UN in cooperation with the Iraqis. The ultimate goal is for a constitutionally elected government to take over no later than 31 December 2005.

The UN will continue to have a central role in this democratic process. The resolution further establishes the relationship between the multi-national force and the interim government. The continued presence of the force is based on a government request to contribute to security and stability in Iraq. The forces mandate will expire no later than the end of the political process, but sooner if the government so requests.

European Refugee Fund to be renewed with EUR 114 million

At a meeting of the Council of Ministers for Justice and Home Affairs on 8 June, EU Ministers for Migration and Asylum Policy agreed to extend the European Refugee Fund for a new period 20052010. The Fund was established in 2000 and is used to develop and harmonise Member State activities in connection with the reception and integration of refugees and the processing of asylum applications.

The total allocation for 2005 and 2006 amounts to EUR 114 million. In Sweden, the finances of the European Refugee Fund are administered by the Swedish Migration Board which, together with the Swedish Integration Board, makes decisions on individual projects.

"This is one way of further improving our cooperation. It is of great importance now we are to implement the common asylum and migration policy in an enlarged EU," says Minister for Migration and Asylum Policy Barbro Holmberg.

At the meeting, a recommendation to facilitate researchers entry into and residence in the EU was also adopted. The Commission estimates that Europe will need 700 000 new researchers by 2010. "We need more researchers to make Europe more competitive in the future," says Ms Holmberg. The recommendation is an expression of political will. Negotiations on a legally binding directive on researchers are under way.

Carin Jämtin comments on the attack on five NGO workers in Afghanistan

Minister for International Development Cooperation Carin Jämtin expressed deep regret about the attack in Afghanistan yesterday on five development assistance workers from the organisation Doctors without Borders (MSF). All five three foreigners and two Afghans were killed.

It is extremely important that protection for development assistance workers and UN staff can be guaranteed so that they are able to carry our their important work. The security situation in Afghanistan has deteriorated recently and several attacks have been aimed at both NGOs and the UN, says Minister for International Development Cooperation Carin Jämtin.

Sweden has promised long-term development assistance to Afghanistan and has taken a decision on at least SEK 750 million and up to SEK 1 billion for the period 2002-2004. So far about SEK 630 million of this allocation has been paid out.

Sida expects to be able to pay out more than SEK 300 million this year. Sweden channels its assistance through the UN system, NGOs (including the Swedish Afghanistan Committee), the International Committee of the Red Cross and the Afghanistan Reconstruction Trust Fund (ARTF).

Report from the Swedish Defence Commission "Defence for a new time"

In the report Defence for a new time (Ds 2004:30) presented to the Minister for Defence Leni Björklund today, the Defence Commission analyses important issues related to Swedish defence policy.

The decisions taken in recent years have radically changed the tasks assigned to the Swedish defence. The proposals presented by the Defence Commission in this report, would modify the direction of the already decided defence reform. The proposals concern a range of areas, including changes in operational capacity requirements, new principles for personnel supply and equipment acquisitions, command structures and administration. In the report the Defence Commission presents political ambitions and guidelines for the coming defence bill from the government, and the final decision by the Riksdag. The Defence Commission points out areas that should be considered for increased as well as reduced ambitions.

* * *

International security policy developments confirm the Defence Commissions previous conclusions. Swedens security has been decisively strengthened by the increasing European integration, particularly the membership of Estonia, Latvia, Lithuania and Poland in Nato and the EU. However, alongside this positive trend, serious, transnational threats to our security exist. The development of the European Security and Defence Policy changes the prerequisites of Swedens security and defence policy. A particularly significant factor is the deepened cooperation within the EU, manifested through the EU security strategy and the EU crisis management capability.

The Defence Commission considers that these developments entail changes in the requirements of operational capacity of the Swedish Armed Forces. For the foreseeable future, the serious threats that can be directed against our security, are common threats. Threats to the common security can therefore also entail threats to Sweden. The ambition to prevent crises and to contribute to crisis management by participating in peace-support operations, and the requirements to be able to manage developments and meet threats that may arise as a result of a crisis or conflict in the international environment, should therefore be seen as a whole.

* * *

The Defence Commission considers that it is of great importance that Sweden participates in the development of the EUs crisis management capability, including a rapid reaction capability. The rapid reaction capability should be developed in cooperation with other countries and must be combined with a continued capacity to contribute to sustained peace-support operations. The appropriation for peace-support operations should therefore increase as of 2005.

* * *

The resources of the Swedish Armed forces are relevant in a broad threat assessment. The role of the Swedish Armed Forces in protection against terrorism, is mainly to support other government authorities. However, the rules governing this support impose some restrictions, and continued investigation is therefore needed urgently. The ambition should be to present a position on these issues in 2005.

* * *

The capability to undertake operations, above all international operations, is the single factor that will have most influence on the activities of the Swedish Armed Forces. Use in highly violent situations, and a high level of readiness requires employed and active duty personnel in units with experience of joint exercises. Such units should to a considerably greater extent, be represented in the operational organisation.

* * *

The Defence Commission considers that the military personnel primarily should serve towards the

training, exercise and operations of the operational organisation. The Armed Forces should not acquire permanent downscaling costs for officers over a certain age. Therefore the Armed Forces should test a system with fixed term contracts for military personnel, including officers.

Considerably fewer officers will be needed in the future staff organisation and, in line with this, training for higher officer posts should be reduced.

* * *

In the opinion of the Defence Commission, it is unreasonable to allow officers to choose whether to participate in one of their most important duties. Therefore an employment contract that includes compulsory service in international operations, should be a condition for promotion.

The principles for admission to basic training should be based on suitability for, a willingness towards and an interest in international service. This should be combined with fixed-term contracts for certain units. Alternative forms of recruitment should be promoted, which is particularly important to create better conditions for increasing the proportion of women in the Armed Forces.

* * *

Fewer units in the operational organisation will mean fewer establishments in the training and management organisation. The remaining training and management organisation locations, must be selected so as to allow sufficiently good conditions for exercise and training. An ability to act as units, at least at battalion level, and joint forces action and ability to command, must be priorities. Larger and joint forces units should have regular exercises, when contract personnel and fully trained personnel can be called in (new forms of refresher training).

At present, complete battalions are not trained anywhere in the army and joint forces exercises, such as those between air and army units, are uncommon or non-existent. According to the Defence Commission, this has to be seen as a systemic error.

* * *

Extensive rationalisations and savings should be made in the command and the defence administration. According to Armed Forces a thirty per cent reduction in personnel is necessary at the Armed Forces Central Command. In the view of the Defence Commission, the reduction could be even higher.

The main alternative that should be considered is that the entire territorial command organisation should be disbanded, and that remaining tasks should be transferred to other sectors of the Armed Forces.

In light of the fact that the future operational organisation to be exercised, trained and supplied with personnel and military equipment will be considerably smaller, an adjustment should be made in the resources for administration. Considerable savings and rationalisations must be possible.

* * *

The acquisition and, where applicable, development of defence equipment, must be directly traceable to the needs of the operational organisation. The main alternative should be unit-based procurement and distribution of defence equipment according to the priority of the operational unit. This will reinforce the present trend of procuring equipment in small numbers. These requirements, together with the need to reduce the costs of acquisitions, must lead to focused and prioritised development, more international cooperation and a greater element of direct procurement of new or used equipment.

Life-cycle responsibility for defence equipment should to a greater extent be taken over by the defence industry, rather than remaining with the Armed Forces.

* * *

Todays threats more frequently require immediately available resources for crisis management. It is

therefore essential to take a decision already in 2004 to revise current financing principles, so as to create a strengthened peacetime capacity.

In todays security policy situation, there is no need for civilian service personnel in the civilian defence sector. According to the Defence Commission, admission of civilian service personnel into basic training will not be needed in the next few years.

It is essential not to limit the issue of voluntary participation in the event of severe emergencies to personnel from the voluntary defence organisations; the use of other organisations must also be considered. It is also important to create opportunities for individual voluntary participation by actively contributing to the development of skills and ability.

* * *

The Defence Commission considers the implementation of savings and rationalisation measures possible, realistic and responsible, that the ambition should be increased in proposed areas, and that a reduction of 3 billion SEK should be made in the budget. This reduction should be implemented gradually, but a net impact should already be evident in 2006. The new level of funding should be fully implemented by the end of 2007.

Demanded savings and reduced ambitions should encompass the following:

Restructuring and reductions within the total defence authorities

A reduction on the Armed Forces Central Command

A reduction on the regional territorial activities, defence planning and Home Guard training The proposed savings amount to 2 billion SEK. An additional net saving on 1 billion SEK encompasses the Swedish Armed Forces. Increased ambitions and costs will be balanced by savings and reduced ambitions in other areas. This must allow an enhanced ability to participate in international operations, including demands for available and useable units, prioritised for rapid reaction capability. The capability for enduring peace-support operations must be maintained. The total budget frame for the Armed Forces must also include operative expenses for units in operations, and should, at the end of 2007, entail international operations within an annual budget of 2 billion SEK.

The Defence Commission considers subject, naturally, to international developments and political ambitions that further rationalisation and savings will be possible in the continued course of the adaptation of the Swedish Armed Forces.

"It is extremely gratifying to hear that Sudans government and the Sudan Peoples Liberation Movement/Army in southern Sudan have last night signed the final sections of a forthcoming peace agreement after a very prolonged and cruel civil war," says Minister for Foreign Affairs Laila Freivalds.

The civil war in Sudan is one of the worlds longest wars with two million dead and over four million people who are displaced in their own country. Alongside the peace process in southern Sudan, the conflict in Darfur has developed into the worlds worst humanitarian crisis, with almost one million people who are refugees.

Sweden to send more troops to Afghanistan

The Government decided today to make a new military contribution to the International Security Assistance Force in Afghanistan (ISAF). This came after yesterdays Riksdag decision granting the Government permission to send another such force. Everyone who supports this decision knows that the mission is full of risks. But the situation for the civilian population is so serious that the

rest of the world must provide support by means of military troops in order to increase security.

It is important the international community helps to improve security and makes it easier for the Transitional Authority to reach the provinces in Afghanistan, says Minister for Defence Leni Björklund. Not least to ensure that the elections to be held in Afghanistan in September 2004 are as fair as possible, Ms Björklund continues.

Together with forces from countries including the United Kingdom, Finland and Norway, Swedens troops are intended to expand the NATO-led International Security Assistance Force (ISAF) to northern Afghanistan. Until now the ISAF force has only been operative in Kabul and Kunduz but will now extend its operations to other parts of the country.

Sweden has been participating with units in the international security force in Kabul since the beginning of 2002. After the deployment of the new force, which is planned to take place successively beginning in June, the Swedish presence will comprise some 110 people. The new Swedish force will begin its operations when ISAF has taken over leadership of the units to which we are contributing.

Sweden has been contributing to ISAFs work in Afghanistan since the operations began. It is natural to continue to contribute so that the measures that have already been undertaken can provide secure conditions as a basis for the reconstruction of the whole country. We have a responsibility to the Afghan people, but also to the Swedish soldiers who have performed important duties and done a good job in Afghanistan over the years, says Ms Björklund.

The International Security Assistance Force in Afghanistan (ISAF) was established under UN Security Council resolution 1386 (2001). In October 2003, its geographical mandate was extended outside of Kabul under resolution 1510 (2003).

Sweden to contribute to UN mission in East Timor

The Government decided today to contribute two Swedish civilian police officers and two military observers to the UN peace-keeping mission in East Timor (Timor-Leste).

The Swedish police officers will serve as advisers to the East Timor police force that the UN has helped build up since the country gained independence. The Swedish military observers will contribute to the maintenance of security and stability. This will involve monitoring the work on developing security and facilitating contacts in areas near the border with Indonesia.

Largely thanks to the support the United Nations has been able to provide ahead of independence and in the two years since, admirable progress has been made. However, much remains to be done and Sweden is contributing in this way to the UN missions ability to support East Timor in its democratic development, which still has a short history.

Laila Freivalds to attend summit meeting in Mexico

Good results for the AP Funds in 2003

Today the Government will present to the Riksdag the annual communication evaluating the performance of the National Swedish Pension Funds (AP Funds). The evaluation shows that the AP Funds achieved good results in 2003, as a result of the upturn on the stock exchange, though deviations from the comparative index are small and management costs for the funds appear high relative to the degree of management activity.

The Government notes that the First, Second, Third and Fourth AP Funds report good results in absolute terms in 2003, due to rising prices for the share investments that have previously caused major losses. The Sixth AP Fund reports good results, both short term and long term, partly due to positive returns on the Funds holdings of non-listed shares.

-I am pleased to note that the AP Funds have achieved good results in absolute terms and that a significant part of previous losses have been recouped. I am also satisfied with the AP Funds increased activity concerning holdings, which can be expected to have a positive effect on the long-term yield of the Funds, says Gunnar Lund, Minister for International Economic Affairs and Financial Markets.

The FirstFourth AP Funds and the Sixth AP Fund, which together make up the buffer funds for the pension system, report combined earnings of SEK 80.8 billion in 2003. This compensates for a substantial part of the losses in previous years (SEK 85.6 billion in 2002 and SEK 26 billion in 2001). In terms of yield, the AP Funds had a total rate of return of 16.4 per cent in 2003. The average return over the latest five-year period was 1.7 per cent per year, which is 0.1 percentage points per year below the average rate of inflation.

With regard to the management of the FirstFourth AP Funds, the Government notes that the returns so far have shown little deviation from the comparative index, which indicates a low level of risk-taking. The costs for managing the Funds appear out of proportion to the degree of management activity, a point the Government intends to keep a continued watch on. The Government also notes that good results must be produced in the years ahead in order to achieve the targets set by the Funds boards.

A comparison of the yields from the FirstFourth AP Funds since mid-2001 indicates a lesser degree of risk diversification than could have been expected as a result of dividing the buffer capital of the pension system into four separate funds. All the indications are that this is due to the Funds interpreting their assignments in a similar way, but an additional factor is apparently that the Funds have so far made very little use of opportunities for active management. In conjunction with future evaluations, the Government intends to come back to the issue of risk diversification between the Funds and the associated question of the mutual independence of the Funds.

The Sixth AP Fund has special instructions to invest in unlisted small and medium-sized companies. The Fund has met the boards targets by achieving a positive return on the Funds

holdings of unlisted shares over the long term. The unlisted portfolio as such, however, has not met the boards targets during the period. Nonetheless, the results can be described as good.

The Seventh AP Fund, which is part of the premium pension system, has recouped some of the losses of earlier years by means of the stock market upturn in 2003. The Seventh AP Fund has so far achieved the boards long-term goal that the Premium Savings Fund shall outperform the average premium pension fund, but at a lower risk. On the other hand, the Premium Savings Fund and the Premium Choice Fund have not outperformed the comparative index over the period since they began operations in autumn 2000.

Statement by Minister for Foreign Affairs Laila Freivalds on Egyptians removed from Sweden

Former Deputy Prime Minister Lena Hjelm-Wallén has just completed a visit to Cairo on my behalf to discuss the case of the two Egyptians who were removed from Sweden in December 2001. Lena Hjelm-Wallén was accompanied by the Director-General for Legal Affairs at the Ministry for Foreign Affairs,

Carl-Henrik Ehrenkrona. They both had talks with leading representatives of the Egyptian Ministry of Justice and the countrys security service.

During the talks in Cairo the Swedish delegation raised two main issues: the reports of torture and other unacceptable treatment and the trial held at the end of April this year of one of the two people who had been removed from Sweden.

As regards the treatment of the two Egyptians Lena Hjelm-Wallén stated that several sources had reported that both men had been treated in a way that is not consistent with the guarantees that the Egyptian Government had given to the Swedish Government. The Egyptian representatives rejected these reports categorically. Lena Hjelm-Wallén requested that a thorough investigation be carried out. The Egyptian side indicated that it was prepared to carry out an investigation. To ensure independent scrutiny the Swedish Government will suggest international participation.

As regards the recently concluded trial complaints have been made concerning procedural flaws that mean that it is questionable whether the guarantees requirement of a fair trial has been fulfilled. Lena Hjelm-Wallén stated that if the reports of flaws in the trial are correct a new trial must be held. The Egyptian representatives rejected the reports of flaws in the trial. However, they pointed to the possibility of drawing attention to procedural errors in a petition to the President. The Director-General for Legal Affairs at the Ministry for Foreign Affairs has been instructed to contact the mans lawyers to notify them that they can consider the possibility of citing procedural errors to obtain a new trial.

Sweden adopts strategy for development cooperation with Iraq

The Government took a decision today on the future orientation of Swedish development cooperation with Iraq.

"The purpose of our support to Iraq is to contribute to a peaceful development towards democracy and the rule of law, to support economic recovery and lay the foundation for broad cooperation between Sweden and Iraq", says Minister for International Development Cooperation Carin Jämtin.

"However, in order for all the intended actions to be implemented, it is essential that the security situation improves. Although developments are hard to predict, it is important that this preparedness exists to support the people of Iraq", Ms Jämtin says.

The proposed budget for Swedish development cooperation with Iraq in the period 20042006 has a maximum limit of SEK 400 million, including humanitarian support.

The need for reconstruction in Iraq is substantial. While the humanitarian needs remain, it is also important that work on reconstructing Iraqi society continues. Accordingly, apart from continued humanitarian efforts, the principal areas of cooperation proposed are infrastructure and democracy and human rights. Special measures are planned for civil society in support of womens rights.

To a considerable extent, Swedish development assistance will be channelled through multilateral organisations, primarily the UN and the World Banks International Reconstruction Fund Facility for Iraq (IRFF). The purpose of this facility is to promote good coordination between the international donors and the Iraqi government and to strengthen Iraqi ownership of the reconstruction process. Support of at least SEK 75 million has qualified Sweden for a place on the donor committee which gives Sweden an opportunity to influence the design of the facilitys measures.

One possible sector for future bilateral coperation is infrastructure, which is one of the areas given priority by the UN and the World Bank. Swedish companies have leading-edge expertise in this area and previous experience of working in the country, which should be put to good use. The Government also hopes that the knowledge of the many people of Iraqi origin now living in Sweden can be drawn on in the future reconstruction work in Iraq.

Global agreement on chemicals enters into force today

Today, Monday the Stockholm Convention will enter into force and so become a legally binding global agreement.

The negotiations that led to the Stockholm Convention on Persistent Organic Pollutants came about as a result of an initiative from Sweden,

the other Nordic countries and Canada. The Stockholm Convention was adopted at a diplomatic conference in Stockholm on 23 May 2001 and is historic in that it is the first global environmental convention to deal comprehensively with trade, production, emissions and waste from hazardous chemicals.

It is quite clear that global cooperation is necessary when it comes to this group of cross-border pollutants, says Lena Sommestad, Minister for the Environment. It is not enough that we in Sweden prohibit and restrict emissions when products that contain these chemicals are being spread via air streams and imports on a large-scale basis.

In a first stage, the Convention prohibits or restricts twelve highly hazardous chemicals, known as POPs, that are persistent, toxic and can accumulate in living organisms. The most hazardous pollutants of today belong to this group, including DDT, PCB and dioxins. These pollutants are spread through air and water far from the source of emissions.

This is an important step in global efforts regarding chemicals and I am very pleased today with what we have accomplished. But there is still a lot for us to do if we are to achieve the goal of a non-toxic environment. New threats are being discovered and there are other chemicals that should be added to the Convention, such as those belonging to the group of brominated flame retardants. This year, Sweden will contribute SEK 1 million to the Stockholm Conventions Secretariat. This will make it easier for other countries to implement the Convention, Lena Sommestad concludes.

Sweden ratified the Convention in 2002. A total of 151 countries and the EU have signed the Convention, and of these, 59 countries have ratified it so far. In Sweden, the twelve chemicals that will now be prohibited or restricted by the Stockholm Convention are already prohibited or severely restricted. As regards unintentionally formed POPs, such as dioxins and PCB, efforts are in progress to analyse sources of emission and the need for further measures. The Swedish Environmental Protection Agency will present a final report of these findings to the Government in December of this year. It is also necessary for Sweden to continue its work with the remaining occurrence of PCB in such things as building materials including sealants and floor coverings, as well as small capacitors. Sweden has also identified additional chemicals that it feels should be included in the Stockholm Convention.

Stockholm to host international meeting on the greatest challenges facing humanity

TIME AND PLACE

There will be an opportunity for the media to meet the participants on Tuesday 18 May at 12.00, at the Clarion Hotel (room C3) in Stockholm.

How has the human race succeeded in stopping such threats to our survival as the ozone hole and smallpox? And why have we failed to cope with global challenges such as the greenhouse effect, polio and world poverty?

This is the topic of a meeting in Stockholm on 18 May, with participants from about 30 countries and international organisations. The meeting has been organised by the Ministry for Foreign Affairs and the International Task Force on Global Public Goods, which was established at the initiative of France and Sweden. The purpose of the Task Force is to identify better ways in which governments, business, researchers, international organisations and NGOs can cooperate on crucial global issues. It is to complete its assignment in 2005.

Further contribution to KFOR

The Government decided today on the size of the Swedish contribution to the multinational peace force KFOR in Kosovo from the middle of June.

The decision means that Sweden will contribute around 330 persons as of mid-June. The contribution will consist of an armed force, including an infantry company, intelligence functions and staff officers. The decision means a cut in the previous force, which consisted of around 520 persons.

The tasks of this mission and its geographical area of responsibility will be adapted to the size of the Swedish force in order to achieve maximum efficiency for the Swedish contribution and, in particular, to meet the need for security of the Swedish unit.

In addition to the initiative in Kosovo, a peace-support mission (SFOR) is also underway in Bosnia and Herzegovina, the leadership of which will probably be transferred to the European Union during the year. At present Sweden is participating in SFOR and wishes to continue to help ensure security and stability in the Western Balkans by participating in KFOR and in the forthcoming EU-led mission in Bosnia and Herzegovina.

The Swedish contribution to KFOR is being given at the same time as Sweden has committed itself to supporting other important crisis-management missions, including one in Afghanistan, where the Government has presented a proposal to the Riksdag that Sweden should contribute approximately 100 more persons and in Liberia, to which Sweden recently sent a mechanised company of around 230 persons.

Sweden has been contributing to the multinational KFOR force in Kosovo since 1999. In adddition to the force of 520, 139 additional troops were sent to Kosovo in the middle of April after the disturbances in order to increase security for the Swedish force and to reduce the burden of work of its staff. Even after the cuts, the force will be Swedens largest contribution to an international mission.

KFOR is led by NATO, under a mandate from the UN Security Council in Resolution 1244 (1999). At present, 36 countries are participating with a total of around 19 000 persons in international efforts to bring security and stability to Kosovo.

Sweden ranks third in international index on poverty reduction measures in the world

Sweden ranks third in an international index that measures all the action taken by the rich countries to reduce poverty in the world. Sweden has risen in rank from eighth place in 2003.

The Center for Global Development, an independent think-tank in Washington D.C., and the Foreign Policy magazine publish an index assessing the policies of the 21 richest countries in contributing to global development and reducing poverty in the world. The index was first published in 2003. This years issue was launched on 27 April 2004.

The index, the Commitment to Development Index, assesses the design of rich countries measures in seven different policy areas of crucial importance to the developing countries: foreign aid, trade, investment, migration, security, environment and technology.

This years rating ranked Sweden third, which is a marked improvement on its eighth place in the 2003 ranking. The Netherlands and Denmark head the list while Japan comes last. Sweden ranks top in the field quality of foreign aid and is far ahead in the fields of environment, trade and technology. Great progress has also been made in the field of security.

This years results show that we are on the right track with the new Swedish policy for global development, and this gives us an incentive to carry on our work. This autumn, the Government will also present a report to the Riksdag on what is needed to drive this policy even further, says Minister for International Development Cooperation Carin Jämtin.

Minister for International Development Cooperation Carin Jämtin will participate in the World Bank Spring Meeting in Washington D.C., USA, on 2325 April.

In connection with the meeting, Ms Jämtin will have discussions with ministers from Rwanda, Kenya, Zambia, Bolivia, Nigeria and Canada, and with the Administrator of the United States Agency for International Development (USAID) Andrew Natsios, the Deputy Head of the World Bank Shengman Zhang, and the Executive Director of the Joint United Nations Programme on HIV/AIDS (UNAIDS) Peter Piot.

One of the main issues at the meeting will be how poor countries and rich countries, in cooperation with the World Bank and other international organisations, will be able to achieve the Millennium Development Goals, including the goal on halving world poverty.

If poverty is to be halved by 2015, there must be better coordination between policy areas. There must be a development perspective in areas such as international trade, security and environment policy, says Ms Jämtin.

One of Swedens main messages at the meeting will be that the resources we have must be used as effectively as possible and that different organisations must improve their coordination and support each others efforts. At the same time, we will emphasise that these resources also need to increase. The rich countries must fulfil the commitments they made in Monterrey. The fact that Swedish development assistance continues to increase gives us credibility and puts power behind our words.

Sweden will also press to increase the capacity of the poor countries to participate in and influence World Bank operations, says Ms Jämtin.

Carin Jämtin comments on the situation in Sudan

Carin Jämtin comments on the situation in Sudan

The situation in western Sudan is probably the worst ongoing humanitarian disaster in the world, says Carin Jämtin. Despite this, Sudan risks being overshadowed by other ongoing crises, which can worsen the situation even further. The Swedish Government will therefore actively seek to draw even more attention in organisations like the EU and the UN to the situation in Sudan.

In the ceasefire agreement of 8 April, the parties to the conflict promised access to the affected areas for humanitarian organisations. It is deeply disturbing that this commitment has not yet been fully implemented. We urge the parties to immediately guarantee humanitarian access to the area, and enable UN investigation missions to travel to Dafur as soon as possible, says Carin Jämtin.

Previous experience has shown that crises in Africa do not always get the international attention and support that is so needed to improve the situation. The Government is therefore determined to continue to pursue the issue in the international forums concerned. I am going to raise the matter myself with my development minister colleagues in the EU, concludes Carin Jämtin.

In 2003, Swedish support to Sudan amounted to some SEK 75 million. This year, Sweden has increased its support to the civil population and to date has already contributed over SEK 100 to Sudan. Swedish development assistance to Sudan has been used for programmes providing water/sanitation, food and education and projects to improve health and demobilise child soldiers.

New Swedish troops to Afghanistan

The Government decided today to propose to the Riksdag that Sweden dispatch new military resources to the International Security Assistance Force (ISAF) in Afghanistan.

"The security situation in Afghanistan has unfortunately deteriorated markedly in the past year. Greater security is a precondition for progress in the democratic process and for improving conditions for Aghanistan's people," says Minister for Foreign Affairs Laila Freivalds.

"The aim of our new mission is to help enhance security and make it easier for the influence of the interim government to reach the Afghani provinces. At the same time, we can support the first free elections in Afghanistan that are planned for September 2004."

The Government's intention is to contribute to the expansion of the International Security Asssistance Force led by NATO under a mandate from the UN Security Council. The force, established after the fall of the Taliban regime in 2001, has until recently only operated in Kabul, but is now being extended to rural areas of the country.

The almost 100 people to be dispatched by the Government this June include military observer teams and rapid deployment forces. Sweden is also prepared to supply a transport aircraft. Together with, inter alia, British and Danish units, the Swedish troops will form part of the ISAF expansion in the area around Mazar-e-Sharif in northern Afghanistan.

- - - -

Swedish forces have participated in ISAF in Kabul since the beginning of 2002. Some of these, mainly staff and liason officers, will continue to serve there. In addition, the Government recently decided to contribute Swedish military rescue service staff to Kabul's international airport. The deployment of the new force would bring the number of Swedish personnel stationed there to around 110.

ISAF was established under Resolution 1386 (2001) in the UN Security Council. In October 2003, its geographical mandate was extended beyond Kabul under Resolution 1510 (2003). Today, ISAF comprises a total of 6 400 soldiers.

Spring Fiscal Policy Bill 2004: Fight against unemployment a priority for the Government

The international economy is emerging from the downturn it has experienced in recent years and strengthened in the second half of 2003. In the Swedish economy, too, activity increased in the autumn of 2003. Growth is expected to reach 2.5 per cent this year and 2.6 per cent in 2005.

The recession has left its mark on the Swedish labour market. Unemployment is at a higher level than the Government can accept. The economic upturn will have no immediate impact on the labour market.

As in previous years, central government spending will be kept below the approved expenditure ceilings. Expenditure ceilings for 2006 and 2007 will be proposed in the autumn, in the Budget Bill for 2005.

There is a budget margin of SEK 0.1 billion in 2004. The estimated margins in 2005 and 2006 are SEK 2.0 billion and SEK 24 billion respectively.

A public finances surplus of 0.3 per cent of gross domestic product (GDP) is expected this year. This is slightly lower than the target set for 2004, mainly because the employment trend is poorer than anticipated. However, the target of an average 2 per cent surplus over the course of an economic cycle remains firm.

Growth and full employment

The objectives of Swedens economic policy are a high rate of growth and full employment. The work first concept is a guiding principle of the policy for growth.

Open unemployment will rise to 5.5 per cent this year, declining to 5.3 per cent next year. Open unemployment must be driven back towards the 4 per cent mark.

The Government and Riskdag have set the target that 80 per cent of people aged between 20 and 64 should be employed on the regular labour market in 2004. This target will not be met in 2004, primarily because the economic cycle has been in a weak phase, but also on account of education initiatives that have reduced the proportion of people aged 2024 who are in employment.

To supplement the employment target there is also a social assistance target. The trend for social assistance has been positive since 1999, despite the cyclical weakness. Between 1999 and 2002, social assistance payments went down by 25 per cent. The reduction continued in 2003, partly because of a positive employment trend for immigrants. The employment and social assistance targets remain in place.

More jobs and lower unemployment

The fight against unemployment is one of the Governments principal responsibilities. The Government is now announcing a package of some SEK 10 billion to keep unemployment down and increase employment. This package includes the following measures:

- \cdot Labour market policy programmes will be expanded, adding 15 000 places this year.
- \cdot 5 000 of these places are intended for local authorities.
- · In addition, there will be a temporary further education and training initiative for local authority employees in health care, schools and social services. In 2004 and 2005, a total of 6 000 people will be given the chance to combine part-time work with part-time study in adult upper secondary programmes or higher education programmes. When allocating these study opportunities, local authorities are to give special priority to employees in involuntary part-time positions.
- The volume of labour market policy programmes will be increased in 2005 as well. The Government will assess the level of this increase in the Budget Bill for 2005.
- · A deduction for building repairs, maintenance and improvement (RMI) work will be introduced to run between 15 April 2004 and 30 June 2005. In all essentials, the systems design will follow the regulations that applied between 1996 and 1999. This will cost an estimated SEK 2.4 billion.
- The budget for special employment support under the activity guarantee system will be enlarged. The compensation given to employers will rise from

SEK 750 to SEK 1 000 per day. This will make it possible to provide places for a further 3 000 long-term unemployed people.

· An inquiry will be appointed to examine the possibility of strengthening the right to full-time employment.

Assignments for the National Labour Market Board

- · Labour market policy will focus on the major tasks of job placement and employment guidance, along with action to combat labour shortages and measures to help those who are most detached from the labour market.
- · Special attention must be given to the situation of young people. One of the goals of the Swedish National Labour Market Administration is to halve long-term unemployment among young people in the course of this year.
- There will be a clearer focus on the role of unemployment insurance as adaptation insurance. The National Labour Market Board will be given the task of shortening periods of unemployment and promoting greater consistency in the way different county labour boards and employment offices apply regulations, by making systematic comparisons.

The Government intends to follow developments on the labour market closely in 2004 and will decide on an ongoing basis whether additional measures are needed to curb open unemployment.

Environmental measures

- · A special tax incentive will be brought in for source separation of waste in multi-family buildings. It is estimated that this will cost SEK 0.4 billion in lost tax revenues. The proposal can enter into force on 1 January 2005 and run until 30 June 2006.
- The Government intends to present a proposal later on a special tax incentive for environmental investments in public buildings. This will involve the introduction of a tax deduction equivalent to 30 per cent of the total cost of certain energy-saving measures and conversion to renewable energy systems undertaken in properties in public ownership. A tax deduction at the higher rate of 70 per cent will be introduced for installing solar cells. The total tax revenues lost as a result are expected to amount to SEK 2 billion, of which a maximum of SEK 100 million will be for the higher deduction for installing solar cells. This proposal will enter into force on 1 January 2005 and apply until 30 June 2006.
- The budget for the climate investment programme will increase by SEK 50 million in 2005 and SEK 150 million in 2006.
- · Appropriations to support biological diversity will rise by SEK 300 million in 2005 and SEK 500 million in 2006.

Support for local authorities

The local government sector needs extra income to enable it to take necessary

initiatives. The Government proposes a vigorous commitment to local authorities for the remainder of its present term of office:

- The temporary employment support paid out to local authorities since 2002, plus receipts from the fixed SEK 200 all taxpayers pay in national income tax, will be replaced from 2005 by higher central government grants worth SEK 4.7 billion.
- · General employment support worth SEK 1.5 billion is proposed for next year.

An additional sum of SEK 4 billion will be allocated to local authorities from 2005 onwards. These funds are to be distributed as follows:

New resources for local authorities

- · A special government grant will make it possible to employ 6 000 extra pre-school teachers. This grant will provide SEK 1 billion in 2005 and SEK 2 billion in 2006 and 2007. After 2007 these funds will be incorporated in the general system of central government grants. The aim of these extra staff resources is to improve pre-school standards and reduce the size of groups.
- · An additional sum of SEK 1.3 billion will be allocated to the local government equalisation system from 2005 onwards.
- The Government will present directions for the distribution of the remaining SEK 1.7 billion for 2005 in the Budget Bill for 2005.

Fighting ill health/reducing sick leave

The goal set by the Government and Riskdag is that in 2008 absence from working life due to sickness will be at half the 2002 level. There will be fewer new cases of activity compensation and sickness compensation.

At present approximately 130 000 people have been on sick leave for more than a year. More than 500 000 people are receiving sickness or activity compensation. It is estimated that the number of days of sick leave claimed will fall by 16 per cent between 2002 and 2004. Yet between 2002 and 2003, the number of new activity and sickness compensation awards increased by nearly 5 per cent.

Unless effective steps are taken, there is a risk that the number of people receiving activity or sickness compensation will continue to rise relatively sharply until 2008. This is largely due to the fact that far too many cases of sick leave have been long lasting.

The Government will present a more detailed analysis of the target for reduced sick leave in the Budget Bill for 2005.

In the autumn of 2003, the Government and the social partners discussed measures that should be taken to reduce sickness absence.

In mid-December, the Government, the Left Party and the Green Party presented a joint declaration of intent containing a range of measures. These measures are now to be implemented, as follows:

· A system of co-financing, under which employers will be required to pay part of the cost of sickness benefits when an employee is on sick leave. The co-financing scheme will require employers, after the first two weeks, to pay 15 per cent of the cost of sickness benefits for each case of sickness. The co-financing will cease if the person on sick leave returns to part-time work or to work with rehabilitation compensation.

A mechanism will be introduced to protect small enterprises from being hit by unreasonably high costs.

In addition, the Government proposes measures to improve the sick leave process and ensure the sustainability of the sickness insurance system, as well as augmented work environment measures.

- The social insurance offices will be required to follow up new cases of sickness compensation for which no time limit has been set. Sickness compensation awards that have already been approved will be followed up much more extensively than previously.
- The no-benefit qualifying day system will be revised so that it is applied more fairly.
- The social insurance office will be required to call parties to a case review meeting and draw up a rehabilitation plan within a certain specified time.
- · There will be changes in the regulations to help doctors and social insurance managers to prevent errors when certifying sick leave and awarding sickness compensation.

The introduction of these measures will make it possible to restore the level of compensation given by sickness benefits on 1 January 2005, as announced in the Budget Bill for 2004.

Taxes

Tax talks have been completed with the Confederation of Swedish Enterprise, the Swedish Association of Local Authorities, the Swedish Federation of County Councils, the Swedish Trade Union Confederation, the Confederation of Professional Employees and the Swedish Confederation of Professional Associations. The constructive discussions and the proposals presented during these talks provide a good foundation for the continued political process and the Governments work on developing and improving the Swedish tax system so as to make it more conducive to growth.

Integration

Within the framework of talks on growth, the Government has invited dialogue on growth and integration. The aim has been to harness the skills and qualifications of people in Sweden with non-Swedish backgrounds and to increase the employment rate in this group.

The Government will be disseminating information about legislation against

ethnic discrimination and will encourage employers to make use of measures within the framework of present labour market policy. Such measures may involve better induction of immigrants, increased access to work experience schemes and action to combat discrimination.

Ethics in the business sector

The Government will continue to engage in discussions with the social partners on ethics in the business sector.

Alcohol policy

Implementation of the action plan on alcohol policy is continuing. This includes a broad programme of public information and enhanced preventive action at local level.

Children

SEK 1 billion is being set aside for reforms for children in 2006. A supplementary child allowance for students will be introduced. At the same time, the share of housing allowances payable as a special allowance to families with children will be raised. Maintenance support will also go up.

The Government has appointed a special working group to describe and analyse the situation of children living in financially vulnerable families. Priority will be given to improvements for this group of children.

Development assistance

The Government expects there will be scope to raise the budget for development assistance to 1 per cent of gross national income (GNI) during the present term of office. As a step in this direction, a further rise of SEK 590 million in the development assistance budget is proposed for 2005. As a result of macroeconomic developments, an additional increase of SEK 34 million is expected in 2005 compared with the framework estimated in the Budget Bill for 2004.

Defence

The basic guideline for the Defence Commission in preparing its proposals is that they must lead to substantially reduced costs. One of the principal scenarios for this process is to be savings of SEK 6 billion. In order to create room for manoeuvre and facilitate the process of adjustment, the defence organisation will have limited authority to order new equipment and services in 2004.

Green tax shift

The Governments tax shift strategy includes a reform of Swedish energy taxation. As a first step in this reform the present zero rate of tax on electricity used in industry will be replaced from 1 July 2004 by the tax rate (SEK

0.005/kWh) corresponding to the minimum level in the Energy Tax Directive. The Government will shortly present a bill proposing tax-free status, in certain circumstances, for electricity used in industrial processes. The objective is for a new energy tax system to be able to enter into force no later than 1 January 2006.

Other proposals

- · On 1 January the sabbatical year system will be brought in nationwide. Approximately 12 000 places will be available under the scheme, on the same terms as during the trial period.
- · SEK 50 million have been set aside to finance a trial programme of shorter working hours in 2005 and 2006. One of the purposes of this pilot scheme is to shed light on the link between health and working hours.
- · A person who has been awarded sickness compensation will be able to commence higher education studies and afterwards receive the same compensation again without reassessment.
- · 4 000 new police officers will be trained during the Governments present term of office.

Swedens Economy

Sweden's gross domestic product (GDP) is forecast to increase by 2.5 per cent in 2004 and by 2.6 per cent in 2005. Of the 2.5 per cent GDP growth in 2004, 0.6 percentage points are a result of a higher number of working weekdays this year than last year. Open unemployment is expected to be 5.5 per cent this year before falling to 5.3 per cent next year. General government net lending is estimated to amount to 0.3 per cent of GDP this year and 0.6 per cent next year.

Developments in 20042005

The global economy improved during the second half of 2003. The favourable economic growth in Asia is expected to continue. Growth in the United States is surprisingly good, and there are also now some signs of improvement in the EU. It is primarily global investment activity which is strengthening at this stage. Household consumption is already growing at a good rate in the United States, and household demand is expected to become an increasingly important driver in the EU as well as time goes on.

The recovery in the global economy is reflected in Swedish exports, which grew at a good rate during the second half of 2003. Exports of motor vehicles and pharmaceuticals were particularly strong. There is a great deal to suggest that the upswing in exports will broaden, and that the trade balance will strengthen further. Household demand will continue to be stimulated by low interest rates and a strong wealth position this year and next. Recent years' decline in investment will come to an end this year, but there will not be any notable upswing before 2005.

Employment has fallen over the last year. The decrease is no longer limited to industry but now extends to most sectors of the economy. The decline will continue in 2004; the increased activity in the economy will cause employment to rise no earlier than 2005. Open unemployment will rise to 5.5 per cent this year before falling to 5.3 per cent next year. The low demand for labour, combined with population growth in age groups with a low employment rate, means that the regular employment rate will fall from 77.6 per cent in 2003 to 76.6 per cent in 2005.

Productivity growth in the business sector has been high in recent years. Combined with lower wage increases, this has contributed to low domestic inflationary pressure. The stronger krona has led to falling prices for imported goods. Next year the stronger growth and demand are expected to result in inflation gradually nearing the Riksbank's target of 2 per cent. No further changes in the Riksbank's repo rate are assumed this year.

Medium-term estimates for 2006 and alternative scenarios

Besides the economic forecast for 2004 and 2005, medium-term estimates are being presented for 2006. These estimates are based on the assumption that resource utilisation in the economy at the end of 2005 will be below normal. Growth can therefore exceed the long-term rate again in 2006. GDP will grow by 2.5 per cent in 2006, and open unemployment will fall to 4.9 per cent.

Two alternative scenarios are also presented. The low-growth scenario illustrates the effects of weaker global growth on the Swedish economy. The high-growth scenario assumes that the labour market and wage formation function in such a way that the government's target of an 80 per cent employment rate is achieved in 2007.

Public finances

In 2003 general government net lending amounted to 0.5 per cent of GDP, which is an improvement on 2002. This year, net lending is forecast to fall to 0.3 per cent of GDP as a result of a decrease in income as a proportion of GDP. Based on decisions and proposals announced to date, expenditure will fall as a proportion of GDP in 2005 and 2006. Net lending will therefore grow to 0.6 per cent of GDP in 2005 and 1.1 per cent in 2006 (see Table 4).

Net lending in 2004 will break down between the three components of the general government

sector such that central government will generate a deficit of SEK 42 billion while the old-age pension system will generate a surplus of SEK 51 billion. In 2005 an increased central government deficit will be offset by an increased surplus in the pension system. The improvement in general government net lending will be the result of a rise in local government net lending.

Consolidated debt amounted to 51.9 per cent of GDP at the end of 2003, which is well below the EU's reference value of 60 per cent. The breakdown of net lending between central government and the old-age pension system means that the improvement in financial position during the forecast period will take the form of increased assets in the pension system. The central government deficit means that both central government debt and consolidated gross debt will rise in absolute terms. In 2004 they will also rise temporarily as a proportion of GDP before falling again.

The general government sector's net debt fell almost to zero in 2003 as a result of increases in share values. The net lending during the forecast period means that the general government sector's financial assets are forecast to exceed liabilities by SEK 44 billion in 2006.

If net lending is adjusted for the economic cycle and various temporary factors, this gives a measure of underlying, or structural, net lending. Structural net lending fell between 2000 and 2002, due primarily to tax cuts and other reforms. It then increased to 1.1 per cent of GDP in 2003 and will hold at this level in 2004 before improving further in the following years (see Table 5).

Evaluation of forecasts

The regular evaluation of forecasts in the Spring Fiscal Policy Bill shows that the Ministry of Finance overestimated GDP growth in the forecasts for 2003 made in 2002, while the forecasts presented in 2003 were in line with the actual outcome. Other economic analysts' forecasts were also revised similarly. All forecasters underestimated the growth in unemployment in 2003, especially in the forecasts made in 2002.

Swedish police adviser to OSCE field mission in Belgrade

The Government has today decided to assign Detective Inspector Dan Göthberg to the newly established post of police adviser to the Organisation for Security and Cooperation in Europe (OSCE) in Belgrade, Serbia.

The position of police adviser to the OSCE field mission in Belgrade is the result of cooperation between the National Police Board, the OSCE and the Serbian Ministry of Internal Affairs. The three parties have developed a three-year project designed to further the use of criminal investigation technology by the Serbian police service. The Swedish International Development Cooperation Agency is providing approximately SEK 12 million to support the project. As police adviser, Dan Göthberg will be supporting the implementation of the Swedish–Serbian development cooperation project. His assignment will include serving as adviser to the Serbian police service in the technical aspects of scene-of-crime investigations, technology use, methodology and related areas.

Police matters have become an important task for the OSCE. Four of the field missions in the Western Balkans (Croatia, Serbia and Montenegro, Kosovo and Macedonia) are working on police matters, including the training of multi-ethnic police forces.

Carin Jämtin comments suspension of food aid for Palestinian refugees

Yesterday the UN agency for assistance to Palestine refugees, UNRWA, broke off its humanitarian assistance in Gaza with immediate effect.

This means that, for the time being, UNRWA will not be distributing food aid to some 600 000 Palestinian refugees. This risks having significant humanitarian consequences and seriously worsening the living conditions of already extremely vulnerable Palestinian refugees.

"It is unacceptable that the UN is now being forced to end its food deliveries. If this persists there is a risk of starvation. Israel's legitimate concern for its security situation is no justification for preventing the UN from providing humanitarian assistance," says Minister for International Development Cooperation Carin Jämtin.

The reason for UNWRA's drastic decision is that the Israeli authorities have increased the already very complicated and time-consuming regulations for staff and materials entering and leaving the Gaza Strip. UNWRA now finds the situation unsustainable.

"Sweden therefore urges Israel to immediately lift the restrictions that are preventing the UN from distributing food aid to Palestinian refugees in Gaza," says Carin Jämtin.

"Today Sweden has also reiterated the demands that the EU is making on Israel. These demands include the need for clear guidelines, extended opening hours at border crossings and access for vehicles of international organisations, as well as permission to also remove humanitarian materials, such as food containers, that have been transported into Gaza. I am also going to raise the matter with my EU colleagues at the next development ministers meeting," concludes Carin Jämtin.

UNWRA is the UN agency for assistance to Palestinian refugees. In 2003 Sweden contributed almost SEK 300 million in support of UNRWA's activities.

Sweden strengthens its contribution to KFOR forces in Kosovo

The Government today decided to give the Swedish Armed Forces the go-ahead to reinforce the Swedish battalion in Kosovo (KS09) with a maximum of 150 people until 20 June 2004. On 26 March 2004 the Swedish Armed Forces requested a temporary reinforcement of the Swedish battalion in Kosovo. This measure will ensure that the Swedish battalion has adequate protection and sufficient endurance capacity until the regular rotation in June 2004. Due to the developments in Kosovo since 17 March 2004, including demonstrations and subsequent riots, the Swedish Armed Forces have identified the need for a temporary reinforcement of the Swedish battalion. Reinforcements include personnel, vehicles and equipment and will be on site in Kosovo by mid-April at the latest. The cost of the temporary reinforcement must not exceed SEK 52 million. On 29 March 2004 the Swedish Armed Forces were assigned by the Government Offices to make plans and preparations for the temporary reinforcement.

Carin Jämtin to take part in memorial ceremony in Rwanda

On 7 April, Minister for International Development Cooperation Carin Jämtin will lead a Swedish delegation to Rwanda to attend the ceremony taking place in the capital city of Kigali to commemorate the tenth anniversary of the 1994 genocide.

"The genocide in Rwanda was an atrocity. I am taking part in the memorial ceremony to show respect to those who fell victim to the murderers. Peace and reconciliation are a precondition for development and this is why Sweden is supporting efforts to achieve reconciliation in Rwanda," says Minister for International Development Cooperation Carin Jämtin.

Rwanda is one of the world's poorest countries. It is gradually recovering from the genocide, which shattered the community. Between April and July 1994, some 800 000 people were murdered in Rwanda.

Sweden and Rwanda have been engaged in development cooperation since

1997. In 2003, Swedish support amounted to some SEK 100 million. Among other things, Sweden is contributing to a memorial to the genocide, the Gisozi Memorial Centre, which is under construction in Kigali, and is also supporting the country's National Unity and Reconciliation Commission.

Level of greenhouse emissions is stable

The level of greenhouse gas emissions in Sweden is falling. From 1990 to 2002 levels fell by 3.5 percent.

This is one of the findings of a report on Swedish emissions of greenhouse gases that Sweden is about to present to the EU Commission and the Climate Convention Secretariat.

A breakdown of the figures shows that emissions from small-scale heating plants and individual boilers have dropped by 38 per cent since 1990. This is due to a reduction in the use of oil heating and greater use of alternative heating methods. District heating, for example, has undergone extensive expansion and the use of biofuels has risen sharply.

However, carbon dioxide emissions from industries and heat and power production in large-scale plants increased during this period.

Traffic emissions increased steadily over the entire period 19902002. In 2002, carbon dioxide emissions from the transport sector were 1.7 million tonnes higher than in 1990. This corresponds to an increase of 10 per cent since 1990.

Emissions have fallen and this is good news. It shows, for example, that carbon dioxide taxes and investments in district heating facilities have had a significant impact. But traffic emissions are rising and this is a matter for concern. This trend must be broken if Sweden is to reduce emissions of greenhouse gases in the long term, says Minister for the Environment Lena Sommestad.

Laila Freivalds and Carin Jämtin to take part in international conference on Afghanistan

On 31 March, Minister for Foreign Affairs Laila Freivalds and Minister for International Development Cooperation Carin Jämtin will take part in an international conference on Afghanistan, "Afghanistan and the International Community – a Partnership for the Future". The conference, to be held in Berlin, will be hosted by President Hamid Karzai and Federal Chancellor Gerhard Schröder, as well as the UN and Japan.

"The presence and involvement of the international community in Afghanistan is very important. Afghanistan must not be forgotten in the wake of other conflicts and crises around the world," states Minister for Foreign Affairs Laila Freivalds.

Many positive things have happened since the fall of the Taliban regime in 2001. More than three million refugees have returned from neighbouring countries to their homeland, four million children -34 per cent of them girls - now attend school and women are no longer forbidden to work for a living.

"But there is still cause for concern about the situation in Afghanistan. The poor security situation, the lack of legal certainty, drug trafficking, human rights violations – where women and girls in particular are at risk – is worrying," states Minister for International Development Cooperation Carin Jämtin.

The goal of the Berlin conference is to look to the future and support the ongoing democratisation process and reconstruction of Afghanistan.

In its development strategy for Afghanistan, Sweden has promised long-term assistance and support of up to SEK 1 billion over a 3-year period (2002-2004). So far about SEK 630 million of this allocation has been paid out.

This year Sweden plans to increase its contribution to the Afghanistan Reconstruction Trust Fund (ARTF) from SEK 47 million to at least SEK 75 million.

Swedish election observers to Malawi

The Government decided today to send three election observers to Malawi to monitor the presidential and parliamentary elections in the country, due to be held on 18 May. The Swedish observers will be members of the joint EU election observation team.

"It's important that the elections in Malawi are conducted in a free and democratic manner. By sending election observers, Sweden can contribute to the development of a functioning electoral system in the country and thus strengthen Malawi's democracy," says Minister for International Development Cooperation Carin Jämtin.

Two of the Swedish observers will work for six weeks in April and May and one observer will be on duty for almost two weeks around the time of the election. The EU Commission will finance the mission, apart from wages and training, which will be paid for by the Member States involved.

The country introduced a multi-party system as recently as 1994, and several reforms have been carried out aimed at consolidating democracy. The legacy of one-party rule still partially remains, however. The opposition has expressed concern that it will not be able to conduct its electoral campaign on the same terms as the government in power, with regard, for example, to access to the media.

Strategy for Sweden's development cooperation with Namibia

The Government today approved a strategy for development cooperation with Namibia in 2004–2008. In this connection, the Government has decided to enter into a cooperation agreement with Namibia for the period April 2004 to December 2006, providing aid amounting to SEK 160 million.

Under the new strategy, development cooperation with Namibia will move from the traditional bilateral form to broader cooperation.

"This is an exciting change, which reflects the broad relations that have now grown up between Sweden and Namibia," says Minister for Development Cooperation Carin Jämtin.

During Namibia's struggle for liberation, Sweden gave extensive support to the liberation movement SWAPO in the 1970s and 1980s. When Namibia gained independence in 1990, Swedish support instead took the form of bilateral development cooperation. Since Namibia is a middle-income country, it was agreed from the outset that this cooperation would only be pursued for a ten-year period.

Support for export of environmental technology to Canada and China

The Government decided today to allocate SEK 150 000 each to two separate projects to promote exports of Swedish environmental technology to Canada and China respectively.

In February the Government appointed an Inquiry on the organisation of a national centre for environment-driven business development and export of environmental technology. Later this spring Claes Roxbergh, the Inquiry Chair, will be presenting proposals on how to achieve better coordination and concentration of national government resources and how to strengthen cooperation between the State and enterprises. An environmental technology centre will be set up after the summer.

Ethnic reconciliation and the implementation of the peace agreement from 2001 have high priority in addition to closer ties to the EU. On 22 March Prime Minister Crvenkovski submitted an application for membership of the EU.

Focus on Sweden's cooperation in the Euro-Atlantic Partnership Council and the Partnership for Peace

The Government today submitted a communication to the Riksdag on Sweden's cooperation in the Euro-Atlantic Partnership Council (EAPC) and the Partnership for Peace (PfP) (Govt. communication 2003/04:84).

The communication reports on the development of this cooperation and the new situation facing the partner countries' cooperation with NATO. At the UN Conference on Human Rights in Geneva, 25 women foreign ministers and leaders have agreed today to work towards violence against women being the main issue.

The lack of interest in women's rights that exists in many quarters must be overcome and replaced by involvement. Declarations on women's rights must be followed up with action. We call on politicians and civil society all over the world to work together to ensure that women's rights are fully respected."

Government presents communication on transition rules for workers from new EU countries

Today the Government is presenting a written communication to the Riksdag with proposals for special work permit rules for a transition period for workers from the new EU Member States. The Government's proposals will mean more transparency. Workers from all over the new EU are entitled to come to work here. But the job should be a proper one with pay meeting the terms of a collective agreement. Labour permits must be applied for from the country of origin. There must be a formal job offer. Housing should have been arranged prior to entry. If there is any doubt about the seriousness of an employer, it will be possible to control the payment of taxes and social contributions. These are rules that will enable us to prevent people from the new Member States from being exploited on the labour market.

The Government considers that labour market testing is unnecessary at present. However, should there be serious disturbances on the labour market, the Government intends to reintroduce labour market testing for new Member States.

The Government's ambition is that the transition period should be as short as possible. Within two years, the Government will report back to the Riksdag on this issue. This is why the communication also contains a programme of action to prepare for completely free movement.

The package of measures presented in the communication falls into three areas:

- 1. Scope for evading labour market rules will be limited
- The Swedish Tax Agency will be assigned the task of more effective control when issuing F-tax cards and of F-tax card holders. A report on this assignment is to be presented by 30 November 2004 at the latest.
- · A group consisting of representatives of the social partners and the Ministry of Industry, Employment and Communications is working on the question of staffing agencies. The issue of authorisation of staffing agencies is among questions being discussed.
- · At the Ministry of Finance, work is currently being undertaken to review the possibility of allowing principal contractors to be responsible for subcontractors' taxes and social security

contributions.

- · The Act on Codetermination at Work may also need to be amended so that trade unions have insight into and information on compliance with collective agreements even if an employer has no trade union members on the staff.
- · The possibility of ratifying ILO Convention 94 aimed at preventing social dumping will be looked into.
- 2. Improvements will be made in the control and follow up of the labour market
- · Today, controls made of employment certificates for workers in the EU are rather basic. The Swedish Migration Board will be assigned the task of reviewing ways of improving the control of employment certificates.
- The Swedish Migration Board and the Swedish Tax Agency will be commissioned to review what can be done to check more efficiently that self-employed people are genuinely engaged in business activities and to control their ability to support themselves.
- The National Labour Market Board together with the Swedish Migration Board and the social partners have been assigned the task of proposing how continuous monitoring of developments on the labour market could be organised. This would make it possible to discover disturbances threatening employment in a specific region or industry.
- · The Swedish Unemployment Insurance Board (IAF) will report every three months on the number of EU certificates issued for unemployment benefit in Sweden. The IAF has also been assigned the task of proposing further measures to avoid abuse of the unemployment insurance system.
- · The Swedish Working Environment Authority will analyse the problems that may arise in the working environment at companies or entrepreneurs registered abroad.
- 3. Welfare must function for everyone in this country and for those coming here
- · EU citizens are entitled to go to any EU country they like and seek work. While there, the unemployment insurance of the country of origin applies, but if this compensation is very low, the Swedish Social Services Act may come into play. We have to change this, and this is why an Inquiry is being appointed to review the concept of "stay" as used by the social services.
- · To avoid a person obtaining benefits from several systems simultaneously, we shall examine the implementation of the EU's coordination rules. This is also important in order to prevent people from losing their insurance coverage by falling between two countries' insurance systems.
- \cdot In the longer term, Sweden needs to review its national welfare systems in order to adapt them to a globalised world.

Swedish support to the African Union's first peace-keeping mission in Burundi

The Government decided today to allocate a grant of SEK 3 million to the African Union's peace-keeping force in Burundi.

In recent years, African countries and their cooperation organisations have shown a greater willingness and preparedness to deal with conflicts on the continent themselves. The relatively newly established African Union (AU) is in the process of building up a crisis management capacity of its own. The mission in Burundi is the organisation's first independent peace-keeping operation. "The Swedish contribution is part of the Government's efforts to strengthen African capacity to prevent and manage conflicts. A solution to the conflict in Burundi is vital for peaceful, stable development in the region," says Minister for Foreign Affairs Laila Freivalds.

A civil war between the Hutu and Tutsi ethnic groups broke out in Burundi in 1993. Despite the peace agreement of 2000, fighting by some rebel groups that are not party to the agreement has continued. Following new progress in the peace process, the AU decided at the beginning of 2003 to send a peace-keeping force to Burundi to monitor the peace agreement. The African force has been in place in Burundi since May last year and consists today of around 2 600 troops. The UN Security Council has expressed its support for the AU force in Burundi and Secretary-General Kofi Annan has urged the member states to contribute to financing the mission. Swedish election observers to Sri Lanka

The Government has today instructed the Swedish International Development Cooperation Agency to recruit and train one long-term and three short-term observers to monitor the upcoming parliamentary election. The Swedish observers will be members of the joint EU election observation team.

The background of the mission is that the President of Sri Lanka dissolved the country's parliament on 7 February 2004 and called new elections, to be held on 2 April 2004. Sri Lanka's Elections Commissioner has invited the EU to send election monitors to observe the election.

"It's important that the EU and its members heed Sri Lanka's request for election monitoring. An election result that everyone feels is fair and that cannot be called into question can establish the conditions needed for a resumption of the suspended peace talks," says Minister for International Development Cooperation Carin Jämtin.

The long-term observers are to serve for a period of five weeks in March-April and the short-term observers for about ten days, provisionally in early April. The EU Commission will finance the mission, apart from wages and training, which will be paid for by the Member States involved.

After close to 20 years of conflict, for the past two years a ceasefire has been in effect between the government and the Tamil Tigers (LTTE) in the northern and eastern parts of the country. However,

at present the peace negotiations are at a standstill. The election was called as a result of differences between the President and the Prime Minister regarding the conduct of the peace talks.

Yearbook on the EU 2003: Enlargement and work on a new Treaty

Today the Government submitted the annual report on its work in the European Union to the Riksdag.

Activities during 2003 were characterised by the work of the Convention and the Intergovernmental Conference, and by the work on a new Treaty which aims to ensure more effective decision-making in the enlarged Union. During the year a strategic three-year working programme for the Council was adopted for the first time, as was a Security Strategy for the Union.

The Treaty of Accession was signed by the ten new Member States on 14 April. The day after the signing, the ten acceding states, Cyprus, Estonia, Latvia, Lithuania, Malta, Poland, Slovakia, Slovenia, the Czech Republic and Hungary, participated in the EU Council meeting as active

observers.

Work to promote sustainable development, work which links economic reforms, employment and social issues as well as environmental awareness, continued within the framework of the Lisbon strategy. Considerable progress was made through the adoption of new employment guidelines, the creation of a single energy market for households and companies, and agreements being reached on the Single European Sky, trade in the allocation of emission rights and common regulations for energy taxation.

The report also describes the work within all Union policy areas throughout the year. The Government's report on its work in the EU during 2003 will serve as the basis for a parliamentary debate during the spring.

The report is available on the Ministry for Foreign Affairs website www.ud.se and will also be available in libraries. Later in the spring a short version of the Yearbook on the EU will be distributed to upper secondary schools, organisations and the mass media. The short version will also be available in English.

Election observers to Indonesia

The Government decided yesterday to send ten election observers to monitor the parliamentary and presidential elections in Indonesia, within the framework of the EU Commission's election observation mission.

Indonesia is to hold its third free parliamentary elections on 5 April. The first round of the presidential election will take place on 5 July, with a second round, if needed, on 20 September. Just over 300 foreign observers will be monitoring the elections. Apart from the EU, whose mission is the largest, Australia, Japan, the United States and Canada will also be participating. In addition, observers will come from a large number of Indonesian and foreign NGOs.

"It's important that both the parliamentary and the presidential election are conducted in a free and democratic manner. By sending election observers, Sweden can contribute to the development of a functioning electoral system in the country," says Minister for International Development Cooperation Carin Jämtin.

Indonesia has experienced major changes over the past five years. The first democratic elections

were carried out in 1999, after the fall of General Suharto. Although a far-reaching process of reform has been under way since then, the heritage of the long period of authoritarian rule lives on and corruption is widespread. Domestic turbulence has also affected the pace of reforms.

Activities of the Organization for Security and Co-operation in Europe (OSCE) in 2003

Today the Government is submitting a Communication to the Riksdag on the activities of the Organization for Security and Co-operation in Europe (OSCE) in 2003.

"Last year it was particularly important that the OSCE was able to adopt an action plan to combat trafficking in human beings. Sweden has been one of the driving forces behind the adoption of this plan and won support for the appointment of a senior official to monitor implementation," says

Minister for Foreign Affairs Laila Freivalds.

Other examples of important results achieved by the OSCE during 2003 are a new strategy to address threats to security and stability in the twenty-first century and an action plan to improve the situation of Roma and Sinti in the OSCE area.

In the Communication the Government gives an overall picture of OSCE activities and provides information on Sweden's policy towards and involvement in the Organization.

"It is important to highlight the important work being done by the OSCE, not least in the field in the form of conflict prevention and support for democracy development and respect for human rights," says Minister for Foreign Affairs Laila Freivalds.

The OSCE is operating field missions in a total of 16 countries. By its presence on the ground the OSCE can take practical action to promote democracy, human rights, rule of law, and tolerance between ethnic groups. The ultimate aim is to promote stability and development throughout the OSCE area. Sweden supports OSCE field activities in a number of ways, including the secondment/provision of personnel and election observers and funding for various types of projects in the area of conflict prevention.

During 2003 Sweden provided a total of 50 election observers for OSCE election monitoring missions to Albania, Russia, Serbia and Montenegro, Georgia and Azerbaijan.

Sweden also contributed a total of more than SEK 4 million to a range of conflict prevention projects, including police training in Kyrgyzstan, a mine clearance project in Tajikistan, projects to combat human trafficking in Uzbekistan and environmental projects in the Western Balkans. With its broad membership the Organization for Security and Co-operation in Europe (OSCE) is an important means of establishing long-term security in Europe. Swedish Rescue Services Agency to conduct training and bridge-building project in Afghanistan

Following a decision by the Government today, the Swedish Rescue Services Agency is to conduct a training and bridge-building project in Afghanistan.

"Reconstruction of the road network in Afghanistan is a necessary step for creating development and peace in the country. It is important to facilitate relief operations and the return of refugees and will play a crucial role for trade and economic growth," says Minister for Defence Leni Björklund, commenting on the decision.

"It is extremely important that the international community maintains a substantial presence in Afghanistan. The work of the Swedish Rescue Services Agency is part of our continued commitment to the country," says Minister for International Development Cooperation Carin Jämtin.

The purpose of the project is to build eight temporary bridges in Afghanistan. The Swedish Rescue Services Agency plans to direct the construction of the first four bridges and in the process train UNOPS and Afghan personnel so that they will be able to erect the remaining bridges themselves. The project has a budget of SEK 12.5 million and is financed by the Swedish International Development Cooperation Agency.

Sweden provides extensive humanitarian and development-oriented assistance to Afghanistan. For the three-year period 2002–2004, Sweden has pledged SEK 1 billion in support to Afghanistan to contribute in different ways to the reconstruction of the country.

Sweden supports UN initiative in Sudan

Internal disturbances in the Darfur province of Western Sudan have caused a large influx of refugees inside Sudan and over the border in Chad. Previously international relief organisations, including the United Nations, have been prevented from providing relief in the province. Now the United Nations has been given the opportunity to work in the province and will set up operations in

three locations, El Fashir, Nyala and El Geneina.

"We are very pleased that the international community now has access to the province of Darfur, and Sweden will naturally assist the UN in this venture," says Minister for International Development Cooperation Carin Jämtin.

Sweden has received a request from the United Nations to support UN efforts in Western Sudan by setting up an office for all UN staff in the province of Darfur together with Norway, Denmark and Finland. This initiative will be carried out by the Swedish Rescue Services Agency and financed via Sida. Estimated costs are SEK 5 million and the initiative is expected to last one month. The Swedish Rescue Services Agency will send three staff members and be responsible for all equipment connected with the administration, the refugee centre, liaison and IT. In addition, the Swedish Rescue Services Agency will supply vehicles.

"Sweden is a small country, but that does not prevent us from being a major player. Our strong support for the United Nations, our commitment to international organisations and the lack of colonial ties gives us credibility. We take part in UN military missions and contribute to UN civilian disaster missions and development assistance," says Minister for Defence Leni Björklund.

The UN Special Representative for Sudan has requested the support of the UN Office for the Coordination of Humanitarian Assistance (OCHA) for humanitarian initiatives in the province of Darfur in Western Sudan on the Chad border.

New strategy for the international fight against drugs

The fight against drugs is one of four priority areas for Swedish development assistance in 2004. As part of this work, the Government has adopted a new strategy, based on a Sida proposal, for cooperation with the UN body, the United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime (UNODC). The aim of the strategy is to intensify and enhance the efficiency of the Swedish commitment to UN efforts to fight drugs.

The new strategy for cooperation with UNODC is based on Sweden's restrictive drug policy. "Drug abuse and the production of drugs are serious threats to development in many of the world's poor countries. Through the UN, Sweden can contribute to the fight against drugs, primarily by working preventively, but also by impeding drug production and smuggling," says Minister for International Development Cooperation Carin Jämtin.

One of the most important changes in the strategy is that Swedish financial support to the work of UNODC will now be directed at themes rather than at geographical areas, as it was previously. Two-thirds of Sweden's annual grant to UNODC will be used for projects to reduce the demand for

drugs and for policy work. The remaining one-third is a basic general grant to UNODC dug-prevention work.

Sweden has long been an active partner of the UN in its work to combat drugs. Sweden is, for example, one of the largest donors to the UN drug control programme. In 2003, the grant was SEK 38.5 million, which will increase to SEK 50 million in 2004. The UNODC platform is the fight against drugs, terrorism, corruption and trafficking in human beings. Since 2002, it has been led by Antonio Maria Costa.

Final decision on Liberia force

The Government decided today that Sweden would contribute an armed force in Liberia over a twelve-month period as part of the United Nations Interim Administration Mission (UNMIL). On Wednesday the Riksdag decided to consent to the Government bill requesting dispatch of a mechanised infantry company of a maximum of 240 troops who will work together with the Irish battalion that is already in place in Liberia.

The Swedish force will therefore be part of UNMIL's reserve force, which means the Swedish contingent will participate in paving the way for the more stationary troops to be established around the country. The force will also be assigned the task of guarding and protecting UN and humanitarian organisations' activities and protecting civilians.

Operations will not begin until the United Nations are able to guarantee that there is access to medical services of a sufficiently high-standard. The Swedish Armed Forces will issue regular reports to the Government on the development of operations and undertake evaluations of whether changes are necessary in the unit's structure.

Total costs of the UNMIL operations may not exceed SEK 285 million for budget year 2004.

Sweden signs immunity agreement for the International Criminal Court (ICC)

Today Minister for Foreign Affairs Laila Freivalds signed the Agreement on the Privileges and Immunities of the International Criminal Court (ICC).

The purpose of the Agreement is to give the Court and its actors the protection needed to enable the Court to function effectively.

The signing took place at the United Nations headquarters in New York, which Laila Freivalds is visiting for talks with UN Secretary-General Kofi Annan.

"The International Criminal Court represents a significant advance towards strengthening international law and combating freedom from prosecution. Sweden will continue to give the Court strong support, both acting on our own and in cooperation with others, especially the European Union," says Minister for Foreign Affairs Laila Freivalds.

Sweden participated very actively in the work that led up to the adoption of the Rome Statute for the International Criminal Court in July 1998 as well as in the work that enabled the Court to start its operations once its Statute had come into force on 1 July last year.

Work on drafting a Government Bill on the Privileges and Immunities Agreement is under way in the Ministry for Foreign Affairs. When this work has been completed, which should be some time this spring, the Bill will be submitted to the Riksdag (the Swedish Parliament) for decision. Thereafter Sweden will be able to ratify the Agreement. So far five states have ratified the Agreement, which will enter into force after the tenth ratification.

Sweden to strengthen ties to motor city Detroit

The Swedish Honorary Consulate in Detroit is to be upgraded. Leif Pagrotsky, Minister for Industry and Trade, stated this when he met Michigan's Governor Jennifer Granholm in the state capital of Lansing on Tuesday morning, US time.

"This is proof of the growing importance that Michigan and Detroit have for Sweden and Swedish industry," says Minister Leif Pagrotsky.

The industrial link between Sweden and Detroit has increased significantly in recent years. The headquarters for the owners of the Swedish car manufacturers Volvo and SAAB, Ford and General Motors, are situated here. ABB is one of the largest subcontractors to the car industry, and maintain important cooperation involving research and development. The exchange of personnel between Detroit and the region of Västra Götaland, where a large portion of the Swedish motor industry is located, is also increasing, both in the way of short-term residency and those who choose to move permanently.

Lennart Johansson has been the Swedish Consul in Detroit since 1997. As of 1 March, his title will be that of Consul-General.

"The Honorary Consul constitutes a valuable resource for promoting Swedish interests abroad and is an important complement to the regular activities of the Foreign Service," states Leif Pagrotsky. "I am convinced that Lennart Johansson, as Consul-General, will continue his commendable efforts in developing the important relationship between Sweden and Michigan."

The Ministry for Foreign Affairs can open honorary consulates-general in major cities within areas of particular importance to Swedish interests. Swedish Minister of Finance Bosse Ringholm: "Completely unrealistic proposal of Commission on EU-budget"

The Commission has presented proposal for EU-expenditure where the level of expenditure is unrealistically high. In his comment to the Commission proposal for budgetary means for EU in the years 2007-2013, Swedish Minister of Finance Bosse Ringholm declares that the proposal hardly can be viewed as a realistic starting point for negotiations.

– If this proposal would be implemented, it would imply an increase in the range of 12-14 billions SEK or €1,3 – 1,6 billion of the Swedish yearly payment to the Union compared to today's level. I cannot for any reason defend such an increase, Bosse Ringholm continues.

The Commission proposal implies that expenditure within the next financial perspective, EU's long-term budget, will amount to maximum 1,27 per cent of the member states GNI. Together with five other member states, the Swedish Government, have demanded that expenditure from the EU-budget should be limited to maximum 1% of member states GNI. Expenditure from the

EU-budget today amounts to less than 1% of member states GNI.

- Proposing such a massive increase in the expenditure level considerably above what several member states demand and are able to cope with on their national budgets shows the unrealistic view the Commission has regarding our common budget and the state of public finances in Europe, says Bosse Ringholm.
- In a situation where a number of member states must cut down in national expenditure in order to come to terms with their national budget deficits it is almost provocative to propose a large increase in the EU-budget, according to Ringholm.
- An expenditure level at 1% as we and the five co-signers of the 1%-letter advocate would allow for real increases in spending and financing of all agreed EU priorities, according to Ringholm. Through re-allocations we can give the new member-states equal possibilities as today's member states to take part of the common EU-budget.
- The EU-budget should to a greater extent concentrate on reaching a sustainable growth in line with the ambitions in the so-called Lisbon strategy, through actions in the fields of for example research and development, education and new technologies, Bosse Ringholm ends by saying.

Sweden promises support at donor conference for Liberia

State Secretary for Foreign Affairs Hans Dahlgren and State Secretary Annika Söder are participating in the international donor conference for Liberia that is being held today in New York. The donor conference is being led jointly by the United Nations, the United States and the World Bank.

"Sweden will contribute to addressing Liberia's immediate security and humanitarian needs, so as to support the more long-term reconstruction of this war-torn country", says State Secretary Söder. Sweden's total contributions, which will amount to SEK 418 million in 2004–2005, will consist of support for reconstruction work, humanitarian measures and security-building activities. As part of the security-building efforts, the Government has proposed that Sweden should participate in the United Nations Mission in Liberia (UNMIL), sending a mechanised rifle company made up of a maximum of 240 troops. This company will come under the Irish battalion that is already in place in Liberia.

State Secretary for Foreign Affairs Hans Dahlgren is taking part in the donor conference in his capacity as the EU Presidency's Special Representative in Liberia and the neighbouring countries. "The EU has worked closely with the UN, the US and the West African cooperation organisation ECOWAS to bring about a credible peace process and strong UN action. The international support for the peace agreement and the reconstruction of Liberia bears witness to the strength of multilateral cooperation", says Mr Dahlgren.

Sweden is working actively to promote peace and security in Liberia in the long term. In 2003 Sweden contributed close to SEK 75 million for humanitarian and peace-support operations in the country.

Swedish election observers to Russia and Georgia

The Government has decided today to send four election monitors and six election observers to Russia for the forthcoming presidential election on 14 March 2004. The Government has also decided to send two election monitors and four election observers to Georgia for the forthcoming parliamentary elections on 28 March 2004.

"By sending election observers, Sweden can contribute to the development of an efficient election system in the country," says Minister for International Development Cooperation Carin Jämtin. The decision to send election observers follows a request from the Organisation for Security and Cooperation in Europe (OSCE) in light of the elections to the Duma on 7 December last year, which failed to fulfil many of the OSCE and Council of Europe commitments.

The presidential election in Georgia on 4 January 2004 showed a significant improvement compared with the parliamentary elections in November 2003, which did not meet international norms. The conduct of the presidential election has brought Georgia closer to meeting international standards for democratic elections.

Government to sue the EU Commission

The Government today decided it will sue the EU Commission for its decision to allow paraquat in pesticides in the EU. The decision was taken by the Commission in December last year.

As a result of this legal action, the Court of Justice will examine the Government's request to annul the Commission's decision.

In the EU, the substance is used in the control of weeds in, for example, olive, wine and hazelnut plantations. Paraquat has been banned in Sweden since 1983.

"We know that paraquat is highly toxic and extremely hazardous to health. The use of paraquat is associated with the risk of harm and death for thousands of people, especially in poor countries where people are unable or do not know how to protect themselves when using the pesticide. But even in the EU there are reports of poisoning," says Minister for the Environment Lena Sommestad.

"The decision that we took today was essential and based on principle. Ever since the issue was first raised, I have been trying to stop the use of this dangerous substance. In my view, paraquat is an unacceptable pesticide that has no place in sustainable agriculture," says Lena Sommestad.

Sweden to support development in Vietnam

Today Sweden and Vietnam signed two agreements on development cooperation. These agreements are, firstly, a three-year cooperation agreement for the period March 2004 to December 2006, and secondly, an agreement on research cooperation which is to last four years. Minister for Foreign Affairs Laila Freivalds, who is in Hanoi in connection with the Swedish state visit to Vietnam, signed the agreements on behalf of Sweden.

Swedish proposal for simplifying developing country exports to EU becomes a reality

The EU Commission today launched a new function to make it easier for companies in developing countries to export their products to the EU. The idea of establishing a function of this kind was first raised by Sweden in 2002.

"Even though we have reduced customs duties in several areas, there are many competitive companies in developing countries that still do not get into the EU market. This is because EU regulations are often difficult to grasp and unnecessarily complicated," says Minister for Industry and Trade Leif Pagrotsky.

The new EU "on-line helpdesk" is intended to serve as a contact point to which exporters from developing countries can turn to obtain comprehensive information about customs duties and regulations for imports to the EU. It is meant both to help companies in developing countries with their export activities and to give EU countries a better picture of the difficulties that exist in our own market and where there is scope for simplification.

"This is an important first step towards simplifying procedures for entrepreneurs in developing countries and at the same time offering European consumers a broader and better range of products to choose from. I hope this function can be further developed in the future", says Mr Pagrotsky. The Government is also considering establishing a national counterpart to the EU function. This could, firstly, provide support to the EU and, secondly, take up issues that are specific to the Swedish market.

"The peace agreement reached during the autumn is an unique opportunity for bringing an end to the prolonged conflict in Liberia that has caused an enormous amount of suffering for the civilian population and has been an obstacle towards peaceful developments in the entire West African region. The UN mission has been given a clear and extensive mandate to support the peace process in the country. But in order for the UN to succeed in this, Member States must be prepared to offer dynamic assistance," Laila Freivalds, Minister for Foreign Affairs, states.

The Government's intention is to contribute a mechanised rifle company of no more than 240 persons, which is to be incorporated in the Irish battalion already in place in Liberia. The Swedish force will therefore be part of UNMIL's reserve force, which means the Swedish contingent will participate in paving the way for the more stationary troops to be established around the country. The force will also be assigned the task of guarding and protecting UN and humanitarian organisations' activities and protecting civilians.

"Sweden can play an important role in contributing to the UN's efforts to promote peaceful developments in the country. It also sends a clear signal regarding Sweden's continued strong commitment for the prevention and management of conflicts in Africa," Leni Björklund, Minister for Defence, states.

According to the UN's wishes, the Swedish unit should be in place before the end of February. When all 15 000 persons in the UN force are assembled during the spring, UNMIL will be the UN's largest current peacekeeping operation.

Since the autumn, Sweden has had four staff officers and six civilian police officers participating in UNMIL. In addition, Sweden is one of the largest individual humanitarian donors to Liberia, contributing SEK 26 million in 2003. "Although the reports show that there are still countries where international agreements have had little or no impact, the majority of the world's countries are gradually moving towards greater respect for human rights. But it is important that we watch out for backlashes in the long-term positive trend," says Minister for Foreign Affairs Laila Freivalds.

"During the year, for example, the threat of terrorism has led to a deterioration in the respect for human rights and the rule of law in several countries. It is essential therefore that Sweden continues to emphasise that the fight against terrorism must be waged in accordance with international humanitarian law and human rights."

The Ministry for Foreign Affairs has compiled annual reports on human rights in the countries of the world for the past several years. The reports are based on material from some hundred Swedish embassies around the world. To make the material available to everyone who is interested and involved in human rights issues – organisations and enterprises as well as private individuals – the Ministry for Foreign Affairs decided for the first time last year to make these reports public. "The response to the publication has been predominantly positive. It has prompted exchanges between a number of different actors, both in Sweden and abroad. My hope is that these new reports will see the dialogue continue," says Laila Freivalds.

Proposal for legislative amendments to clarify the identity of asylum seekers

The Government has today proposed a number of measures to come to grips with the problem that the identity of many asylum seekers cannot be clarified. One of the proposed measures is that carriers will be required by law to check that aliens have passports and other documents that are required for entry into a country. Under this proposal the carrier will also be required to check that aliens have funds for their journey home. Carriers that do not fulfil their duty to make these checks will have to pay a charge of up to SEK 46 000.

The proposal also prescribes that it should be possible to reduce the daily and housing allowance paid to an asylum seeker who has reached the age of 18 years if he or she impedes the residence permit investigation by not helping to clarify his or her identity.

The Government also proposes that a refusal-of-entry or expulsion order shall specify the country to which the alien is to be sent.

The proposals are contained in the Government Bill "Measures to clarify the identity of asylum seekers, etc", which the Government submitted to the Riksdag today, 22 January.

The background to the bill is the dramatic increase in the lack of documents among asylum seekers. In 1996, 34 per cent of asylum seekers lacked a passport or other identity documents and by 2002 this figure had risen to 88 per cent.

Sweden to support Iraqi police training

The Government decided today to contribute ten Swedish police instructors to a training programme for Iraqi policemen in Ammam, Jordan.

"The serious security situation in Iraq represents a decisive obstacle to normalisation of the country and is a contributory factor in preventing international aid efforts from being implemented effectively," says Minister for Foreign Affairs Laila Freivalds.

"Priority must be given to measures to improve security and an efficient Iraqi police service is a step in the right direction."

It is considered that an Iraqi police force should consist of around 70 000 police officers. At present there are about 30 000 in the force. To meet this need, a programme for intensive training of Iraqi policemen has been organised at a police training college in Ammam, Jordan. Next year, up to 30 000 Iraqis will undergo intensive police training. To be able to carry out this training programme, a large number of international instructors will be required.

The training programme follows a model previously used successfully in, for example, Kosovo and Timor-Leste, where Swedish police officers also participated.

Proposal for measures to clarify the identity of asylum seekers

The Government has decided today, 5 December, to refer the legislative proposal "Measures to clarify the identity of asylum seekers, etc" to the Council on Legislation.

The background to the Government's proposal is the dramatic increase in the lack of documents among asylum seekers. In 1996, 34 per cent of asylum seekers lacked a passport or other identity documents and by 2002 this figure had risen to 88 per cent.

In the proposal referred to the Council on Legislation the Government proposes that the duty of carriers to check that aliens have passports and other permit documents needed to enter the country be laid down in an Act of the Riksdag (Swedish Parliament). The carrier will also be required by law to check that aliens have funds for their journey home. Under the proposal carriers that do not fulfil their duty to make these checks will have to pay a charge of up to SEK 46 000.

In addition, the Government proposes that it should be possible to reduce the daily and housing allowance paid to an alien who has reached the age of 18 years if he or she impedes the residence permit investigation by not helping to clarify his or her identity.

Finally the Government proposes that new provisions be introduced in the Aliens Act to the effect that a refusal-of-entry or expulsion order shall specify the country to which the alien is to be sent.

Sweden to back peace-support operations in Liberia

The Government has decided today, 4 December, to make a contribution of SEK 4 million to peace-support operations in Liberia.

The Swedish contribution will go towards a DDRR programme – a programme for disarmament, demobilisation, rehabilitation and reintegration of former soldiers in Liberia. A majority of the soldiers are thought to be child soldiers and the aim of the programme is to help them readapt to normal life. The contribution will be channelled via the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP), which is administering a donor fund for the programme.

"Disarmament is essential to enable the UN peace force to restore security in this war-ravaged country and to enable relief organisations to reach the suffering civilian population", says Minister for International Development Cooperation Carin Jämtin.

The UN peacekeeping force in Liberia (UNMIL) will assist in disarming the approximately 50 000 former soldiers, a process that will begin during the month of December.

Sweden is committed to promoting peace and security in Liberia and the region in the long term. Sweden provides considerable humanitarian assistance to Liberia through the UN system and non-governmental organisations. During 2003 more than SEK 59 million has been granted for various actions in health and medical care, for education and for support to internally displaced persons. Swedish staff officers and civilian police are also participating in the UN peacekeeping force in Liberia (UNMIL). In August the Government contributed SEK 10 million to the West African peace force that was the precursor of the UN mission.

Pagrotsky relieved as US backs down on steel tariffs

Unofficial translation

The United States is giving in to pressure from the rest of the world and withdrawing the criticised 30 per cent protective steel tariffs that were introduced a year and a half ago, it was announced from Washington today.

"This is a highly positive development for the Swedish steel industry and a victory for law and order in world trade," says Minister for Industry and Trade Leif Pagrotsky.

"It is of major significance that, instead of an escalated trade conflict, the superpower USA is choosing to follow the rules that the WTO member countries have agreed upon," says Mr Pagrotsky.

The United States introduced the tariffs in March 2002 to protect the domestic steel industry. The tariffs were condemned by the EU and a series of other countries which initiated a process against the US in the World Trade Organisation. Three weeks ago, the highest WTO body for dispute settlement stated that the tariffs were illegal and gave the EU, as retaliation, the right to impose import tariffs on American goods to the value of USD 2.2 billion per year.

"In a trade conflict, everyone is a loser. The EU's retaliatory measures would also have affected Swedish importers to a value of more than SEK 400 million per year. Now we can relax and look forward instead to a normalisation of trade relations," says Mr Pagrotsky.

Intensified Swedish-Chilean cooperation

"Today we have been able to go through interesting cooperation areas, such as IT and telecom, environmental technology and the transport sector – primarily high-tech issues of mutual importance. The Government presents Bill on the smuggling of human beings and temporary residence permits

Today on 26 November, the Government presented a Bill to the Riksdag on the smuggling of human beings and temporary residence permits for injured parties and witnesses. The Government proposal means that a new provision will be included in the Aliens Act making it possible to grant temporary residence permits for foreign injured parties and witnesses. It will enable foreign persons to be granted temporary residence permits if this is considered necessary in connection with undertaking preliminary investigations or main hearings in criminal cases. "The proposal means that, for example, victims of trafficking in human beings will be able to remain in Sweden to participate in criminal investigations, which will facilitate police work on such crimes as trafficking," says Minister for Migration and Asylum Policy, Barbro Holmberg. "Those granted a temporary residence permit will have access to the same health and medical care services and social assistance as residents of Sweden. Children under the age of 18 will have the chance to go to school and take part in other activities in the same way as asylum-seeking children and young people."

"These people have ended up in an unbearably difficult situation. It is often a question of women under terrible pressure who may need care and support. They will also be able to seek permanent residence on other grounds during the duration of their temporary residence permits," says Barbro Holmberg.

The Government also proposes tougher penalties for the smuggling of human beings. Offenders may be sentenced to a maximum of two years imprisonment. Where offences are considered serious, it will be possible to sentence gross smuggling offenders to a minimum of six months, and a maximum of six years imprisonment. Tougher sentences will also be meted out to those who, in order to make a profit, plan or organise activities focusing on aliens travelling to Sweden without permits.

"We know that every day, people are being exploited by smugglers of human beings, and in recent years the tragedies of Dover and the southern Mediterranean have made us painfully aware of how far smugglers of human beings are prepared to go. Many people are often cheated into investing everything they own and possess to embark on a journey that unfortunately often leads to tragedy," concludes Barbro Holmberg.

According to the proposal, the amendments should enter into force on 1 October 2004.

It is estimated that several hundred women and children will fall prey to this modern form of slavery this year in Sweden alone.

Sommestad and Pagrotsky welcome increase in Swedish environmental exports

During 2002 Swedish environmental technology companies exported products and services to a value of almost SEK 15 billion. Growth in exports in the environmental technology sector has increased by 8.4 per cent during 2002 compared with the previous year.

This is shown in the Swedish Trade Council report on environmental technology exports for 2002 that was presented today. The report also shows that 60 per cent of environmental technology exports come from small and medium-sized enterprises.

Nordic defence ministers plan joint contribution to Kosovo

At the meeting of Nordic defence ministers in Stockholm on 24 November 2003, it was decided that the Nordic countries belonging to the Nordic Coordinated Arrangement for Military Peace Support (NORDCAPS) should undertake the planning and assembly of a Nordic contribution to the task force that may supercede the present Multinational Brigade Centre (MNBC). Finland offered to take responsibility for leading this task force. Denmark is positive towards cooperation between the Nordic countries, but plans to continue its cooperation with French forces in the area around Mitrovica.

This decision is conditional on NATO's deciding to reorganise the structure of the forces and shift to more mobile task forces within the Kosovo forces (KFOR).

Underlying today's decision is, inter alia, the joint visit made by the Nordic ministers to Kosovo in early November in order, on the ground, to jointly assess the situation and future developments in the country. The Nordic defence ministers welcome the reorganisation of KFOR, which is moving towards a more flexible force for the whole of Kosovo.

In connection with the Nordic meeting, a meeting with Baltic defence ministers was also held to go through joint issues and discuss future cooperation. At this meeting, it was decided to hold annual Nordic-Baltic defence minister meetings in the future.

Participating in today's meeting were Sweden's Minister for Defence, Leni Björklund, Denmark's Minister for Defence, Svend Aage Jensby, Finland's Minister for Defence, Seppo Kääriäinen, Norway's State Secretary, Gunnar Heløe, and Iceland's Director of the Defence Department at the Ministry for Foreign Affairs and External Trade, Kristinn Arnason. Part of the purpose of the coordinated effort is to simplify the routines and administration in cooperation with the Mozambican Government. Among the demands made by the group is more transparent accounting. Sweden has taken the lead in the group of donors, not least in the issue of making demands upon the Mozambican Government to investigate previous irregularities within the banking sector, to introduce an independent bank inspection and for guilty parties to be brought to justice. "Making clear demands for the improvement of the banking system is a good way to support Mozambique. We have the duty of requiring that governments and those in power take responsibility for their country's development, even in difficult situations," says Carin Jämtin. Swedish budget support is a form of direct assistance extended to poor countries that pursue sound, responsible economic policies with a clear poverty reduction orientation. In this way, the objective of the support is to directly strengthen the countries' own political priorities for combating poverty. "Sweden will continue to provide support for democratisation, respect for human rights, good governance and the fight against corruption. In this way, we contribute to the possibilities for people to create their own futures," says Carin Jämtin.

Budget support to Mozambique comprises a fifth of the total development cooperation with the country. In addition to the budget support, the largest Swedish efforts go to democratic governance and human rights, i.e. public administration support. Other important areas that Sweden supports are development and infrastructure, such as roads and electricity. The work against corruption is central to all Swedish efforts.

Sweden to contribute to reconstruction of Iraq's judicial system

The Government decided today to donate SEK 4.5 million to the International Legal Assistance Consortium (ILAC) for a project aimed at strengthening the independence of Iraq's judiciary system.

"It is very important now that the world gives its support to the people of Iraq in their efforts to

reestablish its courts, prosecutors and the legal profession," says Minister for International Development Cooperation Carin Jämtin. "A functioning judicial system is a precondition for recovery in a post-conflict situation."

For three decades Iraq has been isolated from judicial development in the rest of the world. The existing judicial system in Iraq is the platform for the new initiatives but there is an obvious and major need for further education and training of lawyers in numerous areas including human rights. ILAC is now preparing an extensive operation, which with the help of its members and cooperation organisations aims to help rebuild the judicial system in Iraq. This project includes courses for Iraqi judges on their role in an independent judicial system, courses to strengthen legal education, courses for judges, prosecutors and lawyers in human rights and humanitarian law. ILAC's plans for this project were prompted by an invitation from the Provisional Coalition Authority and the UN. The plans are also supported by the Governing Council of Iraq. International Legal Assistance Consortium (ILAC) is a consortium of about 30 NGOs and bar associations from different parts of the world. The organisation is headquartered in Stockholm. ILAC's mission is to contribute to strengthening the restoration of the rule of law in post-conflict areas through missions in cooperation with and at the request of international and regional actors. The consortium has previously implemented projects in, e.g., Afghanistan, Timor-Leste and Sri Lanka.

The Organisation for Security and Cooperation in Europe (OSCE) is due to hold its annual ministerial meeting in Maastricht, the Netherlands, on 1-2 December 2003. Minister for Foreign Affairs Laila Freivalds will take part as Sweden's representative.

Guidelines for Central Government Debt Management in 2004

The Government has decided on the guidelines for the management of the central government debt. The long-term aim is still to reduce the percentage of foreign currency in the central government debt. Therefore, the amortisation on the foreign currency debt will be SEK 25 billion a year. "The guideline decision means that we will continue the long-term aim of amortising the foreign currency debt and reducing our total indebtedness", says Gunnar Lund, Minister for International Economic Affairs and Financial Markets.

At the end of this year, the central government debt is calculated at SEK 1,226 billion, or about 50 per cent of GDP. The central government debt at its highest amounted to about 75 per cent of GDP in 1998.

The Debt Office will be permitted to deviate from the stated amortisation rate by SEK ± 15 billion. The percentage of inflation-linked borrowing in the central government debt will increase in the long term. The rate of increase will be weighed against the demand for inflation-linked bonds as well as the costs and risks of other borrowing.

That part of the financing requirement not covered by inflation-linked borrowing and borrowing in foreign currencies is to be met by nominal loans in kronor, traditionally the Government's most important source of financing.

The average maturity in the nominal kronor-denominated debt and the foreign currency debt will

remain unchanged at 2.7 years. The Debt Office may deviate from the benchmark by ± 0.3 years. The maturity profile, which states that the borrowing should have as an objective that no more than 25 per cent of the debt falls due in the next 12 months, has been removed. This year's decision covers 2004 to 2006.

Pagrotsky welcomes ruling against US steel tariffs

US protective tariffs for steel are illegal and contravene WTO regulations. This was established by the World Trade Organisation's highest body for dispute settlement (the Appellate Body) on Monday afternoon. The decision means that the EU can take retaliatory action if the USA does not remove the tariffs or offer the EU compensation.

"This is expected and welcome news for the EU and Sweden. At the same time, however, I regret that the USA resorts to protectionism to deal with the restructuring problems of its steel industry," comments Minister for Industry and Trade, Leif Pagrotsky.

The US protective tariffs hit EU steel exports hard, but not all countries have been affected to the same extent. Sweden has even increased its steel exports to the USA by 6 per cent over the first seven months of this year, which can be compared with a reduction of 23 per cent for the EU as a whole.

"This says something about what a competitive steel industry we have in Sweden, so that despite the unjust protective tariffs, we have increased our exports to the USA. The Swedish steel industry has managed in time to make the rationalisations that other countries still need to undertake," says Leif Pagrotsky.

In March 2002, the USA introduced protective tariffs of 30 per cent to protect its domestic steel industry. Today's decision means that if the USA does not remove the prohibited tariffs in little more than a month, the EU is entitled, as retaliation, to introduce tariffs on US goods worth USD 2.2 billion.

Swedish civilian police officers to Liberia

The Government today decided to send six civilian police officers to the UN mission in Liberia (UNMIL). The Swedish police officers will provide education, advice and recruitment assistance in connection with the reform of the national police force, which is to take over responsibility for security in Liberia.

"The UN's peace efforts in Liberia are very important for the development of the entire region," says State Secretary for Foreign Affairs Hans Dahlgren, the EU Presidency's Special Representative for Liberia, Sierra Leone and Côte d'Ivoire.

"By sending civilian police officers to UNMIL, Sweden is contributing to peaceful development in Liberia and demonstrating its support for one of the most extensive UN operations ever."

Sweden is already involved in UNMIL through the participation of three staff officers and has recently contributed SEK 10 million to the Economic Community of West African States (ECOWAS) peacekeeping force in Liberia.

UNMIL was established in September this year by United Nations Security Council resolution 1509. It has a broad mandate to support the peace agreement signed by the Liberian government and rebel groups LURD and MODEL in August this year. UNMIL began its mission on 1 October and will consist of 15 000 personnel including a large number of civilian police officers. When the total strength has been achieved, UNMIL will be the UN's largest current operation.

Jonas Weiss Memorial Award goes to Mattias Lentz and Åsne Seierstad

The recipient of the first ever Jonas Weiss Memorial Award has been announced. The award is intended to honour a young Swedish diplomat who has shown a strong interest in conflict resolution and fieldwork in diplomacy.

The memorial award of SEK 30 000 is to go to Mattias Lentz, who, after serving in Jakarta and Beijing, is now working on the issue of Iraq at the Ministry for Foreign Affairs in Stockholm. An honorary award is also being made to Norwegian journalist Åsne Seierstad for courage and integrity in reporting from the war zone in Iraq.

The Jonas Weiss Memorial Award, which is to be presented annually, was established jointly by the Ministry for Foreign Affairs and the family of the deceased diplomat Jonas Weiss. Weiss died in a car accident at the age of just 33 in May last year, while travelling on official business between Baghdad and Amman.

Weiss belonged to a younger generation of diplomats with a strong focus on fieldwork. After his death, his family, his contemporaries at the Ministry for Foreign Affairs and the Ministry leadership decided to establish the memorial award to support colleagues who have already made important contributions in the area or to others who desire to gain more experience and expertise in field operations and conflict resolution. The Memorial Award Board was also authorised to present an honorary award to a person who has acted in the spirit of Johan Weiss.

The Memorial Award Board motivates its choices as follows:

In performing his professional responsibilities, Mattias Lentz has consistently displayed the combination of qualities that are the very essence of the Jonas Weiss Memorial Award: a strong presence in the field, sure and lucid reporting from situations ranging from occupied parliaments to the UN General Assembly, an analytical capacity and a deep commitment to conflict resolution and

democracy promotion measures.

Åsne Seierstad becomes the first recipient of the Jonas Weiss Memorial Award's honorary distinction in recognition of the priority she has always given as a journalist to presence in the field. In Iraq in particular she has shown that courage and integrity are essential prerequisites for both journalism and diplomacy and that the consequences of war must never be concealed when victory is declared.

The awards will be presented by State Secretary for Foreign Affairs Hans Dahlgren. The media are invited to attend the ceremony at the Ministry for Foreign Affairs at 16.00 on 10 November. Commission's monitoring reports presented today: Great progress towards EU membership

"The EU's future member states are making great progress towards EU membership on 1 May 2004," says Minister for Foreign Affairs Laila Freivalds in a comment on the Commission's monitoring reports that were made public today.

"It is particularly gratifying to see that our neighbouring countries Estonia, Latvia and Lithuania have already achieved a high level of adjustment to the EU acquis in most areas.

It is up to the accession countries to intensify their efforts to resolve outstanding problems so that the EU acquis is fully implemented by the entry date, 1 May 2004.

The Government welcomes the progress shown by Bulgaria and Romania. It is important that the pace of reform remains high. The goal is to welcome them as members in 2007.

Turkey is also making progress in the area of reform. But more must be done to strengthen human rights and to ensure the effective implementation of adopted reforms. A resolution of the Cyprus issue is not a requirement for the opening of negotiations but it would obviously benefit Turkey in the continued EU process.

The reports show that the conditions for completing the biggest enlargement of the European Union to date are very good," concludes Laila Freivalds.

The EU Commission's reports show that great progress is being made in preparations for EU accession on 1 May 2004. The new member countries are very well prepared to live up to and take responsibility for the acquis and workings of the EU. However, there are still problems to be dealt with, primarily related to rules for the workings of the internal market and to the future administration of EU funds. In these areas the countries still have work to do. The Commission will continue to have an important role in monitoring and reinforcing action. Sweden is looking forward to the entry of these countries as full members on 1 May 2004.

Bulgaria has made great progress in the economic area but needs to continue to combat corruption

and to reinforce its administrative and legal capacity to implement and apply the EU acquis. These are problems that Romaina is also grappling with. Romaina is showing solid progress and, with continued reforms, will soon be able to be recognised as a functioning market economy. It is important that the pace of reform remains high. EU pre-membership support will increase significantly in the coming three-year period. The aim is for the two negotiating candidate countries to be in a position to become EU members in 2007. This means that negotiations must be concluded in good time before this date.

The decision on the possible opening of membership negotiations with Turkey is not to be taken until next autumn. This country does not yet meet the political criteria set up by the EU.

Today the Government has presented the written communication "Human Rights in Swedish Foreign Policy" (Skr. 2003/04:20) to the Riksdag.

Promoting and increasing respect for human rights is a prioritised issue in Swedish foreign policy. Efforts supporting human rights are to permeate all areas of foreign policy, including security policy, development cooperation, migration policy and trade policy.

The Government's ambition is to further strengthen Sweden's international efforts for human rights through a result-oriented and integrated policy.

The written communication is a follow-up of the Government communication from 1998 of the same name, which was the first accumulated presentation of the role of human rights in Swedish foreign policy.

Nordic countries continue to take responsibility in Kosovo

International meeting on prevention of female genital mutilation

On 10-11 November, Minister for Foreign Affairs Laila Freivalds and Minister for Children and Families Berit Andnor are due to host an international meeting in Stockholm on work to prevent female genital mutilation in Sweden and Africa.

An estimated 130 million girls and women around the world are genitally mutilated and around 2 million are subjected to the procedure each year. Female genital mutilation is a violation of the rights of women and children and often leads to great suffering. There is no support for female genital mutilation in any religion. However, it is not uncommon for the genital mutilation of girls to be justified for religious reasons. With greater immigration to Sweden from African countries, work to prevent female genital mutilation has also become a national concern.

The aim of the meeting is to link Swedish and international work to prevent female genital mutilation. Representatives of various UN bodies, international NGOs and some ten African countries will be taking part in the meeting. Among the Swedish delegates are representatives of the immigrant groups concerned, agencies and the Riksdag.

Journalists are welcome to attend the meeting, which will be opened by Minister for Foreign Affairs Laila Freivalds at 09.30 on 10 November.

Stockholm International Forum: International conference against genocide, 26-28 January 2004

Prime Minister Göran Persson has invited representatives of around 60 governments to take part in an international conference on preventing genocide to be held in Stockholm on 26-28 January next year. The conference, which is the fourth arranged within the framework of the Stockholm International Forum, will be the last of its kind, completing the series that began with the Stockholm International Forum on the Holocaust in 2000.

As well as government representatives, international organisations, academics, researchers and other experts are being invited. The conference aims to take a comprehensive view of the problem of genocide and will be the first major intergovernmental conference on this subject since the UN adopted its Convention against Genocide in 1948. The venue for the conference will be the Stockholm City Conference Centre at Norra Latin and Folkets Hus in Stockholm.

In his invitation the Prime Minister calls attention to the fact that the world has witnessed several episodes of genocide, mass murder and ethnic cleansing since the Holocaust and that world leaders have a responsibility to protect human life and prevent further atrocities.

"Can we prevent genocide by making more effective use of diplomatic, humanitarian, economic and military means?" asks the Prime Minister in his letter of invitation.

Government bill on approval of ten new EU member states

Today the Government is presenting a bill to the Riksdag (Swedish Parliament) proposing approval of the treaty on the accession of ten new member states to the EU.

Under the treaty the new members will join the EU on 1 May 2004. The countries concerned are Cyprus, the Czech Republic, Estonia, Hungary, Latvia, Lithuania, Malta, Poland, Slovakia and Slovenia. The treaty can only enter into force when all present and new member states have approved and ratified it.

When they enter the EU, the new members states accede to the EU acquis in the same way as Sweden did when it became a member. The bill "The enlargement of the European Union 2004" (2003/04:25) contains a detailed presentation of a number of temporary transitional arrangements in various policy areas that are laid down in the treaty of accession.

The bill is about 5 000 pages long and is published in nine volumes.

Sweden to contribute SEK 250 million for reconstruction of Iraq

An international donor conference for the reconstruction of Iraq is being held in Madrid on 23-24 October. The purpose is to collect and coordinate economic contributions to the reconstruction of Iraq. More than 90 countries and international organisations are expected to participate. The Swedish contribution will amount to SEK 250 million for 2004 and 2005.

Sweden has long been a major donor of humanitarian aid to Iraq, and has decided on humanitarian commitments worth approximately SEK 95 million so far this year. Accordingly, the total contribution during a three-year period amounts to approximately SEK 345 million.

The Swedish efforts for Iraq will mainly be channelled via various UN bodies, based primarily on

humanitarian actions already carried out by Sweden But the efforts will be designed bearing in mind that Iraq should soon be able to stand on its own two feet, both politically and economically. Therefore, the Swedish efforts – apart from continued humanitarian measures – will concentrate on getting the political and economic processes going so that Iraq can take over and carry on with reconstruction using its own resources as soon as possible.

"The Madrid conference gives the international community an excellent opportunity to show its solidarity with the people of Iraq and to emphasise the role of the UN in the reconstruction of Iraq", says Minister for International Development Cooperation Carin Jämtin.

Proposal for simplified procedures for imports from developing countries

Unofficial translation

A report was today presented to the Minister for Industry and Trade, Leif Pagrotsky, on making procedures for imports from developing countries easier. The chairman of the inquiry, Ambassador Tommy Arwitz, looked into the preconditions for establishing a Swedish liaison function that can help companies in developing countries who want to export to Sweden and the EU by providing information and contacts. The report proposes that a function of this type be established at the National Board of Trade.

"The proposal is very interesting. There are many competitive companies in developing countries which, despite the fact that we have reduced customs tariffs in several areas, still do not get into the EU market. The rules are often copious, difficult to grasp and unnecessarily complicated," says the Minister for Industry and Trade, Leif Pagrotsky.

"A liaison function of this type could make life easier for entrepreneurs in developing countries while, at the same time, Swedish consumers would not be denied broader and better choice," Mr Pagrotsky states.

The Government is expected to take a decision on the committee proposals in the near future.

The Barents Euro-Arctic Council (BEAC) meeting in Umeå concludes successful Swedish chairmanship

On 2-3 October 2003, the foreign ministers of the Nordic countries and Russia, the European Commission, and representatives of the 13 Barents counties met under Swedish chairmanship in Umeå. This was the ninth meeting of the BEAC since its establishment in 1993. Discussions during the meeting focused, inter alia, on health and social issues, economic development and the environment.

"The BEAC is a unique regional organisation for cooperation which in the last decade has contributed to détente, stability and broad exchange over borders in this northerly part of Europe. One could mention, for example, a new health programme adopted for 2004-2007, the signing of the MNEPR Agreement in Stockholm in May, which paves the way for major efforts to manage nuclear waste in the Barents region and the opening of the border station in Salla on the Russian-Finnish border. We have also initiated cooperation between rescue services and have begun cooperation to put an end to trafficking," says acting Minister for Foreign Affairs Jan O. Karlsson in his statement.

The Government presents its views on the future of the EU

Today the Government will submit a communication to the Riksdag in anticipation of the EU intergovernmental conference due to begin on 4 October, when the heads of state and government and foreign ministers will meet in Rome. In its communication, "The European Convention on the Future of the EU" (2003/2004:13), the Government presents its views on the Convention's proposal for the future of the EU.

"The Convention's proposal provide a good basis for the intergovernmental conference. It enhances clarity and makes the EU more efficient, democratic and open," says acting Minister for Foreign Affairs Jan O. Karlsson.

The Union's fundamental objectives and values are modernised in the Convention's proposal. It strengthens cooperation in the judicial sphere and enhances the Union's powers to act in relation to the world at large. It is the Government's view that the Convention's proposal for the distribution of power between the EU institutions is reasonable.

At the same time the Government communication points to possible improvements in the Convention's proposal. Decisions on taxation, defence policy and large sections of foreign policy should continue to be made unanimously. The proposal for a special council of ministers for all legislation is questioned as is the proposal that countries should be able to unanimously decide to go over to majority decisions in new policy areas under the Treaty. The Presidency's function in the Council and the proposed role of a "foreign minister" also need to be developed, says the Government.

The Government also attaches importance to the constitutional aspects of the proposal for a new Treaty. It discusses, in a special chapter of the communication, how the Convention's proposal relates to the provisions of the Swedish Constitution. The general assessment is that the Convention's proposals conform with the provisions of the Instrument of Government. The Government communication is the second of three stages in the consultation process about a new EU Treaty begun after the Convention concluded its work. The first step was to broaden the referral procedure undertaken between the end of July and the beginning of September, when a ministerial memorandum accompanying the proposal from the EU Convention on the Future of the EU was sent to more than 130 referral bodies. Almost all of them submitted comments. After private members' motions, discussions by committees and debate and resolutions in the Chamber, the Riksdag will present, in November, a report in response to the Government communication. This will be the third stage of the process.

"There is broad support among the referral bodies for the proposal on a new constitutional Treaty but we have also noted important viewpoints," says Jan O. Karlsson. During the negotiations, the Government will hold a close dialogue with the Riksdag's Advisory Committee on EU Affairs and will be an active and constructive partner at the intergovernmental conference, says Karlsson.

Jan O. Karlsson welcomes acquittal of Amina Lawal

"It is very pleasing that the court of appeal has now acquitted Amina Lawal," says acting Minister for Foreign Affairs Jan O. Karlsson, commenting on the decision of the court in Katsina in northern Nigeria to free Ms Lawal.

"The acquittal is a great legal victory both for Amina Lawal and for human rights. Stoning goes against the prohibition of cruel, inhuman or humiliating punishment laid down in international conventions, which Nigeria has undertaken to respect," continues Jan O. Karlsson.

"While we welcome the outcome of this case, we must not relent in our criticism of courts in northern Nigeria that continue to sentence people to stoning. This ruling strengthens our determination to continue to fight for respect for human rights."

The case of Amina Lawal has outraged people in Nigeria and the rest of the world. Sweden has joined in international criticism against the verdict that Amina Lawal should be stoned to death for alleged sexual relations outside of wedlock. As recently as 9 September 2003, the late Minister for Foreign Affairs Anna Lindh condemned the death sentence in the Riksdag.

The budget for 2004: investing in growth, jobs, and welfare

The Swedish economy has coped well with the international economic downturn. Employment is high, growth satisfactory and joblessness still low compared with other countries. Public finances are still in surplus, with the surplus for next year estimated at 0.4 per cent of GDP. The estimated public finances surpluses over the next few years are in line with the Governments overall targets. The public finances surplus target of 2 per cent of GDP over the course of a business cycle remains

firm and will be met.

As in previous years, central government spending will be kept below the approved expenditure ceilings. The Government does not consider any additional savings will be needed to manage the expenditure ceilings for 2003 and 2004. However, the Government is monitoring expenditure developments on an ongoing basis and will take additional measures if the expenditure ceilings come under threat. The proposed expenditure ceilings for the central government sector are SEK 894 billion in 2005 and SEK 931 billion in 2006.

To date there has been no clear turn around in the international economy. However, the Government is counting on an improved climate for business towards the end of 2004. The gross domestic product (GDP) is expected to rise by 1.4 per cent this year and 2.0 per cent in 2004.

The 121-point agreement between the Social Democratic Party, the Left Party and the Green Party is to be implemented in the course of the present term of office. The three parties intend to present guidelines and budget proposals for the implementation of the remaining parts of the 121-point agreement in 2005 and 2006, in connection with the 2004 Spring Fiscal Policy Bill and the budget for 2005.

The labour market

The employment rate is expected to reach 77.7 per cent this year and 77.3 per cent in 2004. This means that on this forecast the Governments target of 80 per cent in regular employment in 2004 will not be met. Nonetheless, the target of having 80 per cent of the population aged 20-64 employed on the regular labour market remains firmly in place. The Government is monitoring developments on an ongoing basis and will take steps to attain its goal.

There has been a gradual rise in open unemployment since mid-2002, owing to a weak trend for employment, fewer participants in labour market policy programmes and an increasing supply of labour. Unemployment is expected to remain at 4.7 per cent next year, after which it is forecast to decline. An augmented supply of labour is essential to secure the long-term financing of welfare.

The number of people receiving social assistance, expressed as full-year equivalents, fell by 25 per cent between 1999 and 2002. Despite this there is much to suggest that the social justice target of halving the number of people in receipt of social assistance between 1999 and 2004 may be difficult to achieve. One pre-condition for achieving this target is that the employment target is met.

This year, for the first time, the Budget Bill contains a gender equality appendix (appendix 4) with a thorough analysis of the economic situation of women and men. The appendix reports the distribution of both paid and unpaid work. It presents the distribution of working hours, wage income, income from public transfer systems and income from capital. The appendix shows that while income from these sources is unevenly distributed between women and men, the public transfer systems go some way towards levelling out income differences. Womens wages amount to 63 per cent of mens wages. When all income sources are taken into account, womens income rises to 76 per cent of mens income.

Investments in growth

In this years Budget Bill, the focus is on investments to increase growth. Increased growth is necessary to achieve the employment target, which in turn is essential for welfare provision.

- · Improvements will be made in the core components of welfare provision health care, schools and social services. Temporary employment support to municipalities and county councils will therefore be boosted by an additional SEK 400 million during 2004. In all, this type of support will be worth SEK 4.7 billion to local government budgets. This resource will be made permanent from 2005.
- · Tax will be reduced by a total of SEK 1 billion for small and medium sized enterprises by easing the 3:12 rules.
- \cdot Investments in infrastructure are a key factor in increasing growth in the coming years. The Government will return to the determination of the final appropriation levels for 2005 and 2006 in the 2004 Spring Budget Bill or in the Budget Bill for 2005 at the latest.

- The National Road Administration will be allowed to postpone amortisation payments in 2004. This will release funds totalling SEK 666 million for use in extra road investments.
- · The Swedish Agency for Innovation Systems will receive an additional SEK 100 million for applied industrial research in the field of IT and telecommunications.
- · A centre for environment-driven business development will be set up under the Swedish Business Development Agency.
- · Support to municipalities for the expansion of broadband provision will be increased by SEK 250 million per year in 2004 and 2005.
- · Increased support for basic research (the Swedish Research Council), SEK 25 million.
- · A Validation Delegation will be set up, receiving SEK 15 million per year, 20042007.
- · Payroll taxes will be reduced by SEK 640 million (as part of the green tax shift).

The Government is preparing a number of proposals aimed at facilitating the establishment of more and growing companies.

- · Increased supply of seed capital.
- · Increased proportion of research-related companies. The Government intends to deepen its dialogue with the parties concerned in order to increase the proportion of research-related companies. Particular emphasis will be placed on areas in which Sweden is competitive.
- · More effective action at regional level to promote company development.
- · Broad action programme to simplify the situation of small enterprises. Organisations representing business will be invited to take part in efforts to design a method of measuring the administrative burden on companies.
- · SEK 20 million to the Swedish Industrial Design Foundation. The funds are to be used in preparations for the Design Year 2005 and for projects to help companies develop their design work.
- · Shorter processing times for environmental assessments. The Committee on the Swedish Environmental Code has been instructed in supplementary terms of reference to simplify environmental assessments and make them more efficient without setting aside health and environment protection requirements.

Action for increased employment and better welfare

Efforts to reach the employment target are continuing. The Government is now proposing additional measures that are designed to have a favourable effect on employment.

- · Better Swedish language courses for immigrants. The Government will commission the National Agency for School Improvement to provide targeted professional development for teachers of Swedish for immigrants.
- · Better governance of labour market policy. Rules must be applied uniformly throughout the country, for the sake of fairness. The Government intends to improve governance by clarifying programme goals and amending the regulations.
- \cdot Inventory of benefits under occupational agreements to analyse the impact of these benefits on the supply of labour among older people.
- · Shorter further education programmes for assistant nurses who want to become nurses.

Action to reduce ill health

Long-term sick leave is still rising. There are now some 135 000 people who have been on sick leave for more than a year and in addition some 492 000 people are in receipt of sickness and activity compensation. The Government, the Left Party and the Green Party agree that both sickness absence and the costs of ill health must be reduced in order to achieve high employment levels in the long term. A number of new measures will therefore now be taken.

· Economic drivers for employers to reduce ill health will be reinforced. A system based on economic drivers to reduce ill health will be introduced no later than in 2004. When this system and other action have brought about a reduction in the costs of ill health, it will be possible to return sickness benefits to the former level of compensation.

- The administration of social insurance. The Government considers that the work on altering the organisation of social insurance is a very important means of increasing the effectiveness of efforts to reduce ill health and achieving the national target of halving sickness absence by 2008.
- · Increased responsibility for the individual to help bring about a return to work, as well as action to combat fraud and abuse. A task force will be set up in the Government Offices to establish a basis for possible action to tighten up regulations and how they are applied. The Government will present proposals on this issue in the 2004 Spring Fiscal Policy Bill.
- · Responsibility for work injury insurance. The Government will raise this issue with the social partners to see if the necessary conditions exist for an agreement to transfer this insurance to them.
- · Sickness compensation for a maximum of three years at a time. The Government will obtain the views of the social partners on how this issue should be resolved and will then present proposals to the Riksdag.
- · Better support for and checks on people with sickness compensation. Over time everyone receiving sickness and activity compensation should have their ability to work reassessed and should be offered support.

Reforms to promote justice and security

A number of important reforms are being implemented both this year and next. These reforms will give more teachers in schools, improved study grants, universal pre-school and more money for health and social services. In addition, investments are being made in the environment and infrastructure, housing construction and the judicial system, and more funds are being provided for international development assistance.

Investments in schools and pre-schools

On 1 January this year universal pre-school was introduced for all children aged four or five. This means all children are entitled to the equivalent of three hours of pre-school per day, free of charge. Special resources totalling SEK 500 million will continue to be provided to assure the quality of this service.

Parental insurance will be enhanced this year and next. The one-month extension of parental insurance takes effect this year. This year the basic level of benefits in parental insurance has been increased to SEK 150 per day. A further increase to SEK 180 per day is proposed for 2004. When the economic situation allows, the Government intends to move ahead and further enhance the parental insurance system by raising the ceiling for qualifying income in the system. The upper secondary study grant has been extended from 9 to 10 months of the year. This will mean an extra SEK 950 per year for families with a teenager at upper secondary school.

Health care and social services

Temporary employment support was introduced for 2002 to strengthen the position of municipalities and county councils in the short term. The support was extended and increased to SEK 300 million in 2003. As the financial situation of municipalities and county councils remains hard pressed, the support has also been extended to 2004. The sum of SEK 200 that all income-earners pay in state tax will again be allocated to municipalities and county councils in 2004. In addition, it is proposed that municipalities receive an additional SEK 400 million in 2004. These changes will strengthen municipal and county council budgets by a total of SEK 4.7 billion in 2004.

Improvements will be made in the core components of welfare provision health care, schools and social services. The temporary reinforcement of municipal and county council finances amounting to SEK 4.7 billion will be made permanent from 2005.

Between 2002 and 2004, SEK 3.6 billion is being invested in action to reduce waiting times in the health service.

The elderly

Pensions have been raised by between SEK 300 and SEK 600 a month for people on the lowest pensions. Improved support for dental care of the elderly has been introduced. This support includes a cost ceiling for prosthetic treatment. A new form of maintenance support for elderly persons has

been brought in to guarantee everyone in Sweden over the age of 65 a reasonable standard of living. This reduces the need of social assistance for elderly people. Any shortcomings in eldercare must be identified and remedied quickly. The county administrative boards and the National Board of Health and Welfare have been given funds to hire about 100 safety representatives for elderly people.

More security in everyday life

In recent years the Government has made the biggest investments in the judicial system in modern times. The Government is following through on this investment now and the legal system will receive an additional SEK 550 million, which will mean about SEK 1 billion more in 2004 than in 2003. The police organisation will receive SEK 225 million, the prison and probation service will receive SEK 150 million to deal with the increased need for places, the court system will receive SEK 50 million and legal aid SEK 100 million. SEK 25 million will go to other government agencies in the area.

Education for equality and security

The Government is carrying through a vigorous initiative for enhanced quality in schools. To enable them to hire more teachers and other specialists, municipalities will receive an additional SEK 1 billion per year for five years until the level of SEK 5 billion is reached, for schools development in disadvantaged areas. A law against discrimination and sexual harassment in schools will be drafted.

A delegation will be appointed to work for four years to secure equal standards throughout the country, high quality and respect for legal rights in the validation of students knowledge. A new IT portal will provide relevant information for individual teachers and advisers. Grants for short terms of study will be increased by SEK 25 million.

The number of places in teacher and nurse education will continue to rise. Work to combat skewed recruitment to higher education will continue.

Investments in basic research and training in research will be carried through. During the period 2000-2005 the Government will allocate an additional SEK 1.7 billion to research and training in research. To make better use of research results it is important to strengthen both free basic research and needs-driven research, as well as links to society at large.

Housing

The Government has set up a special company that can take over vacant apartments from municipal housing companies in municipalities experiencing out-migration or that can also put up risk capital for development projects.

Municipalities in growth regions can obtain time-limited investment incentives to increase the production of small rental apartments and student housing. This support expires in 2006. It is proposed that the National Housing Credit Guarantee Board be given increased powers to use state credit guarantees to ease the supply of capital for housing construction.

Social policy

Implementation of the action plan on drug policy is continuing. It is intended to reduce the availability of drugs, to reduce new recruitment to drug misuse and to induce more misusers to stop misusing drugs.

An initiative for the care of drug misusers called Contract for life will begin to operate during 2004. The emphasis will be on increased measures to help the heavy misusers who are at greatest risk. Implementation of the action plan on alcohol policy is continuing. Additional resources are being allocated to broad information activities and to strengthening and expanding local preventive work. During this term of office the Government intends to take initiatives to further limit the harmful effects of tobacco and to take action to combat the increase in overweight.

Regional development/infrastructure

Extensive investments will be made in infrastructure in the coming years. In 2004 investments will increase by some SEK 3 billion compared with 2003. The tax equalisation system will be developed to generate growth and to favour a fair distribution of national resources. Regional growth

programmes will be prepared and implemented in agreement and dialogue between different stakeholders.

Shorter working hours and sabbatical years

The question of pilot schemes for shorter working hours and sabbatical years forms part of the 121-point programme and requires careful planning and preparation.

The competent authorities will be commissioned to plan pilots for shorter working hours with the aim of starting up in 2004,

To enable implementation of the sabbatical year throughout the county from 1 January 2005, the competent authorities must commence planning and preparatory work for this now.

Fair taxes

During the coming year, taxation policy will focus on four areas: globalisation, small enterprises, the green tax shift and various measures to combat tax evasion.

Small enterprises

SEK 1 billion is being set aside for a two-stage reform of the 3:12 regulations. From income year 2004 the interest rate used as divisor in calculating return on capital will be increased by two percentage points. A second stage will contain additional proposals that will apply from income year 2005. The main thrust is to make conditions for small enterprises more favourable. Later this autumn a change in gift taxation at generation shifts will be implemented.

Last year the Committee for Simplification of Taxation Rules for Small Enterprises presented its final report, which proposed a reform of tax regulations for partnerships. The report has been circulated for comment and the Government will take a position on the Committees proposal in conjunction with the continuing work on tax regulations for small enterprises.

Green tax shift

In the 2000 Spring Fiscal Policy Bill, the Government stated that the overall goal for the green tax shift in the period 20012010 is SEK 30 billion. So far a tax shift of more than SEK 8 billion has been implemented.

EC legislation is of material significance in this area and both the provisions of the coming energy tax directive and the EU Treatys provisions on state subsidies must be observed. A first step in a reform along EU lines is the proposal in the Budget Bill for 2004 that the present zero rate of tax on electricity used in industry be abolished and replaced from 1 July 2004 by the tax level (SEK 0.005/kWh) corresponding to the minimum level in the coming energy tax directive.

The Government is proposing a green tax shift of SEK 2 billion for 2004. The shift includes the following energy and environment tax components:

- · Higher carbon dioxide tax for households and the service sector, up 18 per cent.
- · Higher electricity tax for households and the service sector, up SEK 0.01/kWh.
- · Higher electricity tax for manufacturing industry from 1 July 2004, up SEK 0.005/kWh. A system of long-term agreements with energy-intensive industry will be introduced at the same time.
- · Higher tax on diesel, up SEK 0.10 per litre
- · Higher tax on pesticides, up SEK 10/kg, active ingredient.

These tax increases will be offset for 2004 by the following tax reductions for individuals and companies.

- · reduction of state income tax for all individuals with income from work, down SEK 200 per year
- · Reduced payroll tax, down 0.12 percentage points
- · Biofuels given full exemption from excise duty
- \cdot To ensure the competitiveness of alternative fuels carbon dioxide-neutral fuels should be exempt from both carbon dioxide tax and energy tax.

In order to facilitate energy-efficient electricity and heat production in thermal power stations and to ensure the competitiveness of biofuels, the following previously presented proposals will be implemented: higher tax deductions for fuels used in heat production, tax deductions tied to fuel consumption rates and the abolition of the deduction for energy tax purposes for some electricity in

thermal power plants.

Other tax proposals

Later this autumn the Government will propose that inheritance tax between spouses be abolished from 1 January 2004.

To make improvements for low and medium wage earners the Government will propose a limit rule for real estate tax later this autumn. The new rule will apply to everyone who is covered at present by the limit rule for real estate tax and who pays wealth tax attributable to the value of a one- or two-family home that is their permanent residence. These new rules are intended to apply from income year 2003.

The Government is going to follow up the proposal of the Property Tax Committee for a moderating rule for real estate tax. The previously announced tax reduction for environment investments has been processed and a proposal will be presented during the autumn of 2003.

Swedens exemption from the general EC regulations for the private import of alcohol and tobacco will end on 1 January 2004. The Government intends to keep a close watch on the development of cross-border trade and illegal trade. Adopted and planned tax reductions in Denmark and Finland will be taken into account in assessing Swedish tax adjustments, as will other changes in our immediate neighbourhood. The role of the Swedish Alcohol Retailing Monopoly in alcohol policy must not be weakened.

To achieve a responsible financing of the green tax shift that has the correct distribution policy profile, a limited amendment should be made to the rules governing the charging of state tax on income from work.

The Government proposes that an upward adjustment of one percentage point should be made, over and above the change in the consumer price index, when the tax thresholds in the state tax schedule are fixed for 2004.

Jan O. Karlsson to speak at the United Nations

On 21-26 September, Acting Minister for Foreign Affairs Jan O. Karlsson will attend the UN General Assembly in New York in connection with Sweden's commitment in the declaration on supporting work to prevent HIV/AIDS.

Today, on Monday, Jan O. Karlsson will address the General Assembly at approximately 17.00 local time. Sweden is the 51st speaker. After the speech, a press briefing will be organised. On Thursday 15 September, Jan O. Karlsson will meet a representative of the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP). At 17.15 local time the Acting Minister for Foreign Affairs will address the General Assembly in connection with the concluding debate. After his speech, a press briefing will be organised, which concludes Jan O. Karlsson's stay in New York.

Increased development assistance to go to concrete measures

Development assistance will increase by SEK 2.8 billion between 2003 and 2004. Its share of GNI will rise from 0.81 to 0.868 per cent. Increasing development assistance will continue to be one of the Government's main reform initiatives. The target of allocating one per cent of Sweden's GNI to

international development cooperation and assistance remains firm.

"Development assistance has increased by 30 per cent over the past three years. Next year's increase means that we will be able to take forceful action in four major areas: HIV/AIDS; sexual and reproductive health and rights; narcotics; and peace support, conflict management and common security," says Minister for Development Cooperation, Migration and Asylum Policy Jan O. Karlsson.

HIV/AIDS

Support to UNAIDS will increase from SEK 60 to SEK 100 million. More support will be given to the Global Fund to Fight AIDS, Tuberculosis and Malaria and other efforts to combat HIV/AIDS. Preventive work continues to be important but the Government will increase its support to, for example, care, treatment and the development of a vaccine. A special Ambassador, responsible for HIV/AIDS issues, will be appointed.

Sexual and reproductive health and rights

Support to the UN Population Fund (UNFPA) will increase from SEK 205 to SEK 270 million. Conservative forces are trying to undermine progress made internationally. Sweden will increase its support to such organisations to enable vital work for women's reproductive and sexual health and rights to continue.

The fight against drugs

Support to the UN International Drug Control Programme will increase from SEK 38.5 to SEK 50 million. Narcotics problems are closely linked to poverty, lack of equality, exploitation, corruption and weak political control. Efforts will be directed both at production and consumption in developing countries.

Peace support, conflict management and common security

Resources allocated to civil missions, such as police and rescue services in connection with peace-keeping operations, will increase. The Government will strengthen confidence-building measures, such as dialogues and participatory processes. Greater emphasis will be given to the underlying causes of armed conflicts.

Continued export promotion initiatives in 2004

"Promotion of both Swedish exports and investments in Sweden will be high priority issues for the

Government next year," the Minister for Industry and Trade, Leif Pagrotsky, stated in connection with the presentation of the Government's Budget Bill for 2004.

"We will ensure that the advantages of increased internationalisation benefit more companies, not least by continuing the battle against unnecessary red tape in trade at all levels," Mr Pagrotsky said. Continued long-term, strategic and dynamic efforts in trade and investment promotion are proposed in the Budget Bill for 2004. The priorities set out in the programme "Active, Attractive Sweden" launched in the autumn of 2002, will be carried through.

The Government gives priority to increased activity in strategic markets. This applies to both established and new, interesting and fast growing markets such as, for example, India, China, Brazil and Russia. Business sector development and trade in the Baltic Sea region will be stimulated. The Government is also appropriating funds for export and investment promotion initiatives in high-tech industries and new areas where Sweden and Swedish companies have special expertise and are in a good position to compete, such as, for example, the IT, biotechnology and food areas.

Sweden's Economy

Sweden's gross domestic product (GDP) is forecast to increase by 1.4 per cent this year and 2.0 per cent next year. Open unemployment is expected to be 4.7 per cent in both years. General government net lending is estimated to amount to 0.2 per cent of GDP this year and 0.4 per cent next year.

Developments 20032004

Economic growth in the euro area has been weak so far this year, with reduced competitiveness and falling investment as contributing factors. However, there is much to suggest that the US economy is in a recovery phase. Improved profitability in the business sector and a continued expansive monetary policy will help boost growth in the United States. The rest of the world will therefore encounter increased demand next year, resulting in the strengthening of the global economy. Last year and at the beginning of this year, growth in the Swedish economy held up well relative to the weak growth of the rest of Europe. This year a strong wealth position and low interest rates have contributed to household consumption growing at a good rate. The same factors will continue to boost demand. The dampening of GDP growth that has nevertheless been seen can be explained largely by reduced investment in the business sector. Given recent years' adjustment of the capital stock and the recovery in economic activity, business sector investment is forecast to grow again next year.

Export orders have been weak in recent months, which is in part a reflection of the economic

situation in the euro area. There is therefore a great deal to suggest slower growth in exports during the second half of the year. An improved international economic climate will boost demand for Swedish export commodities next year.

Employment has been largely unchanged over the last three years. Open unemployment has risen gradually since mid-2002 due to a growing supply of labour. The situation in the labour market is expected to remain relatively stable. Open unemployment is forecast to be 4.7 per cent both this year and next. Given that the working-age population is growing faster than employment, the regular employment rate will fall from 77.7 per cent in 2003 to 77.3 per cent in 2004.

The slowdown in GDP growth in recent years has resulted in decreased inflationary pressure. The wage growth has fallen and productivity growth has been high. If fluctuations in energy prices are excluded, inflation has fallen more or less continuously since the beginning of 2002. As it is anticipated that there will still be available resources in the economy next year, inflation (UND1X) is forecast to be below the Riksbank's target of 2 per cent at the end of 2004. The Riksbank is therefore expected to lower its repo rate to 2.50 per cent in 2003. Next year the Riksbank is expected to raise its repo rate so that it ends the year at 3.25 per cent.

Medium-term estimates 20052006

Medium-term estimates are being presented besides the economic forecast for 2003 and 2004. Over this time frame it is difficult to predict the business cycle. Instead the estimates are based on the assessment that resource utilisation in the economy will be below normal at the end of 2004. Growth in 2005 and 2006 may therefore be above the long-term rate. GDP is estimated to grow by 2.6 per cent in 2005 and 2.5 per cent in 2006. Open unemployment will fall to 4.0 per cent in 2006 and the regular employment rate in 2006 will be 77.5 per cent.

Public finances

In 2002 general government net lending amounted to 1.1 per cent of GDP. In 2003 net lending is forecast to decrease to 0.2 per cent of GDP. Income will fall as a proportion of GDP while expenditure will increase. Net lending is forecast to rise to 0.4 per cent of GDP in 2004.

The estimated effects of decisions and proposals published to date mean that expenditure will fall as a proportion of GDP in 2005 and 2006. Net lending will therefore rise to 1.2 per cent of GDP in 2005 and 1.6 per cent in 2006. The positive saving means that net debt will decrease. Central government debt and consolidated gross debt will continue to fall as a proportion of GDP, cf. Table 4.

Net lending in 2004 will be allocated between the three components of the general government sector such that central government will generate a deficit of SEK 40 billion while the old-age pension system will generate a surplus of SEK 54 billion. The central government deficit is expected to decrease during the forecast period while the pension system's surplus will increase somewhat. Local government is expected to generate deficits in 20042006 after running a surplus in 2003. These deficits are believed to be commensurate with a positive outcome as defined in the balanced budget requirement for municipalities and county councils.

Table 5 also shows net lending with taxes accrued to the income year to which they relate. Statistics Sweden has decided that in future it will report net lending with fully accrued taxes. As can be seen from the table, the accrual of taxes had a major impact on net lending in 20002002. Relatively small accrual effects are anticipated during the forecast period.

If accrued net lending is adjusted for the business cycle and other temporary factors, this gives a measure of underlying, or structural, net lending. Structural net lending fell from 4.1 per cent of GDP in 2000 to 0.6 per cent in 2002, which can be attributed primarily to tax cuts and other reforms. Structural net lending will rise to 1.2 per cent of GDP in 2003 and hold at this level in 2004. It will then improve further, reaching 2 per cent of GDP in 2006.

Threat to Swedish timber exports to Japan removed

Following pressure, Japan has agreed to change the rules for building materials that had threatened to shut the door on some parts of the substantial Swedish timber exports to Japan. This would have excluded a number of Swedish producers, primarily of laminated wood and laminated wood products.

"This is a major success for the Swedish wood industry, particularly for small and medium sized companies and sawmills in Norrbotten and Västerbotten", comments Minister for Industry and Trade Leif Pagrotsky.

On 1 July 2003, Japan introduced new rules for formaldehyde emissions in living environments. The rules entailed more complicated procedures for foreign companies than for Japanese companies, as approval by Japanese authorities was required for all products. In total an export sector worth SEK 1.9 billion was directly or indirectly at risk, which corresponds to over 10 per cent of Sweden's total exports to Japan.

After intense pressure from Sweden, the EU and others, Japan has now agreed to let Swedish exporters apply for Japanese approval on the basis of results of tests carried out in Sweden. "This will mean a simpler, faster, and hopefully cheaper process for Swedish wood exporters. This will benefit both Swedish manufacturers and Japanese consumers, who have a particularly high opinion of Swedish wooden houses", says Leif Pagrotsky.

Pagrotsky regrets setback in WTO negotiatons

The WTO negotiations in Cancún collapsed on Sunday. The chairman, Mexico's foreign minister Derbez, stated that there were no chances of reaching an agreement.

"There was a real possibility of now taking an important step forward in the negotiations for more open and fairer trade, above all in the agricultural area," the Minister for Industry and Trade, Leif Pagrotsky, says in a comment.

"The crucial problem that finally caused the collapse of the talks concerned an extension of the WTO system to include new issues. Among other things, the African group rejected a compromise text about initiating negotiations on agreements on simplified trade and greater transparency in public procurement. The most controversial issue concerning an agreement on investments, previously pursued by the EU, had already been removed from the agenda."

"This will scarcely benefit poor people in developing countries who more than others need rules against corruption and unnecessary red tape in trade," Mr Pagrotsky says.

"Furthermore, we will now lose the restriction of rich countries' subsidies to agriculture that was on the negotiating table."

The negotiations in Cancún were a mid-term review of the so-called development round which commenced in Doha, Qatar, 2001. According to the timetable the round is to be completed on 1 January 2005 at the latest.

"Several important deadlines in the Doha round have already been broken and this will make even greater demands on all the WTO member countries if we are to succeed in reforming the rules of international trade in the time agreed," says Leif Pagrotsky.

Sweden plans to reduce its Kosovo force

Sweden is planning an adjustment of its contribution to the peace-keeping force, KFOR, in Kosovo. The reduction in the number of troops, which will take place in parallel with similar reductions by other troop contributors, means that after the end of the year Sweden will contribute about 500

troops instead of the current 750.

"The fact that there is now considered to be less need for a military presence in Kosovo is a positive sign indicating that the peace-keeping operations have been successful," says the Minister for Defence, Leni Björklund.

"However, there is still much to be done before Kosovo has build up a society that ensures its population a safe existence and Sweden will maintain a well-dimensioned force there," the Minister says.

The background to the reduction of the force is that NATO, which is leading KFOR, now considers that the security situation in the area is much improved and that the peace process is moving in the right direction. The UN police forces and the local police, KPS, will now be of increasing importance in the work to build up civil structures in the area. NATO has therefore announced a general reduction of forces at the end of the year from 22 000 to 17 500.

Sweden has contributed a peace-keeping force since October 1999. The size of the force has varied but on average has been about 800 personnel. As from November 2003 to May 2004 Sweden will lead the brigade in which the Swedish forces serve together with Finland, Norway, the Czech Republic, Slovakia, Ireland and Latvia.

Nordic environment ministers send "mercury letter"

Minister for the Environment Lena Sommestad and her Nordic colleagues have sent a joint letter to EU Commissioners Margot Wallström and Erkki Liikanen urging them to take vigorous measures against the use of mercury.

The reason for this letter, which was also sent to EU environment ministers, is that the European Commission is to draw up a European mercury strategy by 2004.

The Nordic ministers say in their letter that the European Commission must take forceful action in all areas in which mercury problems can be tackled. They also refer to research that shows an increasing amount of mercury in arctic areas despite the absence of mercury emission sources in these areas.

Mercury fallout in Sweden is about 4.2 tonnes per year, as compared with the roughly 700 kilos per year discharged from Swedish sources. Excessive mercury levels due to this fallout have been found in fish in thousands of Swedish lakes.

The UN Environment Programme has recognised mercury as a global environmental problem and the Nordic countries take the view that the use of mercury should be regulated in a binding global

A New Declaration Adopted in Luleå

The Baltic Sea Environment Ministers set the framework for strengthening their cooperation on Friday. The ministers agreed to take joint action on the issues of clean water, renewable and efficient energy as well as cleaner consumption and production.

In the first Council of Baltic Sea States meeting (Members are Denmark, Estonia, Finland, Germany, Iceland, Latvia, Lithuania, Norway, Poland, Russia, Sweden and the European Commission) since 1996, ministers adopted a declaration in which they agreed to take urgent and concrete measures to enhance maritime safety in the Baltic Sea.

In the areas of water, energy, and sustainable consumption and production, further measures were agreed on to promote regional implementation of commitments made at the Johannesburg Summit one year ago. Among them is a decision to establish a well-managed and ecologically coherent network of marine protected areas for the protection of biological diversity.

Cooperation between the EU and Russia will be of vital importance when additional countries join the Union. Harmonisation of environmental legislation between Russia and the EU will receive special attention.

The eleven countries agreed to work together to influence the new Action Plan for the Northern Dimension. The Ministers emphasised that Baltic 21, an Agenda 21 for the Baltic Sea Region, should be complemented with cross sectoral activities following EU enlargement. Networking and

cooperation with civil society, the private sector and local communities were considered critical.

Eutrophication of the Baltic Sea is so severe that environment and agriculture ministers should meet to consider and discuss further action.

Preparations for the Baltic Sea Summit in June next year have begun in earnest. The Ministers agreed to follow up on todays decision in 2006.

The Barents Euro-Arctic Council raises the issue of cleaner production and prioritises important investments

Several decisions for cleaner industrial production were adopted when the Ministers of the Barents Euro-Arctic Council met Thursday in Luleå, Sweden. A joint programme for cleaner production was adopted and a list of prioritised investment projects in Northwest Russia was endorsed. Lena Sommestad, the Swedish Minister for the Environment, hosted the meeting in Luleå for the environment ministers of the Barents Euro-Arctic Council (BEAC). Besides Sweden, Denmark, Iceland, Finland, Norway, Russia and the EU Commission also participated. The cooperation covers the northernmost counties of Norway, Sweden, Finland and Russia.

The meeting adopted a joint programme to achieve cleaner and more efficient industrial production. The Ministers adopted a special hot spot list, particularly mentioning urgent environmental projects in the Russian area of the Barents region. The list was compiled by NEFCO, an environmental financing organisation set up by the Nordic Ministers of the Environment and AMAP, who deal with assessing, monitoring and mapping the environment within the Arctic Council. The list is based on an earlier list and takes into account the experiences of project work during ten years of cooperation in the Barents region.

The Ministers also agreed on a declaration establishing common targets and priorities for future cooperation. This also includes sustainable forestry and nature protection.

Sweden chaired the Barents Euro-Arctic Council from 2001-2003. Finland will now assume the chairmanship for the period 2003-2005.

Environment ministers on the offensive regarding EU's northern dimension

At today's Nordic environment minister meeting in Luleå, Sweden, a detailed discussion was held regarding environmental issues in the EU's northern dimension. In a statement to the EU, the importance of prioritising environmental issues in the efforts involving the new action plan for the EU's "northern dimension" was emphasised. The Nordic environment ministers give the EU Commission's role the highest priority.

The ministers also point out the need for sustainable production and consumption patterns as well as the development of instruments for environment policy, such as environmental impact assessments and the trading of emissions rights.

The statement emphasises the need for sustainable production and consumption patterns as well as the development of expedient instruments for environment policy, such as environmental impact assessments and the trading of emissions rights for carbon dioxide.

"The dialogue with partner countries, particularly Russia, must be increased and followed up by measures such as an intensified effort regarding financial issues within the EU. Continued forceful actions are necessary to reduce emissions in the sensitive northern seas and efforts for increased maritime safety have high priority," the ministers state.

In the statement, the ministers emphasise the importance of the partnership for environmental cooperation regarding the "northern dimension". Furthermore, the importance of NEFCO (Nordic Environment Finance Corporation) was discussed, particularly for small and medium-sized projects, as was the future of NEFCO.

Also discussed at the meeting in Luleå were current EU issues and efforts within the UN Commission on Sustainable Development. The meeting expressed support for the current Norwegian chairmanship.

The ministers also decided on a proposal to the EU Commission and EU environment ministers regarding the EU's pending strategy for mercury. In the proposal, the ministers point to emissions in the Arctic region and emphasise the importance of long-term binding global environment agreements to minimise emissions of mercury.

Swedish support to the energy sector in Lithuania

The Government decided today to grant SEK 8.95 million in support to the energy sector in Lithuania.

This support is intended as part-financing for a new transformer station with demonstration character, whose purpose will be to supply electricity to a new sewage treatment plant in the city of Siauliai. The decision will make it possible for the client to access a secure electricity supply for the sewage treatment plant and modern technology in preparation for the future modernisation of the Lithuanian electricity network.

"It is important for the sewage treatment plant in Siauliai to acquire a secure electricity supply. A more modern, more environmentally friendly and more efficient electricity network for Lithuania, moreover, will be a welcome development. The Government's decision will open the way for Swedish companies to share their considerable expertise," says Minister Jan O. Karlsson. The initiative is one outcome of the work being carried out, within the framework of the Second Baltic Billion Fund, by the Ministry for Foreign Affairs' Projects Export Secretariat, aimed at establishing a platform for cooperation between the state sector and private industry in the Baltic Sea region. The overall goal of the Baltic Billion Fund is to strengthen the position of Swedish industry in the Baltic Sea region.

The Swedish support will be administered by the Swedish International Development Cooperation Agency (Sida).

35 years since Sweden signed the Treaty on the Non-Proliferation of Nuclear Weapons

Today it is 35 years to the day since Sweden signed the Treaty on the Non-Proliferation of Nuclear Weapons (NPT). The treaty forms the cornerstone of global efforts towards disarmament and the prevention of nuclear weapon proliferation.

"The work of preserving and strengthening the NPT must continue," says Minister for Foreign Affairs Anna Lindh. "This is essential today when we can see a number of threats to the treaty, including the decision by North Korea to withdraw from it."

She goes on to point out "In this treaty the nuclear weapon states have pledged to disarm their nuclear weapons, but their lack of will to show concrete progress risks undermining the NPT in the long run. Disarmament commitments must be taken seriously."

"The discussions initiated by the USA on a new type of small nuclear weapon are therefore disturbing," stresses the Minister for Foreign Affairs.

"We must continue our efforts to get all countries to sign the treaty. India, Israel and Pakistan must accede as nuclear weapon-free states. North Korea must also be persuaded to remain a party to the treaty as a state without nuclear weapons."

The NPT means that the five recognised nuclear weapon states – the USA, Russia, the UK, France and China – are not permitted to spread nuclear weapons, related know-how or technology to third countries except for peaceful purposes, such as building nuclear power stations or use in medical care. The other parties to the treaty have pledged not to develop or acquire nuclear weapons. At present, 188 states are party to the treaty, which entered into force in 1970.

US-EU compromises improve prospects for WTO meeting in Mexico

The EU and the United States presented a compromise proposal on Wednesday for carrying through the negotiations on agriculture in the current world trade round. Earlier in the week, the EU and US agreed, with Canadian support, on a proposed approach for lowering tariffs on industrial products. "The fact that the EU and the United States have begun to compromise in two major areas in this WTO round is very positive and a necessary prerequisite for the success of the WTO negotiations", says Minister for Industry and Trade Leif Pagrotsky.

"However, much remains to be done before we can be sure the trade negotiations reach an ambitious result, safeguarding the interests of developing countries. A result along these lines is also in the interests of Swedish consumers and businesses."

The framework proposals from the EU and the US will be discussed prior to the ministerial meeting in Cancún, Mexico on 10-14 September, where a decision is to be taken on the future conduct of the negotiations. After that WTO negotiations will continue, the aim being to bring them to a conclusion by January 2005 at the latest.

The framework proposal for the negotiations on industrial products paves the way for cuts in tariffs and takes special account of the least developed countries.

"It's very good that the proposal makes it possible to do away with bothersome, low-level tariffs as well as all tariffs on cloth, clothing and environmental products," says Leif Pagrotsky. "These are ideas Sweden has long supported."

The agriculture negotiations have long been a stumbling block in the WTO round. The framework proposal from the EU and the US encompasses tariff reductions, restrictions on export subsidies and cuts in domestic subsidies.

"The compromise on agriculture will provide an important basis for further negotiations," emphasises Minister for Agriculture, Food and Fisheries Ann-Christin Nykvist. "The proposal clears up the conflict of interests between the United States and the EU. We will now analyse the proposal carefully in terms of Swedish interests and work to ensure that the final result reflects Sweden's ambitious objectives, particularly where the conditions of competition for developing countries are concerned."

Sweden supports West African peace force in Liberia

The Government took a decision today to contribute SEK 10 million to the Economic Community of West African States ECOWAS' peace-keeping force in Liberia. The decision on the mandate of the force was taken by the UN Security Council on 1 August. The force, led by Nigeria, is being deployed in Liberia at present.

"The arrival of the West African force is a decisive step towards peace in Liberia and an important signal from the international community that the violence in Liberia must cease," says State Secretary for Foreign Affairs Hans Dahlgren, who holds the position of the EU Presidency's Special Representative for the MRU region, including Liberia.

"The force is to ensure that the conflicting parties respect the cease-fire agreed on 17 June and to do everything possible to enable relief organisations to reach the suffering civilian population with food, water and medicines," Hans Dahlgren continues.

"President Charles Taylor has no role to play in the transitional government that is to lead war-torn Liberia towards free and fair elections. The fact that an international peace force is now in place in Liberia means that Charles Taylor must live up to his promise and leave the post of President as soon as possible," says State Secretary for Foreign Affairs Hans Dahlgren.

Sweden and the EU have actively supported ECOWAS' mediation efforts, partly by providing financial support for the peace negotiations that have been under way in Ghana since the beginning of June. The Swedish contribution to the ECOWAS peace-keeping action is also guided by the Government's aim to strengthen Africa's peace-keeping capacity and to prevent and manage conflicts.

Sweden provides considerable humanitarian assistance to Liberia through the UN system and non-governmental organisations. During 2003 more than SEK 40 million has been granted for various initiatives in health and medical care, education and for support to internally displaced persons.

Swedish support to African countries in the WTO

Sweden is to help four African countries defend their interests in the World Trade Organisation, WTO. This was decided by the Government today. In a unique joint initiative, Benin, Burkina Faso, Mali and Chad have proposed that support to cotton production be banned. The Swedish

contribution of about SEK 450 000 is to help these countries independently pursue the issue at the WTO summit in Cancún in September.

"That some of the poorest countries join forces in this way in a challenging initiative for free and fair trade is a very rare occurrence and something Sweden warmly welcomes," the Minister for Industry and Trade, Leif Pagrotsky, and the Minister for Development Cooperation, Migration and Asylum Policy, Jan O Karlsson, said in a joint comment.

"To actively pursue an issue in international negotiations requires resources. We have therefore chosen to give these countries economic assistance," Mr Karlsson continued.

The four countries behind the initiative are strongly dependent on income from cotton. It is their most important export and production employs millions of people in the region. The countries oppose the support given by the EU, China and the US to their own cotton producing farmers, which leads to overproduction and low world market prices.

"The focus must be on areas where developing countries have competitive advantages when world trade is opened up. Trade affords opportunities to fight poverty and the countries behind the cotton initiative have taken note of that," Mr Pagrotsky states.

Sweden is appropriating over SEK 160 million this year to promote trade-related development cooperation and the participation of the developing countries in world trade. SEK 16 million of this will go to the WTO's fund for trade-related technical assistance, which makes Sweden the single largest donor.

Process of referral to precede EU Intergovernmental Conference

Dialogue in preparation for the EU intergovernmental conference (IGC) this autumn will begin with a process of referral. More than 130 bodies around the country will be given an opportunity to comment on the proposal from the Convention on the Future of Europe for a constitutional treaty for the European Union. The starting point for the process will be a ministerial memorandum (Ds 2003:36), which will be distributed along with a Swedish language version of the results of the Convention.

"This is the beginning of a process of consultation," says Minister for Foreign Affairs Anna Lindh. "This will put us in a very strong position when we come to present our views at EU level." The referral process will be followed early in the autumn by a written communication from the Government to the Riksdag in which the Government will give its evaluation of the proposals presented by the Convention. In November the Riksdag will respond with a report, following private members' motions, discussion by committees and a debate and resolution in the Chamber. In combination, this process will provide a foundation for the Government's negotiators at the IGC. The ministerial memorandum describes the Convention's proposals area by area. It then goes on to indicate the principles on which a Swedish position could be based.

At the Thessaloniki Summit in June, EU heads of state and government concluded that the Convention's proposal was a good basis for the IGC that is scheduled to begin in the first half of October and reach completion in time for the elections to the European Parliament in June 2004. "I hope as many referral bodies as possible will take this chance and get involved," says Anna Lindh.

Sweden first to ratify the MNEPR Agreement

Today, Sweden was the first state to deposit its instrument of ratification of the MNEPR Agreement with the OECD Secretary-General in Paris.

The MNEPR Agreement, which means the Multilateral Nuclear Environment Programme for the Russian Federation, was signed in Stockholm on 21 May by, inter alia, Minister for Foreign Affairs Anna Lindh, the Russian Foreign Minister, Igor Ivanov, and the French Foreign Minister Dominique de Villepin.

"Nuclear waste is one of the greatest environmental threats of our times. The fact that Sweden, as the first state to do so, is ratifying the MNEPR Agreement reflects the political importance that we attach to this problem and the prominent role played by Sweden in negotiating this Agreement", says Minister for Foreign Affairs Anna Lindh.

The MNEPR Agreement has three main areas of application: safe management of radioactive waste, security regarding spent nuclear fuel and reactor safety.

The MNEPR Agreement has been signed by Belgium, Denmark, Finland, France, Germany, the Netherlands, Norway, Russia, Sweden, the UK and the USA, and by the European Community and Euroatom.

The Agreement will enter into force thirty days after one of the Agreement's depositories has received instruments of ratification or approval from Russia and one other signatory. However, the Agreement applies provisionally from the date of signature.

Sweden gives budget support to Timor-Leste

The Government decided today to contribute SEK 10 million in budget support to Timor-Leste. Sweden has given support to Timor-Leste since 1997, primarily for the reconstruction of the administration and as humanitarian support via the UN. The overall objective of Swedish development cooperation with Timor-Leste is to help the country's own efforts to fight poverty by securing peace and stability, supporting democracy and respect for human rights and strengthening economic development.

Budget support is an effective way of supporting Timor-Leste's development process. This is based on two sound principles – an expressed targeting of poverty and a sound system for budgeting and financial control.

Timor-Leste is the world's youngest state. The country became independent from Indonesia on 20 May 2002 and is one of the world's poorest countries.

Sweden's extensive relations with Timor-Leste partly originate from the fact that Indonesia's occupation of the former Portuguese colony from 1975 was never recognised by Sweden. In Sweden, there has been a strong commitment among politicians and advocacy groups in support of Timor-Leste's freedom and development. After Indonesia declared that the future of Timor-Leste would be decided in a referendum in 1999, Sweden became rapidly involved and sent both civil police and election observers.

Sweden and France presented today an international task

force on global public goods

Today, Sweden and France have presented an international task force on global public goods. The long-term aim of the task force is to create financing arrangements for things that everyone needs but far too few are prepared to pay for, such as clean air and combating infectious diseases. The presentation took place at a meeting in Paris today led by the French and Swedish Ministers responsible for development assistance, Jan O. Karlsson and Pierre-André Wiltzer.

"The international community must be able to cooperate better on

the various global public goods, in such widely divergent areas as clean air, health and financial stability. We spend a lot of time at conferences talking about what we want to achieve. But how can we do this? At national level, we have our public sectors. Internationally, we have to find other ways to jointly identify and tackle global problems", says Minister for Development Cooperation, Migration and Asylum Policy Jan O. Karlsson.

This is why Sweden and France have initiated an international

working group for global public goods, the "International Task Force on Global Public Goods". This has been assigned the task of examining how the most essential global public goods are provided today. It will also present proposals on how these crucial issues could be handled more efficiently and better ways of financing this. The objective is to combat poverty and promote sustainable development.

The task force consists of some 15 experts from governments, international organisations, civil society, the business sector and the academic world. Work is expected to last until the end of 2005. Ernesto Zedillo, former president of Mexico and Tidjane Thiam, previously a minister from Côte d'Ivoire will lead the organisation.

A secretariat, under the leadership of Sven Sandström, a Swede and former Managing Director of the World Bank, has been established in Stockholm.

At today's meeting, a reference group, "Friends of the Task Force", was linked to the task force, led by Sweden's OECD Ambassador and former State Secretary Gun-Britt Andersson.

The Government will take the initiative for establishing an independent international commission on weapons of mass destruction, in which Hans Blix will be Chairman. This was announced by Minister for Foreign Affairs Anna Lindh after the cabinet meeting on Thursday.

"We must do everything we can to avert the threat posed by weapons of mass destruction," Anna Lindh stated. "It is very gratifying that Hans Blix is willing to accept the chairmanship. The experience and knowledge he possesses is unique."

"The purpose of the commission is to provide new impetus to the international efforts involved in disarmament and non-proliferation of weapons of mass destruction and missiles. The commission will be formed during the autumn of 2003 under the leadership of Hans Blix and plans call for their recommendations to be submitted in 2005."

On Thursday, the Ministry for Foreign Affairs opens a new section dealing with disarmament on the Ministry for Foreign Affairs' website (in Swedish). The address is www.ud.se. Information dealing with disarmament, non-proliferation, export controls of weapons of mass destruction, missiles and conventional weapons is available there. Weapon types are described, as are international agreements and the Government's policies in these matters. Current information, speeches and articles will also be published.

"This is one more way to express the Government's commitment in this area. I hope we succeed in spreading knowledge of and arousing further interest in issues concerning disarmament," says Anna Lindh.

Three meetings for environment ministers in Sweden

At this meeting of the environment ministers of the Council of the Baltic Sea States, a declaration will be made outlining continued cooperation around the Baltic Sea to enhance the environment and achieve sustainable development.

Hans Dahlgren to travel to Ghana for talks on Liberia

The State Secretary for Foreign Affairs, Hans Dahlgren, will travel on Tuesday to Ghana in his capacity as the EU Presidency's Special Representative to the Mano River region. The visit will take place in connection with the UN Security Council's tour of West Africa and the efforts now again being made to find a peaceful solution to the serious conflict in Liberia.

With Ghana's foreign minister, Nana Akufo-Addo, Mr Dahlgren is chairman of the International Contact Group on Liberia which was established to give international support to a peaceful development in the country. In addition to discussions with Akufo-Addo and with the special Liberia mediator, the former Nigerian Head of State Abubakar, Hans Dahlgren will meet the delegation from the UN Security Council visiting the region. The delegation is led by the British Ambassador to the UN, Jeremy Greenstock. Mr Dahlgren will also contact representatives of the parties to the conflict still residing in the capital Accra.

Hans Dahlgren has been the EU Presidency's Special Representative for Liberia, Sierra Leone and Guinea (the Mano River countries) for two years and as such has a mandate to try to contribute to peaceful solutions to the conflicts in Liberia and the region. Sweden and the EU actively contributed to the realisation of the peace talks in Ghana.

Biljana Plavsic to serve sentence in Sweden

The Government has decided that the sentence passed on the former President of the Serbian Republic of Bosnia and Herzegovina, Biljana Plavsic, by the International Criminal Tribunal for the former Yugoslavia may be executed in Sweden.

On 27 February 2003 Biljana Plavsic was sentenced by the Tribunal to 11 years' imprisonment for persecution, a crime against humanity. The Tribunal has asked Sweden if the sentence may be enforced here.

The Tribunal was established by the UN Security Council in 1993 to institute legal proceedings against persons responsible for serious breaches of international humanitarian law in the former Yugoslavia. Since a very special type of crime is involved, the UN considers, inter alia in view of security, that sentences passed by the Tribunal should be executed outside the former Yugoslavia. One of the preconditions for the Tribunal to be able to fulfil its assignment is therefore that individual states undertake to enforce the prison sentences passed. Several other states are already executing the Tribunal's sentences.

"Sweden has a strong interest in promoting the Tribunal's administration of justice so that proceedings are instituted for crimes committed in the former Yugoslavia. Like several other states, therefore, Sweden has concluded an agreement with the Tribunal on enforcement of prison sentences," Thomas Bodström says. "Sweden has not previously received a request from the Tribunal for transfer of enforcement of sentence. Now that we have received a request it is essential for Sweden's part that we take our responsibility so that the Tribunal's sentences can be enforced." Enforcement in Sweden will compy with Swedish rules. However, enforcement in Sweden may be longer than normal since the Government may deviate from the rule that conditional release be granted after two thirds of the sentence has been served.

Sweden signs Optional Protocol to the UN Convention against Torture

Sweden will today sign the Optional Protocol to the UN Convention against Torture and Other Cruel, Inhuman or Degrading Treatment or Punishment. Sweden will thus be among the first countries to demonstrate its intention to implement the provisions of the Protocol on international and national preventive visiting and inspection systems. Sweden was also one of the initiative-takers when negotiations on the Optional Protocol began in the early 1990s. "No form of torture or other inhuman or degrading treatment can ever be accepted. The Optional Protocol to the UN Convention on Torture is one more step in our efforts to eradicate the occurrence of torture in the world," says Minister for Foreign Affairs Anna Lindh. Sweden's Ambassador to the UN, Pierre Schori, will sign the Protocol in New York on the UN International Day in Support of Victims of Torture. It is hoped that more countries will now join those that have already signed the Protocol.

The nations that sign the Optional Protocol agree to allow a subcommittee of the UN Committee against Torture to visit places where people are held in detention and subsequently present recommendations to the receiving state. National institutions that can conduct similar visits and inspections and submit recommendations will also be established.

Sweden and the EU are actively involved in efforts to eradicate all forms of torture and other inhuman treatment. The EU guidelines to combat torture were adopted during the Swedish Presidency of the EU in the first half of 2001. The guidelines primarily form the basis for a démarche in third countries on the use of torture.

Tightened sanctions against Burma

The Government decided today to approve the EU decision to tighten sanctions against Burma. This means that the ban on military cooperation with Burma has been strengthened. The list of persons subject to the EU visa ban and of those whose assets are frozen in the Union has also been extended.

The EU decision is a reaction to recent negative political developments in Burma – particularly the arrest of the Nobel laureate and leader of the democratic opposition Aung San Suu Kyi and her party leadership on 31 May.

"By tightening sanctions, there will be greater international pressure on the military junta to release Aung San Suu Kyi and initiate a dialogue aimed at restoring democracy in Burma", comments Minister for Foreign Affairs Anna Lindh.

Both bilaterally and via the EU, Sweden has demanded the release of Suu Kyi and has urged several Asian countries to become even more active in efforts to promote positive development in Burma. "It is most positive that the members of the South East Asian cooperation organisation ASEAN demanded the release of Aung San Suu Kyi last week. These countries are playing a key role in achieving positive development in Burma, which in turn would mean an upswing throughout the region", says Anna Lindh.

EU sanctions against Burma were introduced in 1996, and include an embargo on the transfer of weapons and military equipment, a visa ban for senior members of the regime and freezing of these persons' assets in the EU. There is also a moratorium on high-level visits to Burma, a prohibition against all development cooperation (apart from humanitarian assistance and support towards the promotion of human rights through organisations such as NGOs) and deliveries of equipment that can be used for internal repression.

Tougher sentences for human smuggling

Today the Minister for Migration Policy, Jan O.Karlsson, will present a proposal to the Council on Legislation on amendments to the Aliens Act.

The Government's proposal means anyone who intentionally helps an alien to unlawfully enter or pass through Sweden or any other Schengen state will be sentenced for human smuggling to imprisonment for at most two years. The crime shall be considered grave if the act entails, for example, systematic exploitation of the vulnerable situation of aliens, mortal danger or other ruthlessness in relation to aliens. Tougher sentences will also be meted out to those who, in order to make a profit, plan or organise activities focusing on aliens travelling to Sweden without the prescribed permits.

"Events in recent years have made us painfully aware of the abuse some people are prepared to inflict on other people. Dover in the summer of 2000 is perhaps the worst and best known example where 58 people were found dead in a container. We know that people are exploited by human smugglers every day. These people in their vulnerability and desperation are persuaded to invest all they possess in a lie and in a journey that in the worst cases ends in tragedy," says the Minister for Migration Policy, Jan O. Karlsson.

It is further proposed that a new provision be introduced into the Aliens Act which will make it possible, on application by the leader of a preliminary investigation, to grant time-limited residence permits to foreign injured parties and witnesses where this is considered justified in order to carry out a preliminary investigation or main hearing in a criminal case.

"The proposal means victims of human smuggling are granted the legal right to remain in Sweden to assist criminal investigation staff in prosecuting crimes by giving testimony and providing other evidence," Mr Karlsson continues.

"Those granted a time-limited residence permit are furthermore entitled to the same health and medical services and social assistance as residents of Sweden. In this way we can provide for the extra support many of these people may need," Jan O. Karlsson says.

According to the proposal, the amendments should enter into force on 1 October 2004.

Twenty largest donor countries meet in Stockholm to coordinate humanitarian assistance

On 16–17 June, the Swedish Government will be hosting the International Meeting on Good Humanitarian Donorship, an international conference on humanitarian assistance. The conference will be held at Frösundavik in Stockholm.

Representatives of the world's twenty largest donor countries, which account for nearly 98 percent of global humanitarian assistance, will be attending the conference in Stockholm along with representatives of the UN, NGOs and a number of international experts to agree on a set of guidelines to improve global humanitarian assistance.

This is the first large-scale international initiative of its kind to be taken with the aim of improving the coordination of global humanitarian assistance. The conference is being organised by the

Ministry for Foreign Affairs in cooperation with the Swedish International Development Cooperation Agency (Sida).

"The scope of humanitarian assistance has increased enormously over the last ten years. In spite of this, resources are still insufficient to meet humanitarian needs. Increased resources are needed, as well as greater efficiency. Improved coordination of initiatives is vital," says Minister for Development Cooperation, Migration and Asylum Policy Jan O. Karlsson.

Swedish rapid deployment force to the Democratic Republic of the Congo

The Government decided on Tuesday to propose to the Swedish Riksdag the dispatch of an armed unit to the Democratic Republic of the Congo (DR Congo), to be part of an EU-led multinational military rapid deployment force in Bunia, in the province of Ituri, in the north-eastern region of the country.

The region has long been characterised by violence between ethnic groups. The situation has deteriorated after Uganda's retreat from Ituri in May as part of the peace agreement for the DR Congo. The UN peace-keeping mission MONUC is in Bunia and is to be strengthened. The Security Council has called for assistance from the international community in helping to stabilise Bunia until 1 September.

On 5 June, the EU decided to respond to this request by sending a rapid deployment force. The EU is expected to take the decision on initiating this operation on 12 June. It will be carried out in accordance with Security Council Resolution 1484.

Political control of this operation will be exercised by the EU, while France will be responsible for its military leadership. Authorisation for the rapid deployment force is temporary and according to the UN decision will apply until 1 September 2003.

The aim of this temporary operation is to work closely with MONUC in stabilising the security and humanitarian situation in Bunia, protecting the airport and internally displaced refugees who have pitched camp in the town and where necessary, helping to ensure the security of the population, UN personnel, and humanitarian efforts underway in the area.

"The overall aim of the EU operation is to prevent violations of the civilian population, to improve the humanitarian situation and to give support to UN efforts and to the peace process in the DR Congo", comments Minister for Foreign Affairs Anna Lindh.

Minister for Defence Leni Björklund also comments "It is important that the international community gives support to preventing genocide and protecting international law and human rights. Our soldiers will be engaged in a mission involving risks. Alongside the security risk and that of infectious diseases will be the problem of the troops' exposure to continual mental strain through meeting, for example, forcibly recruited child soldiers. However, the forces we plan to send are well-trained".

"There are limitations and risks that are to be weighed against the positive effects of an operation in the DR Congo. What is important is to save lives, and promote peaceful development", says Leni Björklund.

The Swedish contribution will consist of a task force unit of around 70 persons, including tactical leadership.

State to acquire ABB's shares in Swedish Export Credit Corporation—Bill to the Riksdag

The State is to take over the shares in the Swedish Export Credit Corporation (SEK) held by ABB Structured Finance Investment AB. This will make the State the sole owner of this company. The acquisition will come about through a direct dividend to ABB from the company's total capital. To restore the capital base, the State will aim for a period of time to be restrictive with regard to shareholder dividends. The acquisition is conditional on approval by the Riksdag.

This is the essence of a Bill to the Riksdag that the Government decided on today. The Riksdag's decision is expected before the summer recess.

"The Government has complied with ABB's wishes to relinquish its ownership of shares in the Swedish Export Credit Corporation. We have reached an agreement that I am satisfied with and that the Government believes is good for both the Swedish Export Credit Corporation and for the State," says Minister for Industry and Trade Leif Pagrotsky in a comment.

"SEK is an important actor for the financing of Swedish exports and plays a vital role on Swedish capital markets. The State's ownership of the company is long-term and stable. The change in ownership does not alter the State's view on the strategy, which remains firm," adds Mr Pagrotsky. Since 2000, the Swedish Export Credit Corporation has been 65% owned by the State and 35% owned by ABB. The company's activities mainly involve offering its clients – among them Sweden's largest export companies – medium- and long-term export financing. This includes fixed interest-rate credits within the framework of the OECD Arrangement on Guidelines for Officially Supported Export Credits.

New development bill submitted to the Riksdag

Today the Government presented to the Riksdag its bill, "Our common responsibility – Sweden's policy for global development". Sweden is thus the first country in the world to present a coherent policy for global development.

The bill proposes new goals for all aspects of Government operations with the aim of contributing to fair and sustainable global development. Trade, agricultural, security, migration, environmental and economic policies are to promote global development. A poverty and human rights perspective shall permeate the entire policy.

With this bill, the Government has reformulated its policy in order to contribute more forcefully to the fulfilment of the UN objectives. The overriding goal is to abolish world poverty. An intermediate goal is to halve world poverty by the year 2015.

The bill proposes that the Government report each year to the elected representatives in the Riksdag on the implementation of the policy. Each ministry shall present how its political decisions have contributed to fair and sustainable global development.

Sweden's policy for global development can be summarised in ten points:

1. One cannot develop countries from outside

Our initiatives are to be based on the experiences and priorities of the poor. Since the late 1990s, most poor countries have formulated their own strategies to fight poverty. These strategies should serve as the point of departure for our cooperation.

2. All policies should move in the same direction

As a result of the bill, conflicting goals in Swedish policy will be made visible and will be carefully weighed up. This means, among other things, that endeavours to reform the EU's agricultural and fishery policies will be intensified.

3. An open economy and free trade form the basis of development

If poor countries are to reap the benefits of increased world trade, it is crucial that rich countries open up their markets. At the same time, the export capacity of poor countries must be improved. Development assistance should also be used to strengthen the position of poor countries at the negotiating table.

4. Democracy is a prerequisite

Measures to promote democracy and good governance will be afforded greater priority in Sweden's policy for global development.

5. Women are the key to development

Measures targeted at women and women's rights also mean increased welfare for the whole family. Gender equality is highlighted as a central aspect of the human rights perspective and shall permeate not just development assistance but every facet of Swedish global development policy.

6. Consideration for the environment puts limits on our lifestyle

Efforts to change the production and consumption patterns of rich countries must continue. Poverty can also put a strain on the environment. Further efforts will therefore be made to contribute to sustainable ecological development in poor countries.

7. Increased mobility for people contributes to development

We therefore intend to create organised forms for freer migration. The sums of money that immigrants send to their native countries are almost twice as high as the world's total development assistance, but much of this money disappears along the way on account of high transaction charges. Sweden shall help to reduce these costs in order to increase the overall development effects.

8. Swedish society at all levels shall be involved

Organisations and popular movements have always played a central role in Swedish development cooperation. The Government bill serves to consolidate their role. A citizens' forum shall be set up.

9. Development assistance will be increased but must also be made more efficient Instead of limiting the number of partner countries, the number will probably be increased. We will work in all countries where our contribution is meaningful. Development assistance will be

concentrated to less subject areas and sectors in each country. The goal of one per cent of GDP remains unchanged. A new independent evaluation function will be introduced to monitor the fulfilment of objectives and the efficiency of development cooperation.

10. Sweden will continue to promote difficult and controversial issues

There are deep differences of opinion as regards issues relating to democracy and human rights, in particular in the matter of women's rights. Matters relating to sexual and reproductive rights are especially controversial, including the right to abortion, contraceptives and sex education, as well as the rights of homosexuals, bisexuals and transsexuals. Sweden will continue to speak out for these issues.

Proposal on Deep Rock Terminal Storage of Mercury

One of the main proposals in the bill A society with a non-toxic and resource-saving ecocycle is a proposal on deep rock terminal storage of mercury.

The Government proposes a legal requirement that waste containing at least 1 percent by weight of mercury shall be stored permanently deep in the bedrock by 2015 at the latest. Storage may also be an option for waste containing lower concentrations of mercury if this is deemed reasonable according to the criteria in the Swedish Environmental Code. The Government will appoint a coordinator to coordinate implementation, taking technical, environmental, social and economic conditions into account.

Under the Swedish strategy, mercury should not be recycled but should be terminally disposed of in a safe and environmentally sound way. Starting from this principle, the Government has commissioned two inquiries into how such terminal disposal can be effected. In 2001, the Committee on the Terminal Storage of Mercury proposed a legal requirement that waste containing mercury should be stored permanently deep in the bedrock. Waste owners should cooperate and bear the responsibility for the location, construction and management of a deep storage facility. Several technical and legal issues remain to be solved before a storage facility can become a reality.

Government Bill on the ecocycle presented to the Riksdag

The Government Bill "A society with a non-toxic and resource-saving ecocycle" that has now been presented to the Riksdag is based on an agreement between the Government, the Left Party and the

Green Party.

The Bill includes strategies and measures for further development towards a society with a non-toxic and resource-saving ecocycle.

"Waste is both a resource and an environmental problem, a resource to be made use of and an environmental problem to be minimised", says the Minister for the Environment, Lena Sommestad.

Simplifying life for the consumer

The Government wants to make it easier for consumers to take part in the various waste collection systems, particularly those for hazardous waste.

"All households should enjoy a good level of service. We also want to increase collection closer to people's homes. We therefore plan to make more stringent demands on the accessibility of collection systems. We also aim to give the Planning and Building Act Committee the task of reviewing ways in which property owners can be compelled to provide space for sorting at source", says Minister for the Environment Lena Sommestad.

Producer responsibility for packaging and recycled paper will be retained, but the Government considers that the role of municipalities must be strengthened and more clearly defined, primarily with regard to planning responsibility and information to households. Local consultation between producers and municipalities must also be extended.

An increase in ecologically sound waste management

"We are moving away from landfills as a solution in Sweden", says Minister for the Environment Lena Sommestad. "We agree that recycling packaging and other waste is a sound principle, that should be developed in line with Swedish and European Union waste management policy. The volume of waste must be reduced, and the dangers presented by waste prevented. Any waste that is still produced must be recycled, re-used or burned for energy recovery".

This is why further measures are proposed to achieve waste management in accordance with the waste management hierarchy, by promoting methods for biological treatment and other types of material recovery. The Government therefore proposes new interim goals for biological treatment of food waste from households, restaurants, large-scale catering centres and shops, and food and similar waste from the food industry, etc. By 2010 at the latest, at least 35 per cent of food waste from households, restaurants, large-scale catering centres and shops must be recycled using biological processes.

The requirements for waste incineration must be made more stringent. The Government considers that waste for incineration should be well sorted, classified and controlled. Hazardous waste should not be transported to incineration plants mixed with other waste. Waste that is suitable for recycling or that does not burn should have been separated from other waste. The Government therefore intends to assign the Swedish Environmental Protection Agency, in consultation with the Swedish Energy Agency, the task of examining the possibility of more stringent requirements for and control of waste for incineration, under the Ordinance concerning waste incineration.

A one-man committee will be appointed with the task of presenting proposals on how a tax on waste incineration could be legally drafted and to assess the suitability of such a tax or whether other economic policy levers should be formulated instead. The one-man committee should also assess a suitable level of tax in relation to the effects to be achieved.

Waste management should be seen as an infrastructure

Waste management should not only be seen as an issue of resources and an environmental problem but also as an infrastructure. The Government plans therefore to define central government planning responsibility and to develop and strengthen follow-up at central government level. The responsibility of the Swedish Environmental Protection Agency will be extended to cover monitoring developments in the field of waste management regarding capacity and methods of waste management, and to promote ecologically sustainable waste management that is efficient for

society and simple for the consumer.

At the same time a council responsible for waste issues will be established within the Swedish Environmental Protection Agency which will help it to implement waste management policy. Representatives of the central actors in the field of waste management and the rest of the business sector, consumers and NGOs should be included in this council.

Waste management planning is to be strengthened at municipal, regional and national levels. This planning should aim at consolidating earlier strategies for achieving goals in the waste management field. The Swedish Environmental Protection Agency will be given the task of drawing up a national waste management plan.

The responsibility of waste-owners will be defined in legislation, primarily for industries and other enterprises. This will make it clear that the waste-owner should consider recycling and making use of the possibilities it presents. It is the hope of the Government that the ambitious work on waste issues that has already been undertaken by many entrepreneurs will be the level achieved by all entrepreneurs in the future.

The monopoly of municipalities on hazardous waste will be maintained but the issue of abolishing this monopoly will remain under further examination.

Final disposal of mercury

Waste containing specific amounts of mercury should be transported to permanent disposal sites, deep down in rock. Exemptions should be granted in only a limited number of cases, where mercury amounts are very small or where other exceptional grounds exist. The requirement for disposal at depth should apply from 1 January 2015. An external actor should be given the task of coordinating implementation, based on technical, environmental, social and socio-economic conditions. Reports on implementation should be presented to the Government every three years to ensure that work is proceeding according to plan.

Draft legislation

In addition to the provisions on the responsibilities of waste-owners, it is proposed that: the Government should have the power to make specific requirements on the composition of goods and their suitability for re-use and recycling in accordance with EU regulations.

Municipalities should be responsible for monitoring compliance with the Act concerning vehicle disposal.

The Government should be able to issue requirements for deposit systems for ready-made drinks packaging. The Government plans to extend this to apply to all metal cans and plastic bottles for ready-made drinks.

Agreement on nuclear safety in Russia to be signed in Stockholm on 21 May

On Wednesday 21 May the MNEPR agreement will be signed in Stockholm by, among others, Minister for Foreign Affairs Anna Lindh and

Russia's Foreign Minister, Igor Ivanov. This will establish a legal framework for support measures in Russia in the area of nuclear safety.

The MNEPR agreement (Multilateral Nuclear Environmental Programme in the Russian Federation) has three main application areas: safe management of radioactive waste and spent nuclear fuel and reactor safety.

The absence of a legal framework regulating issues of liability in the event of nuclear damage has severely limited the possibility of international support measures. Sweden therefore, along with a number of other countries, has been the driving force in negotiating an agreement.

The MNEPR agreement will enable, for example, the NDEP fund (Northern Dimension Environment Partnership) to implement nuclear safety projects in Russia, such as at Andreeva Bay. Sweden has contributed 10 million euro to the fund.

Lena Hjelm-Wallén presses for new agricultural policy

In a proposal to the EU Convention on the future of Europe, Lena Hjelm-Wallén today presents a treaty text containing new objectives for the EU's agricultural policy.

"The present agricultural policy objectives are designed for the situation that existed in Europe in the 1950s," says Lena Hjelm-Wallén. "These objectives are no longer relevant so they should be reformed.

"The new objectives should be based on the demands raised by society and consumers, they should satisfy ambitious requirements for animal welfare and health, environmental considerations and sustainable development, and they should contribute to a living countryside. The goal of global food security must also be taken into account.

"The EU must not use agricultural policy to take back with one hand what it gives with the other in the form of development assistance and trade facilitation," says Lena Hjelm-Wallén.

If the Convention on the future of Europe adopts the proposed objectives, the European Parliament should have co-decision rights on matters of agricultural policy. This is a radical change. At present the Council of Ministers, acting on proposals from the Commission, has sole decision-making power on agricultural issues.

"The European Parliament would be able to back the Commission up where modernisation is concerned," says Lena Hjelm-Wallén.

Even if the new objectives are not accepted, in her view the European Parliament should be given a say in the guidelines for the common agricultural policy. This could be done by joint adoption by the Council and the Parliament of multi-year framework programmes.

Lena Hjelm-Wallén and Dutch Convention member Gijs de Vries have jointly tabled a proposal giving the European Parliament greater influence over the budget for agriculture, on condition that the Council decides on multi-year budget ceilings.

New act on the treatment of personal data in activities under the legislation on aliens and citizenship

The Commission of Inquiry on Data pertaining to Aliens today presented its final report An Aliens' Data Act (Swedish Government Official Reports 2003:40) to Minister for Migration Jan O. Karlsson.

In its report, the Commission proposes a new act to regulate the way in which the Government Offices, the Swedish Migration Board, the Aliens Appeals Board, the Swedish Integration Board, the National Police Board and the police authorities treat personal data in activities that come under the legislation on aliens and citizenship. This new act will supplement the provisions of the Personal Data Act (1998:204) and is adapted to the requirements of the European Community Data Protection Directive.

One effect of the Commission's proposal is to allow the authorities concerned to make rational and effective use of modern information technology in their contacts with other Sweden and foreign authorities and with private individuals.

In order to enable the authorities to work together, certain provisions are proposed that will allow them to release personal data to one another, even when such data is secret.

At the same time the Act will give the individual a strong degree of protection against undue intrusions into his or her personal integrity. The measures proposed include restrictions on the seeking and compiling of sensitive data about individuals. Stringent limitations are also proposed on access by outsiders to electronically stored information.

Evaluation of the Baltic Billion Funds

The Government decided today to commission the Swedish Agency for Administrative Development to evaluate operations relating to the Baltic Billion Funds. The results will be presented on 30 January 2004.

"The Baltic Billion Funds have meant that it has been possible to take a wide range of initiatives in the Baltic Sea region. The aim has been to strengthen the presence of the Swedish business sector, to encourage cooperation between countries and to stimulate growth in the entire region. Now that we are approaching the end of the second programme period it is essential that the progress reports undertaken regularly in each Baltic Billion Fund be extended with an evaluation of these operations," says Minister for Development Cooperation, Migration and Asylum Policy, Jan O. Karlsson.

Background to the Baltic Billion Funds:

The Baltic Billion Fund I

In order to stimulate growth and employment, the Swedish Riksdag decided in July 1996 to appropriate SEK 1 billion for support to cooperation and development in the Baltic Sea region. These funds were intended to support measures and projects in the following five areas, the Swedish export industry, energy systems, reciprocal exchange of know-how, reinforced infrastructure and cooperation in protecting the Baltic Sea environment. The objective was also to increase trade and investment and to strengthen cooperation between states and the business sector in the Baltic Sea region. A total of 78 projects received support from the First Baltic Billion Fund. The appropriation was concluded at the end of 2002.

The Baltic Billion Fund II

In the spring of 1998, the Riksdag took a decision to appropriate a further SEK 1 billion for the development of the business sector in the Baltic Sea region over a five-year period. The overall objective of the programme is to stimulate business sector development and trade with the countries of the region based on Swedish interests. Proposals from the Committee on Economic Cooperation in the Baltic Sea Region contained detailed objectives for strengthening the position of Swedish enterprises in the Baltic Sea region and improving the participation of Swedish companies in the development of this region's business sector. The funds are being used for several different support measures designed in close cooperation with the business sector and including support to market establishment, project exports and information campaigns. There is considerable interest on the part of the Swedish business sector, municipalities, county administrative boards and the cooperating countries. At present, 37 programmes and projects have been decided upon within the framework of the second Baltic Billion Fund.

Swedens Economy

Sweden's gross domestic product (GDP) is expected to increase by 1.4 per cent this year and 2.4 per cent next year. The weak international economy holds back Swedish exports this year. Excess capacity in parts of the business sector will lead to decreased investment. As a consequence of the moderate GDP growth, unemployment will rise somewhat this year. Next year both international and domestic demand will pick up. The stronger economy will lead to a fall in open unemployment. General government net lending is estimated to amount to 0.4 per cent of GDP this year and 1.0 per cent next year.

International developments

The security policy situation resulting from the Iraq crisis has held back the global economy. The forecast is based on the assumption that uncertainty about the global political situation will subside but that some uncertainty will remain. As the uncertainty abates, it is predicted that firms will be more willing to invest and household consumption will strengthen globally. An expansive monetary policy in several countries will assuage the negative effects of the Iraq crisis. In the United States, GDP will grow by 2.6 per cent this year and 3.8 per cent next year. In the EU, an export-driven recovery is expected to lead to GDP growth of 1.3 per cent this year and 2.2 per cent next year. The underlying problems in the Japanese economy remain and so GDP growth will be weak over the next few years. Overall, global GDP growth will be 3.2 per cent this year and 4.0 per cent next year.

Developments in Sweden 20032004

The unfavourable international economic climate, combined with weak demand in a number of export industries important to Sweden, including the telecommunication equipment industry, will hamper Swedish export growth this year. However, competitiveness is good thanks to strong productivity growth in the business sector. As the global investment climate improves, demand for Swedish goods will increase. Imports of goods will grow gradually once destocking is complete and demand in the economy picks up. Nevertheless, ever higher exports will result in a growing surplus on the balance of trade in goods and so boost GDP growth both this year and next.

Net exports of services fell sharply towards the end of last year, due in part to decreased foreign tourism in Sweden. No major recovery is anticipated this year and so the balance of trade in services will slow GDP growth by around 0.4 percentage points this year.

Despite weak growth in income, household consumption is forecast to increase by around 2 per cent per year. Household demand will be boosted by strong real wealth, continued low interest rates and a relatively stable labour market situation.

Business investment is still weak. Many industries have excess capacity, and uncertainty about global developments is undermining the willingness to invest. However, resource utilisation is rising gradually and industrial investment will increase again next year. Residential construction will grow both this year and next. General government investment will also rise, thanks in part to central government investment in infrastructure, although proposed cutbacks will dampen the upswing. Overall, investment will fall by 0.5 per cent in 2003 and rise by 2.9 per cent in 2004.

Central government consumption will decrease both this year and next, due in part to limits on defence spending. The limited financial room for manoeuvre in the local government sector will curb growth in local government consumption. General government consumption will increase by 0.5 per cent this year and 0.2 per cent next year.

Demand for labour is currently weak. Employment is forecast to decrease slightly this year and open unemployment to rise to 4.5 per cent. Next year the general economic recovery is expected to lead to an improved labour market situation. Employment will rise and open unemployment will fall to 4.3 per cent. The regular employment rate among people aged 2064 is estimated to be 77.6 per cent in 2004.

Inflation rose sharply over the winter. The increase was due primarily to higher prices for heating oils, petrol and electricity. These prices are expected to fall gradually and so have only a temporary impact on inflation. The rate of growth in wages has slowed over the last year and inflationary pressure is expected to be low in the future. The Riksbank is expected to lower its repo rate to 2.75 per cent in 2003. Underlying inflation as measured by the UND1X index is forecast to be slightly below 2 per cent at the end of both 2003 and 2004.

Medium-term estimates 20052006

Besides the economic forecast for the next two years, medium-term estimates are being presented. Over this time frame it is difficult to predict economic fluctuations. Instead the estimates are based on the assessment that resource utilisation in the economy will be below normal at the end of 2004. Growth in 2005 and 2006 may therefore be slightly above the long-term rate. GDP is estimated to grow by 2.6 per cent in 2005 and 2.5 per cent in 2006. The economy is assumed to reach normal resource utilisation in 2006. Open unemployment will fall to 3.8 per cent in 2006 and the regular employment rate will rise to 77.8 per cent.

Public finances

In 2002 general government net lending amounted to SEK 25 billion or 1.1 per cent of GDP. This is a sharp decrease from 2001 when the surplus was in excess of SEK 100 billion. However, the high level of net lending in 2001 was due largely to the exceptionally high tax revenue from corporate profits and capital gains in 2000, which was reported in the National Accounts in 2001 increasing net lending by around 2 per cent of GDP. If net lending is adjusted for tax accruals and the economic climate, this gives a measure of the structural level of net lending. Structural net lending is estimated to have fallen from 4.2 per cent of GDP in 2000 to 0.8 per cent in 2002. This trend reflects an expansive fiscal policy in the reforms and tax cuts introduced during the period.

In 2003 net lending will fall to 0.4 per cent of GDP. The deterioration is due in part to the weak economy. Net lending will rise in subsequent years and is expected to exceed 2 per cent of GDP in 2006. The projected surpluses through to 2006 are believed to be commensurate with the target of an average surplus of 2 per cent of GDP over a business cycle. Structural net lending will rise from 0.8 per cent of GDP in 2002 to 2.2 per cent of GDP in 2006. The fiscal stance, measured as the change in structural net lending, is therefore expected to be tight during the forecast period.

In 2002 general government income amounted to 56.8 per cent and general government expenditure to 55.8 per cent of GDP. Income will be unchanged in 2003 as a proportion of GDP while expenditure will increase. The anticipated economic recovery will help both income and expenditure to decrease as a percentage of GDP in the period 20042006.

Net lending in 2003 will be allocated between the three parts of the general government sector such that central government will generate a deficit of SEK 43 billion while the old-age pension system will generate a surplus of SEK 51 billion. The central government deficit is expected to decrease during the forecast period while the pension system's surplus will increase somewhat. The local government sector is expected to generate deficits in 20042006 after a small surplus in 2003. These deficits are believed to be commensurate with a positive result as defined in the balanced budget requirement for municipalities and county councils.

In 2001 general government financial assets exceeded liabilities, which means that net debt was negative. Substantial reductions in the value of general government shareholdings in 2002 meant a return to positive net debt despite continued positive saving. The forecast makes no assumptions about future changes in value with the exception of the effects of exchange rate fluctuations on central government debt. This means that net debt will move in line with net lending, and general government financial assets are expected to exceed liabilities once again in 2005.

The allocation of net lending between central government and the old-age pension system means that the improvement in financial net wealth will take the form of increased assets in the pension system. The central government deficit means that the liability side of the general government balance sheet will grow during the forecast period. However, this increase in debt is so small that central government debt and consolidated gross debt will continue to fall as a proportion of GDP.

Consolidated gross debt amounted to 52.4 per cent of GDP at the end of 2002, which is well below the EU reference level of 60 per cent of GDP. Consolidated gross debt is forecast to be below 50 per cent of GDP at the end of 2005.

Spring Fiscal Policy Bill: responsible policies for unsettled times

Sweden is affected by the international economic downturn. Economic growth is forecast to be just 1.4 per cent this year, rising to 2.4 per cent in 2004. The surplus in the public finances will decline to 0.4 per cent of the Gross Domestic Product (GDP) in 2003. In 2004 an increase to 1.0 per cent is expected. Nevertheless, government saving remains in line with the target of an average 2 per cent surplus over the business cycle.

As in previous years, central government spending will be kept below the approved expenditure ceilings. Expenditure ceilings for 2005 and 2006 will be proposed in the Budget Bill for 2004.

The weak economic trend is expected to have adverse consequences for the labour market. Open unemployment is forecast to rise this year to 4.5 per cent. Next year it is expected to fall back to 4.3 per cent.

The Government has set a target that the proportion of people aged 20-64 in regular employment should go up from 73.9 per cent in 1997 to 80 per cent in 2004. Despite the favourable trend in the early part of this period, the chances of reaching the employment target in 2004 have lessened. The reasons for this include the international economic downturn and the increased supply of labour. The proportion of the population aged 20-64 in regular employment is estimated to approach 78 per cent in 2003 and 2004. Even so, the employment rate in Sweden is among the highest in the EU.

Further details on the Swedish economy are reported in tables 1 and 2.

Full employment top of the agenda

Full employment is at the top of the Governments agenda. A high growth rate, more and more people in work, and fewer and fewer jobless lead to enhanced social justice and increased resources and make it possible to gradually extend welfare. Efforts to reach the employment goal are continuing, with measures focusing on young people, immigrants, the unemployed, the elderly and the sick.

Getting young people into jobs more quickly At the beginning of the 1990s, 80 per cent of young people aged 20-24 were in work. The corresponding figure today is 60 per cent. The difference is largely due to the fact that more young people are pursuing more advanced studies, but the desire of young people to work and to combine work and studies needs to be harnessed more adequately. The Government intends to instruct the National Agency for Higher Education to consider ways of giving students in programmes of higher education more credit for previous studies. The Agency is also to conduct impact studies of different educational programmes.

A special expert will be commissioned to review the selection rules for higher education, with a view to reducing the unnecessary repetition of courses to improve already passing upper secondary school grades. Opportunities to claim the higher student grant for courses taken to repeat and supplement upper secondary education will be restricted from 2004. The higher student grant will subsequently only be available to individuals who lack complete upper secondary grades.

Better use must be made of immigrants skills

In 1997-2002, the employment rate has risen more rapidly for immigrants than for people born in Sweden. In spite of this, the employment rate among Swedish residents born outside Europe is barely 54 per cent, as against 77 per cent for native Swedes aged 16-64.

A temporary government initiative will be taken to develop effective systems for validating knowledge acquired by immigrants before coming to this country, so they can be given credit for these qualifications in Sweden. Language learning and work placement schemes will be better integrated. Swedish instruction for immigrants will be reformed and regularly linked to studies in the local authority adult education system or higher education, work experience, employment or other activities.

Priority to the long-term unemployed and long-term sick
Recruitment subsidies will be reviewed to increase their effectiveness and
ensure that those who have most difficulty in obtaining regular employment
receive priority. Efficiency measures will be taken in labour market policy with
a view to promoting a speedier transition from unemployment to work. A

Welfare reforms for schools, health care and families with children Despite the deterioration in the economic situation, it will be possible to carry out a range of welfare reforms in 2003 and 2004. This year there will be reforms worth some SEK 19 billion. These reforms will give higher pensions, more teachers in schools, improved study grants, universal pre-school, more international development assistance and more money for health and social services. The extension of parental insurance to 13 months will also take effect this year.

Next year reforms worth approximately SEK 10 billion are planned. The reforms will provide increased resources to health care, the schools, development assistance, justice, roads and railways, and various environmental initiatives.

A number of additional measures are being implemented in the Spring Fiscal Policy Bill targeting areas of particular priority:

Municipal and county councils will receive a further SEK 300 million in 2003 for the temporary recruitment incentives system.

Municipal and county councils will be allocated another SEK 4.3 billion in 2004, by the extension for one more year of the temporary recruitment incentives and the transfer to the municipalities of the SEK 200 that everyone pays in state income tax in 2004 as well.

The prison and probation services will receive a further SEK 200 million in 2003.

In 2003, SEK 40 million will also be invested in the metropolitan regions, one purpose being to improve job prospects for immigrants. SEK 10 million will go to special anti-discrimination initiatives. SEK 20 million will be committed to sheltered housing and other measures for girls and young women at risk. SEK 15 million will be allocated to cultural heritage preservation. SEK 5 million will go to measures to combat gambling addiction.

Increased ill health a human and economic problem

The increased sickness absence is a human problem above all. But it also has economic consequences. Since 1997, the costs for sickness absence in the form of sickness allowances have risen from approximately SEK 15 billion to SEK 45 billion. Recently the number of days of sickness allowance claimed has begun to decline and the Government estimates that the figure will fall 9 per cent compared with 2002. The increased sickness absence has entailed suffering for individuals, difficulties for employers and a heavy burden on the social insurance systems. If the trend is not broken, important welfare initiatives will have to be sidelined.

Sickness absence has many causes and measures are therefore needed in a range of areas. The Government has set the target of halving the number of days of sick leave between 2002 and 2008 and bringing down the number of new activity and sickness allowances (which replace disability pensions and sickness benefits).

The Government initiated a major project in the autumn of 2001, when an 11-point programme against ill health was approved by the Riksdag. A number of measures have already been either implemented or proposed. In the Spring Fiscal Policy Bill the following new changes in the ill health area are now put forward:

The period during which the employer is responsible for sick pay is being extended with 7 to 21 days. At the same time a cost limiting mechanism is being brought in which will mean that enterprises with less than about 25 employees should not end up with excessively high costs for sick pay. The level of compensation in sickness insurance will be lowered by making a 3 per cent reduction in the income on which sickness allowances are payable (qualifying income).

The initial no-benefit day will apply equally to all, irrespective of the timing of sickness notification.

Sickness allowances for the unemployed will be adjusted so as to prevent them being higher than unemployment benefits.

Recruitment incentives are being introduced for people on long-term sick leave who find work with another employer.

The Government intends to present additional measures in the Budget Bill for 2004, among them stronger economic incentives for employers from 1 January 2004, enhanced preventive efforts, a proposal for the review of sickness allowances (formerly disability pensions) every third year, and increased responsibility for individuals on sick leave to participate in breaking out of sick leave and to assist in rehabilitation.

Spending cuts and postponed expenditures

In order to keep to the given economic framework, a number of additional expenditure cuts and postponements of expenditures are proposed in the Spring Fiscal Policy Bill. All the spending cuts are shown in table 4.

The ceiling in the sickness and parental insurance systems will not be raised from SEK 24 000 to SEK 32 000 until later in this term of office.

The contact days for which a temporary parents allowance can be claimed will be discontinued from 1 July 2003. Contact days give parents the right to claim a temporary parents allowance one day per child each year in connection with visits to the childs school or after school centre.

The ceiling in the system of maximum charges for child care will be raised by SEK 120 to SEK 1260. It is only the highest charges that will go up, not the percentage of parents income. Hence, it will still be the case that the parents will pay a maximum of 3 per cent of their income for the first childs care. Households earning less than SEK 38 000 per month will therefore not be affected.

Purchases of defence equipment for approximately SEK 1 billion in 2003 and nearly SEK 400 million in 2004 will be postponed.

Road and railway investments worth SEK 0.5 billion in 2003 and SEK 1 billion in 2004 will be postponed.

As previously decided, international development assistance will be raised by SEK 2.2 billion in 2003 and SEK 2.4 billion in 2004. In addition, development assistance will rise an extra more than SEK 500 million in 2004 due to a change in forecast GNI. However, payments worth SEK 400 million will be postponed this year.

Expenditure restrictions totalling some SEK 240 million will be introduced for climate investment programmes and the appropriation for land decontamination. These appropriations will also be reduced in 2003 and 2004.

The reform giving free entry to museums will be postponed until 1 January 2005. This will reduce costs by approximately SEK 90 million in 2004.

Sweden is affected by the international economic downturn. Economic growth is forecast to be just 1.4 per cent this year, rising to 2.4 per cent in 2004. The surplus in the public finances will decline to 0.4 per cent of the Gross Domestic Product (GDP) in 2003. In 2004 an increase to 1.0 per cent is expected. Nevertheless, government saving remains in line with the target of an average 2 per cent surplus over the business cycle.

As in previous years, central government spending will be kept below the approved expenditure ceilings. Expenditure ceilings for 2005 and 2006 will be proposed in the Budget Bill for 2004.

The weak economic trend is expected to have adverse consequences for the labour market. Open unemployment is forecast to rise this year to 4.5 per cent. Next year it is expected to fall back to 4.3 per cent.

The Government has set a target that the proportion of people aged 20-64 in regular employment should go up from 73.9 per cent in 1997 to 80 per cent in 2004. Despite the favourable trend in the early part of this period, the chances of reaching the employment target in 2004 have lessened. The reasons for this include the international economic downturn and the increased supply of labour. The proportion of the population aged 20-64 in regular employment is estimated to approach 78 per cent in 2003 and 2004. Even so, the employment rate in Sweden is among the highest in the EU.

Further details on the Swedish economy are reported in tables 1 and 2.

Full employment top of the agenda

Full employment is at the top of the Governments agenda. A high growth rate, more and more people in work, and fewer and fewer jobless lead to enhanced social justice and increased resources and make it possible to gradually extend welfare. Efforts to reach the employment goal are continuing, with measures focusing on young people, immigrants, the unemployed, the elderly and the sick.

Getting young people into jobs more quickly

At the beginning of the 1990s, 80 per cent of young people aged 20-24 were in work. The corresponding figure today is 60 per cent. The difference is largely due to the fact that more young people are pursuing more advanced studies, but the desire of young people to work and to combine work and studies needs to be harnessed more adequately. The Government intends to instruct the National Agency for Higher Education to consider ways of giving students in programmes of higher education more credit for previous studies. The Agency is also to conduct impact studies of different educational programmes.

A special expert will be commissioned to review the selection rules for higher education, with a view to reducing the unnecessary repetition of courses to improve already passing upper secondary school grades. Opportunities to claim the higher student grant for courses taken to repeat and supplement upper secondary education will be restricted from 2004. The higher student grant will subsequently only be available to individuals who lack complete upper secondary grades.

Better use must be made of immigrants skills

In 1997-2002, the employment rate has risen more rapidly for immigrants than for people born in Sweden. In spite of this, the employment rate among Swedish residents born outside Europe is barely 54 per cent, as against 77 per cent for native Swedes aged 16-64.

A temporary government initiative will be taken to develop effective systems for validating knowledge acquired by immigrants before coming to this country, so they can be given credit for these qualifications in Sweden. Language learning and work placement schemes will be better integrated. Swedish instruction for immigrants will be reformed and regularly linked to studies in the local authority adult education system or higher education, work experience, employment or other activities.

Priority to the long-term unemployed and long-term sick

Recruitment subsidies will be reviewed to increase their effectiveness and ensure that those who have most difficulty in obtaining regular employment receive priority. Swedish-French agreement on study of global public goods

Unofficial translation

Today Sweden and France will sign an agreement on the establishment of an international task force that will study issues related to global public goods. The agreement will be signed in Paris by Sweden's Ambassador Frank Belfrage and the Minister for Development Cooperation for France, Pierre-André Wiltzer.

The group – "the International Task Force on Global Public Goods" – will have an international secretariat, based in Stockholm. The secretariat will support the work of the task force with background material and analyses.

The task force will be commissioned to investigate how the most important global public goods are provided today and to propose better methods of handling and financing them in order to reduce poverty in the world and contribute to sustainable development. An important part of its task will be to disseminate knowledge and information on the conclusions and recommendations of the task force. Its assignment should be completed in 2005.

"There is a growing number of global issues that concern us all and that require new forms of solution. By commissioning these studies, Sweden and France wish to improve, in a concrete manner, the way in which we handle global public goods. We expect the task force to present proposals on how this should be implemented", says Minister for Development Cooperation, Migration and Asylum Policy Jan O. Karlsson.

The international task force will consist of 15-20 leading experts from governments, the business sector, international organisations, civil society and the academic world. The work will be lead by Ernesto Zedillio (former President in Mexico, and currently head of the Yale Center for the Study of Globalization) and Tidjane Thiam (former Minister of Planning in Côte d'Ivoire and now active within the private sector in London).

The international secretariat in Stockholm will be lead by Sven Sandström, former Managing Director of the World Bank.

Leif Pagrotsky rejects criticism of GATS Agreement

"Sweden is one of the countries that promoted the most ambitious undertakings in the GATS agreement when it was last negotiated. Prime Minister Göran Persson's first comments on the outbreak of war in Iraq

Unofficial translation

"I regret that this war has now broken out. The attack on Iraq is in contravention of international law and threatens the lives of thousands of people. The disarming of the terrorist regime in Iraq must take place within the framework of international law and must therefore be returned to the United Nations Security Council.

"As long as the war continues, every conceivable effort must be made to avoid any impact on the civilian population. The rules of humanitarian law must be observed. This is the responsibility of both sides in the war. The attack on Iraq does not absolve that country of its obligation to comply with the resolutions previously adopted by the Security Council.

"We in Sweden have taken measures to raise our level of preparedness. A special group of state secretaries has been formed. It will be led by State Secretary Lars Danielsson, with the primary task of coordinating between the Government Offices and the authorities involved".

Jan O. Karlsson receives commission report on aliens without documents

Commissioner Tommy Arwitz today delivered the report of the Commission on Enforcement of Refusal-of-Entry and Expulsion Orders to Minister Jan O. Karlsson. The Commission has looked in particular at cases in which the identity of the alien is unclear.

"The absence of documents is a major problem in the asylum process today and is a significant cause of the long waiting times. It is essential to come to grips with these problems to improve the asylum process, so as to shorten waiting times and enable enforced decisions to be implemented more efficiently. This is quite simply a matter of safeguarding the right of asylum," says Minister for Migration Jan O. Karlsson.

"In his report, Tommy Arwitz provides a toolbox for tackling these problems. He makes an

interesting analysis of the current situation as regards the problems associated with the enforcement of refusal-of-entry and expulsion orders, and the difficulties that arise in the absence of documents. "Before we take a position on any of the proposals we will now refer the report to various bodies for comments and scrutinise the proposals thoroughly. Only after this discussion will we be ready to make decisions on any changes in procedures and proposals for legislation."

Sweden supports infrastructure development in Africa

The Government has today authorised the Swedish International Development Cooperation Agency (Sida) to make an interest-free loan equivalent to USD 20 million for subscription for shares in the Emerging Africa Infrastructure Fund. The share capital received by the Emerging Africa Infrastructure Fund is to serve as security for loans from private financiers that can then be lent on for use in infrastructure projects in Africa.

"The lack of infrastructure is a serious obstacle to development in sub-Saharan Africa and infrastructure development is absolutely crucial for achieving the objective of halving poverty by 2015. In sub-Saharan Africa there has been a limited supply of private foreign capital for infrastructure projects. A public-private partnership is therefore essential to promote infrastructure development," says Minister for Development Cooperation, Migration and Asylum Policy Jan O. Karlsson.

The Swedish loan will be made to the Public Private Infrastructure Development Trust, a trust

established by the development assistance authorities in the UK, the Netherlands, Switzerland and Sweden, which will use the resources to subscribe for shares in the Emerging Africa Infrastructure Fund. Using this share capital as security, the Fund can borrow from private banks and use the money it raises to provide loans for infrastructure projects in countries south of the Sahara. The sectors eligible for support include electricity, telecommunications, transport, waste management, water and sanitation. Decisions on loans are to be based on as assessment of the project's impact on poverty and the environment.

Swedish airfield unit to the Democratic Republic of the Congo

The Government decided today to submit a bill to the Riksdag with a request to send an airfield unit

of 90 personnel to the UN peacekeeping mission, MONUC, in the Democratic Republic of the Congo.

If the Riksdag approves the proposal, Sweden will be the first country in the West to deploy troops to MONUC. Among other things, the unit will be responsible for the operation and maintenance of an airport, presumably in Kindu in the eastern part of the country. This kind of specialised initiative has been especially requested by the UN, and the Swedish unit is considered highly qualified for the task. According to the UN's wishes, the Swedish unit should arrive by late May/early June. Sweden's only previous contribution of troops to Africa was in a UN operation in Congo in the 1960s, when a total of 6000 Swedes took part. Since the mission in Macedonia, which ended in February 1999, Sweden has not contributed any larger troops to a UN-led peacekeeping operation. The last time Sweden contributed military troops outside the EU was to a UN-led peacekeeping operation in Lebanon in 1986-1994 and in a mine-clearance platoon during the autumn of 2000, also in Lebanon.

"The peace process in the Democratic Republic of the Congo has made considerable progress during the past year, and the mission is an important contribution to the international community's efforts to promote peace in the country. It also gives a clear signal of Sweden's strong commitment to the prevention and resolution of conflicts in Africa, something that we have also taken active steps to promote within the framework of EU cooperation", say Minister for Foreign Affairs, Anna Lindh, and Minister for Defence, Leni Björklund.

"The international commitment to the peace process must continue. MONUC has a key role to play at this decisive stage."

Sweden's relations with the Democratic Republic of the Congo go back a long way and Swedish missionary organisations have operated in the country for over one hundred years. During the current conflict, Sweden has given extensive humanitarian aid and support to the peace efforts, including support to the national political dialogue which is intended to lead to a transitional government and, eventually, to democratisation.

A number of Swedes are involved in the peace process. Ambassador Lena Sundh is the Assistant Representative of the UN Secretary-General for MONUC, and Ambassador Bo Heinebäck has made valuable contributions as a mediator between the parties to the national political dialogue. At present, Sweden has five military observers and three civilian police officers in the UN mission. Background information is available on the Ministry for Foreign Affairs' website.

Yearbook on the EU 2002: Historic decision on ten new member states

Today the Government submitted to the Riksdag its annual communication about its work in the European Union.

The Union's activities during 2002 were characterised by the enlargement process. Negotiations with ten applicant countries were completed at the meeting of the European Council in Copenhagen in December when agreement was reached on the financial conditions for their accession to the Union. Cyprus, the Czech Republic, Estonia, Hungary, Latvia, Lithuania, Malta, Poland, Slovakia and Slovenia will become members on 1 May 2004.

During the year preparations began, within the framework of the Convention, for the next intergovernmental conference which, among other things, is to draw up the EU's decision-making processes in an enlarged Union. Concrete progress was also made in work within the framework of the Lisbon strategy for promoting sustainable development, that is to say an integrated approach to economic, social/employment and environmental issues.

The communication gives a detailed report of the work carried out within all Union policy areas throughout the year.

The Government communication on its work in the EU during 2002 will serve as the basis for a parliamentary debate during the spring. The document will be available at libraries and on the Government website www.ud.se. The Yearbook on the EU is also available in an abbreviated version which is being distributed to upper secondary schools, organisations and the mass media. An English version is being compiled.

This section also describes the action the Government wants to take to strengthen the UN, reinforce global security and enhance the cooperation between nations. The UN has a unique role in endeavours for peace, development and security in the world, and this is the basis for Sweden's strong support of the UN.

There follows an account of Sweden's actions on several of the most important issues for the UN: peace and security, conflict prevention, disarmament, humanitarian, economic and social issues, the environment, human rights and the fight against terrorism. The ongoing process of reform is also discussed, as well as the UN's finances.

The final section highlights a number of questions that the Government considers to be particularly significant for the UN's continued efforts to safeguard international peace, security and development. The follow-up to the Millennium declaration will be one focus of Sweden's continued engagement in the UN, human rights issues another.

The Government will also continue to be proactive on such matters as sanctions, stronger and more effective peace-keeping operations, conflict prevention and humanitarian issues, as well as disarmament. In addition, special emphasis will be given to augmented cooperation with the EU and the World Bank. The reforming of the UN is another high-priority issue for the future.

The last time the Ministry for Foreign Affairs compiled a communication on the UN was in 2000, when the account covered the years 1998-1999.

Anna Lindh and Jan O Karlsson to visit the Western Balkans

Minister for Foreign Affairs Anna Lindh and Minister for Development Cooperation, Migration and Asylum Policy Jan O Karlsson will visit the Western Balkans on 10–12 March. The two-day visit will take Anna Lindh to Croatia and Macedonia while Jan O Karlsson will travel to Bosnia and Herzegovina and to Kosovo. The trip will end on 12 March with a joint visit to the Federal Republic of Yugoslavia.

A central theme of this joint visit is the Balkans in the light of the EU's approaching enlargement and the question of how Sweden can contribute to other countries in the Western Balkans also being given opportunities to forge closer links with the EU. If this is to be possible, genuine political and economic reform is required in these countries.

Other important issues during the visit include migration issues, regional cooperation, economic development, human rights, improved conditions for minorities, the regional return of refugees, enhanced cooperation with the International War Crimes Tribunal in the Hague as well as bilateral issues such as trade and development assistance. The common theme for Sweden in all of these issues is how Sweden can make the most effective contribution in these areas.

A significant share of asylum-seekers in Sweden comes from the Western Balkans, in particular from Bosnia and Herzegovina and from Kosovo. An important part of the ministers' visit, therefore, will be their discussions on asylum and refugee return issues with the relevant governments in the region.

During the visit, Ms Lindh and Mr Karlsson will meet heads of state and government, foreign ministers, and other ministers and political party representatives in each country. In addition, a number of visits will be made to NGOs including Kvinna till Kvinna, a Swedish organisation, and to other organisations working to strengthen the rule of law.

Wallenberg inquiry: "A failure of diplomacy"

Today the Commission of inquiry into the actions of the Swedish foreign policy leadership in the Raoul Wallenberg case has presented its report "A failure of diplomacy" (UD 2001:03) to the Minister for Foreign Affairs Anna Lindh. The Commission's assignment was to investigate and evaluate the actions of the Swedish foreign policy leadership in the Wallenberg case. Its purpose was to clarify whether the leadership of the Ministry for Foreign Affairs had taken advantage of all the opportunities that had emerged over the course of the years to shed light on the fate of Raoul Wallenberg.

Raoul Wallenberg was a Swedish diplomat with a US assignment. He received several detailed instructions for his operations from the US State Department. There were no equivalent instructions from its Swedish counterpart.

When in January 1945 the Soviet Union informed Sweden that Wallenberg had been found, the British and US Embassies in Stockholm were informed by the Ministry for Foreign Affairs. Instructions on action in this issue were not issued to the Swedish envoy in Moscow, Staffan Söderblom, until March 1945.

The inquiry has found a previously unknown dossier in the archives of the Ministry for Foreign Affairs that shows that, at an early stage, the Swedish Foreign Service was disoriented by rumours indicating that Wallenberg had disappeared by car and subsequently been murdered.

This version of Wallenberg's fate came to guide the Ministry's work for several years.

However, two officials of the Swedish foreign service, Staffan Söderblom and Ulf Barck-Holst, reported as early as 1946 on the possibility, despite everything, of Wallenberg being in Soviet captivity and that some kind of compensation for his release was being demanded by the Soviet side. The Commission has evidence that the Minister for Foreign Affairs, Mr Undén, read these reports. Despite this, he took no initiative to try to find out the truth behind these Soviet moves for negotiations.

Without the documents, the Commission cannot draw completely clear conclusions on the underlying reasons for Undén's unwillingness to take action on the Wallenberg case. Given the information to which he had access, his passivity appears incomprehensible and remarkable.

Critical comments have also been made on Undén's predecessor Christian Günther and several other leading diplomats in the Ministry for Foreign Affairs. The Chairman of the Commission is former County Governor Ingemar Eliasson. Other members of the Commission are Professor Kristian Gerner, Dr Birgit Karlsson, Professor Christer Jönsson och Dr Gudrun Persson. Experts are Professor Hans Fredrik Dahl (Norway) and Professor Klaus Törnudd (Finland). The Secretary is Dr Johan Matz.

Sweden responds to the 2003 UN appeal for Angola

The Government decided today to commission the Swedish International Development Cooperation Agency (Sida) to contribute a total of SEK 80 million to the 2003 UN appeal for Angola. The UN appeal includes support for food safety measures, health care, protection and education for people in need, as well as security measures and coordination of humanitarian operations.

Sweden is also participating in acute reconstruction efforts in Angola. A grant of SEK 19 million will therefore be allocated to the World Food Programme (WFP) for the reparation of bridges and roads. This project will be carried out by the Swedish Rescue Services Agency.

The Swedish contributions, which are intended for both reconstruction projects and acute humanitarian needs, will be distributed as follows:

- SEK 20 million to the United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF)
- SEK 11 million to the UN Office for the Coordination of Humanitarian Assistance (OCHA)
- SEK 20 million to the Food and Agriculture Organisation of the United Nations (FAO)
- SEK 10 million to the Office of the UN High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR)
- SEK 4 million to the Lutheran Association
- SEK 4 million to the Norwegian Refugee Council and
- SEK 2 million to the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP).

"The scale of humanitarian needs in Angola is considerable. Since the war ended in April 2002, some 3 million people are in need of acute humanitarian aid. Some 850,000 internal refugees have now returned to their native districts – districts which often lack basic services. Urgent measures are needed to help these people", says Minister for Development Cooperation, Jan O. Karlsson. "However, the Angolan Government has the ultimate responsibility for the humanitarian situation and long-term developments in Angola. One condition for continued Swedish development cooperation is that the Angolan Government pursues development policies that benefit the entire Angolan population", says the Minister for Development Cooperation.

ISA is a government agency for the promotion of foreign investment in Sweden. Its operations focus on information campaigns, marketing projects in such areas as IT, electronics and biosciences as well as regional cooperation and education and training.

To date ISA's China project has focused on Beijing and Shanghai and primarily on high-tech industries in which Sweden enjoys a strong international position. These include the IT industry, microelectronics, systems technology within telecommunications, vehicle technology and telematics. About eighty per cent of the companies in these industries are located in southern China and in Beijing and Shanghai.

"Now that ISA has the opportunity to strengthen its presence in southern China, I hope that more Chinese companies will be interested in investing in Sweden," says Minister for Industry and Trade Leif Pagrotsky.

"Foreign direct investment plays an important role in employment in Sweden and in keeping Sweden amongst the world leaders in key technology fields," says Pagrotsky.

In conjunction with today's meeting with the Swedish-Chinese government commission for the promotion of trade and investments, ISA will be meeting the Chinese delegation for talks on direct investment.

Sweden preparing to take part in peace support

On 13 February 2003, the Government decided to present a bill to the Riksdag in preparation for Swedish participation in the planned EU-led peace support force in Macedonia. In the bill, the Government describes developments in Macedonia (the Former Yugoslav Republic of Macedonia, FYROM), the conditions for stationing an international force led by the European Union (EU), previous Swedish missions in the country and preparations for Swedish participation in the planned EU force.

In its bill, the Government proposes that the Riksdag approve the Government's placing an armed force of a maximum of twenty persons at the disposal of an EU-led military peace support operation for twelve months. This initiative has been taken after an invitation by Macedonia's government and in accordance with UN Security Council Resolution 1371, in which support is expressed for an international security-related presence in the country. The Macedonian mission will be the EU's first military crisis-management operation and will be undertaken with the support of NATO and in close cooperation with other international actors in the country.

After the final decision on the initiative has been made by the EU foreign ministers, and given the approval of the Riksdag, the Government intends to take a decision on the size and composition of the Swedish troop contribution. According to the planning schedule agreed on by the EU countries, the mission could go ahead as early as March this year.

Development assistance to Burmese refugees in Thailand

The Government decided today to commission the Swedish International Development Cooperation Agency to enter into an agreement with Diakonia, a Swedish development assistance agency, on humanitarian assistance to the Burmese refugees in Thailand. The two-year assignment will include the supply of food, shelter, medicines and education to the value of SEK 57.1 million.

Burmese refugees in Thailand have been subjected to forced migration, physical assault and other threats to their safety and dignity by the Burmese regime. "Helping people who have been forced to flee their country is a humanitarian obligation of the international community," says Minister for Development Cooperation, Migration and Asylum Policy Jan O. Karlsson.

The ultimate responsibility for the refugee situation lies with Burma's military regime. "We will never accept a regime not taking responsibility for its people's safety and human rights and forcing tens of thousands of people to flee their country," says Mr Karlsson.

Today over 130 000 people are living in refugees camps along the Thai-Burmese border. The humanitarian efforts in the area are mainly coordinated by the Burmese Border Consortium (BBC), a consortium of five relief organisations operating locally, one of which is Diakonia.

In addition to the people who have fled the country, several hundred thousand others are living in Burma as internal refugees often under

very difficult conditions.

"We will continue to demand that the Burmese regime give the humanitarian aid organisations in Burma free and unhindered access

to people in the country that are displaced or otherwise in need," says Mr Karlsson.

Swedish contribution to the Global Environment Facility

The Government decided today to contribute a total of SEK 764 million to the Global Environment Facility (GEF) for the period 1 July 2002 – 30 June 2006.

"Investments in the Global Environment Facility's activities in developing countries are also investments in our own environment. It is positive that 32 countries have been able to agree, in a spirit of solidarity, to contribute resources which will enable the GEF to continue its important efforts to improve the global environment", says Swedish Minister for Development Cooperation, Jan O. Karlsson.

The phasing out of persistent organic pollutants (such as DDT) and projects to combat desertification are two important new areas with which the GEF is working.

In Sweden's opinion, a considerable increase in the Facility's resources is needed, and it is therefore making a further contribution of SEK 100 million in addition to the SEK 664 million that were agreed during negotiations. This makes a total of SEK 764 million. A number of other countries have similarly chosen to make voluntary donations in addition to their negotiated shares.

The Global Environment Facility was established in 1991 to finance investments of value to the global environment in developing and former Eastern bloc countries. Since the start, the GEF has allocated some SEK 40 billion in contributions and has received a further SEK 100 billion from other sources for over 1000 environmental projects in 160 countries.

Neighbourhood cooperation on unaccompanied children

Unaccompanied children with no known guardians crossing the borders between the countries of the Baltic Sea region are in an extremely vulnerable situation. In order to discuss joint action in this area, some 80 representatives of ministries and government authorities from all the Baltic Sea countries, Russia, Ukraine and Moldova have met in Stockholm at the invitation of the Minister for Development Cooperation, Migration and Asylum Policy Jan O. Karlsson and the Council of the Baltic Sea States.

"It is extraordinarily satisfying to have achieved agreement on fundamental principles for good reception of unaccompanied children and on continued cooperation", says Jan O. Karlsson, who opened the meeting on Monday.

"This conference represents a pioneering effort on Sweden's part in addressing an issue that all the Baltic Sea countries are grappling with individually, but where there is an obvious need for international cooperation. Sweden will continue to provide support for joint endeavours by our neighbours", continues Jan O. Karlsson.

The meeting was brought to a close on Tuesday by the Minister for Children and Families, Berit Andnor. By then, agreement had been reached on a range of matters, including

- that the countries shall work together, both to improve the general situation for unaccompanied children, by joint measures, and to solve individual cases,
- that an action plan shall be drawn up for continued cooperation between the countries on

unaccompanied children,

- that the action plan shall include networks linking responsible parties, expert meetings, support measures and the role of NGOs,
- that unaccompanied children shall only be returned to their home countries if there is someone to receive them and look after them there.

"This will hopefully provide good opportunities for Swedish export successes on the Chinese market," Mr Pagrotsky says.

The project includes, among other things, the setting up of an advisory group of Swedish experts to support Chinese decision-makers, study visits to Sweden for key Chinese officials as well as a website for communication and marketing of Swedish environmental solutions.

Unaccompanied children crossing the borders between the countries of the Baltic Sea region with no known guardians are in an extremely vulnerable situation. It is often a question of children who have fallen victim to trafficking in human beings or of those who cross borders for other reasons. The authorities of the countries in this region have difficulty in taking care of these children, identifying them and enabling them to return to their home countries safely. This is why cooperation between neighbouring countries is necessary.

To organise such cooperation, Minister for Migration, Jan O Karlsson, and the Council of the Baltic Sea States have convened an international meeting in Sweden to take place on 10-11 February. Participating in the conference will be a large number of representatives of ministries and agencies in all the states of the Baltic Sea region and from Belarus, Ukraine and Moldavia. Sweden supports installation of maritime surveillance system in Russia

The Government decided today to contribute a maximum of SEK 3.7 million to the installation of a

marine surveillance system (AIS, Automatic Identification System) in Russia. The installation will take place through the auspices of the Swedish Maritime Administration, in collaboration with the port authorities of St. Petersburg and Kaliningrad.

AIS is a new technical system which makes it possible to monitor and follow the movements of a vessel from other vessels and stations on land. AIS can be used, inter alia, for coordination in connection with rescue operations at sea, monitoring of oil transports, facilitating oil destruction operations, estimating arrival times at ports and coordination of ice-breaking activities.

"The growing traffic in the Baltic Sea and Gulf of Finland will also lead to greater risks, such as accidents with serious environmental consequences", says Minister for Development Cooperation, Migration and Asylum Policy Jan O. Karlsson.

"AIS means major opportunities for greater cooperation and more extensive exchange of information between the Baltic Sea countries in a number of fields. It is important that all countries are able to take part in this cooperation", adds Jan O. Karlsson.

At a ministerial conference in Copenhagen on 10 September 2001, the states of the Baltic Sea region agreed to establish national land-based maritime surveillance systems by 1 July 2005 at the latest. These systems will be based on signals from AIS. The countries in the Baltic Sea region will also set up a joint, compatible surveillance system, which in turn will be based on national systems.

Report on labour immigration circulated for comment

Berit Rollén today submitted her report on EU enlargement and movement of labour (SOU series

2002:116) to Jan O Karlsson.

The task of the special expert was to look into how employees in the candidate countries can be given access to the Swedish labour market from the day of accession on the same terms as citizens of present EU and EEA countries. She was also to assess whether this could involve serious disruption of the Swedish labour market or major costs for the social security systems, and, if so, also propose preventive measures.

"Berit Rollén assesses that there will be no disruption of the Swedish labour market in connection with the enlargement. This tallies with an assessment made previously by the Government," Jan O Karlsson says.

Berit Rollén says in her report that abuse of the social security systems may occur and points out that Sweden could avail itself of the possibility the transitional rules afford to apply Swedish law for two to seven years after the enlargement to counter this.

"Abuse of the welfare system must naturally be checked," Mr Karlsson says. "But this can be done in many different ways. The special expert has indicated a method that involves introducing rules that apply in the labour market."

"I will circulate the report for comment in order to obtain views on the special expert's proposals. This procedure will show whether the method proposed is possible and appropriate for countering the abuse feared," Mr Karlsson concludes.

Breakthrough for nuclear agreement at the Barents Summit

Preliminary translation from Swedish

The Prime Ministers of the Nordic countries and Russia meet under Swedish chairmanship in Kirkenes, Norway, on 10-11 January on the occasion of the Barents Euro-Arctic 10 Year Anniversary. The Summit discussed e.g. economic development, environmental- and nuclear safety issues, and health- and social affairs. Representatives from the 13 member counties in the Barents Region did also participate, together with observers and invited guests.

Among other things, it was decided to:

Management of spent nuclear fuel and radioactive waste must start. The Russian Prime Minister Mr. Kasianov and the Nordic Prime Ministers reached an agreement during the Summit regarding tax exemption on goods and equipment needed for management of spent nuclear fuel and radioactive waste in Russia. There are therefore good possibilities to start a programme regarding

radioactive waste clean-up during 2003. The final agreement will be signed in Sweden later this year.

Transport in the eastern and western directions will be improved. Border crossings and customs procedures should be facilitated. All border crossings in the Region should fulfil the objective that goods should pass in no more than two hours. A common standard for rail gauge switches should be developed. Possibilities to travel across the boarders should also be facilitated. The modernised Norwegian-Russian border border-crossing point Storskog-Borisoglebsk was opened in relation to the Summit.

The fight against organised crime and trafficking in human beings will be strengthened. The Prime Ministers intends to reinforce co-operation among, customs police, immigration and border authorities, thus starting a process to fight organised crime and trafficking in women and children. The co-operation for a better environment will be developed. The climate changes affects on the region risk to become very serious because of the sensitive arctic environment. Within the region there is therefore a great demand for a close co-operation to implement measures that reduce mitigation and environmental damage. The Prime Ministers emphasized the importance of the aims in the Kyoto protocol and its early entry into force.

The co-operation between emergency- and rescue services will be improved. During the Swedish presidency efforts have been made to improve co-operation between rescue services within the region. Norway will host a major civil-military exercise, "Barents Rescue" in 2004 or 2005. Sweden hosted the first exercise of this kind in the Barent Region in September 2001. The spread of Tuberculosis must be stopped. The Prime Ministers urged their health and social authorities to gain full control of the spread of tuberculosis in the region within 10 years. Anna Lindh concerned about North Korea's decision to abandon the Non-Proliferation Treaty

"North Korea's decision to withdraw from the Non-Proliferation Treaty will worsen the already serious situation on the Korean peninsula. The North Korean action is counterproductive", comments Minister for Foreign Affairs Anna Lindh.

"Several countries in the region have been working for many years to achieve peaceful development on the Korean peninsula. The decision is also surprising in the light of the fact that there seemed to be prospects for a diplomatic dialogue.

This action challenges the entire international community and threatens to undermine international efforts for disarmament and non-proliferation of weapons of mass destruction. Ultimately, it may represent a threat to international peace and security.

North Korea must be persuaded to withdraw its decision and to resume cooperation with the IAEA. The crisis must be resolved by diplomatic means as soon as possible, via a dialogue with all the parties involved", says Anna Lindh.

Financial support to the Folke Bernadotte Academy

The Government decided today to allocate SEK 2 million to the Folke Bernadotte Academy for coordination of the project "Challenges of Peace Operations: Into the 21st Century". The project was launched in 1997 and at that time was coordinated by the Swedish National Defence College with the aim of contributing to the resolution of regional conflicts. It has now entered its second phase, covering the period 1 January 2003 – 31 December 2005, and coordination will be taken over by the Folke Bernadotte Academy (FBA). The project is supported by the Armed Forces, the National Police Board and the National Defence College. FBA's task will now be to consolidate and intensify international cooperation in the handling of regional conflicts as well as to promote increased coordination between different institutions in a broad list of countries prominent in the area of peace support operations, including, among others, Russia, the USA and Canada.

"The decision means Sweden will have a chance to influence the international debate on peace support operations, particularly bearing in mind that the project will open an opportunity for increased cooperation with the UN Special Committee on peace-keeping operations," says the Minister for Foreign Affairs, Anna Lindh.

The Folke Bernadotte Academy is located in Kramfors and is led by Director-General Michael Sahlin.

Latvia obliged to pay SwemBalt AB for scrapping

In 1994 a Swedish ship, owned by SwemBalt AB, was removed and scrapped by Latvian harbour authorities. Since then a protracted legal process has taken place between the Latvian state and SwemBalt, which has demanded compensation.

A judgment was passed in 2000, when an arbitration court in Copenhagen reached the conclusion that Latvia had violated its liabilities under the intergovernmental agreement on the mutual promotion and protection of investment and international law. At Latvia's request, a Danish court has reviewed this verdict and a new judgment was passed today in Copenhagen. According to the new judgment, the original arbitral award from 2000 stands firm and Latvia is obliged to pay just over USD 2.5 million plus interest and compensation for legal expenses to SwemBalt AB. "All along we have asserted that the bilateral agreement on the mutual promotion and protection of investment is crystal clear as regards Latvia's obligations. I now expect Latvia to show that it respects its international commitments and to pay compensation immediately to SwemBalt so that the matter can be put aside", says Minister for Industry and Trade, Leif Pagrotsky. An appeal against the Danish judgment can be lodged with the Danish "Högste Rett" which is the

court of final instance.

OSCE presence in Chechnya

"I am deeply disappointed that Russia has opposed the continued presence of the OSCE in Chechnya, according to its mandate for political dialogue and the promotion of human rights that has applied since 1995", says Minister for Foreign Affairs, Anna Lindh.

"It is my hope that the international community will continue to demand the OSCE's presence in the region and that Russia will accept these demands. This is in Russia's own interests. Like the other

EU countries, Sweden will continue to monitor the situation in Chechnya closely.

The OSCE Assistance Group to Chechnya was established by a decision of the OSCE Permanent Council in April 1995. The group has consisted of a team of six people. The Assistance Group's mandate expired on 31 December 2002. Its tasks have included promoting human rights, supporting the development of democratic institutions, assisting the delivery of humanitarian aid and promoting a peaceful resolution of the crisis. The EU has made active efforts to ensure the extension of the OSCE's mandate so that the organisation can continue to carry out its important work in Chechnya.

Decisions in the OSCE are made by consensus, including decisions regarding the mandates of its field missions. Further information about the mandate of the Assistance Group can be found on the OSCE's homepage at: www.osce.org

Peace and Security: the report of the Commission of Inquiry on Security Policy

The Commission of Inquiry on Security Policy will today present its report, "Peace and Security", to Minister for Foreign Affairs Anna Lindh. The assignment given to the special expert in charge of the inquiry, Rolf Ekéus, has been to analyse Swedish security policy actions – political and military – in the period 1969–1989.

Swedish security policy in the later stages of the Cold War was played out against a backdrop of shifting moods in world politics. The détente that marked much of the 1970s gave way to deeper opposition between the superpowers during the Second Cold War in the early 1980s.

During this period Sweden was required to define its security policy in a field of tension between the threat from the Soviet Union and the possibility of support from the West. The Soviet Union was the great – indeed, the only – threat. The dilemma facing Sweden as a western democratic country was that in order to preserve the credibility of its policy of neutrality it had to maintain a certain military distance to the West.

Support from the West found expression in close cooperation regarding military equipment, military technology and intelligence. The inquiry has found an American guideline document elaborating the foundations of the US security policy relationship with Sweden. This document, which was not known to Swedish officials, contained an undertaking to assist Sweden in response to a Soviet attack.

The credibility of the Swedish policy of neutrality required that no preparations were made in peacetime for military cooperation in war. This was emphasised in statements by the Government, defence inquiries and defence programmes throughout the period covered by the inquiry. The special expert has examined military plans drawn up in the period and has found no evidence that this principle was not fully respected.

The policy of neutrality also required a strong defence with a credible capacity to defend the country's territory in the event of a war between the superpower blocs. An isolated attack on Sweden, unconnected with a major conflict in Europe, was considered to be wholly improbable. The Swedish policy of neutrality served a broader security policy purpose in peacetime. It formed part of a Nordic security policy pattern that was an important factor in keeping the tension between the blocs at a low level in the Nordic region. On the basis of its policy of neutrality, Sweden was also able to conduct an active policy aimed at strengthening peace and security in Europe and other parts of the world.

Support for integration of developing countries into world trade

Sweden is making a contribution of SEK 9 million to help the poorest developing countries elaborate their trade policy priorities and needs.

The Government has decided to give SEK 4.5 million to the multilateral development cooperation programme Integrated Framework for Trade-Related Technical Assistance to Least Developed Countries. The Swedish International Development Cooperation Agency (Sida) is contributing an additional SEK 4.5 million to the programme.

"The international community has a responsibility to jointly support developing countries so that they can build the capacity to push their trade policy issues in the international arena and have a chance to develop their trade", says Minister for Industry and Trade Leif Pagrotsky.

"It's in their interest and ours alike that their integration into the global economy proceeds from their own priorities."

The Integrated Framework is a cooperative programme involving six international organisations — the World Trade Organisation (WTO), the International Trade Centre (ITC), the United Nations Conference on Trade and Development (UNCTAD), the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP), the World Bank and the International Monetary Fund (IMF) — a number of donor countries and the least-developed countries (LDCs) that are the recipients of the measures provided by the programme. The purpose of the Integrated Framework is to make trade issues an integral part of LDC development strategies and to adapt trade-related development assistance to needs and make it more effective.

Sweden supports studies on cooperation between the EU and the African, Caribbean and Pacific (ACP) countries

The Government decided today to make a contribution to the European Centre for Development Policy Management as part of a three-year cooperation agreement. The Swedish contribution amounts to SEK 2 million for the year 2003. In total, a sum of SEK 6 million will be granted for the period 2003-2005.

The Swedish appropriation will mainly serve to finance studies and seminars in four areas: political cooperation, political dialogue,

the participation of non-governmental actors in the reform of development cooperation, and measures to prepare and strengthen the ACP countries' (77 countries in Africa, the Caribbean and the Pacific) negotiating capacity in connection with negotiations on a new trade order between the EU and the ACP region.

The European Centre for Development Policy Management was established in 1986 with the aim of increasing knowledge about and encouraging cooperation between the EU and the ACP countries. This is done by means of studies, seminars and by various activities to promote dialogue between the EU and the ACP countries.

Swedish support for integration promotion in Latvia

The Government decided today to contribute a total of SEK 5.2 million in support of efforts to promote integration in Latvia in 2003–2004.

By supporting education in the Latvian language, Latvian history and Latvian administration, Sweden hopes to encourage applications for Latvian citizenship by Russian speakers in the country. SEK 3 million will go to support the State language programme and SEK 1 million to the Latvian Naturalisation Office. The funds will be placed at the disposal of the United Nations Development Programme in Riga.

In addition, the High Commission for National Minorities in the Hague will receive SEK 1.2 million for the production of a manual for instructors at the State Language Centre in Latvia. The responsibilities of the Language Centre include implementation of language legislation and protection of the Latvian language. The purpose of the Swedish support is to help ensure greater observation of statutory rights in connection with the implementation of the relevant legislation. "The integration of Russian speakers in Latvia is important for the country's economic, political and social development as it prepares for EU membership. This is why it is important that Sweden continues to support the positive developments," says Minister for Development Cooperation, Migration and Asylum Policy Jan O. Karlsson.

A substantial proportion of the Latvian population – 40 per cent – consists of Russian speakers, and most of these people are non-citizens. An inadequate knowledge of the Latvian language has so far been a significant obstacle to citizenship. Over the last few years, however, Latvia has made progress in the process of integration and has adopted a broad programme for the integration of the country's national minorities. In addition, a minister specially responsible for integration affairs has recently been appointed. Sweden attaches great importance to the process of integration in Latvia

and has been one of the largest donors to the different programmes to date, contributing some SEK 20 million since 1996.

Quicker administration of cases relating to lone child refugees

Asylum cases relating to lone child refugees should be processed more swiftly. This is made clear in the new appropriation directions to the Swedish Migration Board and the Aliens Appeals Board, that were approved by the Government today. Decisions in asylum cases relating to lone child refugees are to be made within three months by the Swedish Migration Board and within three months by the Aliens Appeals Board.

In the same document, the Government puts considerable emphasis on the need to highlight the issue of women's need for protection in the asylum process. Among other things, women who apply for asylum should be able to have access to female investigators and interpreters. Today, the Government has commissioned the Swedish Migration Board to provide an account of what measures it has taken to better highlight the issue of women's need for protection.

She was chairman of the FAO Committee on Forestry in Rome in 1995, 1997, and 2001, and of the UN Forum on Forests, UNFF, in New York in 2002.

The Government also decided today that Staffan Herrström, Deputy Director-General at Sida, will be acting Director-General until 1 April 2003.

New country strategy for Sri Lanka

Today the Government has decided on a new country strategy for development cooperation with Sri

Lanka for the period 2003-2007.

The negotiations in progress between the government of Sri Lanka and the Liberation Tigers of Tamil Eelam (LTTE) have been successful so far and inspire hope that peace will finally be reached after the deadly civil war that has plagued the country since 1983.

The Minister for Development Cooperation, Migration and Asylum Policy, Jan O. Karlsson, congratulates the parties to the conflict on the progress made so far in the peace negotiations and hopes that they will succeed in their joint intention to give the country a lasting peace.

"The conflict has meant enormous losses of lives and property and the country has no chance of reconstructing what has been destroyed on its own. The international community must give political and economic support to the peace process and reconstruction efforts. The new country strategy comes therefore at a very opportune moment," Mr Karlsson says.

Since the spring Sweden has been participating with eight observers in the Sri Lanka Monitoring Mission, SLMM, which is supervising the peace process. Sweden is also participating in the support measures for the peace process that were initiated in Oslo a month ago and which will be followed up by a conference for long-term support in Tokyo during the spring of 2003.

Development cooperation in the next five years will take the form of efforts to promote peace, democracy, human rights and economic development measures to combat poverty. The volume of cooperation will amount to at most SEK 350 million over the next three years in addition to development country credits, humanitarian assistance and support to Swedish non-governmental organisations.

Sweden's cooperation with Sri Lanka started in 1958.

Government takes decision on new strategy for South America

The Government took a decision today on a new strategy for Sweden's development cooperation with South America. In particular, the new strategy for the period 2003-2007 focuses on the Andean region. The basis for development cooperation is the fight against poverty.

The regional strategy identifies Bolivia as the poorest country on the continent, the armed conflict in Columbia as the most destabilising factor, and the Andean region as the most vulnerable. Bolivia and Columbia are therefore afforded priority in Sweden's development cooperation with South America, and have their own strategies as part of the broader framework of the regional strategy. The overall objective of Sweden's development cooperation is to raise the living standards of the poor, something that requires economic growth, greater social equality and peaceful coexistence. Of the development cooperation policy objectives, greater economic and social equality, combined with democratic development are particularly important.

Investments in marketing of Swedish biotechnology in the USA

The Government has decided to grant SEK 1,150,000 for a project to market Swedish biotechnology in the USA in connection with the technology exhibition "BIO2003 Exhibition and Convention" in Washington on 22-26 June 2003. The purpose of the project is to present Swedish know-how and to create a platform from which Swedish companies can do business. "Our Swedish biotechnology industry is at the forefront of international developments", says Minister for Industry and Trade, Leif Pagrotsky. "In the next few years it is important that we make ourselves even more visible in order to create more jobs in Sweden."

The funds will be placed at the disposal of the Swedish Trade Council for the preparation of a Swedish pavilion at the exhibition, at which some 15 companies will be represented.

The Ministry for Foreign Affairs has also decided to allocate SEK 250,000 for special activities to market Swedish biotechnology in the USA in connection with Sweden's participation in BIO2003. These funds will be placed at the disposal of the Swedish Embassy in Washington.

The initiatives are part of the Government's long-term strategy to promote Swedish biotechnology abroad.

Anna Lindh welcomes peace agreement in the Democratic Republic of the Congo

"I welcome the peace agreement announced today, which brings to an end four years of war in the Democratic Republic of the Congo (DRC)," says Minister for Foreign Affairs Anna Lindh. "This is a crucial step for stability in the region. Now all parties must follow the agreement. In the short term in particular it is important that the parties cooperate to disarm the various militias that are still operating in eastern Congo."

The Congolese government, armed rebel groups and the political opposition today signed an agreement on a new political order in the country and on the form to be taken by the transitional government that is to lead the country to free and democratic elections within two years. Among the provisions of the agreement, President Kabila will be assisted during the transitional period by four vice presidents from the armed and political opposition and there will be power-sharing in the government. The agreement has come about after mediation by the United Nations and South Africa.

The report "National Security and Personal Integrity" presented to the Minister for Justice today

Today the Commission on the Security Services has submitted to Minister of Justice Thomas Bodström its report, National Security and Personal Integrity (Rikets säkerhet och den personliga integriteten, SOU 2002:87) including eight research reports attached as annexes (SOU 2002:88-95). The Commission's task has been to document and illuminate, exhaustively and definitively, the Swedish security services' constitutionally protective activities from the end of the Second World War up to and including the period when the Commission completed its work. In this context "constitutionally protective" denotes the security services' surveillance of those Swedish extremist political organisations and groups which were deemed to constitute, actually or potentially, a threat to national security.

Marshall of the Realm Gunnar Brodin has served as commission president. Other members have included former President of the Supreme Court Anders Knutsson, Secretary General of the Voluntary Organisations Fund for Human Rights Anita Klum, editor Ewonne Winblad, and professors Alf W. Johansson and Karl Molin. Chief District Court Judge Fredrik von Arnold has served as principal secretary.

The Commission has conducted comprehensive and systematic studies in the archives of the security services. Access has been granted to all the material requested. The Commission has also interviewed or called to testify nearly 400 individuals, chiefly officials within the security services but also leading politicians and persons active within the surveyed organisations. As a result the Commission can today present a detailed and in-depth picture of that which colloquially is referred to as "Surveillance Sweden", its formation and scope.

The Commission has found that, in the 1950s and 1960s, the registration of communists and communist sympathisers was particularly widespread. By the end of the 1960s there were more than 100,000 such persons registered, at times on flimsy grounds. During the last 30 years, there have been at most 5,000 to 10,000 individuals listed in the central register or the working registers of the Security Police (SÄPO), arising from such persons' association with extremist organisations on the Left or Right.

The registration of political opinions in Sweden (åsiktsregistrering) was formally prohibited by the 1969 Proclamation on the Scrutiny of Personnel (personalkontrollkungörelsen), and since 1977

codified in the constitution. Despite the ban, this practice has continued.

This has been due to, among other factors, the fact that unclear instructions have been issued by the National Police Board and Swedish Government. Official guidelines were often written in a manner that could be interpreted in several ways. In this way it became possible to both satisfy political opinion and at the same time provide the Security Police the authority deemed necessary in light of national security. In its working registers SÄPO has to a great extent recorded information in contravention with the ban on registering political opinions.

The Commission has found that there is even today a palpable risk that the ban on registering political opinions could be violated in connection with the surveillance of individuals active in extremist political organisations.

The Commission has sharply criticised the manner in which wire-tapping rules have come to be applied. In addition, this type of encroachment has often impacted individuals other than the object of suspicion and thus violated their personal integrity. In fact, telephones of political organisations have been tapped, an activity which endangers the very right to conduct legitimate political activities in Sweden. This concerned, during the 1950s and 1960s, the Swedish Communist Party (now the Left Party) and in the 1970s mainly the leftist parties KFML and KFML(r). In the years around 1970, wire-tapping was used against the anti-war FNL movement. When the telephones of newspaper offices were tapped, such activity imperilled the constitutionally guaranteed protection of informants (meddelarskyddet).

At present wire-tapping is used chiefly against nazi and anarchist organisations and is typically based on the suspicion of criminal conspiratorial association. The Commission finds that suspicion of this type of crime has been cited all too often as the basis for wire-taps.

In the view of the Commission, the way criminal courts have applied legislation has become decisive in the development wire-tapping practices. In many cases, the courts have permitted wire-taps to continue for a long period of time without an indictment or even stronger suspicions being raised. In this context, the Commission has noted cases where wire-tapping continued for nearly ten years. The courts, prosecutors and police have collectively contributed to the violation of individuals' integrity in a way which is at variance with the intentions of the legislation. Even the judicial oversight authorities, the Ombudsman (JO) and the Attorney-General (JK) have, through their failure to react, sanctioned the development of this legal practice. The responsible cabinet minister should have periodically been informed.

The Commission has found that wire-tapping was used to gather information about individuals who did not figure in the preliminary investigations giving rise to the wire-taps. This information has in thousands of cases been collected in ways which lack legal grounds. Such "surplus information" has on occasion constituted the greatest single source behind registration on Security Police lists. In several cases, such "surplus information" has been made available in connection with scrutiny of personnel (personalkontroll), for instance in the Leander affair. In this way, the very legal basis of the system for scrutiny of personnel has, in the opinion of the Commission, been undermined. The Commission calls attention to the fact that SÄPO, on more than 30 occasions, has used bugging devices against extremist organisations in Sweden. This practice was particularly common in the beginning of the 1950s, and there are even strong indications that microphones, permanently installed in the HSB building in Stockholm, were used for the purpose of monitoring communist meetings held there. Among other noted cases of bugging include the FNL movement's office in Stockholm at the end of the 1960s and the 1969 congresses of KFML (Gothenburg) and the united FNL groups (Uppsala). After bugging was criminalized in the early 1970s, the Security Police has not, as far as can be determined, made use of this surveillance method for constitutionally protective activities.

With reference to the Military Security Service, the Commission has established that within the Defence Staff, particularly during the 1970s, there occurred illegal registration of political opinions. In the SÄPO archive the Commission has found a large number of reports from the IB and its predecessor Group B – special branch of the Defence Staff used for collection of intelligence – from the late 1950s to the end of the 1970s. Together with previously known information these documents have made it possible in large measure to reconstruct the domestic activities conducted by Group B/IB. The significance of these activities for the surveillance of security risks was found to be relatively limited.

On several occasions Group B gathered information by means of bugging communist meetings. A few buggings took place in Malmoe at the beginning of the 1960s. It is likely that the electoral assembly of the Stockholm branch of the Swedish Communist Party was bugged in 1963, as well as two meetings of the Swedish Communist Party executive board in 1965.

The Commission has also scrutinized the IB's occasional use of infiltrators and found cause to criticise the infiltration of groups which were not illegal, an activity which appears to be in violation of the freedom of association. The Commission has moreover expressed sharp criticism of IB's contribution to, and in some cases initiation of, criminal activities on the part of infiltrators. In the social democrat archives, the Commission has uncovered reports drawn up by Group B which, among other aspects, concern domestic issues beginning with the early 1960s. The Commission findings strongly suggest that Defence Minister Sven Andersson, at the start of the 1970s, recommenced IB's domestic activities which had been interrupted by government intervention in 1969. There is good reason to believe that Birger Elmér reported not only to the minister of defence but also to leading figures within the Social Democratic Party. The Commission has expressed apprehensions about the confusion of party and state interests which have ostensibly arisen in this case.

Regarding the controversial question of the origin of Group B within the Defence Staff Domestic Department, the Commission has however found that the impulse came from the Defence Staff under pressure from a threat perception heightened by several revelations of industrial espionage at the time. Another factor of importance in this regard were American demands for the protection of advanced military equipment being exported to Sweden. Evidence that social democracy was behind the initiative to establish Group B – and thus maintain a separate security service financed with public funds and subject to military security – has not been found. Neither has the Commission uncovered evidence that Group B originated in an agreement between the Swedish Armed Forces, the Employers' Confederation (SAF) and the Confederation of Trade Unions (LO).

The perceived threats which the security services worked against appear, in the view of the Commission, to be largely comprehensible in light of military threat perceptions at the time as well as the prevailing frame of mind. This does not mean that the perceived threats were always realistic. Both alarmism and backwardness are in evidence. Threat perceptions were often exaggerated and at times persisted well beyond the time span that was warranted.

Swedish initiatives in St Petersburg in 2003

Sweden will strengthen its ties with St Petersburg through a special Swedish initiative in connection

with the city's 300th anniversary celebrations in 2003. The Government has decided to allocate a total of SEK 10 million to the Swedish International Development Cooperation Agency, the Swedish Institute, the Swedish Trade Council and the Stockholm Region European Committee for this purpose.

Swedish support to Sami cultural centre in Lovozero, Russia

Today the Government decided to allocate a sum of SEK 1,215,000 for the development of a Sami cultural centre in Lovozero on the Russian Kola peninsula. Lovozero is a main centre for the Russian Sami population and the cultural centre will be an important contribution towards strengthening their cultural identity.

Sweden is making active efforts to improve the opportunities for indigenous peoples to take part in regional cooperation in the Barents region. Sweden gives assistance to the Global Fund to Fight AIDS, Tuberculosis and Malaria

Today the Government approved a further grant of SEK 140 million to the Global Fund to Fight AIDS, Tuberculosis and Malaria. Sweden's contribution to this fund will thus amount to a total of SEK 200 million in 2002.

AIDS, tuberculosis and malaria take the lives of millions of victims every year. According to the Joint United Nations Programme on HIV/AIDS (UNAIDS), HIV/AIDS has become the worst plague in world history, and there is no sign of the epidemic abating. These illnesses weaken people's ability to support themselves and thus deepen poverty.

"The aim of the UN is to halve the number of poor people in the world by 2015. For this aim to be achieved, we must reduce the spread of HIV, tuberculosis and malaria", says Minister for Development Cooperation, Migration and Asylum Policy Jan O. Karlsson.

"It is vital for world development that all donors honour their commitments to the Global Fund", says Jan O. Karlsson.

The Global Fund to Fight AIDS, Tuberculosis and Malaria was established by a number of interested countries, NGOs and UN bodies and began its work on 1 January 2002. The fund is playing an important role in the international fight against these illnesses which, every year, cost the lives of some five million people, primarily in the poorest countries. The Government intends to contribute SEK 600 million to the fund over a three-year period.

Agreement between Sweden and the UN concerning archive material on Dag Hammarskjöld

The Government today decided to enter into an agreement with the United Nations on preservation of archive material relating to Dag Hammarskjöld. The Agreement will be signed on Thursday 19 December at a ceremony at UN headquarters in New York by Pierre Schori, Ambassador to the Permanent Mission of Sweden to the Office of the United Nations, and Mr Shahsi Tharoor, Under-Secretary-General at the UN Department of Public Information.

A considerable amount of historically valuable material is kept in the UN archives, inter alia several

newsreels on the Swede Dag Hammarskjöld who was Secretary-General of the United Nations from 1953-1961. There is a risk that this film material will be destroyed in time if measures are not taken to secure its preservation. Sweden and the UN have therefore agreed that the films be transferred to Sweden to be taken care of here. The Swedish Film Institute will restore and preserve the films on behalf of the UN. They will subsequently be available for research and studies at the National Archive of Recorded Sound and Moving Images. The film material will also be available in digital form at UN headquarters in New York.

"It is very positive that Sweden can contribute in this way to the preservation of the important heritage that these films represent," the Minister for Foreign Affairs, Anna Lindh, said in a comment. "Dag Hammarskjöld was, and is, one of the most prominent UN leaders and we are proud that Sweden has been given this trust."

Easier way into the WTO for the world's poorest

It is to become easier for the world's poorest countries to become members of the World Trade Organisation. The WTO General Council took a decision to this effect today.

New guidelines will make it possible also for the least developed countries to carry out the negotiations required for WTO membership. Sweden is chairing the committee that has drawn up the guidelines and the Minister for Industry and Trade, Leif Pagrotsky, considers today's decision to be of central importance for moving forward the position of developing countries in the trade system.

- We have prioritised this work and rapidly succeeded in achieving results. The decision means that the least developed countries, LDCs, can more easily become members and thereby also share the advantages this implies.
- The guidelines will be important for overcoming the problem caused by certain WTO members placing unreasonably high demands on developing countries in the accession negotiations.
- The decision is also crucial for confidence in the ongoing
- WTO negotiations where development issues are in focus.

Since the establishment of the WTO in 1995, none of the LDCs have become new members of the organisation. Complicated and resource-demanding membership negotiations have obstructed the accession of these countries to the organisation. The new guidelines for accession negotiations adopted today focus on four areas: market access, the WTO system of rules, the accession process

and technical assistance.

Peace agreement signed for Aceh

Today, the Indonesian Government and the Free Aceh Movement (GAM) signed an agreement on a cease-fire in the Indonesian province of Aceh at the northern tip of the island of Sumatra. Sweden will contribute logistics and communications to the monitoring mission which will control compliance with the agreement. This assistance of around SEK 13 million will be administered by the Swedish Rescue Services Agency and financed by Sida over a four-month period while services are being built up.

"I welcome the fact that the parties have taken this important step towards a sustainable and long-term solution to the conflict", comments Minister for Foreign Affairs Anna Lindh.

"It is vital that the Indonesian Government and GAM do all that is in their power to live up to the agreement that has now been signed in order to bring lasting peace to a democratic Aceh".

Fighting has been under way for more than 26 years, and the agreement is part of the process of creating lasting peace in Aceh. The Geneva-based human rights organisation, the Henri Dunant Centre (HDC) has mediated in the negotiations between the Indonesian Government and GAM for almost three years and will be hosting the signing of the agreement today. A monitoring mission under the leadership of the HDC will immediately control that the agreement is respected.

"The efforts of the HDC and the support of the international community for the monitoring mission in particular and Aceh's future in general was clearly demonstrated at the donor conference in Tokyo on 3 December. Through Ambassador Bengt Säve-Söderbergh's role as advisor to the parties and the HDC, Sweden has contributed to the parties' agreement to solve the conflict via negotiations", says Anna Lindh.

New organisation to support developing countries in the WTO

Unofficial translation

Today, Sweden signed an agreement on the establishment of an international organisation, the Agency for International Trade Information and Cooperation (AITIC), which will support the

poorest countries in ongoing WTO negotiations.

"This is part of our endeavours to give the poorest countries a better chance to promote their interests", says Minister for Industry and Trade Leif Pagrotsky who, together with Minister for Development Cooperation, Migration and Asylum Policy Jan O. Karlsson, was one of those behind the initiative.

"Sweden is one of the countries that is most active in promoting more resources and greater know-how and skills in trade issues for poor countries. This is partly to enable them to make use of their potential in negotiations and partly to give them a stronger trade position in general". AITIC will provide services to poor countries' negotiators in the ongoing WTO round, with particular focus on the 25 developing countries without representations in Geneva. Many developing countries are represented only by one or two persons. At the same time, the agenda of the World Trade Organisation has broadened and the current round of negotiations in the WTO is entering into an increasingly intensive phase.

"AITIC is a good example of how to enhance, with relatively small means, the ability of developing countries to influence their economic outlook themselves", says Minister for Development Cooperation, Migration and Asylum Policy Jan O. Karlsson.

In addition to Sweden, Denmark, Finland, Ireland, the Netherlands, Switzerland and the United Kingdom are supporting AITIC. The organisation will have a budget of around SEK 120 million for the first five years of its operations. Sweden's contribution for this period will be SEK 12 million.

China invests in Sweden

An announcement today revealed that Shanghai is planning the opening of a trade and investment office in Sweden. The office is to be located in Göteborg.

"This is important both for Göteborg and for Sweden given the role that the office will play in the Baltic region," says State Secretary Sven-Eric Söder, who on Friday completed his visit to China. During his visit to China this week, Sven-Eric Söder has led a delegation from the Invest in Sweden Agency (ISA). The main purpose of the visit has been to promote Sweden as an investment country in Beijing and Shanghai. The programme has included seminars, company visits and meetings with central and regional ministries. The visit is part of the Swedish Government's comprehensive China campaign.

China's membership of the WTO along with the Chinese Government's "Go Abroad" policy of encouraging Chinese companies to establish themselves abroad will lead to China eventually becoming a major investor in other countries.

"Our goal is to see Sweden become one of Europe's largest recipients of Chinese investments," says

Sven-Eric Söder. "This is why we are out in good time now that things are beginning to move." To date, China has made about ten investments in Sweden. These include the large IT and telecom companies Huawei and ZTE.

The week has also seen ISA enter into a cooperation agreement with Citic Bank and the State Development and Planning Commission (SDPC). In addition, State Secretary Söder and ISA have drawn up guidelines with the Ministry of Foreign Trade and Economic Cooperation (MOFTEC) and the State Economic and Trade Commission (SETC) for continued investment initiatives. Today ISA opened its office at the consulate-general in Shanghai. In addition to being represented there, ISA will also be represented in Beijing.

"The response we have received from the Chinese to our efforts to attract investments has been enormous," says ISA's Director-General Kai Hammerich. "Now that work is under way, our partners and contacts in China are major players in the field."

The Tax Base Commission presents proposals for a 'new tax reform'

The Tax Base Commission presented the report Our Taxes? (SOU 2002:47) to Bosse Ringholm, Minister for Finance, today. The Commission's main task is to present an overall assessment of how the Swedish tax structure should be designed in a globalized world.

According to the Tax Base Commission, there is every prospect of continuing to use taxes to finance a functioning welfare society that meets the same standards as today. However, this will only be possible if Sweden maintains and develops the tax system, as it has done in the past. Sweden faces a long-term demographic trend in which an increasing proportion of the population will have to be supported by a shrinking workforce. Sweden is not the only country in this situation; indeed the situation is similar in most European countries.

The tax system makes a great impact on the labour supply and the effectiveness of production, and these considerations should therefore be the main focus of attention when it comes to designing today's and tomorrow's taxes. Taxes must not distort the economic incentives for households' consumption decisions and enterprises' decisions concerning production. The lowest possible marginal tax rates can be achieved by making the tax base as broad as possible and avoiding reductions and tax exemptions wherever possible.

The total tax shortfall corresponds to about 4 per cent of GDP, or 8 per cent of tax revenue. Two-thirds of this is attributable to the 'black' sector, i.e. revenue not declared by companies and illicit work. One-third of the shortfall is due to various international transactions. The latter 'new' tax shortfall, in particular, is likely to increase.

The Commission concludes that most of the increase in problems due to international factors is caused by enterprises transferring production to other countries, by cross-border shopping and by tax reductions required under international rules.

The Commission's proposals

Having reviewed all aspects of taxation the Commission presents a large number of proposals, some of which are quite radical. Some of the more important proposals are presented below.

A committee consisting of representatives of the parliamentary parties should review the capital tax sector. The main aims should be to achieve a tax system that is more rational in economic terms, more robust and more equitable by broadening tax bases, reducing marginal tax rates and simplifying certain features. A 'new tax reform' should include the following changes:

- · Abolishing inheritance and gift tax for tax class I (husband, wife and descendants).
- · Broadening the wealth tax base to include all significant assets and substantially reducing the tax rate. If this gives rise to insoluble problems, the wealth tax should be abolished altogether.
- · Raising the benefit levels under the unemployment, sickness and parental insurance systems.
- · Anticipating future reductions of corporate tax in more and more EU countries, Sweden should prepare to reduce this tax to 25 per cent.

A general condition must be not to weaken vertical income distribution. High-income wage earners will have to pay for their own tax reductions.

Consequently, these and any other changes should be financed by abolishing tax deductions for pension premium payments and reductions in employer's contributions and by abolishing accrual funds.

Eventually, Sweden should prepare to reduce the gap between the VAT rates in Sweden and the minimum EU level. Probably, it will only be possible to reduce the general rate, say to 22 per cent, by making the VAT rates more uniform, i.e. abolishing the lower rates for specific sectors. In the long run, 20 per cent is a reasonable VAT rate.

Sweden should also actively propose that the EU allow member states to levy a special VAT rate on e-commerce and similar services, in which case the minimum rate should be 15 per cent. This should apply to all sectors that are exposed to international competition in which the EU applies the country of origin principle.

In 2004, when Sweden will have to start applying the EU's high alcohol and tobacco quotas in full, this will lead to loss of tax revenue. Sweden should therefore reduce its selective taxes to levels that are closer to the EU average. This would also be fairer to different groups of consumers and curb illegal activities in this area.

International efforts

Sweden should pursue a harmonization of the definitions of tax bases and minimum EU levels as regards the most rapidly changing tax bases. To achieve this aim, some member states would have to give up their veto in certain areas.

In the case of the more slow-moving tax bases, in particular household earnings and enterprises' wage costs, the EU should adopt the opposite strategy. Here, every effort should be made to defend and facilitate the member states' opportunities for maintaining different tax levels.

Effective and efficient administration

Sweden's tax administration is effective and resource-efficient by international comparison. Nevertheless, we consider it necessary to increase the appropriation to the tax administration authorities by 2 per cent for the implementation of measures two areas:

- · international cooperation on information exchange and controls;
- · information with a view to raising public awareness about taxes and what they are used for. An unprejudiced review should be made of the hearing of tax cases with a view to enhancing competence and simplifying the administrative structure. A realistic objective should be to ensure that the administrative courts can conclude all tax cases within two years.

Jan O. Karlsson to attend migration council meeting in Brussels

On Thursday 28 November, Jan O. Karlsson, the Swedish Minister for Development Cooperation, Migration and Asylum Policy, will attend a meeting of the EU's Justice and Home Affairs Council in Brussels.

A decision on the EU programme for the return of Afghan refugees is also expected, as well as conclusions on extended cooperation and the establishment of a networks between migration liaison officers.

Iceland must follow international regulations banning whaling

Sweden will today deliver its official objection to Iceland's declaration that it intends to hunt whales despite the international ban.

Earlier this autumn Iceland acceded to the International Whaling Convention and so became a member of the commission linked to the Convention, the International Whaling Commission (IWC). A country joining the Convention is expected to respect the IWC regulations. But Iceland entered a reservation against the ban on whaling.

The IWC is trying to draw up a sustainable regulatory framework to preserve the world's whales and on which the majority of countries are able to agree. Sweden is playing an important role in these efforts and would like to see Iceland participate.

But Iceland's reservation means that unless progress is made in amending the regulations, Iceland does not consider that it is under any obligation to respect the IWC whaling ban as of the beginning of 2006. It was this condition that Sweden believes should have been examined at the last IWC meeting in Cambridge.

"Iceland's unilateral condition is incompatible with IWC cooperation and its objectives. If Iceland is

to be a member of the IWC, Sweden intends to place the same demands on Iceland as upon other IWC members", comment Minister for Foreign Affairs Anna Lindh and Minister of the Environment Lena Sommestad.

This is also stated in the written objection to be presented today by Sweden to the Depositary of the International Whaling Convention in Washington. The objection means that Sweden declares that it does not accept the condition laid down by Iceland for its membership. Sweden's objection applies irrespective of whether previous or future decisions of the IWC accept or reject the Icelandic condition.

The new consulate-general is to focus on trade promotion in particular and be responsible for the provinces of Guangdong, Fujian and Hainan, and also for the autonomous region of Guangxi. Together they have 160 million inhabitants. In addition, the consulate-general will be working with information about Sweden and encouraging the development of regional cooperation between twin towns.

Anna Lindh welcomes peace in Angola

The Secretary-General's Special Representative in Angola, Ibrahim Gambari, declared on 21 November that Angola is now at peace. The peace process took a great step forward after the ceasefire agreed in April between the Angolan Government and the former rebel movement UNITA, and is now declared to be successfully concluded.

"I welcome the fact that after 30 years of ravaging civil war, peace has now come to Angola," says Minister for Foreign Affairs Anna Lindh in a comment.

"It is vital that the Angolan Government now takes full responsibility for the reconstruction of the country. Important political and economic reforms are urgently needed. The government must, in particular, lay down a resettlement policy that embraces not only demobilised soldiers but also displaced persons and refugees returning from neighbouring countries," continues the Minister for Foreign Affairs.

"I call upon all parties to continue to participate in the process which is intended to lead in time to general elections held openly in full accordance with democratic principles.

"One of the most important tasks is to reduce humanitarian suffering among the people of Angola. Sweden is currently one of the principal donors of humanitarian aid to Angola. This year alone we have given over SEK 100 million," concludes Anna Lindh.

The Government has instructed the Swedish International Development Cooperation Agency to draw up a proposal for a country strategy for future development cooperation with Angola. The strategy will aim to reduce poverty in the country, not least by promoting the society's democratic development and respect for human rights.

Sweden prepared for UN appeal for humanitarian assistance

This week the UN will launch its annual package of requests – consolidated appeals – for humanitarian assistance. The appeals for 2003 will cover some 20 countries and amount, in total, to USD 3 billion for food, shelter, medicines and other basic needs for almost 50 million people afflicted by natural disasters, war and other emergencies.

"The UN appeals are an important means of achieving coordination, predictability and rapid funding of relief to areas hit by crisis", says Minister for Development Cooperation, Migration and Asylum Policy, Jan O. Karlsson.

Every year Sweden channels almost one third, or approximately SEK 300 million, of its humanitarian assistance through the UN appeals. Sweden is normally also among the first countries to respond, which it does through Sida as early as mid-January. The Swedish payments are then made soon after this – by April at the latest. This makes Sweden a leading country as regards a clear and rapid response to these considerable and important needs, which is highly appreciated by the UN and the international community at large. In addition to assistance through the appeals, Sweden also provides direct support to the UN Office for the Coordination of Humanitarian Assistance (OCHA), which is responsible for coordination of the appeals.

The countries and regions at the receiving end of the 2003 appeals will include South Africa, Afghanistan, Ethiopia, Somalia, Eritrea, the Palestinian territories, Tajikistan and North Korea. Other countries and regions are Angola, Burundi, Chechnya, the Côte d'Ivoire, the Democratic Republic of the Congo, the Great Lakes Region in Africa, Guinea, Indonesia, Liberia, Sierra Leone, Sudan and Uganda.

The theme of the appeals for 2003 is "Hope for the Future", to emphasise the importance of providing hope to communities afflicted by conflict and crisis, such as Afghanistan and Sierra Leone, where humanitarian assistance during a transitional period may lead to durable peace and sustainable development.

Targeted sanctions against Belarus

Unofficial translation

Fourteen of the 15 EU foreign ministers decided yesterday to impose travel restrictions on Belarus President Lukashenko and the circle of people closest to him.

"We are deeply disappointed by developments in Belarus and the country's unwillingness to improve the situation by cooperating with the EU and OSCE. This year, several journalists have been sentenced to unreasonably long imprisonment for criticising the President, prosecution of a number of opposition politicians has been instituted and freedom of religion and belief has been limited. The OSCE office in the country has been thrown out by the authorities", comments Minister for Foreign Affairs Anna Lindh.

The restrictions will be targeted at the Belarus President and parts of his government. They are designed to affect the élite responsible in Belarus and not ordinary people.

"It has been important for Sweden not to agree to decisions that will further isolate the population. We shall also continue to promote cooperation with the Belarus people, by encouraging bilateral contacts", emphasises Anna Lindh.

A unanimous EU decision could not be taken because of Portugal's objections. Portugal is concerned that extended EU sanctions may affect the forthcoming summit in Portugal.

Report on economic reform submitted to the EU

Sweden has today submitted this year's National Report on Economic Reform of the Product and Capital Markets to the Economic Policy Committee in the EU. The report is a part of the co-operation on economic reform in the EU.

The report describes the reform work in Sweden to render the goods, services and capital markets more efficient. Efforts to promote the knowledge-based economy and integrate environmental concerns into economic policy are also highlighted. The report outlines measures taken and the economic consequences of the reforms. A few examples of reforms described in the report are the improved legislation for fighting cartels, the improvements in public procurement and the strengthened legislation for financial markets.

From an international perspective Sweden has progressed well with work on economic reforms. It concerns for example electricity, telecom and transport, as well as investments in education and research and integrating environmental considerations into economic policy. The reforms have on the whole generated positive effects on the economy and for consumers.

But there are also areas that can be improved, for example the competitive situation in the markets for food trade and construction. The price level in Sweden is still higher than the EU average and the regional price difference for certain products is significant.

Economic reform is a central part of the work to attain the EU goal of becoming the most dynamic and competitive economy in the world by 2010. This goal was set at the European Council in Lisbon in the year 2000. Work to achieve the objective is therefore called the Lisbon strategy. The co-operation on economic reform in the EU is an important instrument to pursue reforms in the EU and reach the Lisbon objective.

Association agreement between the EU and Chile

An association agreement between the EU and Chile was signed on Monday in Brussels by the foreign ministers of the EU and Chilean Minister for Foreign Affairs Soledad Alvear.

The agreement which contains three sections: political dialogue, cooperation and trade, is regarded as the most important entered into by Chile in modern times and the most far-reaching agreement entered into by the EU with a third country.

The EU and Chile will now pursue a regular political dialogue, endeavour to coordinate their positions and take common initiatives in international forums.

In addition, the EU and Chile will cooperate in the spheres of economics, science, technology, IT, culture, education, the fight against drugs and in combating organised crime.

From a Swedish trade perspective, the results of the negotiations are considered to be favourable, both regarding the import and export of industrial products. All industrial products are covered by the agreement and the majority will be duty-free when the agreement enters into force.

The agreement is also positive for the service sector. Full market access and non-discrimination is guaranteed in several major Swedish sectors.

In the field of investment, the agreement is one of the EU's most far-reaching bilateral free trade agreements. Conditions for direct investment will be improved, inter alia, by guaranteeing that such investment is dealt with at the national level. Both imports and exports may be expected to increase. The agreement means a considerable improvement for Swedish companies wishing to take part in public procurement in Chile.

The Swedish Government has therefore decided today to grant an extra SEK 500 000 to the European Centre for Development Policy Management (ECDPM). The Centre is responsible for increasing awareness and promoting cooperation between the ACP and the EU. The purpose of the grant is to support the ACP countries in their negotiations with the EU. The new trade order will enter into force in 2008. It means a revolutionary change for about half of the world's least developed countries. In the long term, customs tariffs will be reduced, tax systems revised, and one-sided preferences abandoned in favour of reciprocal trade preferences.

Jan O. Karlsson on cooperation with Russia on migration

In view of the large increase this year in groundless applications for asylum from ex-Soviet citizens, Jan O. Karlsson travelled to Moscow last week for talks with Deputy Foreign Minister Valery Loshchinin, Minister of the Interior Boris Gryzlov and Deputy Interior Minister Andrei Chernenko (head of the Russian Federal Migration Service). The discussions continued on Tuesday at expert group level.

¡§We were given a very positive reception by the Russian ministers and have reached agreement on a range of joint measures. This is a matter of constructive cooperation between neighbours, aimed at putting a stop to crime and to the exploitation of the asylum system. Within just a few days of our meetings, it has proved possible to solve a number of cases with the help of the Russian authorities,;" says Jan O. Karlsson.

As a result of the talks in Moscow, the most senior official of the Russian Federal Migration Service, Igor Junash, is in Stockholm today for negotiations on a Swedish-Russian agreement on: "h Establishment of citizenship and issuing of exit documents. Sweden and Russia will cooperate on establishing citizenship and issuing exit documents, by means of direct contacts between the Swedish Migration Board and police authorities, and the Russian Ministry of the Interior and migration service.

- "h Police liaison officer at the Russian embassy in Stockholm. At present Sweden has a police liaison officer at its embassy in Moscow and another at the consulate-general in St Petersburg. Sweden has requested that Russia station a similar Russian police liaison officer at its embassy in Stockholm.
- "h Enforcement of sentences. Sweden wants to have the option of sending Russian citizens who commit crimes in Sweden back to Russia to serve their sentences there. Russian authorities will now examine a Swedish draft for a bilateral agreement on enforcement of sentences.
- "h Further expert contacts. The Russian-Swedish expert group that was established in Moscow last week will continue to meet in future and will follow cooperation between the authorities on an ongoing basis.

Dubious Russian travel agencies are also known to exist, selling complete ¡§asylum packages¡", which can contain visas, false documents and instructions on how to progress through the asylum system. The Russian authorities have declared that they are prepared to assist Sweden in this matter as well.

Asylum-seekers from the former Soviet Union are now the second largest group of asylum-seekers reaching Sweden. In the last nine months, the number of asylum-seekers from the former Soviet Union has been almost three times as high as in the equivalent period last year. The great majority have no genuine reason for seeking asylum and of these a certain sub-category consists of active criminals. The National Police Board has estimated that approximately 15-20 per cent of them commit criminal acts while in Sweden. The National Police Board emphasises that a large number of cases remain undetected and the figures may consequently be considerably higher. The vast majority (97 per cent) seek asylum when in Sweden and then lack passports or other documents to confirm their citizenship. In cases where applications are obviously without valid grounds, the Swedish Migration Board currently takes decisions very swiftly by special rapid procedures. The agreement with the Russian authorities will facilitate the establishment of citizenship and issuing of travel documents for the return of ex-Soviet citizens.

Support in the EU for measures to prevent abuse of asylum

"The increase in groundless applications for asylum from Russian/former Soviet citizens and the ensuing criminality that has been observed is a serious problem in Sweden today. To combat abuse of the right of asylum, close cooperation between the EU countries is necessary".

This was said today by Minister for Development Cooperation, Migration and Asylum Policy Jan O. Karlsson at the EU Council of Ministers meeting on justice and home affairs in Luxembourg. He gave an account of the situation and measures now being taken to stop abuse of the asylum system. After the meeting, Jan O Karlsson commented that he had met with understanding and a willingness to cooperate.

"I am shortly planning to send a delegation to Brussels so that we can learn about Belgium's similar experiences two years ago and the action they took to stop abuse of the asylum system", said Jan O. Karlsson.

At the open debate, both the asylum procedure directive and the student directive were discussed. Jan O. Karlsson emphasised the importance of procedures enabling rapid processing of applications that obvious lack grounds – procedures that we already use today in Sweden. The student directive aims at facilitating and simplifying regulations for entry and stay for students from countries outside the EU, which Jan O. Karlsson welcomed.

At the meeting, the status directive (a proposed directive on minimum standards for the qualifications and status of third-country nationals and stateless persons as refugees or as persons who otherwise need international protection), and the Council regulation establishing the criteria and mechanisms for determining the Member State responsible for examining an asylum application lodged in one of the Member States by a third-country national were also discussed. This regulation will replace the current Dublin Convention and is expected to be adopted at the end of the year. The status directive is a key directive which will constitute a guideline for all other directives in this area. What was discussed was on the one hand, a common definition and interpretation of the concept of refugee, and on the other, the way in which subsidiary protection (alternative forms of protection) should be defined.

"Stop the abuse of the asylum system"

"The number of groundless applications for asylum has increased dramatically in the last year. We will now shift into a higher gear in cooperation between authorities and countries to reduce abuse of the asylum system and the related criminality which has also increased all over Sweden this year." This was stated by the Minister for Development Cooperation, Migration and Asylum Policy, Jan O. Karlsson, at a press briefing this morning at which he reported the measures against the increasing number of groundless applications for asylum from Russian/former Soviet citizens. Among former Soviet citizens who have sought asylum in Sweden this year there is a group of active criminals who use the asylum system to be able to legally stay in Sweden. They have contacts with criminal networks that provide them with housing, cars and mobile phones. "It is totally unacceptable that the asylum system is exploited in this way. It affects all the other asylum seekers and also innocent people in the municipalities. This development must be stopped by taking measures in Sweden and together with Russia, and through EU cooperation," Mr Karlsson said.

At the national level: The Swedish Migration Board now takes quick decisions as far as people who clearly lack valid reasons for asylum are concerned and they can be refused entry immediately. The possibility of custody facilitates the rapid enforcement of refusal of entry decisions (e.g. if people who have been refused entry are feared will go into hiding). The Swedish Migration Board has capacity for 90 today but the number will be increased shortly. Cooperation between the Swedish Migration Board and the police will be intensified.

Cooperation with Russia: Migration Minister Jan O. Karlsson will travel to Russia in the near future to discuss the problems with representatives of the Russian government and develop cooperation. Among other things, the forms for readmission and enforcement, and possibilities for transfer of enforcement of sentence will be discussed. Cooperation between the Swedish and Russian police will be intensified.

Cooperation in the EU: To prevent new groundless applications for asylum from Russia, cooperation with other EU countries will be intensified.

Jan O. Karlsson will therefore raise the issue of enhanced visa cooperation at the EU meeting of Ministers for justice and home affairs in Luxembourg on Tuesday. Sweden will continue to actively press the Commission for the EU to bring about a readmission agreement with Russia.

New state-owned enterprise for more favourable export financing

The Government wants to start a new wholly-owned state enterprise to help Swedish companies obtain export orders abroad. The enterprise is intended to commence its operations after the turn of the year. The Minister for Trade, Mr Leif Pagrotsky, presented these plans today in connection with the 40th anniversary of the Swedish Export Credit Corporation.

The enterprise is being launched to give Swedish companies better chances of financing export business in important developing countries such as, for example, Brazil and Egypt. It will complement the current system for state-supported export credits which are handled by the Swedish Export Credit Corporation.

In some markets, wholly-owned state export financing enterprises are needed if exporting companies are to obtain favourable conditions in the buying country. With the new enterprise Swedish companies will enjoy equivalent conditions to those enjoyed by other countries' export companies.

"We want Swedish companies to be able to offer good financing possibilities all over the world," says Minister for Trade Leif Pagrotsky. "This will boost companies' chances of new orders and strengthen their competitiveness."

"At the moment it is a matter of making things easier for companies like Ericsson and ABB. It will also have significance for other Swedish companies on markets where special demands are made on financing," Mr Pagrotsky says.

Country strategy for development cooperation with East Timor

The Government today approved a country strategy for development cooperation with East Timor comprising SEK 100 million over a three-year period.

In the period 1999-2002 Sweden contributed over SEK 135 million to East Timor. At present 10 Swedish civilian police officers and 2 military observers are taking part in the UN peace-keeping mission in the country.

Sweden to give budget support to Uganda and Mozambique

The Government decided today to approve an allocation of SEK 65 million in budget support to

Uganda. It also gave the go-ahead for the final instalment – amounting to SEK 100 million for fiscal year 2002 – of budget support for a protracted period to Mozambique.

"Swedish budget support is an expression of the fact that our partnership with poor countries goes beyond debt relief. A big step towards a united Europe

"Now we can achieve the objectives we set during the Swedish Presidency of the EU in 2001. We had plenty of detractors back then who said it would be impossible to conclude the enlargement negotiations in 2002. The recommendations presented by the European Commission today show that we were right in drawing up our ambitious timetable", says Minister for Foreign Affairs Anna Lindh in a comment.

"The candidate countries have made impressive progress. Much still remains to be done. The candidates must continue to fight corruption, improve their work on the environment and strengthen their administrative and legal capacities. At this point, however, EU membership is the best guarantee for further reforms", says Anna Lindh.

The Commission bases its proposal on the progress made by the candidate countries, but also points out certain problems that need to be addressed before the countries join the EU. Ten out of a total of thirteen candidate countries are judged to be ready for accession in 2004. The present Member States are to adopt a position on the Commission's proposal at the EU summit in Brussels on 24-25 October. The final negotiations are to be concluded no later than the summit in Copenhagen in December.

The ten countries that the Commission proposes should conclude negotiations this year are Cyprus, the Czech Republic, Estonia, Hungary, Latvia, Lithuania, Malta, Poland, Slovakia and Slovenia. Romania and Bulgaria are considered to need more time for reforms before they can join the EU. Turkey is deemed not yet to meet the political conditions required by the EU before negotiations can be initiated.

Increased development cooperation with Central and Eastern Europe

In its 2003 Budget Bill, the Government proposes an increase in development assistance to Eastern Europe of SEK 50 million to a total of SEK 800 million for 2004. Cooperation will primarily focus on Estonia, Latvia, Lithuania, Russia, Ukraine and Belarus.

"What is important is to promote sustainable development throughout the Baltic Sea region, increase general prosperity and reduce the gaps created in the region during most of the twentieth century. The Government gives high priority to cooperation with countries in Central and Eastern Europe".

Substantial reinforcement of export promotion

In its 2003 Budget Bill, the Government proposes special investments in export promotion for 2003-2004. For 2003, export promotion will be allocated an additional SEK 52 million, over and

In its 2003 Budget Bill, the Government proposes special efforts for investment promotion in 2003-2004. For 2003, investment promotion will be allocated an additional SEK 13 million, over and above the SEK 5 million decided in the 2002 Budget Bill.

"These new resources will enable us to give the Invest in Sweden Agency (ISA) greater opportunities to attract foreign companies to Sweden. We want to strengthen the ISA's presence abroad, for example, through the permanent establishment of the ISA in China", says Minister for Trade Leif Pagrotsky.

"Foreign direct investments, know-how and technology are of major importance for growth and employment", says Leif Pagrotsky. "They are the motor for technological development, create new job opportunities and contribute to greater competition".

The Invest in Sweden Agency (ISA) is the central agency for investment-promoting measures in Sweden. Its operations focus on information campaigns, marketing projects in special target areas and regional cooperation and training. Target areas include IT, electronics and biological sciences. A new area planned for 2003 is "Intelligent systems for vehicle safety".

The Budget for 2003: Welfare Reforms, Jobs and Health

The outlook for the Swedish economy is good despite the international downturn. The promises that have been made can be kept. The expenditure ceilings will be met. The gross domestic product (GDP) is forecast to rise by 2.1 per cent this year and 2.5 per cent next year.

Open unemployment is expected to reach 3.9 per cent this year, with a further fall to 3.8 per cent next year. The employment rate is forecast to be 78 per cent next year. The Governments target is that 80 per cent of the population aged 20-64 shall be employed on the regular labour market in 2004. Additional measures will be proposed to help achieve this target.

Public finances continue to show surpluses. A surplus of 1.7 per cent of GDP is forecast this year and 1.5 per cent next year. The target is a surplus of 2 per cent of GDP on average over the business cycle. As resource utilisation in the economy is judged to be below the potential level, the surplus is considered to be in line with the target. The financial position of the public sector is steadily improving. Net debt became net wealth last year. Central government debt and consolidated gross debt are declining as a proportion of GDP.

The central government expenditure ceilings are expected to be met, just as they have been met every year since they were introduced five years ago. One of the purposes of the expenditure ceilings is to prevent temporarily higher income being used to motivate permanently higher expenditure. The growing rate of ill health is cause for concern. The Government is monitoring developments closely and intends to intervene if the expenditure ceilings come under threat.

The Budget Bill for 2003 focuses on work and growth, the fight against ill health and a number of welfare reforms. Extra resources to a total value of over SEK 19 billion will be devoted to schools, the health service, pensioners, families with children and other areas in 2003. A green tax shift worth SEK 2.6 billion will also be implemented, bringing higher taxes on environmentally harmful activities and lower taxes on labour.

In order to keep costs down in 2003, it is proposed that SEK 4 billion of area payments to farmers should be paid early, in 2002. Expenditure constraints totalling SEK 1.9 billion are also proposed, in areas including the defence sector and road investments. A general requirement to make economies of 0.7 per cent is being imposed on most central government authorities.

Work and growth

The Governments overall objective is full employment. Government programmes to promote growth and jobs build on a foundation made up of stable public finances, more education and research, improvements in tax legislation, increased construction of housing, investments in environmentally sound products and services and measures to ensure that Sweden continues to be an attractive country to invest in.

The Budget Bill includes the suggestion that a lowering of VAT costs for student accommodation and housing for the elderly should be tested. In addition, the Government intends to examine the possibility of implementing a similar VAT abatement for small rental apartments. Moreover, SEK 2.5 billion has been set aside at an earlier date to support rental housing construction in 2002-2006. The money available for investment grants for provision of student housing will be increased by SEK 125 million in 2003.

Efficient communications are an important ingredient in the Governments policy for growth. The Government presented an infrastructure bill in the autumn of 2001 announcing sharply higher investments SEK 364 billion in railways and roads between 2004 and 2015. A special type of support has been devised for municipalities to encourage the installation of a high-speed, high-capacity infrastructure for IT transmission in areas that are not commercially viable. This support will now be extended for an additional year.

Over SEK 350 million is being set aside for continued measures to promote more efficient energy use in 2003. SEK 300 million is being committed to support municipal projects to reduce carbon dioxide emissions in 2003, rising to SEK 400 million in 2004.

The Government is proposing to allocate SEK 50 million for the implementation of proposals presented by the Bennet Group. This measure is conditional on other actors also being prepared to commit resources.

Special efforts are being made to enable more immigrants to find jobs. The appropriation for the

Swedish National Labour Market Administration is to include special resources earmarked for extra staff whose specific role will be to strengthen the position on the labour market of people from foreign backgrounds.

The committee report proposing a reform of the Chapter 3, Section 12 regulations is still being circulated for comment. The Government wishes to reform the regulations so as to increase financial returns to people who take the risk of starting their own company and/or expanding their business. The Government also intends to introduce more generous tax rules in connection with generational changes at companies.

Vigorous measures to fight ill health

The Government has earlier presented an 11-point programme of measures in response to the sharp increase in the number of people on sick leave and disability pensions. This programme is now being further developed and will be followed up on a continuous basis. The cooperation of the social partners will be sought in the fight against ill health.

The Governments objective is to halve absence from working life due to sick leave between 2002 and 2008. Concurrently, the number of new cases of activity allowances and sickness benefits (early retirements) is to decline.

The Government has announced that it proposes to amend the regulations to give employers stronger economic incentives to take responsibility for working conditions and for preventive measures and rehabilitation. The principal purpose is to reduce the incidence of long-term sick leave. The aim is for a proposal to enter into force on 1 July 2003.

Everyone is to have their own personal contact at the social insurance office. The social insurance offices will receive an extra SEK 500 million per year in 2003 and 2004.

Preventive work environment efforts need to be reinforced. In 2003 SEK 45 million will be provided to the regional work safety representatives and to educational programmes for occupational health services. The supervisory function of the Swedish Work Environment Authority will also receive a boost of SEK 30 million.

Early retirement will always be subject to a time limit of three years. At the expiry of this period extension will be possible subject to a new examination. A person who has been granted early retirement but wants to test his or her capacity to work will be entitled to a dormant early retirement pension for two years instead of the present one.

Part-time sick leave shall be the first option when a person is granted sick leave. Employers are to face a more stringent obligation to provide rehabilitation documents after an employee has been on sick leave for 60 days. The responsibility of the employer to adapt the employees working duties is to be clarified.

A proposal will be put forward to introduce political and financial coordination encompassing social insurance offices, health and medical services, social services and the labour market authorities. Pending this measure, the Government proposes to allow the use of no more than five per cent of the estimated expenditure on sickness benefits for cooperation in the field of rehabilitation. This is equivalent to about SEK 2 billion.

One necessary condition for better health is prompt treatment by the health and medical services. Accordingly, additional resources are being made available to shorten queues and increase access, as presented in greater detail below.

The public sector must be an exemplary workplace. For this reason staffing ratios must increase and the working environment must improve. All employers with more than 10 employees will be required to submit health and working environment reports. Special trials are taking place at some of the major public sector employers aimed at preventing and reducing sickness absence.

Families with children

The final stage of the maximum childcare charges reform will be taken in 2003 when universal pre-school will be brought in for all 4-5-year-olds. This will mean that all children will have the right to attend pre-school free of charge for three hours a day.

The parental insurance system will be further reinforced. The minimum daily allowance will be raised to SEK 150 per day in 2003 and SEK 180 per day in 2004. On 1 July 2003, the ceiling on qualifying income in the sickness and parental insurance systems will be raised from 7.5 to 10 price base amounts, i.e. from SEK 24 000 to SEK 32 000. This will reduce the number of wage earners with incomes above the ceiling from about 1,2 million to about 490 000.

The upper secondary study grant will be extended from 9 to 10 months per year, giving a family with a teenager attending upper secondary school SEK 950 more per year.

The elderly

The new pension system that is coming in at the beginning of next year will give the pensioners with the lowest pensions about SEK 300-600 more each month. A new system of maintenance support for the elderly will be introduced in 2003 so as to guarantee all persons over the age of 65 who are resident in Sweden a certain minimum standard of living. Also in 2003, the means testing of widows pensions will be discontinued.

A total of SEK 50 million is being allocated to reinforce the supervision of elder care by introducing special safety representatives for the elderly.

Health and dental services

The special health care initiative already adopted by the Riksdag will be further pursued. In all, this will involve additional funds of SEK 9 billion between 2001 and 2004. These resources have been freed up mainly from the total defence. Furthermore, SEK 1.25 billion per year will be committed in 20022004 to reducing waiting times in the health service. In total this will mean extra resources of SEK 4.25 billion in 2003 and SEK 5.25 billion in 2004. As a step in the improvement of dental care support for the elderly, the available resources will be boosted by a further SEK 300 million in 2003.

More resources for schools

The school system will receive augmented resources to allow more staff to be employed. In the coming years, the level of support allocated to schools and after-school centres will be raised by SEK 1 billion per year until 2005 in an effort to put more teachers and other staff into the school system. In 2006 and subsequent years, the schools initiative will be worth SEK 5 billion.

Higher education will be strengthened

A special commitment is being made to strengthening higher education. The Governments long-term goal is that at least half the young people born in any year shall have embarked on university level studies by the age of 25. The expansion of higher education will have made room for nearly 100 000 more students between 1997 and 2003.

Beginning in 2003 a new system of adult study support will be brought in to replace the special education allowance. The estimated cost is SEK 2 billion per year. The support targets people over the age of 25 who have relatively little previous education, who either are or risk becoming unemployed or who have disabilities.

Central government allocations to research and postgraduate education will be raised by a total of SEK 1.5 billion between 2000 and 2004.

Higher education programmes in the humanities, social sciences, law and theology will receive an extra SEK 102 million for quality enhancement purposes, while health and social care programmes will receive SEK 193 million to improve quality. SEK 50 million per year is being allocated in 2002 to 2004 to encourage cooperation between universities, colleges and municipalities, aimed at boosting recruitment to higher education and generating sustainable growth in the regions.

Global solidarity

The budget for development assistance will increase by SEK 4.8 billion between 2002 and 2004.

This years Budget Bill raises development assistance from 0.74 per cent of gross national income (GNI) in 2002 to 0.81 per cent in 2003 and 0.86 per cent in 2004. Development assistance is forecast to rise from SEK 12 billion in 1998 to SEK 21 billion in 2004. The Governments ambition is to increase development assistance to 1 per cent of GNI during this term of office, the state of central government finances permitting.

SEK 155 million in 2003 and SEK 135 million in 2004 will be provided for processing of asylum applications by the Swedish Migration Board and the Aliens Appeals Board, so as to shorten the length of time applicants are kept waiting.

Law and order

The Government will follow through with its investment in the police force and judiciary. The police will receive SEK 170 million in 2003 and a further SEK 600 million in 2004 to finance a continued strengthening of the police force. The Swedish Prison and Probation Service will receive SEK 250 million per year in 2003 and 2004 to enable it to cope with the need for increased capacity and for other purposes. A special initiative will be undertaken to fight drugs in the prison and probation system, as part of the action plan on drugs. SEK 100 million is being set aside for this purpose during 2002-2004.

The Swedish Customs will receive additional resources SEK 15 million in 2003 and SEK 10 million in 2004 to enable it to take more effective measures against drug smuggling and other cross-border crime.

Support to local authorities

A large part of the welfare sector is organised by local authorities (municipalities and county councils), including schools, health care, child care and elder care. Apart from targeted support to schools and health care, local authorities will also receive some SEK 4 billion extra next year. The SEK 200 that everyone is to pay in state income tax in 2003 will be transferred to the municipalities and the county councils and the special employment support that has been given this year is to be extended so as to apply in 2003 as well. One of the intended applications of these extra resources is to help bring down long-term sick leave.

Moreover, to strengthen local authorities in areas with heavy population losses special government grants to a total value of SEK 400 million will be brought in for 2003 and 2004.

Taxes for environmental management the green tax shift

A continuation of the green tax shift is a key element in the Governments strategy for transforming Sweden into an ecologically sustainable society. The Budget Bill proposes a tax shift of SEK 2.6 billion in 2003. Total tax reductions and total tax increases are equal in size.

Tax increases

- · The tax on carbon dioxide will go up by SEK 0.10 per kilogram of CO2 to reach SEK 0.74 per kilogram.
- The energy tax on electricity will go up by SEK 0.021 to SEK 0.223 per kWh.
- · The tax on waste will be raised by SEK 82 per tonne to SEK 370 per tonne.
- The tax on natural gravel will be increased by SEK 5 per tonne to SEK 10 per tonne.

The first two tax increases will not apply to the mining and manufacturing and transport sectors.

Tax reductions

· Most of those who earn between SEK 53 600 and SEK 264 200 per year will be entitled to a higher basic deduction on their income tax return. The maximum possible increase will be SEK 3 600, equivalent to tax relief of approximately SEK 1 000 per year.

Alongside the green tax shift, another tax change is to be implemented for environmental reasons. To improve the conditions for electricity and heat production at thermal power stations, it is proposed that the tax on fuels at such plants should be lowered to the same reduced tax levels as apply to mining and manufacturing. At the same time, certain rules for thermal power taxation will be changed to limit the scope for unwanted tax avoidance.

The strategy for reduced taxation of alternative motor fuels will be further pursued. This will make abatements of both energy and carbon dioxide taxes possible for special pilot projects. In addition, general exemption from carbon dioxide taxation is proposed for carbon dioxide neutral fuels. The Government is awaiting EU approval. Pending such approval, terms that are competitive but do not distort competition must be guaranteed in 2003 in order to safeguard the supply of alternative fuels.

Changes in regulations for bringing in alcohol

Personal allowances for bringing in alcohol from EU countries are being upped in accordance with earlier decisions. From the beginning of next year onwards, travellers will be allowed to bring in 5 litres of spirits, 6 litres of fortified wine, 52 litres of wine and 64 litres of strong beer. The allowance for strong beer is also being changed for imports from countries outside the EU, so as to reach the intra-EU level of 64 litres.

Higher taxes on low-priced cigarettes

For reasons of public health it is important that the price of cigarettes is not too low. Low-priced cigarettes enjoy a substantial advantage under the present tax system, in which most of the tax is determined by the retail price. The introduction of a minimum tax on cigarettes is now proposed. The proposed level of the minimum tax is 90 per cent of the tax on cigarettes in the price category for which demand is strongest. This would mean an expected price increase of about SEK 3.50 per packet for low-priced cigarettes.

Halving the need for social welfare allowances

The Government has set the target of halving the need for social welfare allowances between 1999 and 2004, from a level corresponding to 115 200 individuals to 57 600 individuals. A progress report on this target is presented in a special appendix to the Budget Bill. The need fell by a level corresponding to some 25 000 individuals between 1999 and 2001. This means that the target is in reach. The need for social welfare allowances has declined most in groups where the need has been high (immigrants and young people). People born in other countries accounted for 60 per cent of the reduction between 1999 and 2001.

Swedens Economy 20022004

Swedens gross domestic product (GDP) is expected to increase by 2.1 per cent this year and 2.5 per cent next year. The Swedish economy performed well during the first half of 2002. The global economic recovery slowed somewhat during the summer, but is expected to strengthen again in the near future. The Swedish business sector has a good competitive position, enabling continued favourable export growth. Household consumption will continue to be stimulated in the future by rising incomes. Next year, open unemployment is expected to be 3.8 per cent. General government net lending is estimated at 1.7 per cent of GDP this year and 1.5 per cent next year. Unease on global financial markets has increased uncertainty regarding future economic developments.

International developments

Following the recovery at the end of last year and the beginning of this year, the global economy has slowed somewhat. Substantial stock market falls and irregularities in the corporate sector in the United States have reduced household and business confidence. In the United States, the expansionary economic policy will nevertheless contribute to growth of 2.3 per cent this year and 2.7 per cent next year. In the EU, an export-driven recovery is expected to lead to growth of 1.0 per cent this year and 2.3 per cent next year. The underlying problems in the Japanese economy remain and GDP will fall this year. Overall, global GDP growth is estimated to amount to just over 2.5 per cent this year and just over 3.5 per cent next year. Uncertainty regarding the development of the global economy is considerable.

Developments in Sweden 20022003

Exports have shown a marked increase so far this year. During the remainder of the year, exports of goods are expected to rise at a slightly slower rate. The Swedish krona is expected to strengthen to 127 according to the TCW index at the end of 2003 and then remain at around this level in 2004. Despite the anticipated strengthening of the krona, Swedish firms are expected to remain competitive thanks to strong productivity growth. Next year, global market growth is expected to approach the historical average level and exports of goods are forecast to rise by 6.4 per cent, compared with 5.3 per cent in 2002. Good

export growth combined with weak imports will contribute to foreign trade making a significant contribution to GDP growth this year. Next year, when destocking is completed, imports will rise relatively sharply and net foreign trade will dampen GDP growth somewhat.

Household consumption also developed strongly at the beginning of the year and is expected to be stimulated in the future, as previously, by high increases in disposable income and a stable real wealth position. Recent developments on the stock market may dampen the increase in consumption. Household consumption is estimated to rise by 2.0 per cent this year and 2.6 per cent next year.

Business sector investment will fall across the board this year. During the second half of the year, resource utilisation will gradually rise and business sector investment will increase again next year. Housing construction has accelerated and is expected to continue increasing at a good rate both this year and next year, while general government investment will rise, partly as a result of central government infrastructure investment. Total investment is expected to fall by 1.5 per cent this year, but to increase by 4.6 per cent next year.

General government consumption is estimated to increase by 1.7 per cent this year. Next year, central government consumption will decline, partly as a result of the proposed reduction in compensation for price and wage increases to central government authorities. Increasing tax revenues combined with the proposed grants to the local government sector mean that total general government consumption will nevertheless rise by 0.8 per cent in 2003.

The number of persons employed and open unemployment are both expected to remain at more or less the same level this year as in 2001. The anticipated economic strengthening will lead to a gradual increase in the demand for labour. This will be met, to some extent, by increasing overtime and reduced absence. Employment, measured in the number of persons, is forecast to rise by 0.2 per cent next year and open unemployment to fall to 3.8 per cent.

Since the temporary effects of last years supply problems have disappeared, inflation has declined to around 2 per cent. The anticipated reduction in import prices and the assumed dampening of the wage growth will contribute to restraining the forecast inflation. The gradually strengthening demand situation and higher trade margins are expected to have the opposite effect. Overall, consumer prices are expected to continue to increase in the future in line with the Riksbanks inflation target of 2 per cent.

Public finances

In 2001, general government net lending amounted to SEK 105 billion or 4.8 per cent of GDP. The high net lending last year was partly due to the incomplete allocation of tax revenue in the National Accounts, which overall increased reported net lending by just over SEK 50 billion or 2.5 per cent of

GDP. The accounting practice arises primarily as a result of variations in corporate profits and capital gains. Taxes on these are reported in the National Accounts with a one-year time lag. The exceptionally high level of tax revenue from corporate profits and capital gains in 2000 was consequently not reported in the National Accounts until 2001. Net lending is expected to fall sharply from 2001 to 2002, largely due to the substantial effect of accounting practice with tax revenue raising net lending in 2001. According to the National Accounts, net lending is expected to amount to 1.7 per cent of GDP this year, 1.5 per cent in 2003 and 1.6 per cent in 2004.

Adjusted for tax accruals, the business cycle and other temporary effects, a measure of the underlying, structural level of net lending is obtained. Structural net lending has gradually declined from 4 per cent in 2000 to 1.8 per cent in 2002. This development reflects tax cuts and other reforms, but also a sharp fall in tax revenue from corporate profits and capital gains. Structural net lending is estimated at 2.0 per cent of GDP in 2003 and 1.8 per cent in 2004, which is in line with the average surplus target of 2 per cent of GDP over the business cycle.

Tax revenue as a percentage of GDP will fall sharply between 2001 and 2002. This is partly due to tax cuts and partly to the substantial effect of accounting practice with tax revenue in 2001. The expenditure ratio, i.e. expenditure as a percentage of GDP, has fallen continuously since 1994 and was 54.4 per cent last year, which is the lowest level since 1976. The expenditure ratio is expected to rise slightly this year. In 2003, both revenue and expenditure will fall as a percentage of GDP, despite the fact that the change to a taxed guaranteed pension will raise both taxes and expenditure by 0.5 per cent of GDP. The fall in revenue and expenditure will continue in 2004.

The allocation of net lending between central government and the old-age pension system was affected in 2001 by the substantial transfer from the National Pension Funds to central government, as part of the financial phasing-in of the reformed old-age pension system. In 20022004, net lending in the pension system, i.e. the National Pension Funds and the premium pension system, is estimated to amount to over 2 per cent of GDP. This means that a sum in excess of the total surplus target for the whole general government sector will be used to build up the pension funds in preparation for the strain on resources expected in the future as a result of the demographic development. At the same time, central government net lending will show a deficit, while local government net lending will be in balance.

The surpluses in the general government sector will lead to a steady improvement in the financial position. Net debt was replaced last year by a positive balance. Central government debt and consolidated gross debt will fall as a percentage of GDP.

Medium-term estimates and alternative scenarios

For 2004, no assessment of the business cycle situation is made. Instead, three scenarios, differing already for 2002, are presented. In the base scenario, which is based on the short-term forecast discussed above, the recovery continues in 2004, when GDP is estimated to increase by 2.5 per cent. Open unemployment is forecast to remain at 3.8 per cent and the regular employment rate among people aged 2064 is forecast to be 78.0 per cent in 2004, i.e. below the governments target of 80 per cent.

In a high-growth scenario, wage formation in particular is assumed to function better than in the base scenario, and GDP growth can therefore be relatively high without inflation rising. In this scenario, the governments employment target is met in 2004. The effects of weaker international developments are illustrated in a low-growth scenario.

Deposits at Swedish foreign missions at the time of the Second World War and Nazi persecution

The Commission on Jewish Assets in Sweden at the Time of the Second World War presented its final report "Sweden and Jewish Assets" (Swedish Government Official Reports 1999:20) to the Minister for Foreign Affairs in March 1999. The task of the Commission was to find out whether property that had belonged to Jews killed in the Holocaust in one way or another had come into Swedish possession.

The Commission's final report recommended that further investigation should be carried out to ascertain whether such property had been deposited at Swedish foreign missions and never collected. A committee of inquiry into this matter has now completed its report. It was presented to the Minister for Foreign Affairs, Ms Anna Lindh, on 1 October. The inquiry, which was carried out by Ambassador Thomas Ganslandt, is based on a scrutiny of preserved records concerning primarily Germany and states annexed or occupied by Germany or allied with Germany in Europe at some stage of the Second World War.

The most essential conclusions of the committee are briefly as follows. The number of deposits at the missions studied appears to have varied from a very few or none at all to some hundred in Paris, about 150 in Budapest and perhaps a few hundred in Berlin. The depositors were both Swedes and citizens of countries for which Sweden was acting as protective power. Deposits by other foreign citizens were also accepted in certain cases.

Deposits of confirmed or probable Jewish origin identified by the committee at Swedish foreign missions can be established in Germany, Austria, Czechoslovakia, Hungary, Romania, Yugoslavia, France, Italy, Switzerland and Denmark. However, they are relatively few. Regarding Berlin 15-20 cases are involved. In Budapest it is a matter of some ten cases. The total number elsewhere amounts to just over 20 cases.

The deposits mainly comprised money, valuable documents, personal documents and valuables that

the depositors wanted to store in a safe place. Most of the deposits could be returned after the war. In Budapest, however, a considerable number of deposits were lost when the legation was plundered by Russian soldiers and others again during the chaotic situation there in the winter of 1945. Several of these were Jewish deposits. The war also caused losses of property at the consulate in Vienna. In other cities too, people were in contact after the war seeking deposits that could not be identified or found. As regards remaining deposits after the war that were not claimed, the Ministry for Foreign Affairs and missions abroad made great efforts to return them to their owners. The department at the Ministry dealing with matters concerning Sweden's undertakings as protective power during the Second World War – known as Department B – worked to this end until 1952. A few deposits from the period in question whose owners it has not been possible to identify, chiefly a few jewels and small valuables, are still kept in the Ministry archives. The committee has not been able to establish that any deposits still in the possession of the state can be proved to have belonged to people subject to the Nazi persecution.

Cuba to accede to non-proliferation treaty

Cuba has announced its decision to accede to the Treaty on the Non-Proliferation of Nuclear Weapons.

The treaty is a crucial instrument in international efforts to prevent the proliferation of nuclear weapons and promote disarmament. The Treaty on the Non-Proliferation of Nuclear Weapons (NPT) is a treaty dating from 1968 whose aim is to prevent the proliferation of nuclear weapons to countries other than the five nuclear-weapon states (the United States, Russia, China, France and the UK).

The NPT requires states that are parties to the treaty to enter into agreements with the UN's International Atomic Energy Agency on the monitoring of their nuclear installations.

The treaty also contains provisions regarding negotiations on nuclear disarmament. At a meeting in 2000 the parties to the treaty adopted a 13-step action plan for the elimination of nuclear weapons.

Swedish contribution to fighting peat fires in Lithuania

Pagrotsky wants to create an international centre for simplified trade and customs procedures

The Ministry for Foreign Affairs has decided to allocate SEK 88000 to the Board of Customs to finance a feasibility study for establishing Göteborg as a "centre of excellence" for simplified trade and customs procedures. The decision is part of the Minister for Trade's vision of making Göteborg the most efficient centre of commerce in the world.

International studies show that various types of trade procedures can cost between 2.5 and 15 per cent of the value of the exported or imported goods. On the assessment of the National Board of Trade, procedures connected with imports and exports cost Swedish enterprises and official authorities more than SEK 35 billion in 2001, a figure that makes Sweden one of the very least expensive countries. The customs-related expenses alone come to over SEK 3 billion or SEK 344 for each Swedish citizen. This is in spite of the fact that the Swedish customs are even now considered to be perhaps the most efficient and least bureaucratic customs authority in the world. For the EU as a whole, customs-related expenses amount to a total sum in the region of SEK 75 billion.

"I want to bring the costs of trade bureaucracy down even further to boost the competitiveness of Swedish industry. This year the Board of Customs has launched the world's simplest and least bureaucratic customs system – the 'Service Steps' system. This is a great advantage to Swedish business and I want to build on this success and make it an attractive option for foreign enterprises as well to transfer parts of their international customs processing to Sweden", says Minister for Trade Leif Pagrotsky.

"The Board of Customs sets an international standard for simple and speedy electronic customs processing, the port of Göteborg is the leading transport and logistics centre in the Nordic countries and Sweden is a world leader in IT. As I see it, if we work together there is every prospect of making Göteborg the world's leading centre of excellence for simplified trade procedures", says Leif Pagrotsky.

In the aftermath of the terrorist attacks in the USA a year ago, the USA has tightened its security requirements for containers operating in US ports. The US authorities will give priority to the 20 largest ports in the world for direct transport to and from the USA in the future. The port of Göteborg is not on this list.

"We must ensure that Göteborg is not discriminated against", said Minister for Trade Leif Pagrotsky during a visit to the port of Göteborg on Tuesday. "This is why I have taken the initiative for negotiations between Sweden and the USA on an agreement that ensures that direct transport from Göteborg to US ports is able to continue without unnecessary delay and extra red tape. It goes without saying that we shall do all that we can to meet US security requirements".

A request for negotiations will be submitted to the US authorities by Sweden's Embassy in Washington this week.

"We cannot risk our exports taking so long that Göteborg and Sweden lose their competitiveness", continues Leif Pagrotsky. "The USA is Sweden's most important export market, and Göteborg is Scandinavia's largest container port by far, potentially capable of further growth". Göteborg currently deals with 14 000 containers per year for transport to the USA.

Government wants more people trained in export sales

For a number of years, the Swedish Trade Council has been running a very successful training programme in export sales. The Government now wants to expand this training programme to concentrate on new markets in which Swedish companies are keen to increase their activities. The Government has therefore instructed the Swedish Trade Council to undertake a study during the autumn into how an advanced training programme for about 100 people and in cooperation with interested companies could be designed.

The programme targets young graduates with linguistic and cultural knowledge of the relevant countries.

The project's objective is to train 100 people in export sales in 2003 and 2004 mainly for markets requiring specific language skills and where the expertise of people of immigrant backgrounds would be a particular advantage. These markets include Poland, Russia and other neighbouring markets as well as more distant and dynamic markets such as China, Japan and Korea.

The training programme is of six months' duration and includes both theory and traineeships at companies interested in participating in this programme. These companies will bear part of the costs involved.

"We need to make use of the expertise that exists around the country with regard to foreign language skills and knowledge of other cultures, especially amongst our immigrants," says Minister for Trade Leif Pagrotsky. Sweden takes initiative to break the deadlock in disarmament negotiations

Today, Sweden together with Algeria, Belgium, Chile and Colombia present a joint proposal to break the deadlock in international disarmament negotiations, which for several years have been blocked by differences of opinion, primarily between China and the USA.

"The disarmament conference must yield results when it continues early next year", says Minister for Foreign Affairs Anna Lindh. "It is unacceptable that a few countries are able to delay these efforts. Our proposal is a reasonable compromise that takes into account the interests of all the countries participating. By presenting it, we want to help the negotiations make a fresh start".

The impasse in the disarmament negotiations is the result of dissatisfaction with the working programme of the conference on the part of China, the USA and a small number of other countries. The dispute is primarily about how the issue of armaments in outer space should be dealt with. China demands immediate negotiations, while the USA can only accept preliminary discussions. The compromise proposal presented today in Geneva, means that negotiations will deal with four central issues simultaneously. These four issues are: a prohibition against the manufacture of plutonium and weapons-grade uranium, nuclear disarmament, security guarantees for countries without nuclear weapons, and finally, armaments in space. The proposal has a chance of obtaining widespread support, since it is the first compromise to be presented by different groups of countries in cooperation with each other.

Pagrotsky: the USA must amend its legislation, which is against WTO rules

On Friday, the WTO established that the EU is entitled to impose punitive tariffs against the USA worth approximately USD 4 billion per year, because US fiscal legislation for so-called Foreign Sales Corporations involves illegal export subsidies. This is the largest penalty ever to be imposed in connection with the WTO.

"This will put pressure on the USA to amend its legislation", comments Minister for Trade Leif Pagrotsky. "I hope that we will avoid ending up in a situation in which the EU is forced to impose punitive tariffs. So long as the USA makes serious efforts to live up to its WTO commitments, there is no cause for haste".

The EU Commission will now consult with European industry to compile the final punitive tariff lists regarding US exports.

"I will do my best to ensure that the effects on Swedish companies are as mild as possible", says Leif Pagrotsky.

Sweden launches international task force on global public goods

This evening Sweden, along with France and UNDP, will launch an international task force on global public goods. This will take place at a seminar at the World Summit on Sustainable Development in Johannesburg at 18.00-20.30.

"The international community must adopt a more concordant approach to the increasingly complex international cooperation on various global public goods such as clean air, water, financial stability, health, peace and security. At UN conferences such as the ongoing one in Johannesburg there is a lot of talk on what we want to achieve. But how do we actually do it? On a national level we have our public sector. Internationally we have to find other ways to identify and tackle global problems, State Secretary for International Development Cooperation Ms. Gun-Britt Andersson says. Sweden, France and UNDP are therefore launching an "International Task Force on Global Public Goods". Its task will be to investigate how the most important global public goods are provided today and to propose how these crucial issues can be more effectively handled and financed to

combat poverty and contribute to sustainable development.

The group will consist of 10-15 experts from governments, international organisations, civil society, the business sector and the academic world. A secretariat, under the leadership of a Swede, Sven Sandström, a former Managing Director of the World Bank, will be established in Stockholm. A reference group under the leadership of State Secretary Gun-Britt Andersson – "The Friends of the Task Force" - will also be linked to the task force.

Today Sweden will become a member of the cooperation on observation flights, the so-called Open Skies Agreement. The Agreement entered into force on 1 January 2002 and Sweden was the first new state to apply for membership on 4 January 2002. The Government approved the Agreement five months later.

Open Skies is a cooperation within the framework of conventional arms control and is legally binding. Member countries allow each other to carry out, at short notice, observation flights over all areas in their territories. Since 1999 Sweden has conducted several observation flights in the spirit of the Agreement.

Twenty-seven countries were originally signatories of the Agreement, which was signed in Helsinki in 1992. In those days, only members of NATO and the former Warsaw Pact were allowed to participate. When the Agreement entered into force, it was opened to all member states of the Organisation for Security and Cooperation in Europe (OSCE).

Work on forming opinions is also extremely important. Here, Lukas Moodysson's new film Lilja 4-ever will play an important role", says Anna Lindh.

According to the UN, more than half a million women and children are smuggled into the EU every year, and the sex trade has an annual turn-over of billions of crowns.

Anna Lindh welcomes the proposal to remove Swedes from the UN sanctions list

Today Sweden and the USA will each submit requests for two Swedish nationals, who have had their assets frozen and been restricted from travelling, to be removed from the UN list of persons and organisations suspected of connections with the Taliban, Al-Qaida etc. In doing this, a conclusive step has been taken for the sanctions against the two men to be lifted. "I welcome the fact that the USA is now prepared to take this initiative to have the two Swedes removed from the UN list of sanctions, and am confident that the UN sanctions committee will take the same line. As a result, the two men can look forward to soon being able to return to a normal life, after having endured a long and difficult period. At the same time, Sweden, the USA and the lawyers involved will continue to work to bring about a new examination of the third Swede's case, so that he can also be removed from the list", says Minister for Foreign Affairs, Anna Lindh. "Today's results show that our efforts on behalf of the Swedes, and for greater statutory rights in connection with sanctions, have borne fruit. Other evidence of progress is the regulatory framework that has been adopted by the UN sanctions committee to make it easier for people on whom sanctions have been imposed to state their case, and the rules expected to be adopted shortly allowing exemptions from the sanctions for personal use. The Government has long been working to achieve these changes and will continue to be proactive in work with statutory rights issues in the UN and the EU to reduce the risk of individuals being caught in between". <hr>

Each of the Swedish and US requests for the two Swedes to be removed from the list are to be submitted to the chairman of the UN sanctions committee. The case will be presented to the sanctions committee tomorrow (Friday), and its members will then have 48 hours to present possible objections.

When the Swedes have been removed from the UN sanctions list, the EU Commission must also take a decision to remove them from the equivalent EU list. The Government will work actively to ensure that this takes place as soon as possible. When the Commission has made its decision, the travel restrictions and freezing of the Swedish citizens' assets will be discontinued.

Anna Lindh condemns death sentence in Nigeria

"I am greatly dismayed that a woman has been sentenced to stoning in the year 2002", says Minister for Foreign Affairs Anna Lindh.

"I have raised the issue of capital punishment with the Nigerian Government on a number of occasions, most recently at my meeting with Foreign Minister Lamido in Stockholm earlier this year. Sweden has also pursued this issue through EU channels", continues the Minister for Foreign Affairs.

"It is gratifying that the Federal Government of Nigeria has clearly stated that it considers this type of punishment to be incompatible with the country's constitution. This being so, I have sent a letter to the Foreign Minister of Nigeria today, calling on the Federal Government to support Amina Lawal so as to ensure that the continued process of appeal has a satisfactory outcome", concludes Anna Lindh.

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It was yesterday (Monday) that the Court of Appeal for Sharia cases in the State of Katsina rejected an appeal by the Nigerian woman Amina Lawal, thereby upholding her conviction to execution by stoning. Amina Lawal has been tried and found guilty of having a child outside of wedlock. Her lawyers have announced that they intend to appeal the judgement. They have 30 days in which to lodge an appeal.

After this there will be a further easing of restrictions for the Palestinians. At the same time, the Palestinian National Authority will be given great responsibility for the security situation.

"It is important that both parties make use of this opportunity to bring an end to the violence. This is a precondition for the plan to succeed", maintains Anna Lindh.

"The parties must also make use of this chance for further progress. The talks on the Palestinian reform process, to be held in Paris in the middle of the week, are another step in the right direction. It is now vital that this becomes the beginning of a political process that leads to negotiations, to an end to the occupation and to the goal of two states, Israel and Palestine, in peaceful coexistence", stresses Anna Lindh.

"I think there is enormous unexploited potential in marketing Sweden as a culinary and food-producing nation", said Minister for Trade Leif Pagrotsky on Friday in a speech at the House of Culinary Art in Grythyttan in connection with the Swedish Cookery Book Day. "Greater attention should be given to the creativity and professionalism that have yielded both success and publicity in connection with international competitions and other contexts in recent years." "I believe that this could have considerable benefits, not only for the Swedish food industry and restaurant owners. Last year Swedish food exports amounted to SEK 25 billion. This is more than double the figure of previous years. Agriculture, the food industry and the catering trade employ 175 000 people in Sweden today.

This is an important future sector for Sweden. We already export food for more than twice as much as we sell lorries for. Why not take up the challenge of motor-car exports? Last year these amounted to just over SEK 40 billion.

Bush trade mandate increases chances of success in current WTO negotiations

Last night, Swedish time, President Bush was granted a so-called Trade Promotion Authority (previously called a Fast-Track Authority) after a decision by the Senate. This is the first time in eight years for a US President to be granted this authority.

"President Bush's mandate is an important breakthrough. With this decision backing it, the USA can also be regarded as a credible partner in the negotiations. This is a precondition for our being able to modernise the world trade system. Up to now, the EU has been relatively alone in bearing responsibility for leadership, while the USA has been on the sidelines. Let us also hope that this can be the beginning of a generally less protectionist policy on the part of the USA", says Minister for Trade Leif Pagrotsky.

The decision means that both the Senate and the House of Representatives have now agreed to give the President greater authority to negotiate on behalf of the USA. It means, briefly, that the US Congress must approve or reject, in their entirety, future trade agreements that the President is expected to conclude with other countries, for example within the framework of the current round of negotiations in the World Trade Organisation (WTO). It will give the President considerably more leeway in these negotiations and increase the chance of the USA reaching agreement with its trade partners.

To guarantee openness about trade rules and reduce the risk of trade conflicts the WTO carries out regular reviews of members' trade policy. This week the EU's trade policy was reviewed. The EU is praised for its tariff reductions and efforts to bring about new WTO negotiations. At the

The EU is praised for its tariff reductions and efforts to bring about new WTO negotiations. At the same time criticism is made of its considerable use of anti-dumping rules and continued barriers to trade for agricultural products and textiles and clothing.

"It is gratifying that the positive development is noted. I hope our success in opening EU borders for trade can inspire others to do the same," the Minister for Trade, Mr Leif Pagrotsky, says in a comment.

"At the same time we make no secret of the fact that for Sweden's part we would like to go further. Free trade is good for everyone. It benefits both us consumers and poor farmers in developing countries."

The general level of tariffs in the EU has been reduced since the review of policy two years ago and the Union's efforts to build support for the launch of a new round of trade negotiations in the WTO met with praise. Furthermore, last year's Swedish initiative for free trade with the least developed countries was noted.

To make it easier for developing countries to make use of access to the European market, the Swedish government presented a proposal for the establishment of a trade ombudsman. The task of the ombudsman would be to guide developing country exporters through the EU jungle of administrative rules. The proposal has gained a great deal of attention in Brussels.

"It would be a major step in the right direction," Mr Pagrotsky says.

Jan O. Karlsson criticises US decision

The Minister for Development Cooperation, Migration and Asylum Policy, Mr Jan O. Karlsson, today criticised the USA's decision to withdraw its support of USD 34 million to the United Nations Population Fund (UNFPA).

"The decision is deeply deplorable. The UNFPA carries out extremely important work for women's rights and particularly in the fight against HIV/AIDS. The withdrawal of US support can have serious consequences for these operations. It will above all affect those who are already most vulnerable, namely women in poor countries," Jan O. Karlsson says.

The decision has also met with protests from the EU which stresses the importance of the UNFPA's work. The European Commission will now increase its support to the UNFPA by EUR 32 million. The support will not cover the budget reduction caused by the US decision but will considerably alleviate the difficult consequences. It is directed at specific measures in the countries most affected where the mortality rate among new mothers is highest.

"I am pleased that the European Commission is now taking action and supporting the UNFPA but this does not relieve the USA of its responsibility. It is only a short-term solution. In the long term it is indefensible that the USA breaks its commitments in this way. It is a question of global responsibility and solidarity. The EU is now demonstrating that we are willing to assist. We will show the USA that this responsibility is also theirs," the Minister says.

On the initiative of Sweden and Luxembourg, at the end of May the EU unanimously adopted a statement in support of the UNFPA. With reference to the US decision on Monday the EU Presidency again expressed the importance of UNFPA work.

"It ultimately concerns women's rights, women's power over their own bodies. Efforts to prevent unwanted pregnancies, unsafe abortions, deaths in childbirth, venereal diseases and increased child mortality will now be rendered more difficult," Mr Karlsson says.

The EU Commission decided today to appoint a Swede, Jörgen Holmquist, Director-General for Fisheries. Jörgen Holmquist will move from his present position at the Budget Directorate General, where he has been Deputy Director-General.

"It is very pleasing that Sweden can again take up a Director-General's post on the Commission – in an area, moreover, where major interests are at stake in the coming years. It is impressive of Jörgen Holmquist to be promoted to Director-General now, after just one year as Deputy Director-General. We are pleased about this, but we're not satisfied yet. There are many well-qualified Swedes serving on the EU Commission and we expect to see more of them appointed to leading positions in future", says Minister for Foreign Affairs Anna Lindh.

In his capacity as Director-General, Holmquist will join the group of just over thirty Directors-General who meet every week to discuss issues and take decisions that have an impact on the entire range of Community policies.

The fisheries policy, like agricultural and trade policy, is an area in which the Community has exclusive competence, which makes it particularly vital that cooperation between the EU Commission and the Member States functions well. The fisheries policy also plays an important role in the Community's relations with the world around it and in ensuring sustainable development of our natural resources. This means substantial coordination is required with other areas such as development assistance, the environment and the budget.

The Commission has recently presented proposals for a far-reaching reform of the EU fisheries policy and this will be a subject for intensive negotiations between EU Member States in the autumn.

Leif Pagrotsky welcomes decision not to escalate steel conflict

"Sweden welcomes the EU Commission proposal not to further escalate the steel conflict with the United States. Now we can wait and see what action the United States chooses to take during the next month. I expect further exemptions from and restrictions in the American measures concerning important Swedish products," says Minister for Trade Leif Pagrotsky in a comment.

"The fall of the dollar and the financial scandals in the United States have fundamentally changed the picture. It would not be responsible to escalate the situation in the sensitive position the world economy now finds itself. Furthermore, the American companies' need for protection has diminished and the number of exemptions can be expected to increase," continues the Minister for Trade.

"A greater number of tariffs benefits neither the companies nor the consumers, who are of course the ones who will have to pay higher prices in the end," says Mr Pagrotsky.

The EU Commission has the support of the Member States in submitting a proposal to the Council of Ministers on postponing the decision concerning the EU's countermeasures in the steel conflict with the United States. The decision has been preceded by intensive consultations among the Member States.

A ministerial decision is expected instead after the United States has concluded its considerations regarding steel tariff exemptions which will continue until 31 August.

Sweden donates medical equipment to the UN

UN appeals for support for efforts in southern Africa

The UN today launched an appeal for support for the measures required to avert an acute food crisis in southern Africa. The UN has estimated that USD 614 million is needed for these measures. USD 507 million of this refers to direct food assistance. The remainder is for efforts inter alia in agriculture, water, health care, education as well as the transport and distribution of food. Sweden already contributes extensive humanitarian support to southern Africa. It amounts to SEK 62 million for 2002. In June the Swedish International Development Cooperation Agency, Sida, allocated a further SEK 50 million to be able to support the UN as soon as an appeal was made. The

Government is prepared to consider the allocation of additional funds if needed to avert the crisis. Sweden's support will primarily be used for so-called non-food assistance as the major food producing countries contribute most of the food support.

"Great responsibility rests on the countries of the world since we can avert a human tragedy in southern Africa if the international community properly responds to the UN appeal," the Minister for Development Cooperation, Mr Jan O. Karlsson, says.

"13 million people, 2.3 million of whom are children under the age of 5, are in danger of being affected if the necessary measures are not taken to combat the looming food crisis. This is naturally about food, but also about managing health care, and the transport and distribution of food. The political will for governments to work together is also necessary so that political disagreement and bureaucracy do not obstruct relief work," says Mr Karlsson.

"The current crisis is not solely a matter of drought and weather conditions. Political mismanagement, poverty and HIV/AIDS have considerably exacerbated the situation. It is not simply a coincidence that Zimbabwe is the most badly hit. If we do not tackle these problems on a long-term basis, we can be sure that the food crisis will recur. Sweden recently adopted a regional strategy for southern Africa, a strategy that includes directing attention at these problems," says Mr Karlsson.

Two Swedes removed from US sanctions list

The American OFAC authority (Office for Foreign Assets Control) has announced that it intends to remove two Swedish citizens who have had travel restrictions imposed on them and have had their assets frozen from the list of persons and organisations that are suspected of collaboration with the Taliban, Al Qaida, etc. A decision from the UN Sanctions Committee can be expected as soon as all the formalities are completed.

-"We are pleased that the United States has reconsidered the decision about sanctions against the two Swedes. This means that a long and difficult period is now over for them. It would have been even better had the United States changed its mind about all three. The Government will therefore be requesting that the United Nations remove all three from its sanctions list," says Minister for Foreign Affairs Anna Lindh.

"Sweden has been actively pressing for a long time, in the UN, the EU as well as in its contacts with the American authorities, to improve the legal rights of the individual in decisions by the sanctions committees. The decision concerning the Swedes is evidence that improvements can be brought about. The Government will continue to pursue legal rights issues in the United Nations and the EU in order to reduce the risk of private individuals faring badly in the future," says Ms Lindh.

Once the Swedes have been removed from the UN sanctions list, the EU Commission must also take the decision to withdraw them from the EU sanctions list which is not the same as the UN's. The Government will make efforts to ensure this happens as quickly as possible. When the

Commission has made its decision, the travel restrictions and the freezing of the Swedish citizens' assets will be discontinued.

Anna Lindh regrets UN decision on International Criminal Court

"I welcome the fact that the United Nations Security Council made a decision last night that will make possible the continued presence of the peace-keeping forces and continued police operations in Bosnia," says Minister for Foreign Affairs Anna Lindh.

"It is regrettable however that this decision means that personnel in UN peace-keeping operations from the nations that have not joined the International Criminal Court (ICC) cannot be the subject of investigation by the International Criminal Court for the next year. Sweden has warmly supported the establishment of ICC from the beginning. We consider, therefore, that it is wrong in principle to temporarily exclude personnel from certain states from the jurisdiction of the Court. There is the risk that confidence in the Court and in the peace-keeping operations will be affected negatively. It is my hope that the temporary decision will not be extended next year and that the damage will thus be limited," says the Minister for Foreign Affairs.

Sweden becomes WTO; Is largest donor nation

The Government decided today to allocate SEK 8 million to the World Trade Organisation (WTO) fund for trade assistance measures. Sida has previously contributed SEK 8 million. Today; s decision means a doubling of Sweden; s allocation compared with last year.

"At the WTO meeting in Qatar; s capital Doha in November, we established that the focus should be on the interests of the developing countries. Sweden; s increased contribution to the WTO fund shows that we are serious. All WTO members should be able to benefit from their membership,;" says Minister for Trade Leif Pagrotsky.

WTO member countries have promised to contribute SEK 150 million. Sweden is responsible for some ten per cent of these contributions and is the largest donor to the WTO fund.

The money in the fund will be used for training representatives of developing countries in the various areas of WTO work. The focus is on the negotiations that are taking place currently (everything from negotiations on WTO membership, agricultural trade, market access for industrial products and intellectual property rights to agreements on investments and competition), strengthened analysis capacity and the implementation of agreements previously entered into. The Swedish Government is also strengthening support to the other international organisations that provide trade-related development assistance. This includes:

- -SEK 8 million to the United Nations Conference on Trade and Development (UNCTAD) to promote the investment climate and the fight against corruption in developing countries, as well as the capacity of the developing countries to negotiate an investment agreement in WTO,
- SEK 10 million to the International Trade Centre (ITC) to strengthen the ability of entrepreneurs in the least developed countries to export to the EU,
- SEK 3 million to the Integrated Framework (cooperation between the World Trade Organisation, UNCTAD, the International Trade Centre, the United Nations Development Programme, the World Bank and the International Monetary Fund) to integrate trade issues into the developing countries; poverty strategies,
- -SEK 2 million to the Advisory Centre on WTO Law (ACWL) in Geneva to help the developing countries make use of the WTO dispute settlement system.

As well as the contributions the Government is making to international organisations, Sida is an important actor in the work of strengthening the developing countries; trade policy capacity, as well as in supporting the developing countries; export sector and facilitating the flow of trade from the developing countries. During 2001, Sida contributed SEK 120 million to activities in this area.

Sweden commits EUR 10 million to environment and nuclear safety in North-West Russia

Sweden is committing EUR 10 million (close to SEK 100 million) to the environmental fund that has been set up to take care of nuclear waste and other problems in North-West Russia.

"There are urgent environmental initiatives to be taken in Russia and for several years now Sweden has been extensively involved in assisting Russia and has been a leading force in these efforts", says Minister for Trade Leif Pagrotsky in a comment.

At the conference on assistance held today by the Northern Dimension Environmental Partnership (NDEP) in Brussels, it was announced that Denmark, Finland, the Netherlands, Norway, Russia, Sweden and the EU Commission are to put a total of EUR 110 million into the fund.

"Today's conference is an important step in mobilising the international community to carry out environmental efforts in North-West Russia. Not only economic initiatives, but also international agreements regulating such matters as issues of responsibility will be needed to tackle the problems of nuclear waste", continues Leif Pagrotsky.

The environmental investments will relate to both traditional environmental projects such as water and sewage treatment and action to manage nuclear waste from decommissioned Russian submarines and other sources.

The NDEP is a cooperative arrangement between the European Development Bank, the Nordic Investment Bank, the World Bank, the EU Commission and Russia.

Jan O. Karlsson on the food crisis in southern Africa

At a press meeting during political week at Almedalen in Visby, Gotland, today, Minister for Development Cooperation, Migration and Asylum Policy Jan O. Karlsson spoke about the acute food crisis in southern Africa. The crisis is worse than had previously been anticipated, but Sweden and a number of international institutions are prepared to take action as soon as the collective UN appeal is presented. The United Nations is expected to present its appeal on 15 July but has already released the preliminary news that it will be in the region of SEK 5–6 billion.

"13 million people, 2.3 million of whom are children under the age of 5, are in danger of being affected if the countries at risk and the rest of the world do not act decisively to prevent the threatening food crisis. This is naturally about food, but also about managing its transport and distribution, and about health care. The political will for governments to work together is also necessary so that political disagreement and bureaucracy do not obstruct relief work," says Mr Karlsson.

"It is important that the main responsibility lies with the United Nations so that the relief efforts are coordinated. Sida has already taken the decision, therefore, to allocate SEK 50 million to provide support as quickly as possible. The Government is prepared to consider decisions on further economic resources if necessary," says Mr Karlsson.

"The current crisis is not solely a matter of drought and weather conditions. Political mismanagement, poverty and HIV/AIDS have made the situation considerably worse. It is not simply a coincidence that Zimbabwe is the most badly hit. If we do not tackle these problems on a long-term basis, we can be sure that the food crisis will recur. Sweden recently adopted a regional strategy for southern Africa, a strategy that includes directing attention at these problems," says Mr Karlsson.

Southern Africa is facing one of the most serious food crises for ten years. Twelve million people in Zimbabwe, Mozambique, Malawi and Zambia are risking starvation. The situation could lead to a catastrophe that lasts until the spring of 2003. The drought is only one explanation; political and economic factors are also important issues. At the same time, the spread of HIV/AIDS is making the situation more complicated than similar situations in the past. The world's countries and several UN bodies are now making plans and mobilising resources whilst a number of non-governmental organisations are planning their own operations.

A collective appeal to the world's countries by the UN is expected to be presented on 15 July. The United Nations World Food Programme has already sent out a preparatory appeal which states the extent of the help that is necessary to avert the crisis.

Karlsson is extending an invitation to a press meeting in Almedalen, Visby, on 8 July to discuss the reasons behind the situation and the extent of the problem, and to speak about what Sweden and the rest of the world is doing to counter the famine catastrophe that is threatening.

Government welcomes extended mandate for the UN police force in Bosnia

"We welcome the extension of the mandate for the UN police force in Bosnia to 15 July. This will provide scope for further negotiations aimed at finding a solution to the crisis resulting from the US opposition to the International Criminal Court (ICC)", say Minister for Foreign Affairs Anna Lindh and Minister for Defence Björn von Sydow in a joint statement.

"It is also satisfying that the original proposal regarding immunity for participants in the peace-keeping operations was not adopted by the Security Council. We in the EU have been concerned to uphold the integrity and legitimacy of the ICC and to safeguard UN peace-keeping operations. The clear and concerted action on the part of the EU has played an important role in the lead-up to the decision taken by the Security Council last night."

The United Nations Security Council adopted Resolution 1421, extending the present mandate of the UNMIBH until 15 July, by a unanimous vote on 3 July. The United States accepted this compromise solution when it became clear that its proposed resolution would not win sufficient support to be adopted by the Security Council.

"It is highly regrettable that a link has been made between the ICC and UN peace-keeping operations, as this threatens to complicate continued American participation in peace-keeping. It is important that the United States joins in future peace-keeping operations", emphasise Lindh and von Sydow. The two ministers express the hope that the opposition demonstrated by the Security Council may lead the US to reconsider its attitude towards the ICC, bearing in mind that the prime purpose of the court is to strengthen international law.

The United States has urged that personnel engaged in UN operations should enjoy a general exemption from prosecution for war crimes or other serious offences under ICC jurisdiction. If a proposal of this kind had been approved, it would have had consequences not only for the legitimacy of the ICC but also for the credibility of the UN and the Security Council, and would have risked undermining confidence in personnel engaged in international operations.

"It is gratifying that the EU has acted in concert, as this enhances the credibility of the common foreign and security policy. Sweden and other EU countries have made determined efforts to promote the establishment of the International Criminal Court. International law embraces us all. Equality before the law is the corner-stone of a just global community", say ministers Lindh and von Sydow.

In a broader perspective, the resolution proposed by the United States threatens to cripple peace-support operations, whether under UN or EU leadership. To a certain extent, the development of an EU military crisis management capacity is conditional on close cooperation with NATO, especially as regards the potential use by the EU of existing NATO resources in planning and directing any military intervention. Such cooperation could be seriously complicated by the fact that US personnel hold a number of crucial positions on the NATO staffs that would be called upon if the need arose to assist the EU in planning and directing a military crisis management action. In the opinion of Minister for Defence von Sydow and Minister for Foreign Affairs Lindh, "any

such development would be very serious, as it threatens to paralyse all peace-support operations in their present form".

A new US proposal would restrict immunity to personnel from states that are not parties to the Treaty of Rome. However, this proposal too would have similar consequences.

AIDS spreading most rapidly in countries adjacent to Sweden

In Stockholm on Tuesday, the UN is to present its latest report on the AIDS epidemic in the world. "The report shows that the decline in the spread of the epidemic that many had predicted or hoped for was wishful thinking," says Minister for Development Cooperation, Migration and Asylum Policy Jan O. Karlsson.

According to the UNAIDS report, it is not only in Africa that the AIDS epidemic is growing. The disease is spreading most rapidly in countries adjacent to Sweden, in Eastern Europe and in other parts of the former Soviet Union. According to Mr Karlsson, the EU bears a major responsibility for stopping the spread of HIV/AIDS in Eastern Europe. But increasingly less attention is being paid to AIDS in the EU.

"There is a kind of 'All clear' thinking in the rich countries. In its wake there are also danger signals in Sweden that fewer people are protecting themselves when they have sex."

The area in the world that is worst affected is sub-Sahara Africa where there are two thirds of the people who live with HIV/AIDS.

"The fight against AIDS is the most important development issue in the world today," says Mr Karlsson. "Measures will be tailor-made in order to reach the families that have been affected by HIV/AIDS."

Support will also be given to, among other things, research, higher education, cooperation in fighting HIV/AIDS, networks for journalists and organisations that can carry out human rights work. African priorities and development plans will serve as guidance for Swedish support. Coordination with other donors, particularly the EU, is emphasised in the decision.

- What is positive about President George W. Bush's speech is that the United States is indicating strong support for a Palestinian state and for the Palestinians on humanitarian, economic and political levels. He speaks clearly about a Palestinian state being established within a relatively short period of time three years and that is good.
- It is also good that President Bush is unequivocal about continued occupation threatening Israel's identity and democracy and that this occupation must therefore be brought to an end in accordance with UN Resolutions 242 and 338, and that the issues of Jerusalem and the refugees must be solved, that the Israeli settlements must be stopped and the Palestinian funds repaid.
- One problem is that conditions are being made regarding who is to be the Palestinian leader and this is something we cannot support. No-one other than the Palestinians themselves can decide on this issue and it is vital from the point of view of international law, and also from the moral aspect,

that it is the people themselves who are allowed to decide who their leader is to be.

- Another problem is also that President Bush does not say anything about how to move forward in the peace process. There is no mention in this speech of the international conference we have previously talked about. This conference is important if progress is now to be made with a political solution and the violence brought to an end.
- The quartet (US, EU, UN and Russia) must now make further intensive efforts to ensure that the vision of two democratic states living peacefully alongside each other can become a reality.

Resilience - insurance for the future

In the Baltic Region, wetlands retain 10-20 per cent of nitrogen emissions, curbing negative environmental effects such as eutrophication. In China, the forests in the upper Yangtzee river catchment area are ten times as valuable left standing as they are cut for timber since they help control flooding. These are some examples that show the importance of ecosystems for human development.

The Environmental Advisory Council of the Swedish Government has invited researchers from the international scientific network Resilience Alliance to draw up a synthesis report, Resilience and Sustainable Development. The report is the first of its kind to summarize recent research on the development of socio-ecological systems. It was presented today at the conference Stockholm thirty years on.

Case studies from all over the world show that many ecosystems have lost resilience making them vulnerable to disturbances such as storms, fire and pollution. An ecosystem with low resilience may suddenly shift and turn into a qualitatively different state. Clear lakes can turn into murky, oxygen-depleted pools, grasslands into shrub-deserts and coral reefs into alga-ecovered rubble. Biodiversity plays a crucial role in ecosystem resilience by spreading risks and making it possible for ecosystems to reorganize after disturbance and adapt to change. To build resilience is to safeguard our natural resources for the future.

Resilient socio-ecological systems will be even more important in the future as there are signs that disturbances like storms and floods will be more frequent and more intense, says Kjell Larsson, Swedish Minister for the Environment and Chairman of the Environmental Advisory Council. -Indicators of gradual change and early-warning signals of ecological resilience loss, ecosystem-friendly technology and adaptive management are important tools in the work to strengthen resilience.

Decoupling economic growth from environmental impact

We cannot expect economic growth to solve environmental problems automatically. Despite a decoupling of energy, CO2 and other emissions from GDP, total energy use and CO2 emissions are still rising.

These are some of the conclusions drawn in the report Decoupling past trends and prospects for the future, which was presented today at the conference Stockholm thirty years on.

There are prospects for continued economic growth in developed countries and for a very rapid growth in many developing countries with high populations. This will lead to increased pressure on ecosystems and to emissions detrimental to human health unless we can decouple economic growth from environmental degradation, says Kjell Larsson, Swedish Minister for the Environment and chairman of the Environmental Advisory Council.

To find out how well we have succeeded so far and what the prospects are for the future, the Council invited scientists at Chalmers University of Technology to draw up a synthesis report on decoupling. The report summarizes key trends for energy, material use and emissions over time in some major developing and developed countries.

The flows to air and water of emissions detrimental to health and the environment, such as sulphur dioxide, particulates and CFCs, have in many cases been considerably reduced in industrialized countries. Consumption emissions are, on the other hand, still increasing for many materials and can often be traced back to certain specific uses, e.g. copper in brake linings. As regards hazardous chemicals and waste, there are no tendencies towards decreasing volumes. They are increasing somewhat faster than GDP.

The report concludes that economic growth, by itself, will not solve environmental problems automatically. Improvements are generally a consequence of specific environmental policies. Thus policies are required and these should include price incentives, technology development incentives and regulatory measures. Other important strategies are to keep the focus on trends in absolute terms and on the key areas of concern, e.g. emissions of metals and persistent chemicals, CO2 and acidifying substances, rather than on a general decoupling, according to the scientists.

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We cannot expect economic growth to solve environmental problems automatically. Despite a decoupling of energy, CO2 and other emissions from GDP, total energy use and CO2 emissions are still rising.

These are some of the conclusions drawn in the report Decoupling past trends and prospects for the future, which was presented today at the conference Stockholm thirty years on.

There are prospects for continued economic growth in developed countries and for a very rapid growth in many developing countries with high populations. This will lead to increased pressure on ecosystems and to emissions detrimental to human health unless we can decouple economic growth from environmental degradation, says Kjell Larsson, Swedish Minister for the Environment and chairman of the Environmental Advisory Council.

To find out how well we have succeeded so far and what the prospects are for the future, the Council invited scientists at Chalmers University of Technology to draw up a synthesis report on decoupling. The report summarizes key trends for energy, material use and emissions over time in some major developing and developed countries.

The flows to air and water of emissions detrimental to health and the environment, such as sulphur dioxide, particulates and CFCs, have in many cases been considerably reduced in industrialized countries. Consumption emissions are, on the other hand, still increasing for many materials and can often be traced back to certain specific uses, e.g. copper in brake linings. As regards hazardous chemicals and waste, there are no tendencies towards decreasing volumes. They are increasing somewhat faster than GDP.

The report concludes that economic growth, by itself, will not solve environmental problems automatically. Improvements are generally a consequence of specific environmental policies. Thus policies are required and these should include price incentives, technology development incentives and regulatory measures. Other important strategies are to keep the focus on trends in absolute terms and on the key areas of concern, e.g. emissions of metals and persistent chemicals, CO2 and acidifying substances, rather than on a general decoupling, according to the scientists.

"Halving poverty by 2015 – it can be done"

At a press conference today, Minister for Development Cooperation, Migration and Asylum Policy Jan O. Karlsson gave a preview of the information campaign "It can be done". The purpose of the campaign, which will be formally launched in the autumn, is to increase knowledge about the UN's Millennium Goal – to halve world poverty by 2015.

"Halving poverty by 2015 is a great challenge and a difficult task. But it can be done, and what's more it must be done, for the sake of developing countries and for our own sake", says Minister for Development Cooperation, Migration and Asylum Policy Jan O. Karlsson.

"The point of the information campaign we are now setting in motion is not to tell people about the Millennium Goal, development assistance and solidarity in broad, general terms. The point is that achieving the Millennium Goal will require big decisions, and tough decisions, which will affect us and our own society, not just the developing countries" says Jan O. Karlsson.

"It will involve reforming agriculture in the EU, lowering trade barriers, establishing new patterns of production and consumption – decisions that will have a great impact on our own day-to-day life, far greater than the effect we feel from giving conventional development assistance.

"This is going to put solidarity to the test. Public opinion in Sweden is very positive towards development assistance. It is important that we nurture this positive attitude and turn it to good account."

More than 90 per cent of Swedes think it is important that Sweden help to achieve the Millennium Goal. However, 86 per cent believe the attempt will fail.

"We want to draw attention to the advances that have actually been made in developing countries over the past 30 years. This will strengthen belief in the possibility of progress. The key to success is the political will of all those governments, in the South and in the North, that have committed themselves to taking the action required to halve world poverty and create sustainable development. Here popular opinion has a very significant role to play", says Jan O. Karlsson.

Jan O. Karlsson and UNFPA Director on countermeasures

Tomorrow, Wednesday, Minister for Development Cooperation, Migration and Asylum Policy Jan O. Karlsson is to meet the Director of the United Nations Population Fund (UNFPA) in China, Ms Siri Telleri Melchiro. UNFPA works on such issues as women's reproductive health and rights and preventing the further spread of HIV/AIDS.

Support for UNFPA has declined recently and the organisation is facing serious financial problems. The United States has frozen its contribution to UNFPA for 2002 in light of the work carried out by UNFPA in China, among other things. Tomorrow's meeting is being held to discuss measures to counter these developments, that is to say, how the organisation's operations can be supported and strengthened in the future.

The UNFPA annual general meeting will begin in Geneva next Monday and Sweden will be giving its firm support to the organisation and urging other countries to cooperate actively with UNFPA. Sweden will also emphasise the importance of young people having access to information and advice on how they can protect themselves against HIV.

During their Council meeting last week, the EU ministers for development cooperation unanimously adopted a declaration in favour of efforts within the United Nations Population Fund. It underlines the central importance that sexual and reproductive health and rights have in the battle against poverty and in achieving the objectives of the UN Millennium Declaration. The Declaration also welcomes the Commission's intention of strengthening cooperation with UNFPA. The initiative to the Declaration was taken by Luxembourg and Sweden in conjunction with the EU ministers for development cooperation meeting Executive Director of the Fund, Ms Thoraya Obaid. The meeting took place against the background of US opposition to issues surrounding sexual and reproductive health and rights.

The Commission on the significance of internationalisation for Swedish tax bases and the future tax structure (Fi 2000:05) has recently presented the expert

reports that have been written by a number of leading Swedish tax experts, at the request of the Commission. The expert reports are published in the form of two appendixes to the Commissions Report.

The two appendixes contain a total of 13 reports: Expert Report 1 and 2 were written by Annika Persson and Katrin Wallberg, respectively. Both are analysts at the National Tax Board (RSV). These reports contain a thorough review of tax fraud in Sweden compared to other countries, tax administration, the compliance strategy of the tax offices and assessments of the internationally-related areas of risk for the future, as well as the difficulties and opportunities relating to international monitoring. Report 3 is written by Lars Emanuelsson Korsell, Counsel at the Crime Prevention Council (BRÅ). This report deals with the risk and causes of economic crime, with emphasis on tax crime.

Report 4 is written by Leif Mutén, professor emeritus in international tax law. This report deals with the principles that have generally determined the emergence of bilateral tax treaties between countries. Expert Report 5 is written by Associate Professor Kristina Ståhl and Associate Professor Roger Persson Österman. This report provides a description of the current effect of European Community law on Swedish tax law, and what we might expect in the future. Report 6 is written by the Director of Tax Policy at the Confederation of Swedish Enterprise, Krister Andersson, and deals with the ongoing international cooperation in the tax area, especially within the EU. Report number 7 deals with cross-border e-commerce, both within and outside of the EU. This report is written by Professor Sven-Olof Lodin. Report number 8 contains a thorough review of energy taxation and its principles, and highlights how Swedish energy tax revenues are affected by internationalisation. The author of this report is fil. dr. Karl-Axel Edin. Report 9 is written by Hans Olsson at of the Swedish Association of Local Authorities, and deals with the taxation of wages and the collection of social security contributions, as these relate to the international mobility of labour. Associate Professor Joakim Palme and fil. dr. Ola Sjöberg have co-authored Report 10, which discusses the financing of the Swedish social welfare system from the European perspective.

The last section contains three reports that deal with alternative ways of designing a tax system. Professor Sven-Olof Lodin has written about the pros and cons of the expenditure-based tax system in Report 11. Director at the Ministry of Finance, Anders Kristoffersson, discusses cash-flow taxes and other kinds of taxation in Report 12. Finally Report 13, authored by Jan Bröms, describes a proposed reformed taxation system.

The conclusions of each of the reports are those of the respective authors, and do not necessarily agree with the opinions of the Commission.

The Tax Base Commission (Fi 2000:05) was appointed in July 2000.

The general task of the Commission is to provide a comprehensive assessment of how to structure the Swedish tax system in a world with internationalised markets for goods, services and production factors, while retaining the social welfare objectives at current levels. The purpose of this work is to achieve an improved basis for future tax policy prioritisations.

Swedish companies exempted from American steel tariffs

A number of Swedish companies have been granted exemptions from the American penalty tariffs on steel. Products from AB Sandvik Steel and Uddeholm Tooling AB are on the list of exemptions announced last Friday by the US Department of Commerce in Washington.

"It is a relief for all the employees in Sandviken and Munkfors. I am pleased that efforts to obtain exemptions for Swedish manufacturers are now beginning to show results," says Minister for Trade Leif Pagrotsky in a comment. "But there still remain steel products from several companies that should also be granted exemptions. I expect more Swedish-produced goods to have been exempted before the Americans have concluded their exemptions at the beginning of July."

On Monday, the EU Council of Ministers decided to introduce supplementary tariffs on the import of certain selected products from the United States. The implementation of them will, however, be postponed until the American exemptions have been finalised.

"We will then decide how we will react towards the United States," says Mr Pagrotsky. "I hope the US will make efforts to give the EU countries legitimate compensation for the steel tariffs and generous exemptions for our companies' products. I hope, of course, that the EU will be able to avoid introducing tariff increases at all, but I cannot rule out that it may be necessary. The actions of the United States will be decisive."

Proposal referred to the Council on Legislation for a new order for appeals and procedures in cases relating to foreign national

The Government decided today to present to the Council on Legislation a proposal for a new order for appeals and procedures in cases relating to foreign nationals.

The main purpose of the proposed reform is to enhance statutory rights in cases relating to aliens by introducing a two-stage procedure enabling oral negotiations before a court of law in accordance with the provisions of the Administrative Court Procedure Act. Appeals in cases relating to foreign

nationals and citizenship will no longer be dealt with by the Aliens Appeals Board. Appeals against decisions of the Swedish Migration Board will instead be lodged at certain county administrative courts, whose decisions in turn may be appealed at the Administrative Court of Appeal in Stockholm.

After the Council on Legislation has dealt with the proposal, the Government intends to present a Government Bill to the Riksdag in the autumn.

"At worst, pirating and the sale and smuggling of illegal copies over national borders can deprive hard-working people of the opportunity to continue doing work that gives pleasure to us all," he went on.

"Moreover, it's a consumer issue," he added. We must know what it is we are buying and not, for example, risk picking up illegal copies that could damage our computers at home."

The seminar marks the climax of more than two years' work carried out within the Council of the Baltic Sea States under Sweden's leadership. Its purpose is to communicate the importance of protecting and respecting copyright and patent law to the widest possible audience and propose ways in which this can be achieved.

The seminar, which will be held at the National Board of Trade in Stockholm, will be attended by some 70 delegates from all the countries in the Baltic Sea region.

Lithuanian foundation receives 2002 Baltic Sea Award

The Lithuanian Housing and Urban Development Foundation is to receive the 2002 Swedish Baltic Sea Water Award. The award is being made in recognition of the Foundation's innovative programmes and projects for environmental conservation in the Baltic Sea and Lithuania. The Foundation's efforts have helped bring about a reduction in Lithuanian discharges of organic matter into the Baltic Sea from 1 500 to 100 tonnes per year for the projects concerned. The approach used can serve as a model for other parts of the Baltic Sea region.

The Swedish Baltic Sea Water Award, which was established by the Swedish Government, honours direct, practical initiatives that help improve the quality of water in the Baltic Sea.

The Housing and Urban Development Foundation (HUDF), which is a state foundation instituted by the Lithuanian Ministry of Finance, is being rewarded for having taken a comprehensive approach to reducing the pollution burden in a large part of Lithuania and for its active contribution to developing and coordinating the resources and know-how above all of relatively small municipalities in this field.

These initiatives have led to a reduction of eutrophication effects in both watercourses and coastal areas in the Nemuna drainage basin, which affects 75 per cent of the country, thereby benefiting both the environment and the people who live in the area.

The Swedish Baltic Sea Water Award was founded by Minister for Trade Leif Pagrotsky and is administered by the Stockholm International Water Institute (SIWI). The purpose of the award is to recognise efforts that have made a concrete contribution to improving the quality of water in and around the Baltic Sea.

This is the fourth time the award is being made, and State Secretary Sven-Eric Söder will present the prize of SEK 100 000 to the Foundation's Managing Director Mr Aloyzas Vitkausas on 15 August, in connection with the annual World Water Week in Stockholm.

Government bills presented to the Riksdag

Today the Government presented two government bills to the Riksdag: no.

2001/02:185, Residence permits with temporary protection for displaced persons in cases of mass exodus, and bill no.2001/02:182, Mutual recognition of decisions on refusal-of-entry and expulsion. Political agreement was reached during the Swedish presidency of the EU for a directive for minimum standards for giving temporary protection in the event of a mass influx of displaced persons. The directive was adopted in July 2001 and will now be incorporated into Swedish legislation. According to the directive, the Council of the European Union, can, under certain circumstances, take a decision establishing the existence of a situation of mass influx. In such situations, the member states can provide temporary protection for displaced persons. The Government bill proposes that displaced persons be granted residence permits with temporary protection during the period covered by the EU decision.

In May 2001, the EU adopted a directive on mutual recognition of decisions on refusal-of-entry or expulsion of third country nationals. This directive too, will now be incorporated into Swedish legislation. The Aliens Act will be amended to comply with the Directive so that refusal-of-entry and expulsion decisions made by another member state of the EU may be enforced by Swedish

authorities. However, Swedish authorities are required to have made an independent examination of the case before enforcement. The deciding authority should take the foreign decision into account when examining the case.

Jan O. Karlsson on migration, integration and SFI at a conference in Tylösand

"There can be no more important priority at this time than to strengthen the front against xenophobia that now exists in our Swedish society. My contribution to this project is to build further on the honest will to consensus that asylum and migration policy currently enjoys in the Riksdag."

These were the words of the Minister for Migration and Asylum Policy, Jan O. Karlsson, speaking at a conference today in Tylösand on migration, integration and Swedish for Immigrants (SFI), which was organised by the Swedish Association of Local Authorities and the Kronoberg Association of Local Authorities.

"There is a chill wind blowing, and xenophobic tendencies are in evidence in many places in Europe. This makes it important for us to keep up the high level of ambition we have in Sweden. I am doing my best to ensure that we design the best possible system for receiving refugees and I see improvements in this very difficult policy area as a continuous process", said Jan O. Karlsson, drawing attention to a few of the changes that are planned.

"We intend to create greater confidence in the processing of asylum cases by transferring appeals to the general administrative courts. We shall extend the refugee concept to include women persecuted because of their sex and amplify the possibilities for close relatives to immigrate."

Jan O. Karlsson stressed in particular how important it is that children seeking asylum be seen in the first instance as children and only in the second place as asylum-seekers.

"Children seeking asylum must enjoy the same rights as other children. This applies both to

children accompanying their parents and children who arrive in Sweden on their own. There is no question but that the reception of children arriving on their own must be improved."

Anna Lindh welcomes treaty between USA and Russia on strategic nuclear warheads

Minister for Foreign Affairs Anna Lindh welcomes the signing of a legally binding treaty by the United States and Russia in which the two countries have agreed to cut their number of strategic nuclear warheads by about two-thirds.

"This is definitely a step in the right direction towards the final goal: a world free of nuclear weapons. The fact that the two countries were able to agree on a legally binding treaty is positive. It is important now that the warheads are actually destroyed, not just put into storage. The process of disarmament must be made irreversible", says Minister for Foreign Affairs Anna Lindh. "Furthermore, it would be desirable for the United States and Russia to proceed to the next step and reduce the number of tactical nuclear weapons."

Presidents Bush and Putin today signed a treaty in Moscow on substantial cutbacks in their countries' nuclear arsenals. The two countries have undertaken to reduce their number of operationally deployed warheads with strategic range to between 1 700 and 2 200 each, by 31 December 2012.

Government ratifies Kyoto Protocol

The Kyoto Protocol, the global agreement on climate change will be formally ratified by the Government today.

Climate is the most important environmental issue of our time. Sweden and the EU have fought to ensure the viability of the Kyoto Protocol after the USAs defection. They are firmly resolved to ratify the protocol so that it can come into force before the World Summit on Sustainable Development is held in Johannesburg in August this year. We will keep our promise and continue to press more countries to ratify. We will also be continuing our dialogue with the US in an effort to persuade it to return to the Kyoto process, said the Swedish Minister for the Environment, Kjell Larsson.

The EU the European Commission and the 15 Member States will deliver its ratification documents to the United Nations in New York on 31 May. The Swedish document will, according to plan, be handed in by Mr Larsson.

Footnote:

The Kyoto Protocol comes into force 90 days after its ratification by not less than 55 countries. Moreover, these countries must together account for at least 55 per cent of the carbon dioxide emitted by all industrialised countries in 1990.

Development cooperation will also be discussed. In 2001 the Swedish Government adopted a new country strategy for 2002-2005. Swedish cooperation, which is to proceed from a poverty reduction standpoint, is intended to support environmentally sustainable use of natural resources and to help strengthen democratic governance and civil society. In Manila, Gun-Britt Andersson will also visit the headquarters of the Asian Development Bank (ADB), where she will meet the President of the Bank, Tadao Chino. They will discuss ADB initiatives to boost regional cooperation and the role of the Bank in promoting further development of the private sector and local capital markets in the region.

"It is highly regrettable that the USA has decided to withdraw its support for the International Criminal Court. The USA is needed in the struggle for human rights and against legal impunity", says Minister for Foreign Affairs, Anna Lindh after hearing that the USA has notified the UN that it does not intend to ratify the Rome Statute of the International Criminal Court.

"We now hope that the USA will still adopt a positive position and not work against the court. It will have very high safeguards protecting legal rights and we consider that the objections given are unfounded", says Anna Lindh.

The USA has feared, inter alia, that the court would judge American citizens for political reasons. Through its message the United States has now disassociated itself from President Clinton's signing

of the Rome Statute on 31 December 2000.

Together with other EU states, the Swedish Government has worked hard to realise the court. The statute will enter into force on 1 July this year, and the court is expected to be in place next year. It will be able to pass judgement on genocide, crimes against humanity and war crimes.

Minister for Development Cooperation, Migration and Asylum Policy Jan O. Karlsson will be travelling to the USA on 5-8 May.

In New York meetings are scheduled with Mark Malloch Brown, head of the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP), Thoraya Obaid, head of the United Nations Population Fund (UNFPA), representatives of the UN Secretariat's Department of Economic and Social Affairs (DESA), Jayantha Dhanapala, head of the UN Secretariat's Department of Disarmament Affairs (DDA), and Michael Doyle, Kofi Annan's Special Adviser on follow-up of the Millennium Declaration.

In Washington D.C., Jan O. Karlsson has two meetings at the White House, where he will meet the President's special envoy to Afghanistan, Zalmay Kahlilzad, and the President's special adviser on development, democracy and human rights issues at the US National Security Council (NSC), Elliott Abrams. Jan O. Karlsson will also meet Under Secretary of State Paula Dobriansky, Andrew Natsios, head of USAID (the American equivalent of Sida), Horst Köhler, head of the International Monetary Fund, and directors of the World Bank.

This is Jan O. Karlsson's first official visit to the United States as a Swedish Government minister. The subjects covered by the talks will include follow-up of the Millennium declaration and the commitment of the international community to halve poverty by 2015. Some other current issues for discussion are the follow-up to the Monterrey conference on financing for development and preparations for the Johannesburg summit on sustainable development in September.

Sweden signs protocol that places total ban on death

penalty

Sweden, together with 35 other states, is among the first of the Council of Europe member states to sign a new annex to the European Convention for the Protection of Human Rights and Fundamental Freedoms. The annex – Protocol No. 13 – places a total ban on the use of the death penalty and is based on a proposal submitted by the Swedish government at the end of 2000. The protocol is signed today in Lithuania's capital, Vilnius, where the Council of Europe's Committee of Ministers is meeting.

Protocol No. 13 supplements the existing ban on the use of the death penalty in peace time which already exists under the Convention for the Protection of Human Rights and Fundamental Freedoms. The protocol also prohibits the use of the death penalty in time of war or imminent danger of war. This is the first international agreement in the world that does not permit any exemptions whatsoever from the ban on the use of the death penalty. Thus the protocol indicates strongly to other parts of the world that Europe is now prepared to relegate this inhumane punishment to history.

The protocol will come into effect when it has been ratified by ten countries. Sweden intends to do so as soon as possible. In a Government Bill later on this year, therefore, the Government will propose that the Riksdag approve the protocol.

The Council of Europe has been working for democracy and human rights in Europe since 1949 and now has 44 member states. The decision on the new additional protocol which places a total ban on capital punishment was taken in the Council of Europe's Committee of Ministers in February of this year.

Folke Bernadotte Institute to be established in Kramfors

The Government made a decision today about the establishment of a new institute for the education and coordinated training of personnel who take part in international catastrophe- and peace operations. It will be called the Folke Bernadotte Institute and will be located in Sandö in the municipality of Kramfors. The Institute will commence its activities on 1 September 2002. "It is important that Swedes who go out on international missions have the opportunity for thorough preparation, including in areas of operation other than their own. This is where the Folke Bernadotte Institute comes in. It is a question of cooperation between the various professional categories out in the field," says Minister for Development Cooperation, Migration and Asylum Policy Jan O Karlsson. "Everyone will receive fundamental knowledge about human rights, international law and the mandates and roles of the different actors."

There are in the region a series of organisations that have links with the Institute, organisations including the Sida Civil Society Centre in Härnösand, the University of Umeå (which, together with Akademi Norr, the Swedish Rescue Services Agency, and the municipalities of Kramfors and Sollefteå will initiate a training programme in crisis- and conflict management), the Swedish Rescue Services Agency School in Sandö, and the Dog Training School in Sollefteå. SWEDINT, other universities and the Swedish National Defence College will also be important cooperation partners for the Institute.

The Folke Bernadotte Institute is being established to increase the level of education and

cooperation nationally and internationally in the whole chain of support measures within peace support, emergency preparedness and crisis management.

The Government made a decision today about directives to an organisational committee to implement the establishment of the Institute. Ambassador Michael Sahlin will be starting up the operations. He is a Doctor of Philosophy in political science and is at present Ambassador in Belgrade. His previous posts have included that of State Secretary at the Ministry of Defence.

The Government gives SEK 210 million for food for the starving

The Government decided today to enter into an agreement with the World Food Programme (WFP) on the use of this year's general grant of SEK 210 million. The money will be used for disaster situations, reconstruction and development initiatives.

Poverty, conflicts and disasters in the world lead to the suffering of some 800 million people every year from hunger and starvation. Eighty million of these receive assistance from the WFP. Children and people fleeing from conflicts and natural disasters and displaced in their own countries are vulnerable groups to which Sweden wishes to draw special attention in this year's WFP work.

Sweden, which has long been one of the WFP's largest donors, wants to help streamline and raise the quality of WFP operations. Sweden is also advocating that the WFP coordinates its operations more effectively with other actors, in order, for example, to survey and analyse the reasons for food shortages.

Work on gender equality and the environment will be further developed. It is intended to improve the WFP's capacity to analyse how local markets are affected by starvation relief measures, and to increase its commitment to food safety.

In terms of size, the WFP is the largest voluntarily financed UN body for starvation relief. In addition to Sweden's general grant, the WFP receives funds from Sida for unforeseen humanitarian measures, following applications for assistance. The WFP also has a special agreement with the Swedish Rescue Services Agency.

Ambitious free trade agreement finalised between the EU and Chile

The EU and Chile on Friday finalised an Agreement on Association, containing, among other arrangements, the most far-reaching free trade agreement ever entered into by the EU. The trade agreement regulates both trade in goods and services and terms applying to investments, competition and public procurement.

"This high level of ambition should set a pattern for future EU agreements on free trade", comments Minister for Trade Leif Pagrotsky, who was personally responsible for launching the trade negotiations with Chile during the Swedish EU presidency in June 2001.

"I am pleased that the EU and Chile have been able to sew up this broadly conceived deal so quickly, and I hope the agreement will serve as a stimulus to the ongoing negotiations with Mercosur (Argentina, Brazil, Paraguay and Uruguay)", says the Minister for Trade. The negotiations have been concluded in time for presentation at the summit meeting between the EU, Latin America and the Caribbean on 17 May in Madrid.

The financial position of UNFPA has deteriorated for various reasons, including the delay by the USA in paying its 2002 contribution of USD 34 million. UNFPA activities in developing countries will be the main casualties. This will reduce the chances of the developing countries reaching the objectives agreed by world leaders at the Millennium Summit of the United Nations in autumn 2000.

Sweden is one of the largest donors to UNFPA, contributing SEK 160 million in 2001. Sweden is making active efforts in the UN to win higher priority for issues relating to HIV/AIDS, reproductive health and opportunities for young people to obtain information about sex.

Inquiry proposes concentration of forces involved in Barents Euro-Arctic cooperation

A rapidly compiled report on Barents Euro-Arctic cooperation was handed in to the Swedish Minister for Foreign Affairs Anna Lindh last Wednesday. The author of the report, Ambassador Fredrik Vahlquist, advocates the creation of a community of endeavour involving officials employed by the county administrative boards of Norrbotten and Västerbotten and engaged in Barents Euro-Arctic cooperation in one or other capacity. This would take the form of a "Swedish Barents Secretariat".

Sweden holds the presidency of the Barents Euro-Arctic Council until the autumn of 2003. The Council plays a key role in regional cooperation in the northernmost parts of Europe. It is composed of the foreign ministers of the five Nordic countries and Russia, and a representative of the

European Commission.

"The Government considers that Barents Euro-Arctic cooperation is also important in the long term. There must be no reduction in personnel or financial resources after 2003. On the contrary, Sweden and other countries should be looking to extend and intensify cooperation," said Ms Lindh. The report refers to the need for an interface; members of the public, companies, institutions, authorities or NGOs should have someone to turn to with their questions, proposals or ideas for projects. In the long term, cooperation will help boost trade in the Barents Sea region. Ensuring that government funds for cooperation in the region are managed more efficiently than at present is a crucial concern. The report also proposes better utilisation of certain multilateral funding sources, such as the European Bank for Reconstruction and Development (EBRD), the Nordic Investment Bank, the EU and the Nordic Council of Ministers.

The Swedish Ministry for Foreign Affairs has allocated approximately SEK 40 million to cooperation projects and programmes. Sida and the Swedish Institute have contributed over SEK 200 million over the same period, chiefly in the Russian territories in the region.

As part of a major investment in China, the Government has decided to allocate SEK 3 million per year over three years for special initiatives to attract Chinese investments in Sweden.

Joint Indonesian-Swedish statement

A high level Indonesian delegation under the leadership of Coordinating Minister for Political and Security Affairs Mr Susilo Bambang Yudhoyono visited Sweden on the 18th and 19th of April 2002. During his visit he met with Deputy Prime Minister Ms Lena Hjelm-Wallén, Minister for Foreign Affairs Ms Anna Lindh and Minister for Justice Mr Thomas Bodström.

The purpose of the visit was twofold, i.e. reviewing the bilateral relations and seeking ways to further promote the relations as well as exchanging views on regional and international situations, in particular the deteriorating situation in the Middle East and the fight against international terrorism. Both sides are of the view that all relevant UN Security Council resolutions should be implemented.

In response to the Swedish inquiries, the Indonesian delegation briefed the

Swedish side regarding the continuing reforms that take place in Indonesia, in particular Indonesia's efforts to strengthen its economic recovery and the process of democratisation, the efforts to re-establish rule of law and security and order as well as to maintain its sovereignty and territorial integrity. Regional issues were discussed and both sides agreed that conflict is best resolved by negotiated peaceful settlement in freedom and democracy, as well as in respecting human rights and human dignity. The Swedish Government reiterated its support for Indonesian efforts to solve outstanding issues of Internally Displaced Persons (IDP) and refugees. With regard to the case of Aceh, the Government of Sweden supports special autonomy for Aceh within the territorial integrity and sovereignty of Indonesia as agreed in the continuing dialog between all parties concerned. Furthermore the importance of respect for human rights and of the settlement of outstanding legal issues was agreed. Both sides underlined the importance of good neighbourly relations between Indonesia and the new independent East Timor and of the resolution of residual matters between the two countries.

The exchange of views was conducted in a cordial and frank manner and the Indonesian delegation highly appreciated the understanding and support shown by the Government of Sweden. The Indonesian delegation briefed the Swedish side on the improving security situation in Indonesia as well as progress in the Indonesian economic recovery. The two sides explored ways for the two countries to cooperate and for Sweden to support Indonesia's reform process. Coordinating Minister Yudhoyono expressed the appreciation of the Indonesian delegation for the warm welcome and excellent arrangement of the visit.

Karlsson. "We are deeply concerned about the humanitarian situation on the West Bank and Gaza Strip and call upon Israel to give humanitarian organisations immediate access so that damage can be assessed and those in need can receive help", says Jan O. Karlsson.

In its humanitarian efforts, Sweden will concentrate on emergency measures to assist those affected. The UN body for Palestine refugees (UNRWA) and the UN Office for the Coordination of Humanitarian Assistance (OCHA) are now carrying out needs assessments in Jenin and other areas that have been hit. Sweden is prepared to contribute medico-legal expertise, in part through the Swedish Rescue Services Agency, in the near future. The Swedish Rescue Services Agency will also shortly join the UN food programme (WFP) in a needs assessment in the area to investigate the possibility of providing assistance in the form of food transports. Employment support and support to children – areas in which Swedish development assistance has already been playing a leading part – will also continue.

"We are very upset at the extent of the damage inflicted on the civil infrastructure and institutions of the Palestinian National Authority", says Jan O. Karlsson. "Many projects financed by development assistance have been destroyed or damaged. The market, connecting road and square outside the Church of the Nativity in Bethlehem are projects that have recently been completed with Swedish development assistance. This is now a scene of great devastation. The Swedish-built Peace Centre adjoining the square in Bethlehem has been taken over by the Israeli army. This is very disheartening", says Jan O. Karlsson.

Swedish development assistance to the West Bank and Gaza Strip in 2002 will come to at least SEK 165 million. On top of this, Sweden is one of the largest donors to the UN body for Palestine refugees, UNRWA. In 2002, the regular contribution to the UNRWA will amount to SEK 170 million. An additional SEK 40 million has been provided in humanitarian assistance.

US steel tariffs: Pagrotsky requests exemptions from EU

retaliation list

Sweden has now reacted to the list of imported goods worth over SEK 22 billion on which the EU Commission has proposed a levy of penalty tariffs if the United States refuses to compensate the EU for the penalty tariffs on steel that the United States introduced at the end of March.

The list contains goods imported to Sweden for more than SEK 600 million. Minister for Trade Leif Pagrotsky has requested that 26 of these products be removed from the list.

"If we prevent the United States from exporting these goods to Europe, individual Swedish companies will be very seriously affected. It is very difficult to penalise the United States for violating world trade regulations without also penalising ourselves. I hope we will not have to use the Commission's list in its entirety, but if the Americans refuse to compensate us then I am afraid we will be forced to. If that is the case, it is important which products are on the list," says Mr Pagrotsky.

Motorcycles for SEK 171 million, raw cotton for SEK 47 million and juice concentrates for SEK 13 million are among the goods that Sweden would like to remove from the list. The companies that would be worst affected are JO-bolaget, Borås Wäfverier and Harley-Davidson.

Sweden to extend support for study on water cooperation

Water scarcity and contamination are significant factors in the development of poverty and political instability. Water is a high-priority issue in the context of Swedish development assistance as access to good quality water is a key element in the fight against poverty. Sweden will therefore be contributing SEK 300,000 towards a study of cooperation in connection with cross-border water resources. The study will be conducted by the environmental organisation Green Cross International in collaboration with UNESCO, the UN educational, scientific and cultural organisation. Its purpose will be to increase our knowledge and understanding of the relationship between water resources, international cooperation and security. It will aim to show how situations in which

conflict could arise over access to water from the same river or source by two or more countries can be turned into opportunities for cooperation.

Six river systems will be examined, including the River Jordan and the Okawongo River in southern Africa. The findings of the study will be presented at the 3rd World Water Forum in Kyoto in March 2003.

The importance of water in the fight against poverty and the establishment of cooperation is further emphasised by its priority status at the World Summit on Sustainable Development, to be held in Johannesburg, South Africa at the end of August this year.

Sweden to increase development assistance

The outcome of earlier government decisions to raise Swedish development assistance over the next two years is reflected in this year's spring fiscal policy bill. Development assistance for 2002 will amount to SEK 16.5 billion, equivalent to 0.74 per cent of GNI. In 2003 and 2004, assistance will grow to 0.81 and 0.86 per cent of GNI respectively.

"These increases clearly reflect the Government's aim to re-achieve the development assistance target of 1 per cent of GNI," said Minister for Development Cooperation, Migration and Asylum Policy, Jan O. Karlsson.

Between 2000 and 2004, the volume of assistance will have increased by 50 per cent, from SEK 14 to SEK 21 billion.

"Sweden is at the forefront of a break in the international trend. Development cooperation is on the rise for the first time in 10 years, with increases pledged by the EU and the USA. This is a major step towards our goal of halving world poverty by 2015," Mr Karlsson added.

- The Government has allocated SEK 20 million respectively to cover legal representation in asylum cases and travel costs for applicants who have been refused entry or expelled. Expenditure in connection with migration policy in 2002 is budgeted at SEK 3.4 billion.

The Spring Fiscal Policy Bill: Sweden's Position is Strong Reform Policy Defies Economic Downturn

In spite of the international economic slowdown, Sweden's position remains strong. The Government is keeping the promises made. GDP is forecast to rise 1.4 per cent this year. The Government expects the international economic recovery to gather pace in the second half of the year. The growth rate is expected to climb to 2.8 per cent in 2003.

Open unemployment has been halved from 8 to 4 per cent since 1996. On the Government's assessment, there is a possibility of it rising to 4.3 per cent this year before falling back to 4 per cent the following year. However, considerable uncertainty remains.

The Government has set as its target that 80 per cent of the population aged 2064 shall be employed on the regular labour market in 2004. Additional measures will be proposed to help achieve this target.

Public finances continue to show a surplus. The target is a surplus of 2 per cent of GDP on average over the business cycle. The surpluses in 2000 and 2001 were 3.7 and 4.8 per cent respectively. A surplus of 1.8 per cent is forecast for this year. In last autumn's budget bill, the Government stated that a surplus of less than 2.0 per cent would be acceptable in 2002 if the economic trend proved less favourable than expected. Given the sharp downward readjustment of the growth forecast, the present deviation from the target is considered to be acceptable and well in line with the overall target. A surplus of 1.8 per cent is also forecast for 2003.

Public debt has been substantially reduced during the present term of office. There is no longer any net public sector debt; instead Sweden have net assets, which this year amount to approximately SEK 50 billion. The consolidated gross debt ratio is expected to decline to 53 per cent this year. For the sake of comparison, in 1998 it was over 70 per cent, while the EU reference level is 60 per cent. The tax ratio is forecast to fall from about 53 per cent in 1998 to 50.6 per cent in 2003.

Expenditure is forecast to remain below the ceiling this year too. One of the purposes of the expenditure ceiling is to prevent temporarily higher income being used as a basis for permanently higher expenditure. The expenditure ceilings have been met every year since their introduction. However, the Government is keeping a close eye on developments and will propose new measures if the expenditure ceiling comes under threat.

No new expenditure ceilings

This year's spring fiscal policy bill differs from previous years since the Riksdag has decided to concentrate long-term budgetary work to a single occasion each year, in the autumn. Consequently the present bill does not contain any proposals for new expenditure ceilings. On the other hand, as in previous years, it does contain a budget statement describing the direction of the Government's economic policy, a forecast for the Swedish economy, an account of distribution policy aspects and

a supplementary budget for 2002.

Supplementary budget for 2002 higher costs for sick leave

During the current year a number of changes are being made in estimates of Government expenditure and income, as well as some adjustments of priorities. Expenditure is expected to remain below the ceiling this year too. There is a budgeting margin of SEK 0.9 billion. The Government is keeping a close eye on developments and will propose new measures if necessary.

The Government considers that unemployment benefits should be raised in 2002. However, this issue will require further preparation. Spending on sickness benefits and rehabilitation is expected to be higher than indicated in the budget, due to a continuing rise in sickness absence. An increase of SEK 2.5 billion is therefore proposed in the relevant appropriation.

Spending on development assistance in 2002 is forecast to exceed allocated funds by about SEK 1 billion. This is due to withdrawals from reserves set aside in previous years. Migration policy is to be allocated a further SEK 680 million in all in 2002. The Swedish Migration Board's reception system will receive an additional SEK 560 million to enable it to cope with the increased influx of refugees. SEK 60 million will go to the Swedish Migration Board and SEK 20 million to the Aliens Appeals Board, with a view to reducing processing times. The Office of the Ombudsman against Ethnic Discrimination will receive an increment of SEK 2 million.

The Swedish Prison and Probation Service is being allocated a further SEK 150 million in response to the need for increased capacity. In addition, an allocation of SEK 10 million is being made to combat drug abuse in the prison and probation system.

The Adult Education Initiative will receive sufficient funds to pay for 6 000 more study places in autumn 2002 (SEK 108 million). This investment will primarily target municipalities and regions that have been affected by the cutbacks in manufacturing employment announced this winter or that have particularly weak labour markets for other reasons.

Further efforts will be made to support the restructuring of municipal housing companies in municipalities where there are vacant dwellings and large-scale out-migration. On a provisional estimate, about SEK 3 billion more will be committed over the period 20022004. This year SEK 240 million will be dedicated to this purpose. A special housing authority will be established to this end, beginning its operations on 1 July 2002.

A redistribution of study places and funds is proposed to achieve better utilisation of capacity in the undergraduate education system. The redistribution will enable volume to grow in 2002, with more places becoming available at Uppsala University, Lund University, Göteborg University, Stockholm University, Linköping University, Örebro University, Mälardalen University, the University College of Borås, the University of Gävle and some private education providers. The Royal Institute of Technology, Växjö University, Mid Sweden University, Blekinge Institute of Technology, Kalmar University, Dalarna University and Södertörns University College will receive lower allocations.

An additional SEK 15 million will be put into preventive measures to combat alcohol and drug abuse. To make possible the rapid building up of a new animal protection authority, the relevant appropriation will be expanded by SEK 15 million. An additional SEK 50 million is being allocated to car allowances for persons with disabilities. Women's shelters will receive a further SEK 10 million.

With a view to boosting the historically low electoral turnout among immigrant groups, the Government is making a special allocation of SEK 30 million to the parties represented in the Riksdag to enable them to provide better election information to immigrants ahead of the election this autumn. The Swedish postal service (Posten) will receive further compensation of SEK 25 million to ensure that the ambitious targets for postal voting can be maintained.

Expenditures that are now expected to be lower than budgeted include the EU membership contribution, expenditure on study support and housing allowances, and interest payments on

central government debt.

Follow-up of the 11-point programme for better health in working life
The Government has presented an 11-point programme of measures in response to the sharp
increase in the number of people on sick leave and disability pensions. The spring fiscal policy bill
includes follow-up on this programme and the Government will present new proposals in
connection with the budget bill in the autumn.

The Government intends to give employers stronger economic incentives to take responsibility for working conditions and for preventive measures and rehabilitation. The principal purpose is to reduce the incidence of extended sick leave. There is no intention of imposing higher costs on employers collectively. Employer responsibility must be designed to take into account the terms and conditions under which small enterprises operate. The situation of persons who have earlier had extended periods on sick leave or who may be regarded as being at higher risk of requiring sick leave in future must also be considered.

The agenda for the future: families with children, the elderly and the health service A number of reforms are already on the agenda for the next term of office. The final stage of the maximum charges reform in child care will be taken in 2003 when universal pre-school access will be brought in for all 4-5-year-olds. This will mean that all children will have the right to attend pre-school free of charge for three hours a day. The parental insurance system will be further reinforced. The minimum daily allowance will be raised to SEK 150 per day in 2003 and SEK 180 per day in 2004. On 1 July 2003, the ceiling on qualifying income in the sickness and parental insurance systems will be raised from 7.5 to 10 price base amounts, the state of central government finances permitting. The upper secondary study grant will be extended from 9 to 10 months, giving a teenager attending upper secondary school SEK 950 more per year.

As a step in the improvement of dental care support for the elderly, the available resources will be boosted by a further SEK 300 million in 2003. A new system of maintenance support for the elderly will be introduced in 2003 so as to guarantee all persons over the age of 65 who are resident in Sweden a certain minimum standard of living. Also in 2003, the means testing of widow's pensions will be discontinued.

The special health care initiative already adopted by the Riksdag will be further pursued. In all an extra injection of SEK 9 billion over the 20012004 period is involved resources that have been freed up mainly from the total defence. In 20022004, SEK 1.25 billion per year will be committed to reducing waiting times in the health service. In the near future, the Government will also inaugurate a trial scheme to facilitate recruitment of personnel for the health and social services. Recruitment incentives will be payable when unemployed people are appointed to positions in the health and social services.

On the agenda: schools and higher education

The school system will receive augmented resources to allow more staff to be employed. The additional support this year will amount to SEK 1.5 billion. The National Agency for Education estimates that the extra resources this year will be enough to employ a further 3 000 teachers and other school staff. Major investments will also be required in the next term of office. In the coming years, the level of support allocated to schools and after-school centres will be raised by SEK 1 billion per year until 2005 in an effort to put more adults into the school system. In 2006 and subsequent years, the schools initiative will be worth SEK 5 billion.

A special commitment is being made to strengthening higher education. The Government's long-term goal is that at least half the young people born in any year shall have embarked on university level studies by the age of 25. Between 1997 and 2003, the university system will add capacity for about 100 000 more students. Beginning this year, programmes in arts and humanities, the social sciences, theology and law will also receive additional resources to enhance the quality of undergraduate courses. This year's increment will be SEK 100 million, rising in 2003 to SEK 200 million.

Beginning in 2003 a new system of adult study support will be brought in to replace the special education allowance at an estimated cost of SEK 2 billion per year. The support targets people over the age of 25 who have relatively little previous education, who either are or risk becoming unemployed or who have disabilities. Central government allocations to research and postgraduate education will be raised by a total of SEK 1.5 billion between 2000 and 2004. Among other measures, over the period 20012003, SEK 214 million will be provided to sixteen new schools of research.

To develop lifelong learning, a system for individual continuing professional development is needed. This spring the Government has presented a system that can enter into force in 2003, which is based on saving by individuals in their own professional development savings accounts. Employers must also be encouraged to participate.

On the agenda: housing, development assistance and the police The money available for investment grants for provision of student housing will be increased by SEK 125 million in 2003. A sum of SEK 2.5 billion has been set aside to support the building of rental accommodation in 20022006.

Development assistance has gone up sharply during the present term of office. It is estimated that payments in 2002 will be equivalent to 0.8 per cent of the gross national income (GNI). Development assistance is forecast to rise from SEK 12 billion in 1998 to SEK 21 billion in 2004. The Government's aspiration is to return Swedish development assistance to a level of 1 per cent of GNI when the state of central government finances permits.

Justice will receive additional resources SEK 100 million in 2003 and SEK 600 million in 2004 for a further strengthening of the police service.

A policy for full employment growth throughout the country

The Government's overall objective is full employment. The best policy for enhanced welfare is for more people to have jobs. Tax cuts for low and medium earners combined with the maximum charges reform in child care have brought lower marginal effects, which in turn stimulates the labour supply. This year's reforms and tax cuts worth about SEK 20 billion each will also help to stimulate the economy and so sustain employment levels. Moreover, the Government has proposed special support of SEK 3 billion to municipalities and county councils to enable them to bring forward new appointments this year.

An important element of the policy for growth is efficient communications. In autumn 2001 the Government presented an infrastructure bill containing substantially higher commitments SEK 364 billion to railways and roads between 2004 and 2015. A special type of support has been devised for local authorities to encourage the installation of a high-speed, high-capacity infrastructure for IT transmission in areas that are not commercially viable.

The investments in education and labour market policy will enhance competence and increase the supply of well-qualified labour. Labour market policy focuses on combating bottlenecks and intensifying efforts to help those who experience the greatest difficulty in obtaining work, such as people who have long been unemployed, people with disabilities that affect their ability to work and immigrants.

The Government has proposed more effective competition regulations to put the Swedish Competition Authority in a better position to fight cartels.

The Government has set aside funds over a three-year period for a national programme to promote entrepreneurship. The aim is to create a better climate for business, foster positive attitudes towards entrepreneurial activities and boost entrepreneurial undertakings. A national programme to promote the development of innovation systems and clusters is being established to run from 2002 to 2004. Another programme is being set up to strengthen the tourist industry. A special programme is being set up for the 20022004 period to increase IT use at enterprises located in category A development areas.

SEK 50 million per year is being allocated for the years 20022004 to encourage cooperation between universities, colleges and municipalities, aimed at boosting recruitment to higher education and generating sustainable growth in the regions.

To strengthen local authorities in areas with heavy population losses a special central government subsidy to a total value of SEK 400 million will be brought in for 2003 and 2004.

Results during this term of office:

more people in work and lower day care charges

Major reforms have been implemented during the 19982002 term of office while keeping to budget targets. Employment has increased and more resources have been invested in education. In 2002 it is estimated that 240 000 more people will be employed than in 1998. Between 1997 and 2003, the university system will have added capacity for about 100 000 more students. Open unemployment has been halved. In addition, there has been a sharp drop in the number of people taking part in labour market measures.

There has been a rise in employment in the school system, health care and social services. The local government sector is expected to have a balance sheet total in 2002 that is SEK 84 billion higher than in 1998. Over the same period, there will have been a rise of 40 000 in the number of people employed by municipalities and county councils.

The child allowance has been raised to SEK 950, as has the upper secondary study grant. The supplementary child allowance for additional children has gone up by a corresponding amount. A maximum charge has been introduced in child daycare and after-school care. Children are now entitled to attend pre-school even if their parents are unemployed or on parental leave. Parental insurance has been extended by an extra month of benefits for either the mother or father.

Results: higher pensions and 5 billion more to law and order

Pensions and housing allowances have gone up during this term of office. The full price base amount is now used in adjusting pensions. The housing allowance for pensioners has been put up during the present term of office from 83 per cent to 91 per cent of the cost of housing. In elder care, a ceiling on charges and minimum guaranteed income after charges have been introduced. A system is being launched on 1 July to protect against high dental care costs.

Law and order has been allocated some SEK 5 billion more during this term of office. A large proportion of these additional resources has gone to the police.

Major investments have been made to create an ecologically sustainable society. Development assistance has been put up. Conditions for students have been improved. Both the minimum level and ceiling for unemployment benefits have been raised. The work injury insurance system is being reformed.

Results: lower taxes on incomes and businesses

Tax cuts targeting low and medium earners have been implemented in the present term of office in the shape of a tax reduction equivalent to three-quarters of the personal contribution in the pensions system. Pensioners have also received a tax cut of about SEK 100 per month. Pensioners with incomes so low that they do not pay tax also share in the tax cut via a credit to their tax accounts. A tax reduction has been introduced for trade union dues, so that the dues paid by wage earners to their professional organisations are now treated in the same way as dues paid by employers to employers' organisations. For an employee in retail and wholesale trade, this can mean about SEK 100 less in taxes each month.

Real estate tax has been lowered from 1.5 to 1.0 per cent of the tax assessed value on detached and semi-detached houses and from 1.5 to 0.5 per cent on apartment buildings. At the same time, a limit rule has been introduced for real estate tax, which means that households with normal income and wealth pay no more than 5 per cent of their income in real estate tax. The wealth tax exemption has gone up from SEK 900 000 to SEK 1.5 million for single people and SEK 2 million for couples taxed jointly.

A number of business taxes have been lowered. The period for which income may be deferred by using tax allocation reserves has been lengthened from 5 to 6 years. Virtually all the special tax rules governing transactions between the company and its shareholders applying to close companies have been cancelled. A standard deduction for increased living expenses in connection with travel has been introduced for business operators so as to give equal treatment of employees and entrepreneurs. More generous deductions are now allowed in connection with conversion and alteration of business premises. The maximum allocation to tax allocation reserves has been raised by five percentage points. The standard income assessment for investment companies has been lowered from 2.0 to 1.5 per cent. VAT on passenger transport has been halved from 12 to 6 per cent. To stimulate local small-scale enterprise a regional stimulus has been introduced in category A development areas (Värmland, Dalarna and the interior parts of Norrland). In these areas, the general reduction of employers' social security contributions 5 per cent of payroll expenses up to SEK 852 000 goes up to 15 per cent.

Next year all natural persons reporting income from business activities will receive a pre-printed tax return and the same date for filing tax returns will apply to everybody. In normal cases, the penalty for late filing of tax returns is being halved from SEK 1 000 to SEK 500.

Additional steps have been taken on behalf of a green tax shift, i.e. the system whereby taxes on environmentally harmful activities are put up and taxes on labour down. In 20002002 the green tax shift involves about SEK 6.7 billion. A range of energy taxes have been raised while on the other hand the basic income tax deduction has been put up by about SEK 2 100, employers' social security contributions have been lowered by 0.1 per cent and funds have been set aside for individual continuing professional development, among other measures.

Distribution policy

An account of distribution policy aspects is published as an appendix to the spring fiscal policy bill. This account shows the trend in income distribution during the 1990s. Income dispersion showed no signs of appreciable changes in the first half of the decade but grew in the second half. This widening of the spread is mainly attributable to higher capital incomes in the shape of capital gains in higher income brackets. The proportion of households with weak economies was broadly constant during the 1990s, which indicates that social safety nets have functioned well.

The account also contains an analysis of the impact of the value of subsidised public services on household economic standards. Public services help to even out both the economic standard enjoyed by individuals over their lifetime and the relative positions of households with different economic standards. Families with children and pensioners benefit, as also do women as a group.

The levelling that takes place can be illustrated by the fact that if only income from wages, business activities and capital is counted, the fifth of the Swedish population that has the highest economic standard has an income ten times as high as the income of the fifth that has the lowest standard. Adjusting for taxes, transfers and consumption of public services, the ratio falls to 2.3. Welfare policy makes a difference. Public services redistribute large sums of money. The value of individual public services used by households came to SEK 330 billion. (The analysis is based on public services child care, education, health and medical care and elder care in 1999.)

Another important factor in combating income gaps and dispersion is the fight against unemployment. The figure below shows the effect on income distribution of halving open unemployment from 8 to 4 per cent. The columns show the change in disposable income in the population, divided into fifths (quintiles), with the first column representing the quintile with the lowest economic standard and the last the quintile with the highest standard.

Individual learning and skills development

- · Tax deductible savings (a maximum of approximately SEK 9 500 per year) for individual learning and skills development is to be introduced from 2003
- · On withdrawal from this learning account, a special learning and skills development premium will be given
- · The learning and skills development premium is augmented by a fixed sum of SEK 1 000 for everyone
- · Employers may pay deposits into the employee's individual learning account.

The Government decided today to present a so-called guideline bill on individual learning and skills development to the Riksdag. Due to the Council on Legislation's statement criticising the method of dividing the same legislative reform into two separate areas, the Government aims to present a supplementary bill during the autumn of 2002, in which the system will be developed in more detail and proposals for legislation presented. The system is planned to enter into force on 1 July 2003. The Government wishes to emphasise that the new organisation will not affect the timetable for introduction of this system.

"In the information society in which we are living today, it is becoming increasingly clear that learning and skills are perishables. This is why a system providing individual learning and skills development is an extremely important reform. It will be crucial for Sweden's chance to hold its own in international competition and to secure and develop prosperity and welfare. It will give individuals the opportunity to choose themselves, on the basis of their dreams and abilities, how

they want to upgrade and improve their learning and skills", says Minister Mona Sahlin. The principal elements of the bill are:

- The chance to build up a learning account should be sufficiently tempting to attract broad sections of the population. Even for people with medium- to high incomes, these accounts should provide a chance for sufficiently comprehensive learning and skills development.
- · Learning accounts shall be built up in a system that allows individual savings to be accessible, that enables them to be administered in a manner compatible with Sweden's membership of the EU and guaranteeing Swedish tax demands.
- The system will be constructed so that even individuals with limited scope for saving will find it attractive to take part. The proposal as a whole should have a satisfactory outcome in terms of distribution policy.
- · It should be possible to use withdrawals from the individual learning account to pay for learning of all kinds. A regulatory framework will be drawn up in order to prevent risk of abuse.
- · The employer will be given the option to strengthen the system by paying in deposits to individual learning accounts. However, employers continue to have undivided responsibility for in-service training connected with their own operations.

The main components of the proposal

The individual will be given the opportunity to set aside a maximum of 25% of a base amount (approximately SEK 9 500) per year, including a tax reduction, to an individual learning account. The income on the balance of the individual learning account will be liable to full capital income tax (30%).

To enable the rapid introduction of the system, savings will initially be made in accounts administered by a government agency. Later, the possibility of saving with different financial institutions such as banks and insurance companies will be considered. By special order an inquiry will be carried out into the agency most suited to administer these accounts. The continuing process will also include a more detailed examination of the various Community law aspects that may emerge.

Funds withdrawn for learning and skills development will be liable to income tax. However, special stimulation will be given to withdrawal via a skills and learning premium. This will take the form of a tax deduction. The skills and learning premium consists of the following elements:

- The maximum premium will amount to 25% of a base amount (approximately SEK 9 500).
- The full premium is paid on one-year's full-time study (=200 study days) When a lower number of study days is used, the maximum premium is proportionally reduced. However, no premium is paid for learning and skills development that takes less than five days.
- · The actual premium may not exceed 50 per cent of a withdrawal from an individual learning account.
- · The skills and learning premium is strengthened with a fixed amount a basic sum of SEK 1 000 applying irrespective of the number of study days.
- \cdot The premium will take the form of a tax deduction. The possibility for special tax adjustment will be investigated so that this stimulation will benefit the individual during the course.
- · Special rules will ensure that abuse does not occur.

Individuals saving in a learning account will later be able to withdraw savings without having undergone learning and skills development. In this case, withdrawn funds will be liable to full income tax

Employers depositing funds in an employee's learning account receive a tax deduction corresponding to a reduction of the employer contribution by 10 percentage points. An equivalent reduction will be given to individual business operators and partners in trading partnerships. Financing

Stimulation to individual learning and skills development will be financed within the framework given in the 2000 Budget Bill. The framework amounts to SEK 1.15 billion per year and will be financed by increased energy tax revenue. The funds on the account at the National Debt Office in anticipation of the new reform will be used to cover the deficit during the years in which the system will be built up (at the close of 2002, this account amounts to SEK 3.65 billion, including deposits for 2002). In the longer term, the system will be in financial balance. Entry into force, etc.

The system is intended to enter into force on 1 July 2003 (2004 taxation applies to income tax issues) as regards the possibility of savings with tax deductions, learning and skills development premiums, etc. The account system will have been competed around 1 July 2003 after decision by the Riksdag in the autumn of 2002.

Swedens Economy 20022004

Swedens gross domestic product (GDP) is expected to increase by 1.4 per cent this year and 2.8 per cent next year. Swedish exports were hard hit by the substantial weakening of the international economy and the global downturn in the ICT sector in 2001. The effects on the economy were dampened, however, by a highly expansionary fiscal policy. The latest statistics indicate that a recovery has now begun, both in Sweden and internationally. Despite the economic recovery and the expansionary fiscal policy, open unemployment is expected to rise slightly this year as a repercussion of the economic downturn in 2001. Next year, unemployment is once again expected to reach 4.0 per cent. General government net lending is estimated to amount to 1.8 per cent of GDP in the years 20022004.

International developments

The downturn in the global economy last year was prolonged by the terrorist

attacks in the United States, but there are now growing signs of a recovery. Confidence among households and firms has strengthened and forward-looking indicators are pointing upward. The improvement is particularly evident in the United States, where GDP growth began to recover as early as the fourth quarter of last year.

In the United States, the expansionary fiscal policy is forecast to contribute to growth of 1.8 per cent this year and almost 4 per cent next year. In the EU, an export-driven recovery is expected to lead to growth of just below 1.5 per cent this year and just over 2.5 per cent next year. The underlying problems in the Japanese economy are expected to cause GDP to fall this year. Overall, global GDP growth is estimated to amount to just over 2.5 per cent this year and around 4 per cent next year. Uncertainty regarding the development of the global economy has eased considerably compared with the situation that prevailed immediately after the events of 11 September. However, the latest developments in the Middle East, and not least the effects on the price of oil, constitute a risk factor.

Developments in Sweden 20022003

The expected upturn in the international economy will entail a gradual strengthening of the Swedish economy and a recovery in exports. Another important factor fuelling growth in Sweden is an expansionary fiscal policy, which will cause household real disposable income to increase by almost 10 per cent overall in the years 20012003.

Despite the fact that the Swedish export industry became more competitive in 2001, Swedish exports of goods declined. This is mainly due to the fact that exports of telecommunication equipment plummeted. The initially strong competitive position and the improved international economy are expected to contribute to accelerated growth in exports in the future. Exports of telecommunication equipment are gradually picking up. Overall, exports of goods are estimated to increase by 1.5 per cent this year and almost 8 per cent next year.

There was a significant fall in imports last year. This year, imports are expected to rise as exports and household consumption pick up. However, due to the low level of imports at the end of 2001, the growth rate this year is expected to be around zero. Next year, imports are estimated to increase by 8.5 per cent.

Industrial investment decreased as a result of the weak industrial activity in 2001. This year, industrial activity is expected to strengthen. Initially, the growth in demand will be met by excess capacity utilisation but towards the end of the year and during next year, an upturn in industrial investment is forecast. The rollout of third generation mobile phone networks, increased housing investment and extensive central government investment in infrastructure will contribute to investment growth in the future. Overall, investment is estimated

to increase by just over 2 per cent this year and by 5 per cent in 2003.

Significant destocking took place in both trade and industry last year. It is estimated that the destocking in industry is not yet complete and will thus dampen GDP growth also this year. Next year, some voluntary stockbuilding is expected to take place, making a positive contribution to GDP growth.

The sharp growth trend in household consumption in recent years was broken last year. Strong growth in disposable income, increased confidence in the future and a good wealth position are expected have a positive effect on developments in the future. Consumption growth is forecast at 1.7 per cent this year and almost 3 per cent next year.

The local government sector is expected to adjust its consumption to meet the balanced budget requirement. Consumption expenditure is estimated to increase by 0.7 per cent this year and 0.5 per cent in 2003.

Despite the weak economic development last year, the number of employed increased by almost 2 per cent between 2000 and 2001 and open unemployment fell to 4.0 per cent, measured as an annual average. However, both employment and unemployment showed a weak development during the year. There was also a significant drop in average hours worked. The effects of the increased activity in the economy are expected to become apparent in the labour market towards the end of this year and during next year. The number of employed is forecast to fall by 0.4 per cent this year and to grow by the same amount next year.

Last year, hourly wages grew at a slightly higher rate than what is considered to be compatible with balanced economic development. An anticipated slower rate of wage increase combined with a reduction in the effects of temporary price increases on inflation are expected to cause inflation measured as the change in the consumer price index (CPI) to drop to around 2 per cent at the end of 2002 and to remain at this level in 2003.

Public finances

For the year 2001, general government net lending amounted to SEK 105 billion, or 4.8 per cent of GDP, according to the National Accounts. The high level of net lending last year was partly due to the incomplete periodization of tax revenue, which added SEK 42 billion to reported net lending. The periodization effect arises primarily as a result of variations in corporate profits and capital gains. Taxes on these are reported in the National Accounts with a one-year time lag. The exceptionally high level of tax on corporate profits and capital gains in 2000, as well as the tax on the distributed funds from the insurance company, Alecta (formerly SPP), were consequently not reported until 2001. Adjusted for the accounting practice with tax revenue, net lending last year amounted to SEK 62 billion, or 2.9 per cent of GDP. Net lending with periodized taxes better reflects the underlying trend in public finances.

Tax revenue as a percentage of GDP will fall sharply in 2002. This is partly due to the tax cuts and partly to the substantial effects of the accounting practice with tax revenue in 2001. As a percentage of GDP, expenditure has fallen continuously since 1994, and the expenditure ratio last year was 54.4 per cent, which is the lowest level since 1976. The expenditure ratio is expected to remain virtually unchanged in 2002. Net lending is estimated at SEK 41 billion, or 1.8 per cent of GDP. Taking the periodization effects into account, net lending will fall this year by SEK 27 billion to 1.6 per cent of GDP. This underlying reduction is largely equivalent to the tax reductions for the year.

In 2003, income and expenditure as a percentage of GDP will fall, despite the fact that the change to a taxed guaranteed pension will raise both tax revenue and expenditure by 0.5 per cent of GDP. Net lending is estimated at 1.8 per cent of GDP. In 2004, the reduction in income and expenditure as a percentage of GDP will continue; the estimate for net lending for that year is also 1.8 per cent of GDP.

In 2001, the allocation of net lending between central government and the old-age pension system was affected by the major transfer from the National Pension Funds to the central government, as part of the financial phasing-in of the reformed old-age pension system. For the years 20022004, it is estimated that net lending in the pension system, i.e. the National Pension Funds and the premium pension system, will amount to over 2 per cent of GDP. This means that a sum in excess of the financial surplus target for the whole general government sector will be used to build up the pension funds in preparation for the strain on resources which is expected in the future as a result of the demographic development. At the same time, central government net lending will show a small deficit, while the local government sectors finances will be in balance.

The surplus in the general government sector will lead to a steady improvement in the financial position. In 2001, net debt was replaced by a positive balance. For 20022004, this positive balance will grow in pace with the surplus in net lending. Central government debt and the consolidated gross debt will fall as a percentage of GDP.

Medium-term estimates and alternative scenarios

Despite a relatively strong recovery next year, resource utilisation is expected to remain lower than normal. This means that the recovery can continue in 2004, when GDP is estimated to increase by 2.5 per cent. Open unemployment is expected to continue to fall slightly and the regular employment rate among people aged 2064 is forecast to rise to 78 per cent.

Two alternative scenarios present the effects on economic developments of other assumptions regarding the level of resource utilisation and the functioning of the labour market and wage formation. In a high-growth scenario, the labour market functions better than in the base scenario and the government meets its employment target (80 per cent of the population in the 20-64 age group employed in the regular labour market in 2004). In a low-growth scenario, the labour market and wage formation function less well than in the base scenario and the resource situation is assumed to be considerably more strained initially, resulting in a weaker economic development.

Anna Lindh on Israel's actions: A week of shame

"During the past week, frightening reports have reached me concerning the destruction the Israeli military offensive has left in its wake in the refugee camps in Jenin and Nablus. We do not yet know the extent of the destruction since Israel is blocking the reporting of all news. There is talk of a massacre. Thus, I fear the worst in this week of shame", says Minister for Foreign Affairs Anna Lindh in a statement concerning the events of the past week.

"I have reacted very strongly to what has been happening. The offensive can in no way be defended. It is provocative of Israel's government to continue the offensive in contravention of Security Council resolutions and despite strong calls from the international community, including the EU, the US and Russia, for an immediate retreat. Israel's government has acted illegally as well as immorally", says Ms Lindh.

"In Sweden, we are now pinning our hopes on Colin Powell succeeding in his difficult mission during his current visit to the region. He has the active support of the EU, the UN and Russia. The visit must be used to bring about an immediate withdrawal of Israeli troops from Palestinian territory. International observers are needed to supervise the cease-fire. But, in addition, impartial investigations are also needed into the information that has emerged about massacres in the refugee camps in order to establish what has actually happened.

We must use all our efforts to put a stop to the crisis before it becomes totally out of control", concludes Ms Lindh.

Central Government's Annual Report for 2001 presented today

The Government today presented the Annual Report for the Central Government Sector for 2001 to the Riksdag. The aim of this communication is to give an overall picture of developments in the financial results and economic position of the central government sector over the course of the year.

The Annual Report shows that the central government sector strengthened its economic position in 2001. The budget policy targets were met. The surplus in public finances came to 4.8 per cent of the gross domestic product, the highest level in over a decade. For the sake of comparison, the target set by the Riksdag for 2001 was 2.5 per cent. Expenditure remained SEK 4.7 billion below the SEK 791 billion expenditure ceiling set by the Riksdag. The surpluses both in the central government budget and in the income statement have helped make it possible to pay off central government debt for the fourth year in a row. At the end of the year, central government debt was 53.3 per cent of GDP, which is a return to the level seen at the beginning of the 1990s.

There are a number of explanations for the positive results. The crucial factor is budgetary discipline, preventing expenditure from exceeding the ceiling approved for the central government sector. Some major individual factors that have otherwise affected the outcome of both the central government budget and the balance sheet and income statement include higher tax revenues, an extra payout from the Riksbank and the redistribution of resources between the national pension funds and the central government budget in connection with the phasing in of the new pension system. The largest changes on the costs side have occurred in the social insurance system, where costs for both sickness benefits and pensions have gone up.

The visit to Nigeria included talks on democracy and regional cooperation with representatives both of the government and of the regional cooperation organisation ECOWAS. State Secretary Andersson has also opened the new Swedish Embassy in Abuja.

Decision on refusal-of-entry and return to Northern Iraq

Today the Government has taken a guideline decision in relation to refusal-of-entry and return to Northern Iraq. The decision involves a category of people who have hitherto been granted residence permit in Sweden because it has not been practically possible for them to return to Northern Iraq. The situation has changed because of the agreement that the Swedish Migration Board has signed with the International Organisation on Migration (IOM), which in turn has a cooperation agreement with the Turkish NGO, the Anatolian Development Foundation (ADF), authorised by the UN High Commissioner for Refugees to help returning refugees. The organisation only works with people who return voluntarily.

Regarding persons, who after an individual examination, have been assessed as not requiring protection, it was decided by the Government that

- those who come from northern Iraq may return there
- those who come from central Iraq may return to northern Iraq if they have a clear connection with this region

Five separate cases had been forwarded from the Swedish Migration Board to the Government for guideline decisions. One of the applicants was granted a residence permit because of a need for protection. The other four cases were forwarded back to the Swedish Migration Board for further processing owing to the need for a more extensive examination and to the fact that the principle for examining asylum cases in more than one instance should be maintained.

The Government has also taken a guideline decision regarding the principle of refusal-of-entry and return to Germany in accordance with the Dublin Convention. It refers to an Iraqi national who applied for asylum in Germany before coming to Sweden.

Decision on refusal-of-entry and return to Bosnia and Herzegovina

Today the Government has taken a guideline decision in relation to refusal-of-entry and return to Bosnia and Herzegovina. The Government decided that the so-called internal flight alternative will apply to asylum seekers from Bosnia and Herzegovina.

The current situation in Bosnia and Herzegovina and the normalisation process for returning Bosnians mean that there is no reason to grant residence permits for political-humanitarian reasons to the majority of asylum-seekers from Bosnia and Herzegovina. Persons who believe that they would have difficulties in living in one place have the option to settle in other parts of the country. However, each specific case is examined individually.

The decision involves a Bosnian family whose case was previously examined by the Swedish Migration Board. The Aliens Appeals Board forwarded the case to the Government.

Statute of the International Criminal Court enters into force

When ten states have today deposited their ratification instrument for the Rome Statute of the International Criminal Court, the required ratification by 60 states will be fulfilled. This means the Statute will enter into force on 1 July this year and the Court can soon become a reality.

"The establishment of this permanent International Criminal Court is a historic event, perhaps the most important in international law since the Charter of the United Nations," the Minister for Justice, Thomas Bodström, and the Minister for Foreign Affairs, Anna Lindh, say in a comment. "This Court will provide the international community with an essential tool for fighting violations of human rights and war crimes."

"Together with many other states, and particularly within the framework of the European Union, Sweden has worked hard to realise the Court."

"We urge all other states to demonstrate their support for democracy and human rights by ratifying the Statute. It is essential that respect for the Court be strengthened by all countries and major judicial systems being represented."

The Court, which will be situated in The Hague will be able to pass judgment on war crimes, genocide, crimes against humanity and, in the future, perhaps also crimes of aggression. The Statute was adopted on 17 June 1998. It has been signed by 139 states and so far has been ratified by 66, of which Bosnia and Herzegovina, Bulgaria, Cambodia, the Democratic Republic of the Congo, Ireland, Jordan, Mongolia, Niger, Romania and Slovakia ratified today. During the autumn and winter 2002-2003 the states will take a number of decisions, inter alia on the budget and selection of judges and prosecutors. The Court is expected to be fully operational in a year or two. On 11 June during the Swedish Presidency, the EU Council of Ministers adopted a common position. It comprises several measures which will be taken by the Union to support the establishment of the Court and world-wide accession to its Statute.

Sweden was the 36th state to ratify the Statute on 28 June. The Riksdag is currently processing draft

legislation for Swedish judicial cooperation with the Court. Furthermore, a special committee of inquiry is reviewing matters relating to international crime in Swedish law.

Sweden contributes SEK 70 million to the UN High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR) programme for the return of Afghan refugees and internally displaced persons.

"I warmly welcome the agreement on a cease-fire which was signed today between the Angolan government and the UNITA guerrilla," the Minister for Foreign Affairs, Ms Anna Lindh, says. "Peace finally appears to be within reach in Angola."

The 1994 Lusaka peace agreement will now be fully implemented. This means the UNITA guerrilla army will be disarmed and integrated into society. Furthermore, broad participation in political life will be encouraged in preparation for a general election.

"A new strategy will now be drawn up for Sweden's cooperation with Angola. A starting-point for Sweden is that the Angolan government bear the main responsibility for assisting the millions of Angolans in need and for the reconstruction of the country. I therefore take note of the Government's pledge to give special priority to the needs of the civilian population," Ms Lindh says.

"I will shortly be sending a personal representative to Angola to see how Sweden can best assist in this new hopeful situation. This will give us a chance to discuss the matter on the spot with the Angolan government and with the UN which still has an important role to play in the peace process."

Kick-off in Monterrey in fight against poverty

Unofficial translation

"The results in Monterrey are far better than anticipated", says Minister for Development Cooperation, Migration and Asylum Policy Jan O. Karlsson in a comment on the conference on financing for development that concludes today in Monterrey. "The amount of development assistance provided by the world's rich countries has declined over the last fifteen years. But in Monterrey both the USA and Europe have undertaken to substantially increase development assistance. This is an important change of direction", says Jan O. Karlsson.

"But it will take more than development assistance to eradicate poverty. Trade and direct

investments will have to play their part, otherwise there will be no development", says Minister for Finance Bosse Ringholm. "The developing countries need tools to enable them to take advantage of globalisation. They need to be given a better chance to manage their debts, attract foreign investment and negotiate reasonable trade agreements", says Bosse Ringholm.

The Monterrey conference is widely regarded as a great step forward. The fact that the final document of the conference, the Monterrey Consensus, was negotiated even before the conference began (Ruth Jacoby from Sweden was among those leading the negotiations) was progress in itself, since the Consensus now serves as a launch pad rather than a finishing line for the objectives and ambitions of the conference. In Monterrey, the international community has given its full support to crucial demands pushed by Sweden. These include the requirement for each country to demonstrate a will to deepen its democracy and respect human rights so that development can reach the poor, greater harmony between trade, development assistance and investment, increased market access for developing countries and augmented capacity for debt management.

"The results in Monterrey inspire optimism and prepare the way for further progress in the run-up to the conference on sustainable development in Johannesburg, South Africa, in September this year", says Jan O. Karlsson.

A few specific Swedish undertakings in Monterrey:

- * The Swedish initiative for an international commission on global public goods has received widespread support. The commission is intended to promote international cooperation to solve global problems, for example, water supply and the fight against diseases such as HIV/AIDS and malaria.
- * Sweden has entered into an agreement with the World Bank that will mean more than SEK 20 million in support to assist African governments in their endeavours to make development assistance more effective and implement their anti-poverty strategies.
- * In association with a number of other countries, Sweden is establishing a new international organisation whose role will be to strengthen the position of developing countries in world trade negotiations by means of actions tailored to individual cases.
- * Sweden joined the UK and the Inter-American Development Bank in arranging a seminar where new initiatives were presented for public-private collaboration in mobilising resources for infrastructure development.

Decision in Monterrey on organisation to strengthen developing countries in WTO

The Minister for Development Cooperation, Migration and Asylum Policy, Jan O. Karlsson, will today join ministers from a range of countries including the UK, Switzerland, Angola and Zambia in signing a decision to establish an international organisation to give developing countries a stronger voice in the work of the World Trade Organisation (WTO).

Government communication on arms exports

Cooperation, Migration and Asylum Policy Jan O. Karlsson.

The Government submitted to the Riksdag today a written communication on Swedish export control policy and the export of military equipment for 2001.

The value of actual Swedish military equipment exports fell from SEK 4.3 billion to SEK 3 billion during 2001.

The largest recipient countries were the United States, Norway, Denmark, Germany and Brazil. More than half of Swedish arms exports went to these countries.

The value of the permits granted for the future export of military equipment increased during 2001 from SEK 4.6 billion to SEK 23.9 billion. The dramatic increase can be attributed to export permits that were granted during the year for the export of JAS Gripen to South Africa and the export of Combat Vehicle 90 to Switzerland.

"The sale of JAS Gripen to South Africa means that Swedish arms exports will increase in the coming years," says Minister for Trade Leif Pagrotsky. "A deal of this magnitude is sufficient to

increase exports many times over."

In this year's communication, the Government has increased the amount of information provided about Sweden's exports of military equipment. In the communication, the value of the export permits granted per recipient country are reported for the first time. This provides a clear picture of the scope of the granting of permits to a certain country and is yet another step towards greater openness surrounding the export of military equipment.

New Ambassador in Pyongyang

The Government today approved a decision to appoint Paul Beijer to the position of Ambassador in Pyongyang. Since September 2001 he has been chargé d'affaires at the embassy and has previously served, inter alia, at the embassies in Paris and Luanda.

The decision implies an upgrading of Sweden's diplomatic representation in the Democratic People's Republic of Korea. Since the embassy in Pyongyang was opened in 1973 the Swedish Ambassador in Beijing has been dual accredited to Pyongyang while in practice the embassy has been superintended by an acting head of mission (chargé d'affaires). This upgrading means that Sweden will have the same level of diplomatic representation as two other EU states (Germany and the United Kingdom) which recently opened embassies in Pyongyang. It also indicates an emphasis on continued active Swedish engagement in North Korea, both bilaterally and within the framework of EU policy on Korea. Through the embassy, Sweden will continue its assignments as protecting power for, among others, the USA.

The Government decided today to appoint Peter Tejler as Ambassador to Kabul, Afghanistan. Mr Tejler will be concurrently accredited from Islamabad, Pakistan, where he has served as Sweden's Ambassador since 1999. Diplomatic relations between Sweden and Afghanistan have been dormant since the Soviet occupation of Afghanistan.

The appointment of Ambassador Tejler is intended as an expression of support for the interim administration that has been in place in Kabul since 22 December. It is also confirmation of Sweden's long-term commitment to Afghanistan and our undertaking to contribute to the reconstruction of the country.

Sweden has provided extensive humanitarian assistance to Afghanistan over the past 20 years. On 24 January, the Government adopted a new strategy for development cooperation with Afghanistan. The strategy, which covers a three-year period, has a proposed budget of SEK 750 million to SEK 1 billion.

In the course of the spring, the Swedish International Development Cooperation Agency will be opening a field office in Kabul.

Leif Pagrotsky comments on the meeting of trade ministers of the Baltic Sea States in Moscow

Today, the ministers for trade and economic affairs of the Baltic Sea States met in Moscow to discuss how trade and economic growth could be improved in the region.

During the meeting, the importance of shortening times for border passage of goods was stressed. The ministers reiterated the target they had previously established of a maximum of two hours for the passage of goods across borders.

"This target has been achieved at an increasing number of border stations", said Minister for Trade Leif Pagrotsky after the conclusion of the meeting. "But much remains to be done before this serious obstacle is completely eliminated.

If we are to make use of the enormous economic potential represented by the Baltic Sea region, we must ensure that unnecessary border obstacles are removed. It is meaningless to invest billions in roads and railways to save a few minutes in transport times, if one then has to wait for over ten hours to cross borders between countries".

At the meeting Leif Pagrotsky also emphasised the importance of the Baltic Sea Region cooperating to improve its capacity to attract investments.

"It is important that the international community sees the region in its entirety, and I therefore urge investment promotion organisations in these countries to strengthen their mutual collaboration. This would enable a common Baltic Sea Joint Investment Area to be created. One of the preconditions for ensuring that the Baltic Sea region is seen as an attractive area for investment is that it becomes a region in which transparency, predictability and the rule of law prevail everywhere.

The potential of the Baltic Sea region and its significance for Sweden are demonstrated by the fact that Sweden's exports to the Baltic Sea States are increasing, despite the cooling of the international economy. Most impressive is the fact that our exports to Russia increased by 71 per cent last year".

A new nature conservation policy

Yesterday the Government made a decision on the nature conservation report. In it, the Government formulated a cohesive and partly new nature conservation policy.

Nature conservation is an important component in the work of creating a sustainable society. Access to a rich and varied natural environment must be seen as part of our welfare: nature conservation policy is about the quality of life. Nature conservation must also be brought closer to the citizen. These are three of the underlying principles of the report.

Nature conservation policy in the report is partly based on previously established policy, particularly that applying to the environmental quality objectives and their accompanying sub-goals. The main emphasis of the report is given to formulating, on the one hand, the Government's basic views regarding nature conservation policy and on the other, the areas to be focused upon.

Why a cohesive nature conservation policy?

There are several reasons for formulating a cohesive policy for nature conservation:

- · It is an important instrument for achieving many of the environmental quality objectives and sub-goals.
- · During recent years, nature conservation has been allocated more government funds than ever. These increased efforts mean a great responsibility to use the money effectively and ensure that the total sum of all these nature conservation initiatives will yield results that will benefit both citizens and the natural environment.
- · There is a need to strengthen nature conservation in water environments. Nature conservation has traditionally been more active on land than in the sea or lakes.
- · Municipal nature conservation and nature conservation in urban areas must be reinforced. The majority of people now live in cities and urban areas. Considerably more value and importance should therefore be attributed to natural environments near urban areas when urban planning is being undertaken.
- · A dialogue with citizens needs to be developed and thus also new working forms for nature conservation. The demand and need for involvement in different processes is increasing generally throughout all sectors of society, and this also applies to nature conservation. Nature conservation must develop working methods that address this need for local involvement and public support.
- · Integration and gender equality efforts. It is important to find out about how new Swedes regard the natural environment and nature conservation and about heir expectations and visions for the future of our landscape and natural environment. Being out in the open air when hunting and fishing has long been an activity for men. Women's preferences must be given more attention.

The basic views of the Government on nature conservation policy Government policy in different sectors should contribute to the objective of sustainable development: economic, social and ecological. Sustainable development means that today's needs are addressed without endangering the opportunities of coming generations. Nature conservation has points of contact with all three dimensions of sustainable development, despite the fact that its focus is on the ecological dimension. The preservation and sustainable use of biological diversity is one of several basic criteria for sustainable development. If we look after plants and animals and maintain a functioning ecosystem, we also preserve a good living environment for human beings.

People's need for nature and cultural experiences, relaxation and the feeling of being close to nature is part of the social dimension. The natural environment and the right of common access are fundamental for outdoor activities. Outdoor activities, in turn, contribute to good public health. Nature conservation is also significant for the economic dimension, primarily for agriculture and forestry, reindeer husbandry and fishing. An example of this is the need for functioning food chains, if fish stocks are to be maintained.

The natural environment is also of intrinsic value, irrespective of whether or not it is profitable.

Some issues to which particular attention has been drawn:

- · Nature conservation nearer to citizens more intensive citizen dialogue: local forums and platforms for users, landowners, local authority representatives, organisations, etc, should be encouraged and established. The aim of these is to facilitate the dialogue on how to achieve nature conservation objectives. Local actors should be made use of more extensively when nature conservation measures are to be implemented.
- · Efforts for local nature conservation: the Government wants to invest in local authority nature conservation via a special programme. This will give local authorities and local actors within the municipalities the chance to apply for grants for different nature conservation projects. These projects will help to achieve one or several of the environmental quality objectives or sub-goals established by the Riksdag. The programme will start in 2004.
- · The principle of the right of access remains unchanged. The right of access is a fundamental condition for open air activities in Sweden.
- · Open air activities and people's experiences of the natural environment are focused upon as an important basis for nature conservation policy. Natural environments near urban areas have a very important role to play since it is here that the majority of the population often have an opportunity to be. The Government has commissioned the county administrative boards of Stockholm, Western Götaland and Skåne, together with the municipalities involved, with the special task of producing a programme for how the most valuable areas near to the cities can be given permanent protection and administration.
- The Swedish Environmental Protection Agency will make a review of the National Park Plan and find new areas that are potential candidates for new national parks. The work of establishing new national parks will be undertaken together with regional and local actors.
- · Efforts to set up further urban national parks will continue to be made. The county administrative board of Stockholm County will be given a clear role in the administration of the country's first urban national park hitherto. This will include drawing up a plan for management of the park.
- · The Government wishes to undertake a national inventory of the lakes, water courses and coastal waters that are particularly worth preserving. Today there is no such inventory.
- · The Government places emphasis on the fact that areas that are protected must also be administered and made more accessible. They should provide information services, guided tours, car parks and other facilities. The basic principle is that areas that are protected should benefit both the natural inhabitants of the environment and all citizens. The motto is värna vårda visa (shelter -- shield -- show).

The Government, the Left Party and the Green Party support the report together. It will be presented to the Riksdag on Thursday 21 March. It will then also be available on the Ministry of the Environment's website http://miljo.regeringen.se/

Swedish cooperation agreement with Ethiopia

Minister for Development Cooperation Jan O. Karlsson and Ethiopia's Minister for Finance Sufian Ahmed will sign an agreement in Addis Ababa today on bilateral cooperation and support for development initiatives in the Amhara region of north-western Ethiopia. Cooperation in Amhara will consist, inter alia, of support to agriculture, microcredits and road construction. "Continuity and concrete measures are needed to strengthen and develop a poor province like Amhara, which is often seriously affected by drought and starvation. This agreement will enable us to concentrate on long-term development of the province", says Jan O. Karlsson. The Development Minister's visit to Ethiopia will include talks on the future direction of Swedish development assistance to Ethiopia. The visit is also part of the preparations leading up to the international conference on financing for development, due to take place this week in Monterrey, Mexico.

Ethiopia is one of the world's poorest countries. It was one of the first recipient countries for Swedish development assistance and cooperation began as early as the 1950s. Today, development assistance focuses on poverty alleviation, and particularly on rural development. Efforts are also being made to promote human rights and Sweden is giving considerable humanitarian support to Ethiopia. Sida's country framework for Ethiopia in 2002 amounts to SEK 150 million.

EU trade ministers discuss steel

Transatlantic relations were high on the agenda when the EU Ministers for Trade met in Toledo on Monday. The Spanish EU Presidency had prepared a discussion on the need for trade policy cooperation between the EU and the US, but attention was focused instead on the current dispute on steel.

The Government decided today to commission Sida to recruit a maximum of four election observers to monitor the election of independent East Timor's first president. This is being organised by the UN Transitional Administration in East Timor (UNTAET) and is due to take place on 14 April. Independence is expected to be proclaimed on 20 May.

The Swedish election observers will be part of an observer mission of 30 people that the EU is sending to East Timor.

Statement by Anna Lindh on the latest developments in the Middle East

"The Swedish Government welcomes last night's UN Security Council resolution on the situation in the Middle East. It shows that the international community stands united in its demand for an immediate stop to the violence and terror", comments Minister for Foreign Affairs Anna Lindh. "It is gratifying that, for the first time, the Security Council confirms the vision of two states – Israel and Palestine – living side by side in peaceful coexistence, within secure and recognised boundaries. The Security Council has thus clearly indicated a direction for the continued peace process.

I fully concur with the strong statement of Kofi Annan in connection with the meeting of the Security Council. The Government shares his deep concern over the increasing violence and over Israeli use of heavy weapons in civilian areas. We also agree with his demand that Israel must stop its illegal occupation.

The Security Council action comes at a time when it is more important than ever to put out clear signals to the parties. It is a reflection of the terrible developments of recent weeks. The current violence is unacceptable and must cease immediately.

Of central importance is the enjoinder by the Security Council to ensure the protection of civilians and respect for international humanitarian law. In a letter to my Israeli colleague, Shimon Peres, I have therefore requested that Israel respects the Geneva Convention in full", says Anna Lindh.

Sweden and Finland present proposals for the development of EAPC and PfP

Sweden and Finland have today presented a joint paper containing proposals for the future development of the Euro-Atlantic Partnership Council (EAPC) and the Partnership for Peace (PfP). The proposals will be handed over to NATO's Secretary-General Lord Robertson and the 46 EAPC countries in Brussels.

The Swedish-Finnish paper is a contribution to the review ongoing within EAPC which aims to adapt the partnership to developments in the security policy area in Europe, including NATO's planned enlargement, closer relations between NATO and Russia, the EU's evolving crisis management capability, the increasingly broader security concept and the need for cooperation to counter terrorism. The review will continue until the EAPC and NATO summits in Prague in November, although these issues are already expected to be discussed at the meeting of foreign ministers in Reykjavik in May.

The Swedish-Finnish proposals aim, inter alia, to strengthen the role of EAPC and PfP in practical cooperation in joint peace support efforts and to adapt the development of the common capability to carry out crisis management missions to each country's contribution and needs. The proposals also include the further development of military and civil exercise activities for crisis management and rescue services. Furthermore, intensified cooperation is proposed in civil emergency preparedness issues and disaster relief missions to improve the ability to handle the consequences of natural

disasters, accidents, acts of terrorism and other severe civil emergencies.

Like all other partnership countries, Sweden and Finland are taking part in the review and therefore have the opportunity to present ideas. In their capacity as non-participants in military alliances with active commitment to international peace efforts, Sweden and Finland have a special interest in contributing to the development of cooperation within the framework of EAPC and PfP. The planning dialogue and exercise operations carried on within the framework of PfP are of central importance for developing the capacity of participant countries to interwork in international crisis management, both within the framework of the NATO-led operation in the Balkans and in missions led by the EU and the UN.

Stabilisation policy in the monetary union

The Government Commission on Stabilisation Policy for Full Employment in the Event of Swedish Membership in the Monetary Union (Fi 2000:07) today delivered its final report to the Minister for Finance.

Membership in the monetary union means a change in the stabilisation policy regime because domestic monetary policy disappears as an instrument to stabilise the economy. Instead, Sweden will become a participant in a common European monetary and exchange rate policy. Sweden thereby loses the opportunity to counteract macroeconomic shocks that specifically affect the Swedish economy with the help of changes in the interest rate level. This increases the demands on the labour market to adjust, and on fiscal policy. The primary purpose of this investigation is to analyse the problems which may arise in this new stabilisation policy regime and to propose how fiscal policy is best pursued under these new conditions.

Adjustments of relative wage costs will become essential to stabilise employment in case of large shocks to aggregate demand that hit Sweden differently from other member countries. EMU membership may to some extent strengthen the incentives of the labour market parties to achieve an increased nominal wage flexibility, for example through shorter contract periods, clauses that tie wage growth to macroeconomic developments, more frequent renegotiations of existing agreements and less resistance to low nominal wage increases. However, there is reason to believe that changes in nominal wage flexibility will be rather limited and only to a minor extent will compensate for the loss of national monetary policy as an instrument of stabilisation policy.

In the debate, special interest has been attached to so-called buffer funds as a means to increase wage cost flexibility. The view of the Government Commission is that a system with buffer funds, under the auspices of the labour market parties and constructed properly, could contribute to increasing the economy's ability to adjust, thereby moderating cyclical fluctuations. An agreement among the labour market parties on such a system should therefore be welcomed, but the advantages are not so significant that they justify government subsidies.

In the case of a Swedish participation in the monetary union, the need for a domestic anchor for the long-term rate of inflation disappears. Fiscal policy should instead have as a primary stabilisation policy target to counteract major fluctuations in the level of activity both in the short and medium term. Such a stabilisation should be pursued under the restriction of the target for general government net lending over the business cycle. Price and wage cost developments relative to other countries are particularly relevant indicators of the possibilities to stabilise the level of activity in the medium term and should therefore be given a prominent role when formulating fiscal policy. Discretionary fiscal policy, that is, a policy of active decisions to change taxes and public expenditures, should only be used for stabilisation purposes in the event of major macroeconomic shocks. The motives for this are that fiscal policy has a tendency to be too expansionary, that the fiscal policy decision process is slow, and that measures of the cyclical state of the economy (the output gap) are uncertain. In case of small shocks, fiscal policy stabilisation should be achieved through the automatic stabilisers, whereas discretionary fiscal policy should be focused on attaining the target for general government net lending over the business cycle, as laid down by the

parliament.

The institutional framework of fiscal policy has in recent years been reformed in a way that decreases the risk of stabilisation policy failures. However, since EMU membership will entail increasing importance of fiscal policy as a stabilising tool, further steps are justified to ensure that fiscal policy is pursued in a way that is desirable from the perspective of stabilisation policy. The Government Commission presents the following proposals:

- The parliament (the Riksdag) should determine a basic framework for pursuing fiscal policy in the case of Sweden's participation in the monetary union, with the following guidelines:
- The objective of fiscal policy as regards stabilisation policy shall be to counteract major deviations from the sustainable level of output in the short and medium term. This is equivalent to stabilising employment and unemployment near their equilibrium levels.
- Discretionary fiscal policy shall only be used for stabilisation purposes in the case of major shocks, roughly equivalent to an output gap of at least plus or minus two per cent.
- To create room for automatic stabilisers and discretionary fiscal policy in the event of major shocks, general government net lending should amount to 2.5, or alternatively, 3 per cent of GDP on average over the business cycle.
- To ensure enough room for stabilisation policy, the budget margin below the central government expenditure ceiling should be divided into a margin for cyclical expenditure and a planning margin. The margin for cyclical expenditure must not be utilised for anything besides such increases in expenditure that follow automatically from cyclical developments, including labour market policy measures, or for discretionary fiscal policy decisions to stabilise the economy during major shocks. The margin for cyclical expenditure should amount to approximately three per cent of the expenditures restricted by the ceiling. The planning margin is to cover planned 'reforms' and uncertainty in forecasts that are the result of factors other than the business cycle, to the extent that the government does not wish to balance increases in expenditure of this type with changes that decrease other expenditures.
- · An advisory body, a fiscal policy council, should be set up with the task of analysing macroeconomic developments and making fiscal-policy recommendations based on the guidelines determined by the Riksdag. The fiscal policy council should be an authority under the auspices of the government, but independent. The recommendations of the council are to be strictly focused on stabilisation policy. The council's analyses and recommendations should be presented twice a year, once in the beginning of March to serve as a basis of government and Riksdag work on the Spring Budget Bill, and then in early August to serve as a basis for the work on the Budget Bill. The government should take a stand on the recommendations of the council and motivate deviations from them.
- · In order to facilitate the decision process the government should select a small number of appropriate fiscal policy measures in advance for use as policy tools during major macroeconomic shocks. These instruments should, as far as possible, have general aggregate-demand effects and have as small effects as possible on income distribution and resource allocation. The measures should be used for a limited time period fixed in advance. The instruments that according to the Government Commission primarily should be considered are:
- a proportional 'business cycle tax' or 'business cycle tax reduction' in the income tax system
- temporary changes in the value-added tax
- variations in payroll taxes
- variations in public consumption and public investment
- · Local government income should be stabilised over the business cycle. This could be achieved by calculating the local government tax base on the basis of an average of taxable incomes over several years. Alternatively, central government grants can be formulated so that they automatically compensate for the effects of the business cycle on the local government tax base.

Bosse Ringholm comments on EMU report

Minister for Finance Bosse Ringholm has the following comments to make on the final report of the Commission on Stabilisation Policy for Full Employment in the event of Swedish Membership in the Monetary Union, which was presented today.

"The report is a contribution to the discussion on the conditions that may apply in the event of Sweden joining the monetary union. It will now be circulated for comments, after which the Government will take a more detailed position on the proposals.

"With regard to the question of establishing a council of experts – a financial policy council – I do not believe that the existence of one more public authority would do anything to strengthen financial policy. It is rather unclear what role a council of this kind could play that is not already covered by some other body", says Bosse Ringholm.

The Government Commission has come in for criticism from various quarters even before presenting its report, on the one hand for concentrating on the problems associated with EMU and on the other hand for assuming that Sweden will in fact join the monetary union.

"The task of the Commission has not been to take a position on whether or not Sweden should join the monetary union. Its brief has been to discuss the changes that should be made in the framework for financial policy so as to make it possible to safeguard full employment in the event of EMU membership. This is why the report takes a problematising approach. Regardless of whether or not we are in EMU, jobs are an absolutely central issue for the Social Democratic Government", says Bosse Ringholm.

Sweden extends budget support to cooperation partners

The Government today approved the allocation of SEK 240 million in budget support for 2002 to Burkina Faso, Honduras, Mali, Rwanda and Tanzania. How can effective cooperation be achieved in solving problems of international importance such as environmental threats, epidemics and terrorism where individual countries take advantage of the efforts of others and market solutions are insufficient or impossible? This question has been given increasing attention as a theme in the debate on development and globalisation.

In order to discuss the matter, the Expert Group on Development Issues (EGDI) and the Ministry for Foreign Affairs are arranging a seminar on 6 March entitled Regional Public Goods:

Typologies, Provision, Financing and Development Assistance.

The basis for the discussion is a new study with the same name, which on the one hand discusses the problems at regional level in poor countries and, on the other, ways in which aid donors can contribute to good solutions. The seminar will be led by the chairman of EGDI, Ms Gun-Britt Andersson, State Secretary for Development Cooperation. The writers Todd Sandler (University of Southern California) and Daniel G. Arce M. (Rhodes College) will be participating as well as Inge Kaul from the United Nations Development Programme (Office of Development Studies). Other participants include representatives of the Swedish International Development Cooperation Agency (Sida), the Government Offices, NGOs and researchers.

Commission to improve reception of lone refugee children

Unofficial translation

The Government today decided to instruct the Swedish Migration Board and the National Board of Health and Welfare, jointly and in consultation with the Swedish Integration Board and the Children's Ombudsman, to improve reception of children from other countries who arrive in Sweden without an accompanying legal guardian (lone refugee children). The assignment should be carried out in collaboration with the Swedish Association of Local Authorities, the Federation of Swedish County Councils and other organisations concerned and should be completed not later than 31 May 2002.

The assignment comprises

- * Mapping out and analysing the reasons why children come to Sweden unaccompanied, to what extent they do so and what preventive action can be taken.
- * On the basis of the applicable legislation, improving collaboration between authorities in order that lone children who come to Sweden be given the same protection and support as Swedish children and that the best interests of the child are always foremost.
- * Carrying out an inquiry into the extent to which legislation is unclear. Amendments to laws should be proposed if necessary.
- * Presenting proposals for ways of spreading information about the reception of lone refugee children.

Council of Europe adopts total death penalty ban

Unofficial translation

The Council of Europe, an organisation based in Strasbourg in France that has been operating since 1949 and now comprises 43 member states, today adopted a text completely banning the death penalty. The decision to adopt a new additional protocol to the European Convention on Human Rights was taken by the highest political organ of the Council of Europe, the Committee of Ministers. The new protocol – Additional Protocol No. 13 – supplements the existing ban on the use of the death penalty in peacetime. In those states that ratify the new additional protocol, capital punishment will also be prohibited in time of war or imminent danger of war.

Most Council of Europe member states have already abolished capital punishment in both peace and wartime. However, the proposal for a complete ban on the death penalty, which the Swedish Government presented to the Council of Europe's Committee of Ministers towards the end of 2000, makes it considerably more difficult to reintroduce capital punishment in countries where it has already been abolished. A further significant effect of the additional protocol that has just been adopted is that it sends a serious signal to other parts of the world that Europe is now determined to consign this inhumane punishment to history. The additional protocol can also be expected to enhance the protection given to asylum-seekers from areas at war. It has been welcomed by human rights organisations such as Amnesty International.

Women's organisations to meet in Kabul this spring

Unofficial translation

Swedish and Afghan women's organisations will meet in Kabul later in the spring. This was the result of a meeting at the Ministry for Foreign Affairs on Thursday between Minister for Development Cooperation Jan O. Karlsson and some 20 representatives of Swedish organisations. The meeting was held to discuss Swedish support to the women of Afghanistan.

"Swedish organisations have important experience that must be made use of in supporting the work of Afghan women. The women of Afghanistan have suffered from terrible oppression. But they refuse to see themselves as victims", says Jan O. Karlsson.

The Government and Sida are giving priority to gender equality work in the country strategy for development assistance to Afghanistan that was adopted in January. Thursday's meeting included discussions on the importance of microcredits directed at women, education and information on human rights, projects to improve maternity and child health care and support for women's participation at all levels of society.

"Today 16 000 women die every year because of deficient or non-existent maternity care. One in

five children dies before the age of five. Opportunities for women to work and support themselves are minimal. Our work to promote the rights of women must start by dealing with the most basic issues", said Minister for Development Cooperation Jan O. Karlsson.

Taking part in the meeting were representatives of Sida, the Kvinna till Kvinna Foundation, the Forum for Cooperation of Women in Sweden (SAMS), the Church of Sweden, Kvinnoforum (Women's Forum), the International Women's Organisation for Peace and Freedom (IKFF), Doctors without Borders, Sveriges Kvinnoråd (the Swedish Women's Council), Centerkvinnorna (Centre Women), the Left Party, the Federation of Liberal Women, Moderatkvinnorna (Moderate Women), Kristdemokratiska kvinnoförbundet (Christian Democratic Women's Association), PMU InterLife, Save the Children and the Swedish Committee for Afghanistan.

"I have two strong images from Afghanistan. On the one hand, the enormous devastation. On the other, the forcefulness and determination to build up this country that I observed, primarily in Afghan women", says Minister for Development Cooperation, Migration and Asylum Policy Jan O. Karlsson. "Just now, this strength is Afghanistan's biggest asset".

Less red tape surrounding work permits

The Government decided today to introduce exemptions from the requirement for work permits for certain foreign citizens. The Aliens Ordinance will be amended as from 1 April this year. The exemptions apply for:

- a total of fourteen working days during a twelve-month period for a foreign artist and his or her technicians and other tour personnel, provided they have received an invitation from a promoter who is included on the Swedish Migration Board; s list of established promoters;
- a total of three months during a twelve-month period for a foreigner who is a professional sportsman or sportswoman or official and who is visiting Sweden to take part in international competitions;
- a total period of time not exceeding one year for a foreigner who has specialist duties within an international concern and who is working temporarily in Sweden in this capacity.
- "We would like to reduce red tape and this will cut down on the paperwork. Sportsmen and sportswomen and artists coming to Sweden to perform for the odd day should not need work permits", says Minister for Development Cooperation, Migration and Asylum Policy Jan O. Karlsson.

"We are living in an increasingly globalised economy. Many of the major Swedish companies belong today to international concerns. By means of today; s decision, we want foreigners with specialist duties within such international concerns to be able to undertake shorter assignments in Sweden without needing to go through the usual procedure of applying for a work permit", says Mr Karlsson.

Jan O. Karlsson acts on behalf of women and homosexuals seeking asylum

The Minister for Migration and Asylum Policy Jan O. Karlsson had talks on Thursday and Friday with the Danish minister responsible for migration policy Bertel Haarder, EU Commissioner Antonio Vitorino and the British State Secretary for migration issues Angela Eagle, among others. The talks focused on the results that have been achieved so far in harmonising EU asylum and migration policies and on continued work in this area.

"Migration is an issue that transcends borders, which means that close cooperation between countries is essential. I regard the harmonisation of EU asylum and migration policies as a unique opportunity to build up a common policy in which human rights have pride of place. However, I can see that work on harmonisation is making slow progress. Some things have been done, but most of the work still remains to do. Consequently, in association with a number of other countries, I have begun to examine possible ways of speeding up the process", says Jan O. Karlsson. Last autumn the EU Commission presented a proposal for legislation on the interpretation of the refugee concept, one of the implications of which is that women who are persecuted because of their sex and people who are persecuted for reason of their sexual orientation are to be eligible for refugee status.

"The proposal is good. But it will take far too long to carry it through at EU level. I therefore intend to get a head start and propose amendments to the Swedish Aliens Act so as to strengthen the legal position of women and homosexuals in the asylum process."

Agreement with the Office of the UN High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR)

The Government decided today to conclude a cooperation agreement between Sweden and the UN refugee body, the UNHCR. Minister for Development Cooperation, Migration and Asylum Policy Jan O. Karlsson and the UN High Commissioner for Refugees Ruud Lubbers will sign the agreement on Monday 18 February in Geneva.

The agreement covers humanitarian, development and migration issues and includes cooperation between the UNHCR and both the Swedish Government and Swedish agencies, such as Sida, the Swedish Migration Board and the Aliens Appeals Board.

Since 1999, Sweden has concluded annual agreements with the UNHCR on its support to and cooperation with the organisation. The new agreement will apply until further notice and has been drawn up on the basis of previous agreements. Sweden is the UNHCR's fourth largest donor. This year's contribution amounts to SEK 392 million.

At an informal ministerial meeting in Santiago de Compostela today, the EU ministers responsible for migration discussed an action plan to combat the smuggling of human beings and illegal immigration. In his speech, Minister for Development Cooperation, Migration and Asylum Policy Jan O. Karlsson emphasised that the fight against the smuggling of human beings must be characterised by a holistic approach which covers preventive measures as well as control measures. "The fight against the smuggling of human beings must begin early in the migration chain, with efforts to achieve peace, political stability, human rights and democracy. It must not become a one-sided concentration on control measures," said Mr Karlsson, who also urged his colleagues to contribute more to the UN High Commissioner for Refugees.

"A strong UN High Commissioner for Refugees is the best guarantee for support and help to people in areas that have been hit by crisis.

"Women and children must be given priority when the EU implements its action plan to combat the smuggling of human beings and illegal immigration. The trafficking in women for the purpose of sexual exploitation continues to increase despite it having been designated a criminal offence and severe penalties imposed. Trafficking in children for the purpose of sexual exploitation is also extremely serious. It involves children from poor countries, it involves street children and those from children's homes, children who are recruited into this trafficking that could almost be classified as slavery," said Mr Karlsson.

Inquiry into refusal-of-entry and return to a country other than the country of origin

The Government Offices have carried out a review in connection with information presented in the media about cases of refusal-of-entry to Sweden and the return of aliens to Ghana not having been dealt with correctly.

The Prosecutor, who has examined police actions in a number of cases of the return of aliens to Ghana, has discontinued preliminary inquiries. Neither has the Ministry for Foreign Affairs' preliminary review of the handling of the cases by the Swedish Migration Board and the consulate in Ghana given any cause for criticism.

At the same time, discussions surrounding the cases and the investigations have shown that there could be reason to review the Aliens Act in order to clarify situations in which a return of aliens to a country other than the country of origin may be possible.

"I will therefore be proposing that the Government appoints a commission to report on current practice and to submit proposals to make the law clearer. A more detailed examination of existing routines will also be carried out," says Minister for Migration and Asylum Policy Jan O Karlsson.

Sweden to give support to World Bank study

Inquiry into EU enlargement and mobility in the labour market

The Government decided today to appoint a one-man committee on EU enlargement and mobility in the labour market.

How can employees from the new EU Member States have access to the Swedish labour market on the same terms as present EU citizens? How can employees from new Member States be encouraged to take up professions in Sweden where there is a shortage of manpower? These are the most important issues facing the investigator. At the same time, the investigator is to submit proposals for measures to be taken should labour immigration from the new Member States entail a serious disruption of the Swedish labour market or major costs for the social protection systems.

The European Council decision in June on the free movement of manpower from the candidate countries upon entry into the Union is behind the initiative. The decision permits transition periods from two to seven years, but with the possibility of openness from the beginning. Sweden has chosen the latter.

"The future before us will demand greater openness and cross-border mobility. Demographic developments in Sweden, as in the rest of Europe, are characterised by reduced population growth and an ageing population. In the long term, therefore, we will need to open the door to labour immigration to Sweden," says Minister for Development Cooperation, Migration and Asylum Policy Jan O Karlsson.

"This will take place in an organised manner and without disruption to the Swedish labour market. The investigation will provide us with a solid foundation of material as to how we can make use of the asset of free movement in an enlarged EU. I also think it is important that third-country nationals who are resident in an EU country should be included in this free movement. This is also part of the investigator's assignment," says Jan O Karlsson.

There are special agreements for individual projects within the framework of the cooperation agreement. The total amount of development assistance is expected to rise this year to approximately SEK 165 million. Last year, it amounted to some SEK 140 million. New strategy for development cooperation with Afghanistan

Today the Government has decided on a new country strategy for development cooperation with Afghanistan over the period 2002-2004.

The situation in Afghanistan is critical. Twenty-three years of conflicts and recurring natural disasters have devastated the economy and social institutions. Considerable humanitarian assistance will be needed.

The aim of Swedish development cooperation with Afghanistan is to fight poverty in the country. The country strategy defines the objectives and guiding principles for all development assistance programmes in the country, the areas in which they will be implemented and channels to be used. The financial framework of total support will be SEK 750-1 000 million over the three-year period. Swedish development assistance will focus on education, health, mine clearance, food safety and the return of refugees. It will be primarily channelled through the UN, the Red Cross movement and Swedish NGOs, including the Swedish Committee for Afghanistan. Particularly vulnerable target groups such as women, children, persons with disabilities and ethnic minorities should be given special priority.

Sweden has for many years been one of the largest donors of development assistance to Afghanistan and through its Swedish and international cooperation partners, Sida has gained long and extensive experience of assistance to the country.

Sweden to give economic assistance to countries that have recently emerged from armed conflict

Government requests revision of FN sanctions list

This Tuesday, the Government will request the Sanctions Committee of the UN Security Council to revise the list of people and organisations whose assets will be frozen. The request follows a recent Security Council decision on a new resolution calling for clear criteria on sanctions. The Sanctions Committee's first meeting for the purpose of drawing up new sanctions procedures will take place on Wednesday.

"The Swedish Government welcomes the Security Council's decision," said the Minister for Foreign Affairs, Anna Lindh. "It is our understanding that the list will only include people who

fulfil criteria corresponding to those set out by the EU."

Last autumn's decision by Sanctions Committee for Afghanistan to the effect that all UN member countries should freeze the assets of certain people and organisations was taken at very short notice. One member country, the USA, presented the committee with a list which was then distributed to the other 14 committee members. No objections were raised and the list was adopted within 48 hours. Three of the people on it are Swedish citizens. No detailed information was given as to why these particular people had been placed on the list. Nor was the subject discussed by the committee either before or after the decision was taken. Regardless of what one thinks of this procedure, Sweden and all other member countries are duty-bound under international law to comply with the decisions of the Security Council and the Sanctions Committee.

In December, the Swedish UN delegation forwarded a letter from the three Swedish nationals to the Chair of the Sanctions Committee (Colombia) requesting that their names be struck from the list. Although the Chair asked the petitioners to produce additional background information, no such data has been forthcoming.

The Swedish Government has also undertaken to forward a request that an exemption be made in respect of such assets as were necessary for the Swedes' daily support. However, their legal representative has declined to forward such a request.

Last week (16 January) the Security Council adopted a new resolution (1390) on sanctions directed at Osama bin Laden, Al-Qaida and the Taliban, and any organisations or individuals who have or have had dealings with them. The resolution directed the Sanctions Committee to regularly update the list on the basis of relevant information from UN member states and other sources. The committee was also instructed to draw up without delay such guidelines and criteria as might be necessary to facilitate implementation of the resolution.

"The Swedish Government welcomes the Security Council's decision," said the Minister for Foreign Affairs, Anna Lindh. "If the sanctions are adopted with appropriate concern for the rule of law, this can only strengthen confidence in the UN system."

"Now that the new resolution has been adopted, the Swedish Government will today request in its own name a review of the names on the sanctions list, including those of the three Swedes. In the Government's view only the names of people who fulfil the criteria previously adopted by the EU should appear on the list."

Following up on the Security Council's earlier resolution (1373), the EU decided in December to draw up its own list of people and organisations whose assets were to be frozen in EU countries. The EU system incorporates a number of fixed criteria which must be met before a person or organisation can be placed on a blocked accounts list.

Swedish citizen among the prisoners at the Guantanamo base

Unofficial translation

A Swedish citizen was apprehended by the American authorities in Afghanistan suspected of being a member of al-Qaida. He was taken from there to the American naval base Guantanamo Bay, Camp X-Ray, on Cuba. The Swede is one of a larger group of prisoners who according to the United States all constitute a continued threat to the United States and international peace and security.

In the US view, the people taken prisoner are not "legal combatants" and may therefore not be considered prisoners of war. However, the International Committee of the Red Cross considers they should be regarded as prisoners of war. It is the task of the ICRC to supervise that states apply the Geneva Conventions.

In view of the apprehension and transfer of the Swede to the American naval base, the Swedish Embassy in Washington has requested permission to visit him as soon as possible. An embassy official is prepared to travel to Cuba as soon as permission is granted. Contact has been made with the International Committee of the Red Cross (ICRC) which is already present in Guantanamo. Furthermore, the Swedish Embassy in Washington has been instructed to convey to the American

authorities that the Swedish Government expects that all the requirements of the applicable statutory rights are being met.

Commenting on the matter, the Minister for Foreign Affairs, Mrs Anna Lindh, said that she presupposes the Swede will be treated humanely and in accordance with international treaties. Sweden must be kept continually informed of any prosecution against him and given an opportunity to give the Swede assistance. In the event of prosecution, all statutory rights under the third Geneva Convention and the UN International Covenant on Civil and Political Rights must be fully upheld. "It goes without saying that terrorism calls for extraordinary measures. However, humanitarian law and human rights have been written for application in extraordinary circumstances also. It is absolutely necessary that the fight against terrorism is carried on with full respect for international law and human rights," Mrs Lindh says.

The Swedish citizen should now be regarded as a consular assistance matter and his identity is thereby protected under the Secrecy Act. Nor do the American authorities intend to publish his identity

Swedish peace force to Afghanistan

On Friday the 18th of January the Swedish parliament decided to send a Swedish platoon to Afghanistan. The unit will participate in the multinational security force (International Security Assistance Force, ISAF) with mandate from the United Nations. The United Kingdom will have the overall command, the force consists of 5000 troops. The Force will assist the Afghan administration in upholding order and security.

The Swedish unit is an intelligence platoon consisting of two to three patrols with command, control and logistic mechanisms which through surveillance, patrol and reconnaissance will contribute to heightened security in the Kabul area. The platoon consists of 45 men, and is subordinated the English force. The Brits will decide when the Swedish unit will arrive in Kabul. The mandate for the Swedish platoon is six months, but they will primarily be in Afghanistan until the 30th of April.

Request for extradition of Alfredo Astiz delivered in Buenos Aires

Navy officer Alfredo Astiz has been apprehended and placed under arrest (on 28 December 2001) in Argentina, on the basis of the international warrant issued in connection with the detention order against Astiz pronounced by Stockholm City Court. The charge is kidnapping.

The request for Astiz's extradition to Sweden comes from Chief District Prosecutor Tomas Lindstrand at the International Public Prosecution Office in Stockholm.

The Swedish Ambassador to Argentina, Madeleine Ströje-Wilkens, acting on behalf of the Ministry of Justice and the Ministry for Foreign Affairs, today, 18 January 2002, delivered the request for Astiz's extradition to Deputy Minister for Foreign Affairs Jorge Faurie and State Secretary Rogelio Pfirter.

The case will now be processed by the Argentine authorities.

Delivering the request, Ambassador Ströje-Wilkens emphasised the importance of clarifying the fate of Dagmar Hagelin. The Swedish Government has put this point to Argentine governments repeatedly over the years, ever since Dagmar Hagelin's disappearance in January 1977. In recent years the Prime Minister, Göran Persson, has personally taken up the case with both President Menem and President de la Rúa.

"The Ambassador also expressed Sweden's solidarity with the Argentine people and the hope that Argentina will be able to solve the serious crisis in which the country now finds itself – in political, economic, social and legal terms", says Minister for Foreign Affairs Anna Lindh in a comment. "The Ambassador emphasised the hope of the Swedish Government that justice will be done and that the new Argentine Government under President Duhalde will take measures to strengthen the legal system and clear up outstanding human rights cases", adds Anna Lindh.

"During the convalescence of Kjell Larsson, Lena Sommestad will take over as Minister for the Environment. As a member of the board of the Foundation for Strategic Environmental Research, MISTRA, and as a futures scholar she has solid knowledge in the environmental field.

"When Kjell Larsson returns to his post later this spring Lena Sommestad will be entrusted with other tasks in the Cabinet. I will describe these in more detail at the appropriate time.

"Lena Sommestad has expertise in a broad range of fields – economics, the environment and demographics. More than most of us she has tried to see what lies beyond the horizon, what the future has to offer.

"By appointing Lena Sommestad to a ministerial post I want to emphasise the importance of launchin a serious discourse about the major issues for the future: environmental threats, demographic developments, the link between growth and prosperity, education and research. As she takes up her post Lena Sommestad brings a futures dimension to the Swedish Cabinet."

Anna Lindh cautiously optimistic about developments in Colombia

Sweden welcomes the news that the peace process in Colombia between the Colombian government and the FARC guerrilla movement was saved from total breakdown at the final moment last night by active international participation. "The developments of the past twenty-four hours do not mean that the armed conflict in Colombia is over but they do give cause for cautious optimism," states the Minister for Foreign Affairs. "We support the international community's peace efforts actively and wholeheartedly," says Ms Lindh.

Country strategy for development cooperation with Cambodia

The Government decided today on a new country strategy for development cooperation with Cambodia for the period 2002-2004.

The primary aim for Swedish development cooperation with Cambodia is to contribute to Cambodia's own efforts to fight poverty. This will be achieved by continuing focus on support to poverty-directed rural development, education and democracy and human rights. Gender equality issues, the environment and HIV/Aids will continue to be integrated into development assistance programmes. The greater part of this Swedish development assistance will be channelled via various UN bodies, other multilateral organisations and NGOs. Development assistance will amount to approximately SEK 330 million over the period 2002-2004.

After three decades of civil war and violence, the situation in Cambodia is now characterised by relative stability. However, the country is still at a level of development that is far below that of the majority of countries in South-East Asia, and is one of the world's poorest nations.

Appeal to the parties in the Conflict in the Democratic Republic of congo

At an informal meeting in Stockholm on 10 January, African and Nordic Foreign Ministers have discussed the link between security and poverty reduction in the context of the important initiative known as the New Partnership for Africa's Development (NEPAD). On that occasion, the participants agreed to launch a strong appeal to all sides in the conflict in the Democratic Republic of Congo:

Peace is at last within reach, provided that all Congolese parties, as well as the countries exerting influence on them, are ready to strike the necessary compromises.

We also urge the international community, including the United Nations, to provide substantial support to peace building in the Great Lakes region, so that the peace process becomes irreversible and all parties feel encouraged to remain engaged.

Jan O Karlsson to visit Afghanistan

Unofficial translation

Minister for Development Cooperation, Migration and Asylum Policy Jan O Karlsson is due to travel to Afghanistan on Thursday afternoon.

" I want as quickly as possible to get a personal impression of the country's situation and development assistance operations in order to see how reconstruction in Afghanistan is to be effected," says Jan O Karlsson.

In Kabul he will meet representatives of the Afghanistan Government and UN and international development assistance organisations, including the Swedish Afghanistan Committee and Save the Children.

Sweden is one of the largest assistance donors to Afghanistan. Sweden contributed SEK 250 million in 2001. This support has been primarily used for health efforts, education, mine clearance, food supplies and support to refugees. Swedish development assistance has been distributed via the UN system, Swedish NGOs (mainly the Swedish Afghanistan Committee) and the International Red Cross movement.

Sida has presented a proposal for a country strategy for development assistance to Afghanistan over the next three years. The proposal entails a Swedish development assistance contribution of up to SEK 1 billion until the end of 2004. The Government is expected to make a decision on this strategy within the next few weeks.

Nine African foreign ministers to meet Nordic colleagues in Stockholm

Together with her Nordic colleagues, Minister for Foreign Affairs Anna Lindh has invited the ministers for foreign affairs of nine African states to an informal meeting in Stockholm on 10-11 January.

The ministers, who also met in Stockholm about a year ago, will continue their discussions on peace, security and conflict prevention in Africa. In addition, they will discuss the New Partnership for Africa's Development (NEPAD). This programme, which has been developed by African leaders, aims to eliminate poverty in Africa and set the continent on a path of sustainable growth and development.

The NEPAD programme stresses the importance of democracy, human rights and good governance. It calls for a new partnership between Africa and the international community, aimed at ending the marginalisation of the African continent.

The ministers will participate in a public debate on NEPAD to be held at the Riksdag on Friday 11 January, which has been arranged by the Nordic Africa Institute and the Swedish Federation of Young Scientist Clubs. On Friday morning some of the ministers will also visit St. Botvid's Upper Secondary School in Botkyrka.

The African ministers represent democratic states with which the Nordic countries are engaged in ongoing cooperation projects. The following ministers will participate:

Erkki Tuomioja (Finland), Halldór Ásgrímsson (Iceland), Jan Petersen (Norway), Kolawolé A. Idji (Benin), Mompati S. Merafhe (Botswana), Hackman Owusu-Agyemang (Ghana), Modibo Sidibé (Mali), Leonardo Santos Simão (Mozambique), Alhaji Sule Lamido (Nigeria), Nkosazana C. Dlamini Zuma (South Africa), and Cheikh Tidiane Gadio (Senegal). Tanzania will be represented by the Deputy Minister for Foreign Affairs Abdulkader Shareef and Denmark by Director-General Carsten Staur.

Sweden welcomes the Polisario's decision to release Moroccan prisoners

In the beginning of January, the Polisario (the West Saharan liberation movement) decided to free 115 Moroccan prisoners of war. The conflict on the West Sahara has now been under way for 26 years, with enormous human suffering as a result. There are over 150 000 West Saharan refugees in Algeria, living in great hardship. The Polisario is holding some 1 400 Moroccan prisoners of war in Algeria, and West Saharans have "disappeared" in Morocco.

"I welcome the Polisario's decision to release 115 Moroccan prisoners of war. This is an important step that should lead to the release of the rest of the prisoners as well. The release of prisoners of war is an important humanitarian and confidence-building measure that will improve the climate and conditions for discussions that the UN is holding with the parties to this conflict. I appeal to the parties to continue to take measures to resolve the remaining humanitarian issues in accordance with UN Security Council Resolution 1359(2001) and humanitarian law", comments Minister for Foreign Affairs Anna Lindh.

It has not yet been possible to implement the UN peace plan and the referendum on the future status of West Sahara planned by the UN. The parties have not been able to agree on who should be entitled to vote in this election. Political talks are being held via UN envoy James Baker between the Polisario and Morocco.

"The Swedish Government supports the UN's efforts to reach a rapid and permanent solution to the conflict in West Sahara. The guiding principles for the Swedish Government are international law and people's rights to self-determination. The Swedish Government is working to achieve a solution to the humanitarian problems", continues Anna Lindh.

Sweden is one of the largest donors to West Saharan refugees. In addition to grants given via the EU and other international organisations, Sweden has given SEK 103 million in development assistance to West Saharan refugees since 1989.

Sweden applies to join Open Skies

Sweden and Finland have applied to join the treaty on observation flights – the Open Skies Treaty – that entered into effect on 1 January 2002.

"We welcome the entry into force of the treaty. It brings a further strengthening of the pan-European, treaty-based security order that Sweden has sought to promote", says Minister for Foreign Affairs Anna Lindh.

"The increased transparency and predictability that this treaty brings in the military sphere makes it an important instrument for building confidence and security", comments Minister for Defence Björn von Sydow.

The treaty is legally binding and entails that states parties permit one another to conduct short-notice observation flights over all portions of their territories. Since 1999 Sweden has

conducted several observation flights in the spirit of the treaty.

Twenty-seven countries have acceded to the treaty, which was signed in Helsinki in 1992. At that time participation was limited to members of NATO and the Warsaw Pact. It is now being opened up to all countries that are members of the Organisation for Security and Cooperation in Europe (OSCE).

Swedish accession requires the approval of the Riksdag, which is expected to discuss the issue during the spring. Sweden's application must also be accepted by all other participating countries before accession can take place. Sweden will be admitted to treaty participation in the autumn at the earliest.
