The past year

 2020 was a very challenging year for global health. The COVID-19 pandemic is the most extensive health crisis in over one hundred years and requires both managing the acute crisis and maintaining the long-term work with health systems, health security and healthy societies.



About the development assistance for health report

- Sida's global health efforts are governed by thirteen bilateral strategies, one regional strategy and one global strategy.

Record development assistance for health in 2020

- Sweden's development assistance for health in 2020 amounted to SEK 6.2 billion, the largest amount ever.
- This increase is partly linked to the COVID-19 pandemic, but is also due to increased core support.
- 58% of development assistance for health was channelled via the MFA, and 42% via Sida.




Total aid is also increasing

- Development assistance for health accounted for 11.9% of total aid, just over one percentage point higher than in 2019 but lower than previous years due to the general increase in aid.
- According to the OECD DAC, in 2020 Sweden provided the most aid in relation to its gross national income (GNI) – 1.14% – of any country in the world.




Core support and special initiatives

- The MFA's development assistance for health amounted to more than SEK 3.5 billion, of which 89% was core support.
- The five largest recipients received more than 80% of the total support.
- The Global Fund and Gavi received both increased core support and special additional funding in 2020.
- The World Bank invested an increased share of its funds in health in 2020.

Sida's development assistance for health 2020



Focus on country cooperation

- Sida's development assistance for health in 2020 amounted to SEK 2.6 billion, an increase of over a quarter of a billion compared with 2019.
- Most of Sida's support (56%) was channelled to country level.
- Five countries received over half of the bilateral support paid during the year, and seven countries received over SEK 100 million each.




Implementing organisations

- In terms of implementing organisations, Sida's share of assistance channelled via multilateral organisations increased from 51% in recent years to 59% in 2020.
- Conversely, the share via the next largest category, NGOs and civil society organisations, decreased slightly to 33%.




Sida's development assistance for health 2015–2020






Sida's bilateral development assistance for health Disbursements for 2020

Sexual and reproductive health and rights (SRHR)

Continued increase in development assistance for SRHR

- In 2020, Sweden's development assistance for sexual and reproductive health and rights (SRHR) amounted to SEK 3.2 billion.
- Development assistance for SRHR thus continues to increase annually, from both the MFA and Sida, each of which accounts for equally large shares.



Somewhat lower share

 Despite the record amount of development assistance for SRHR in 2020, the increase in total assistance means that SRHR represents a 6.1% share of Sweden's development assistance.

Major support to global COVID-19 response

- Sweden's total support to the global COVID-19 response amounted to SEK 1.9 billion in 2020 (not just development assistance for health).
- Most (80%) was channelled via Sida to new and additional support as well as to reprogrammed support.
- An additional sum in excess of SEK 670 million was paid by the MFA to address the pandemic's indirect effects, primarily regarding humanitarian action.

Methodology



General comments

- Statistics from the MFA's and Sida's statistical databases are used to calculate Sweden's development assistance for health.
- The standard values are used to calculate the shares of development assistance for health and development assistance for SRHR.
- With few exceptions, that same standard values are used in this year's report as in last year's.

Standard values for development assistance for health

Regarding the organisations mentioned in the report, standard values have been use to calculate the share of Swedish core support that has gone to health initiatives in each organisation. Standard values are based on data received from each organisation on how large a share of non-earmarked activities goes to the health sector.

Regarding **GFATM**, **UNFPA**, **Gavi**, **UNAIDS**, **WHO** and **IFFIm**, it is estimated that 100% of activities are health-oriented initiatives. This means that all of Sweden's core support to these organisations is calculated as health assistance.

Regarding **UNDP**, the share considered as being targeted at strengthening systems for services related to HIV in 2017 (1.05%) has been used to calculate how large a share of Swedish core support has gone to health. This standard value has been kept for 2020. In 2020, Sweden also gave core support to **UN Women**, which has health-oriented activities. Of the Swedish support, 9% is estimated to have been used for health-oriented action.

Regarding **UNICEF**, the share of the organisation's regular resources in 2019 that went to result area 'health' (28%) has served as a standard value to calculate how large a share of Swedish core support has been designated for health-related measures. This is a reduction compared with the previous standard value of 43%. Sweden's investments in water and sanitation are reported separately from health initiatives, and so support to the UNICEF Water, Sanitation and Hygiene (WASH) programme is not included in this report.

Regarding the **World Bank**, the previous standard value (13.2%) has been adjusted upwards to 14.1%, which corresponds to the total share to the health sector from both the IBRD and the IDA in the first half of 2020. Water and sanitation have not been included, since within the World Bank this is largely comprised of major infrastructure projects. Other investment banks, such as the African and Asian Development Banks, have not been included in this report since only a very small part of their activities are focused on the health sector.

Sweden's development assistance for health via the EU is provided through the European Development Fund (**EDF**) and the European Commission (**EU KOM**). Since EU support to health-related measures can vary greatly from year to year, references are made to commitments in the area of health and not to actual payments. Regarding both the Development Fund and the Commission, the commitment – given as a percentage – amounts to 5.4 per cent for the period 2014–2020. For practical reasons, this figure has been used as a standard value to estimate Sweden's relative contribution to health via the EU in 2020.



Standard value for SRHR

An estimate of how large a share of development assistance for health goes to SRHR is made based on the methodology and standard values developed by the *Netherlands Interdisciplinary Demographic Institute* (NIDI) to follow up donor support to population activities, in line with the ICPD Programme of Action. To estimate how large a share of multilateral core support goes to SHRH via the Ministry for Foreign Affairs and Sida's support per sector code, the standard values established by the NIDI have been used.

These figures were developed by the NIDI in collaboration with bilateral and multilateral organisations by means of a questionnaire to ODA donors. The percentage shows how large a share of the organisation's activities – according to the organisation – is allocated to SRHR. In 2014, NIDI/UNFPA stopped following up donor support for population activities, but Sweden has chosen to maintain this methodology so it can compare Swedish support to SRHR and as a share of development assistance over time.



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
